#### The Story of Buchanan



#### "About The First Planting Of Men" & How They Did

A Tale Of Settlement Here 17 Days Before The Town Was Born

The western route of Ira and Mahalla Mansfield was almost entirely through recently settled areas where all of the settlers had experienced the hardships of the emigrant only a few years before. Their memories opened their doors to the wayfarers from New York state, who were not refused admittance anywhere during their month-long journey.

Following the successful passage of the Maumee river Jane slights nearly 220 miles, except to say that after leaving Ohio they drove to the old Chicago Road, probably at Tecumseh, Mich., and followed that pioneer route west to Chicago.

They went by way of Niles instead of taking the old Chicago trail route through Bertrand. A few miles east of Niles in southern Cass county Jane was introduced to that famous item of southern cookery, the corn dodger. Mr. Mansfield had stopped and gained permission to stay the night. Mrs. Mansfield asked if they might have supper. The lady of the house said they had just finished a meal of dodgers and milk and there was plenty left, if they liked it. Jane edged up to her mother and whispered, "What are dodgers?" "Wait and see," answered Mahalla. So Jane waited and in due time learned, and liked the dodger, which was a corn bread baked in the ashes of the fireplace on boards made for that purpose.

The first destination of the Mansfields was Crystal Lake, Ill., 12 miles northwest of Chicago. Relatives who lived there wanted the Mansfields to select land and settle there. Jane skipped over the events between Niles and Chicago, save that her father drove a bit out of the way at Lacrosse to show them a gallows. "What a man had just been hung for murder. Also noted were the deep mires and swamps where Calumet and Pullman now stand. At Chicago they stopped briefly to check on the arrival of their household goods they had shipped there by boat. The goods had not arrived, never did arrive and were never heard of. This was a commonplace experience in the West. Chicago was a frontier city of a few thousand people, still in the raw ugly stage—a "muddy black-dirt hole," Jane noted.

On they went through more mashes to Crystal Lake. There Mr. and Mrs. Mansfield were both at once prostrated by ague. After Mr. Mansfield had recovered he was shown the lands of northeast Illinois, Henry county, and across the border in southern Wisconsin. Mansfield told his host he would not take one of the "black muck" farms of that area if it were given to him, and the pilgrims started home to New York state.

By that time Mansfield's funds which he had brought along to pay expenses of the trip west were low, as he had not thought of returning. This summer of 1842 was near the low point of the banking and financial panic which had begun five years before. The only money in circulation in any amount was the paper issue of the state banks, nearly all of which was depreciated in terms of specie. The farther Mansfield got from New York State the more his New York state money was suspected and it was accepted only at a "fearful discount," as Jane heard her father tell her mother. They would soon be out and would have to stop at the first place they could find an empty house, until they could get more funds from the east. By a happy set of coincidences their money ran out at Bertrand, where they also found a vacant

house, and the same day they arrived they met Major Dutton. Dutton was the operator of a sawmill on McCoy's creek, on the site later occupied by the Banton brothers flour mill. He needed help in his sawmill, and he had a vacant log cabin on his mill grounds. "We have to help each other," said Major Dutton in the true pioneer spirit. "You can come to McCoy's creek six miles north, and live in my house and work for me while you wait to hear from the east." So it was done. They stayed one night at Bertrand, then drove to McCoy's creek. From Jane's account it seems that they may have approached the sawmill settlement by a road corresponding to the present road.

#### W. C. Lyddick, Buchanan Native, Dies At 75 Years

Spent Entire Life As Farmer On Portage Prairie

Funeral services were held at the Swem Funeral home at 2:30 p.m. Oct. 4 for William C. Lyddick, with the Rev. Lawrence E. Lee of the Evangelical United Brethren church in charge. Buryal was made in the Portage Prairie cemetery.

He was born near Buchanan Dec. 16, 1876, the son of Adam and Susan Lyddick, and spent his entire life as a farmer on Portage Prairie. He had lived on his farm immediately west of the Bertrand township hall since 1904. His last illness began last April. He spent several weeks during June and July in hospitals and had improved and came to Buchanan, making his home at the Hotel Buchanan. He became worse again and was taken back to the Berrien Center hospital Sept. 15, dying there at 1:20 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 2.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Mary Young of Buchanan and Mrs. Carrie Randall of Kalamazoo; by four brothers, John W. Lyddick of Gary, Andrew Lyddick of Buchanan Rt. 2, Charles Lyddick of Benton Harbor Rt. 2, Fred Lyddick of South Bend.

Howard Souther, 1727 Oak St. Niles, is the author of an article published in the October issue of Radio-Electronics, a national technical magazine on radio, television and high-fidelity. A graduate of the University of Arizona, he was at one time an amateur radio operator, a partner in Transcriptions Inc., and an instructor at Motion Pictures Institute. During World War II he was a captain in the Signal Corps, Pictorial Engineering & Research Division, assisting in standards on exposure meters and the military projector JANP 409.

#### Police Will Experiment In Use For A Time

Public Invited To Stop And Watch Experimental Checks

The Buchanan Police Department received the new electric timing device for regulating automobile traffic Tuesday, states Chief Jack Krugh, and the force will spend several weeks in conducting speed surveys on different streets of the city, and in acquainting themselves with its use. During this period the device will not be used in the enforcement of legal speed rates. The signs to be posted at the highway entrances to the city have not arrived. They will be posted before the timer goes into use as an enforcement device.

Anyone who sees the timer in use in experimental operation by the police is cordially invited to stop and watch its operation, or make a trial use of it themselves if they wish. Or if they wish the police will check the accuracy of their speedometers by the device. The timers are given approval by many cities as far better than the present car-chasing methods, and a safer method of enforcement, and more accurate than a speedometer on a police car.

#### Fire Dept. Runs To Select Fire

3 Farm Buildings And Their Contents, Totaling \$20,000 Value, Lost

The Buchanan fire department was called to a Niles township fire for an assist about noon Sunday. Three farm buildings and their contents were destroyed on the John Selen farm, located a mile east of the Range Line Road on the left side of the Winn road, which branches from Range Line just this side of the Frank Bachman house. Lost in the fire were one large barn, one small implement barn, one small brooder house, including all equipment.

Selen had turned all farm stock and poultry out of the barn Sunday morning. It is believed that the fire started in a short in the wiring of the large barn. A strong wind carried the flames through the other buildings. The barns were too far gone to save at the time of the arrival of the firemen who devoted their efforts to saving the house, which was in line with the direction of the flames.

The loss was estimated at \$20,000. Selen stated that he had insurance of \$6,000 on the buildings, but none on the implements. The Niles city fire department and the Morris farm department were also called out.

#### May Desenberg, Merchant Here 17 Years, Dies

Leader Church, Social Worker, Managed Store After Death Of Husband

Funeral rites will be held at 2 p.m. Friday at the Swem Funeral Home for Mrs. May E. Desenberg, a resident of Buchanan for 44 years. The Rev. H. Carlyle Carson will be in charge and burial will be made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

The business houses will be closed from 2 to 3 p.m. for the funeral. Mrs. Desenberg was born May 24, 1875, in Corydon, Iowa, the daughter of Henry and Margaret Belvel.

She married Louis M. Desenberg on April 30, 1908, in Berkeley, Calif. He died Dec. 2, 1934. Until recent years Mrs. Desenberg had been an active leader in her church and in the social life of Buchanan. She was a member of the Presbyterian church, a member and past president of the Buchanan unit of the Business and Professional Women, a member of the Fort St. Joseph Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, of the former Monday club and the Thirty club.

Following the death of her husband in 1934, she had taken an active charge of the Desenberg clothing store and conducted it until after the Christmas season of 1951, when failing health forced her retirement.

She is survived by a son, Atty. E. R. Desenberg; by two sisters, Harriet Evans and Margaret Richter, both of Des Moines, Iowa, by a brother, E. Rea Belvel of South Bend; by three grandchildren. She died at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday at the Pawating hospital, where she had been taken the day before. She had been an invalid following a hip fracture incurred at her home last June.

She left Roanoke first as a girl to stay with a brother in Indiana, and came at the age of 20 to Buchanan, making her home with the William Conrad family. She was married to Orville Rose at the Conrad home on Jan. 12, 1890. They celebrated their 58th marriage anniversary before his death on April 29, 1948.

Mrs. Rose had attended the Evangelical church since its first organization here, and had since belonged to the organization for many years. She is survived by three daughters, Mammie and May at home and Mrs. Milton Bachman of South Bend Road, Portage Prairie, by one son, Glover Rose of Mishawaka, Ind., by two sisters, Mrs. Ora Riley and Mrs. Lottie Wilson, both of Roanoke, Va.; by five grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. She died at 3:15 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 2, after an illness of four years at the home four miles northwest on the Madron Lake Road, where she and her husband lived since 1904.

#### John F. Russell Dies Suddenly

Business And Civic Leader Meets Untimely Death At Age 52

Buchanan business houses will be closed from 3 to 4 p.m. today (Thursday) for the funeral of John F. Russell, business and civic leader, who died suddenly at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 5, 1952.

The funeral will be held at the Moccasin avenue school at 3 p.m. with the Rev. H. Carlyle Carson of the First Presbyterian church in charge. Buryal will be made in Oak Ridge cemetery. He was born in Buchanan Jan. 12, 1900, the son of Henry and Augusta Russell. In 1925 at St. Joseph he married Miss Mildred Biocucci, who survives him.

He began his business career here in 1925 as a salesman in the employ of Philip Friday, then conducting an automobile agency here. From the beginning he displayed marked ability as a salesman and in 1927 he purchased the Buchanan Chevrolet agency from Floyd Lintner afterwards adding agencies in Niles and Berrien Springs.

He served on the Buchanan school board from 1938 to 1944, when he was very active in the promotion of expanded school facilities here. He showed further interest in the youth of the community in 1946 when he headed the committee which raised the funds for the construction of the Buchanan Youth Council building. He was a member of the Elks Lodge in Niles and of the Loyal Order of the Moose. In 1950 he was one of twelve dealers in the United States named to membership in a dealers conference committee by the General Motors corporation.

He is survived by his wife, by a daughter, JoAnn, now a student at Stephens College, Missouri; a son, Jack D., at home with his mother; Mrs. Augusta Russell Baroda, two sisters, Mrs. Marie Davis, Stevensville, and Mrs. Louise Randt, Lansing; nine brothers, George of Buchanan, Lester of Niles, Milton and Alvin of Berrien Harbor, Louis of Hastings, Harry and Henry of Stevensville. Death came very suddenly and unexpectedly from heart attack while he was mowing the lawn at his home on Terre Coupe road about 7:30 p.m. Sunday.

Outside of Best, the locals, as they are written, are in good condition and barring any later practice injuries should enter the Niles tilt ready for some sweet revenge.

As for the Niles camp, they are still licking last week's battle scars. Goshen, Ind., finally broke the Niles winning streak of 20 consecutive victories last Friday with a 13-0 trouncing. The last time a Viking eleven tasted defeat was in the 1949 Dowagiac squad. 12-6. But the Vikes are a proud school and they probably will shake off the ill effects of last week's contest and be keyed high for this one.

Game time is 7:30.

#### Buchanan Smothers South Haven 33-7

Striking for two first period touchdowns and a 14-7 advantage, the Buchanan Bucks roared to a 33-7 victory over the South Haven Rams last Friday night. The triumph enabled the Bucks to remain on the clean side of the winning department with a 3-0 record while South Haven has yet to come out on the long end of the score.

A crowd of 1500 set through a thrill-packed first stanza as both legions ran both kick-offs for markers. The Bucks scored first early in the game as they motored into the end zone from their 43 South Haven yard and from here the locals moved 67 yards in nine plays to score, clinched by James Burket throwing 32 yards to Bob Rotzen for the TD. John Rothfuchs booted the PAT for a 7-0 count.

Then came the 4th of October fireworks. The Rams must have received word that something had to be done at this time for it was upon the ensuing kickoff that Don Pobuda caught the ball on his 11-yard line and scampered 89 yards to score and the Ram players were tied at 7 all after the kick.

But Richard Beistle must have caught the kick-off return fever for he fiddled the kick-off after the Ram score and raced 72 yards to chalk up his second touchdown of the season. Rothfuchs booted from placement and the Bucks led 14-7 at the end of 12 minutes.

Buchanan advanced the score to 20-7 late in the second stanza as they marched 55 yards to score. Beistle began the drive by losing four yards but Charles Nichols swept left end for 25 yards and a first down on the Ram 31. Beistle sliced off tackle to the 20 a play later and then Gordon Smith ended the drive by cutting, though gaud for the touchdown. The kick after a 15-yard Buck penalty was no good.

The third stanza was scoreless as both teams staged a good old fashioned punting duel. South Haven punted late in the quarter to their 20 and as the last period opened Burket dashed for 4 yards to the 26 and then Nichols' sled around end to score. Rothfuchs' kick was blocked.

The Bucks picked up their last touchdown of the game late in contest as Burket picked off a Haven pass on the Ram 19. From here Jim passed to Gumble for 16 yards. Dodge Kurpinski threw to Nichols for 1 and then came a reward that Burket deserved. The quarterback playing his third season as a varsity regular scored the first touchdown of his career by banking over center for six points. The kick was good.

Billions Appropriated For Power Progress

In the past six years the light and power industry has increased its generating capacity by 50%—from about 40,000,000 to 60,000,000 kilowatts. The cost was more than \$10,000,000,000, and every nickel of it was private capital.

Commenting on this achievement, the Wall Street Journal said editorially: "This newspaper believes there is no electric power shortage either present or threatened, save in the working imaginations of certain politicians and of ardent believers in state socialism."

Government officials who plug for socialized electricity have been forecasting the most critical kind of power shortage for many years. Yet real shortages have never appeared. The power situation has been tightest in regions, such as the Pacific Northwest, where socialization of the industry, or the threat of it, has prevented normal expansion and growth.

Story Of Buchanan

(Continued from Page 1) ing roughly with the course of the present Rynearson Road Jane writes of the hills between Niles and McCoy's creek resembling the wooded hills of New York State. They came down the long hill past the David Sanford farm house just east of the present (1952) Hayden-Habicht garage.

The Sanford farm borders on the east the farm of Andrew Day, whose house was on the location of Gambles store (236-240 E. Front) extending south from Front. Joining Day's farm on the west was the land of John Hamilton, whose holdings cornered at the present Front and Oak street intersection, his house being about on the present city hall site (107 West Front).

Lyman Bates had a farm with an orchard extending north from Front and west of Moccasin, his home being in the rear of the cement house now at 107 Moccasin. The streets named were then non-existent, as they arrived here on July 4th, 1842, just 17 days before John Hamilton filed the plat of Buchanan at the courthouse in Berrien Springs.

The log house they were to move into near Dutton's mill needed some work, so the Duttons lived two weeks in a log cabin on an "island" formed by a division of McCoy's creek about due north of the present (1952) E. Lillian Crull building at 227 East Front street. This island took in the area now known as the Clark "mound" east of Portage street, and the creek rejoined into one about 100 yards north-

east of that point between the extensions of Dewey avenue and Third street. John Hamilton's mill was on the north fork near the present intersection of Dewey avenue and North Portage street. The Mansfield family moved into the log house in the mill-yard, after Ira and Mr. Dutton had worked nights for two weeks getting it ready. Dutton advised Mansfield that a forty acres north of Front street was school land, and that he knew it would soon be sold. He told Mansfield to go to the land office at Kalamazoo at once and buy it.

In the spring of 1843 Ira Mansfield had secured money from the east, enough to make a good payment. So he went to Kalamazoo by horseback and bought the land, then covered with oak trees and grubs. At once he sawed lumber and built a plank house. The family moved in before a door was hung, and covered the opening with a blanket until Dec. 1, 1843. The structure is still a part of the framework of the present Furrer home.

**Scholarships For Short Course Open To Young Farmers**

Some scholarships for the fall term of Agricultural Short Courses at Michigan State College will not be awarded until Friday, Oct 17, officials have announced.

Young farmers interested in applying, or persons knowing of eligible youths, should contact a high school teacher or economist of agriculture, a county agricultural agent, a local banker or Short Courses Department, MSC, East Lansing.

The fall term will open Oct 27 with registrations, with the present ranks of 92 advance enrollees expected to be swelled before then. Both leadership and practical agricultural skills are taught. The tuition, room, board and books for an 8-week course period average about \$140.

The complete agriculture course for men includes livestock, dairying, crops, farm management, poultry, soils, horticulture, farm mechanics, plant diseases, bacteriology, farm insects, and other subjects. Elective subjects include rural leadership, family relations, parliamentary procedure and public speaking. Some courses are co-educational and there is a home economics course for women.

Young men will live in the Short Course dormitory and eat at the Short Course cafeteria. Campus quarters also will be provided for women students. The associations and experience will help them to greater successes in farming and in rural leadership.

Banks in Michigan back the program annually with 240 Bank Scholarships and Sears Roebuck Co provides other financial help for students.



# Former Rear Admiral U. S. Navy Is Now Skipper At Helm Berrien Co. Hospital

## A Rear Admiral Is Skipper Of County Hospital

### Former U. S. Navy Officer Shows How Good Public Relations Help Cure Cases and Save Co. Money

Public relations improvement is reported to be receiving increasing attention in hospitals in general these days, but many word-of-mouth reports from patients indicate that kindness as a curative is being practiced with an especially special success at the Berrien County Hospital at Berrien Center, Mich.

Every month there comes to the Record office one of the instruments of good personnel promotion at Berrien Center, in the form of a magazine for workers and patients, "The Hospital Mirror." The frontpiece is a drawing of the hospital entrance, with this verse beneath:

"Within these gray walls life begins and ends,  
Here in this harbor, worn sea-weary ships  
Drop anchor as the fading sun descends.

A fitting sentiment—all the more fitting since the skipper of the Berrien County Hospital is a retired rear admiral of the United States Navy. He had spent 35 years in navy surgery, his last work being in a large way supervision of personnel, as rear admiral in charge of the Ninth Naval District with headquarters at Great Lakes.

Wait a minute, his name is Frederic L. Conklin, M.D. He had planned while in naval service to return to active surgery on retirement, and he retired a year in advance of the navy limit of 62 to take the Berrien Center post. He was born in Manchester, Mich., he is a graduate of the University of Michigan, a classmate of the late Dr. J. C. Strayer of Buchanan. The last fact will not at all hurt his "public relations" in Buchanan.

He has been in charge at the Berrien Center hospital since 1949.

The mimeographed messages of kindness bubbles over with lightly-touched news and jokes—but it nevertheless carries a serious communication. There is an editorial, "Public Relations Reflected by Secretaries and Nurses." Here's just a taste from it:

"Sick people are often difficult, not from choice but from sheer suffering, and this one factor will quickly determine your patience and tact. While it is unwise to appear curious about a patient's private life, a little conversation about his family, his hobbies, or his work will smooth the pathway to a more friendly understanding. Each and every person connected with the functioning of a hospital can be an emissary of good public relations, by having the ability to like people, to enjoy helping people, to be cheerful and polite and by trying to be tactful in every situation."

And from this and the rest of the editorial—a welded esprit d' corps in the hospital force can become a main factor in curative results, as well as in public relations.

It works in many ways, as the testimony of many patients and the response of the public, including the medical profession, proves. Twelve Berrien county doctors, including skilled specialists, give their services gratis as consultants. Once operations were rare at the hospital because of lack of staff and equipment. Now Dr. Conklin, himself a skilled and experienced surgeon has an assistant, Dr. L. E. Litven, and a staff of nine registered nurses. So now all surgery is handled at the Berrien Center Hospital, except cases that require highly specialized skills. The hospital has very mod-

ern equipment in its operating rooms, including spark-proof light switches. Once all cancer cases were sent out for X-rays, but now they are done in the hospital with skilled consultants to aid in learning.

The development of the above skills and facilities within the hospital have resulted in considerable savings in outside fees and transportation expenses.

All of the above pertains to the technical work of the hospital. But to the layman there is something else understood in the lounging rooms and sun rooms, and the patients' wards. There is an atmosphere of cheerful sociability. Furnishings are not new, modern, deluxe, but they are clean and well-kept.

Service and fraternal clubs and organizations from nearby cities have provided television sets, radios and other time-passing entertainment facilities for men's and women's convalescent wards and lounging rooms and the infirmary. Many organizations and individuals contribute books and magazines. But there is always a shortage of reading materials. Anyone in the Buchanan community who has accumulated old magazines or good books can be sure that they will be well placed and enjoyed to the limit in the Berrien County Hospital. It is but a little over a moderate half hour's drive to the hospital site and a visit to the hospital which caters to Berrien county's underprivileged might be enlightening.

Beautyicians from nearby towns and cities give their services gratis, and many women have received the "first hair" waves of their lives in the Berrien Center hospital. For many of them it is better than a dose of medicine.

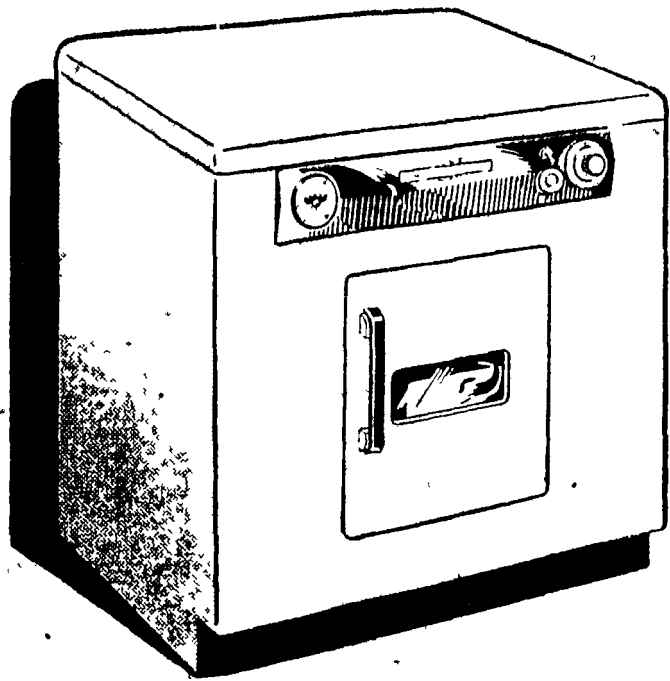
Service, fraternal and social organizations and clubs sponsor many women's tea parties, and holiday parties, as on Christmas.

There is an average of 85 patients in the hospital at all times. There is also an out-patient clinic for those who do not require hospitalization. These services are regularly available to legal residents of the county, and are free wholly or partially only to those who can prove their financial inability. Patients are asked to get statements from their local physician saying that they need care. After these preliminaries they are taken to Berrien Center to determine their needs. All cases which are accepted are taken care of impartially, and none are ever neglected because of the lack of money.

We close this with the magazine's sally at insolvency in the "Silly Dilly" column:

Doctor: I will examine you for \$10.  
Patient: Go ahead, and if you can find it I'll give you half.

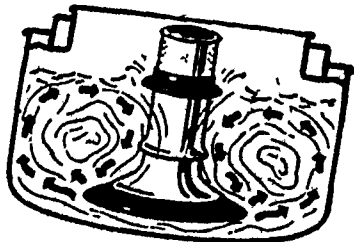

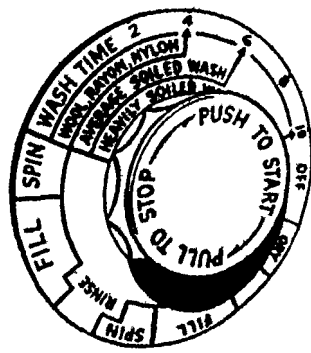

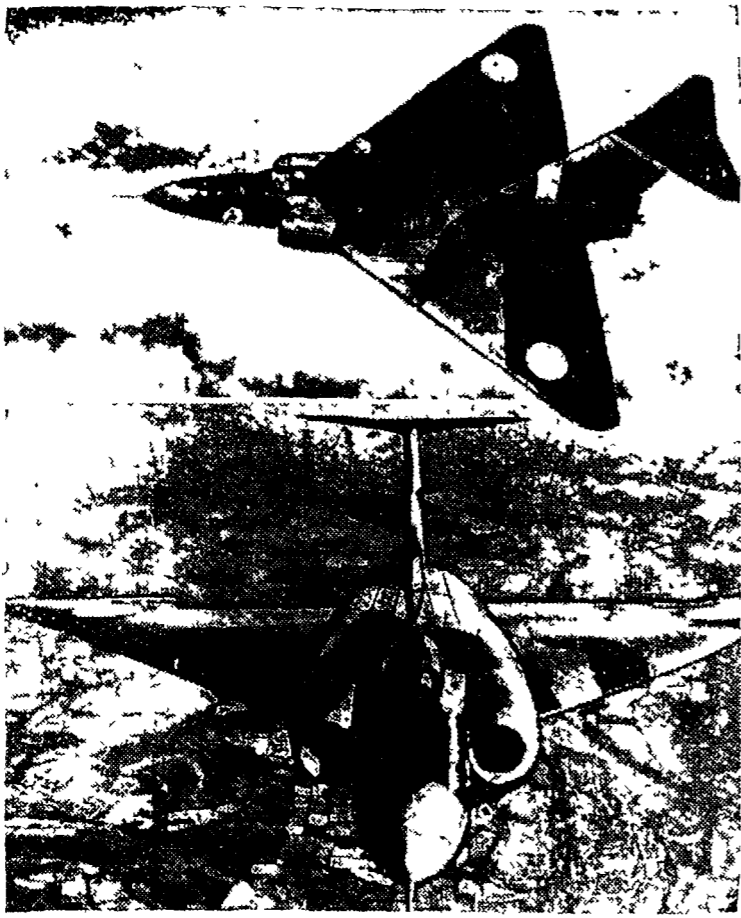

Million Year Old Ape Man Exhibited In The Smithsonian

An ancient creature with the face and brain of an ape walked like a man. He is Washington's latest VIP. He is represented at the Smithsonian Institution by the exact casts of a few fragments of his bones which have been preserved as fossils in the limestone of South Africa for from 750,000 to 2,000,000 years. The original ancient bones of this ape-man were found by Dr. Raymond A. Dart, of the University of Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, in ancient caves in the Central Transvaal. The South African ape-man may have been intelligent enough to use fire to cook his dinner. This was indicated by fire-charred bones found near the site where some of the bones were located and believed to be of the same antiquity. Dr. Dart has therefore named him Australopithecus prometheus, which means "southern ape that used fire." Dr. Dart also found evidence that the ape-man used weapons to kill game by bashing in their skulls. They also killed one another in this violent way.

Scientist Claims Cure For Strikes

A prescription of emergency treatment in a labor crisis has been worked out by Dr. Francis Bradshaw, New York psychological consultant. It is difficult, he points out, for the top men in a dispute to come to an agreement. Each feels that he cannot "back down" on any single point without betraying those he represents. And yet it is doubtful whether any top man in an industrial dispute knows just what the men he represents might be willing to agree to. The remedy, as seen by Dr. Bradshaw, is to bring together two groups, each one made up of representatives of each level in the hierarchies of management or of labor, from big boss to assistant foreman, from union president to shop steward. Setting the scene for these discussions is important.

There should be no reminders of the respective status of the participants. The atmosphere of a courtroom and "witnesses" should be avoided. When disagreements occur over facts, just what the situation really is should be ascertained by scientific methods. In one case it was found that failure to agree was caused by the misunderstanding of 80% of the words used in the contract under discussion.
