Clark Equipment Buys 19 Acres E. of Plant For Long-Term Growth

250-Auto Parking Lot To Divert Shift Traffic

Graveled Entrance From The Niles-Buchanan Road Now Being Built

The Clark Equipment company recently completed the purchase of a 17-acre tract comprising nearly all of the old Bampton orchard, for the purpose of using it for future expansion and also for the location of a 250-car parking lot and a drive to it from the Niles-Buchanan Road.

The 17-acre tract was bought from Joseph Voorhees and includes the house and lot which he originally built for a home and which is now occupied by Arthur C Metzger, 419 E. Front. The company previously purchased two acres from the Gmlin property, the old Charles Bampton home, at the top of the Niles hill, the tract lying north of the old Gmlin residence, from the foot of the hill nearly to McCoy's Creek.

The added Gmlin tract forms a short cut to the west of the Voorhees tract, and the south end of it will form part of the site of the new Axie and Heat Treat plant to be erected soon. The new parking lot now under construction begins at the west side of the former Gmlin tract and extends to the east along the north side of the former Voorhees property. It is now being graded and will be surfaced with gravel. An entrance road extends from the Niles-Buchanan road north to the property and will also be gravelled.

The construction of this parking lot and the road leading to it will divert a large portion of the heavy shift traffic from Niles and points east and from the present Front-North Portage route and will greatly relieve the congestion through the east part of the business section. It will also divert much of the shift traffic from the southeast by way of Ryeaterson Road, and via Liberty street, thus avoiding the Front-Portage light.

Clark officials stated that the tract was bought in part to relieve the congestion in the present parking lots and the traffic congestion at shift change at the Front-Portage light, and also because the tract affords the ideal direction of plant expansion if and when it should come. The tract happened to be available by purchase and so was added to the site.

CITY PLANS TO HOLD 13-MILL LINE

Next Monday evening, May 14, the taxpayers of Buchanan who must supply the snags of government are cordially invited to attend the session of the city commission and sit in on the second and final reading of the 1951-52 general city budget.

The city commission proposes to continue the general rate of 13 mills, which was set in 1946 and has been held at that figure since. The budgetary statement is more definite than it has ever been before, owing to improved book-keeping methods that were set up by city management and which have been in use the past twenty months. Because of this improved method the commission is more accurately informed on probable income from all sources, and can better determine the probable cost of essential services to be maintained without lowering the quality of those services, and within the continuing 13-mill rate.

The city manager points out that the proposed budget has been figured very closely, to accomplish a certain amount of work. There is very little leeway for any unanticipated work. If the city commission should deem it necessary to order additional projects, added revenue must be provided. However they are proceeding in the belief that a city can operate on a set budget by simply holding operations within the work limits set.

Strict accounting of income the city receives from all sources has been of considerable aid in forecasting such income in advance. Doubtless many will be interested and probably a bit surprised to know the range of sources of city income. They include: local taxation, refund of part of sales tax, intangible tax, gasoline and automobile weight tax, tavern license fees, sale of materials, as gravel, to individuals, rental of equipment to individuals, parking meter intake, fines, revenue from invested cemetery funds, truck haulage at regular commercial rates for individuals who cannot get service of private trucks in emergencies, other minor sources.

An example of the income from rental of city equipment is the present rental of the city air hammer to the Berrien Construction company, which is using it in the demolition of the old Days avenue sidewalk. The purchase of the air hammer has greatly reduced the labor cost in pavement and other demolition, while rental fees have nearly covered the original cost of the equipment.

The preliminary step in setting up a proposed budget is the formulation of a work plan for the coming year in which necessary maintenance, new equipment and construction are compiled and their costs estimated.

The appropriations are then made on a budgetary basis. All charges are segregated into the various budgetary accounts, as General Administration, Public Works, Police, Cemetery, Fire Dept., Library, Recreation Board, Civil Defense, Welfare, Contingent.

Each department budget is again broken down into classes of expenditure, which represents the final item classification. The department is given a code letter, and the classes of expenditure under each department are also given code numbers. The code letter for the Department of Public Works, for instance is S. In the expense classification, 1 is for wages, 2 is for telephone, 3 for electric lights, 4 for fuel and 5 for equipment with a total of 20 classes.

A charge against the equipment classification of the D.P.W. is accordingly S-5. This rigid classification enables the city manager at any time of the fiscal year to analyze accurately which departments and which expense classifications are staying within or exceeding the budget estimates. In that way adjustments can be made wherever possible in the entire picture to keep the overall expenditure in line. Each different expense must be paid for from the budget fund where it belongs. However, if one budget department is evidently over the estimate and another under, the city commission may adjust the matter by transferring parts of appropriations from one department to another.

In the general budget report, each department is given a separate page followed by a revealing comment on each expense classification, noting whether it is higher, the same, or lower than last year, and giving clear reason for its status.

If the city administration holds to the 13-mill rate in the face of rising costs, it will mean a very distinct achievement, in which the improved budgetary accounting methods must be credited as sound business procedure.

R. Koenigshof Gets Close-Up Washington, D.C.

Attends National Federation Grain Dealers As Mich. Delegate

At close range there are some federal executives who really seem to be more interested in preventing a runaway inflation than merely stacking a federal payroll, stated Robert Koenigshof, Michigan delegate, after returning from a convention of delegates to the National Grain Federation in Washington, D. C.

The federation is composed of the grain dealers of 20 states, including the Michigan Elevator Exchange Delegates from Michigan were Robert Koenigshof and Waldo Phillips of Deatur. The convention was held at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D. C., April 25-26-27. Headline speakers were Mr. Brannon, secretary of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mr. Knudsen, head of the Department of Transportation, and Eric Johnson, OPS head. Secretary Brannon talked on the need of all-out grain production. There was less carry-over of wheat from this last year than before, he stated, and the crop estimates for 1951 are lower than last year. The argument made by many that the farmer has been the chief beneficiary from the rise in food prices is wrong, stated Brannon.

Eric Johnson, a brilliant and effective speaker, defended the necessity of freezing prices in the present manner. More nations have suffered ruin of their economy and overthrow of their government from wild runaway inflation than from any other cause, he stated. The rise in prices, the government has had to pay for military supplies since the Korean war began and factories have been diverted from peace-time to war production is evidence of what has already been happening. The price for wire used by the army has gone up 700%. Aircraft guns that cost \$150,000 before now cost \$260,000. Practically all other war production has risen accordingly.

He noted the results of the recent buying spree in the merchandise field when wholesalers and merchants built up their inventories 50% over normal. During that period bank loans doubled from \$9,000,000,000 to \$18,000,000,000. Price control might not have been necessary, had there been general self control, from the individual through the wholesaler to the factory.

Young Farmers Find Body Of Man While Plowing Cornfield

While plowing a cornfield on the farm of Robert Sheeley on the road east of Mt. Zion churchyard, seven miles southwest of Buchanan, about 8 p.m. last Thursday, Kenneth and Donald Olson saw what appeared to be a body lying a short distance away.

They went to the Sheeley farm and asked Mr. Sheeley if he had had a scarecrow in the corn field last year. Assuming them to be not Sheeley accompanied the young men back to the field and they found a badly decomposed body of a man.

They called "Coroner" Harding Day of St. Joseph and after examination he stated that the death had been from natural causes, probably six weeks previously. From an address found on a pocket the man was identified as William S. Hag, whose last residence was at Michigan City. He had been working there but had lost his work shortly before his death. He had previously been a patient at a mental hospital at Longflier, Ind., and also had tuberculosis. He was 56 years of age. Burial was made at Plymouth, Ind.

To Apply Fluoride To Pupils' Teeth In Local Schools

Through cooperative efforts of local dentists, the Health Council of the P.T.A. and the State Bureau of Dentistry, plans have been completed to provide for the application of sodium fluoride to children's teeth at our local schools.

It has been demonstrated that the application of fluoride to children's teeth will prevent 40% of new cavities. It has no effect on decay already present and is not a substitute for regular care by a dentist. Fluoride is a colorless and tasteless liquid, applied with a cotton swab, and allowed to dry on the teeth. The treatment is painless and is most effective when given every three years from about age three to age 15.

Dental hygienists will be sent here by the State Department. Each child will have four appointments including cleaning the teeth at the first appointment. The cost to the parents for the series will be \$4.

This year pupils in grades 2, 3, 5, 6, 8, and 9 will be given application cards at school. Parents desiring the treatment will please sign and return the cards with \$4 as soon as possible so that a schedule of the program may be made in advance.
