University Has Technical Training For War Workers

Technical training for 3,008 workers in Michigan war industries has been given to date by the University of Michigan in the United States Office of Education's engineering, science and management defense training program. A new series of these courses, which is expected to draw at least 1,000 new enrollments, will open on April 13 and 14, in Detroit, Dearborn, Flint, Grand Rapids, Jackson and Ann Arbor.

The courses have been planned to meet three major needs of those employed in war industries. Refresher courses are given to those who desire to "brush-up" on previous training; transfer courses retrain men for new jobs; while the "up-grade" courses prepare men for advancement in a particular field.

Admission requirements include, in general, at least two years in a recognized engineering college or its equivalent in experience. Instructors are supplied from the University of Michigan faculty and experts in industry. These non-credit courses will be offered without tuition cost to those enrolled, with expenses being borne by the federal government.

Tales of An Old Town

An Attempt to Reproduce a Cross Section of The American Scene, As Witnessed Here Through the Past Century

Some More Memories of Old Railroad Days in Dayton (By Fred Richter)

Here's a few added notes on old railroad days at Dayton. Before my father, Julius Richter, came to Dayton to take charge of the section, a man by the name of Fred Hess had been in charge, and those working under him were John Sebasty, August Wentland and Billie Renke. When Hess left the section, the three continued to work a few years under Richter, but one by one left the railroad to go to farming. Their places were taken by Julius Renke, Lewis Dreger, and Ed Richter, who in turn worked together for several years.

I occasionally worked with this gang when an extra man was needed or a substitute for an absent workman. I will remember the old handcar house in which they put the handcar and tools. It was an old boxcar and might have for all I know, been the first handcar house they ever had. It was located on the north side of the track just opposite the grain elevator, with one end with a door in it facing the track.

I remember one night my brother gave me the key to this tool-house so that I could use it for a dressing room, getting ready for a masquerade ball in Lamb's hall. That was my first dance, also my last. Why my last?

Well, because I decided that night that I would rather sit on a bench and watch them go by. Possibly I expected to learn it all one night and, having failed to learn much of anything I became discouraged.

But back to "workin' on the railroad all-I-I-I the livelong day". On the railroad the "livelong day" then was from 6.30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. and from 12:30 p. m. to 5:30 p. m. You see we were about half on "suntime". In the winter time it was still dark when we wheeled the old handcar out. First we lit a little fire under the oil can to make the oil run when we greased the car. On a very frosty morning, or if there was snow on the rails, the wheels spun and we would get nowhere. So one man would walk east and one west to inspect the track. The west end of the Dayton section was about 100 feet west of the Wilson crossing and the east end was directly south of the Bakertown cemetery.

For many years a good grade of oak ties was used, until that timber got scarce. Once the railroad had a lot of cedar ties put in. They were probably cheap to start with but they proved very expensive in the long run, as the wood was too soft to hold the spikes and many of the ties broke under the rails. In a very few years they were all taken out. Several different kinds of wood have been used since for ties and the ties are now soaked with creosote to keep the water out. The roadbed is also crushed stone now instead of gravel. Because of these conditions, the ties probably last doubly as long as they did once.

I remember once the railroad decided to raise the roadbed a few inches on a certain stretch. About fifteen open flatcars loaded with gravel were brought in and unloaded in the following manner. From an end flatcar, a cable was attached to sort of plow which pulled the gravel off the car, and this cable was attached at the opposite end to the engine. Stakes were set on each side of the flat to keep the gravel from running off the sides of the car. This gravel came usually from the railway gravel pit near Pokagon. In 1914 the use of gravel was discontinued in favor of crushed stone.

Since the gravel contained some soil, the weeds had to be mowed off several times a year from each side of the tracks. After crushed stone was used, some weeds came through from beneath and had to be pulled. But after the railway developed the practice of spraying the roadbed with a poison weed-
