Rev. William Johnson Remembers When He Was A Slave in Kentucky

Spent First Ten Years As Slave On Tobacco Plantation

Rev. William Johnson 93, former Baptist minister, is doubtless the only member of the colored settlement in the neighborhood of North Portage whose memory is a living bridge between today and the times of slavery.

Directed by Rev. Norman Lee, pastor of the New Good Hope Baptist church of Moccasin Court, I went to his little home setting back north of the street at 209 East Fulton.

"They tell me you are the only colored man here who can remember slavery days," I said. The old man was on the side of his bed, stooped over, with a cloth that covered his head...

"I was born on a tobacco plantation in Kentucky across the Ohio river from Cairo, Ill. Charleston, Ky was about five or six miles away. My old master's name was Moseby Johnson. My mother and I and two brothers and a sister lived in a log cabin in the slaves' quarters...

"We were the masters' men? Some were and some were not. It was a good deal like folks treat their animals. Some men love their horses and never beat them, and some of having good looking horses. Others don't care anything for them and beat and half starve them."

"I glanced down at Rev. Johnson's hands and they were much lighter than those of a full-blood negro. 'Chappie' was apparently the term used for a small colored boy."

Ties For First Place Honor In Dairy Judging

Competes In Girls, Boys Open Class At Cassopolis

Dollie Mae Sebasty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Sebasty, Wagner Road, tied for first place in judging dairy cattle in a considerable field of boy and girl judges...

"The judging was open to members of 4-H clubs and Future Farmers of America chapters. Miss Sebasty is a member of the Burke Busby Bees 4-H club. Her only previous experience in judging had been at the Doan Straub farm at Galien on July 7."

Miss Sebasty participated in a broadest Saturday Over Station, W. H. Benton Harbor, Saturday in which she was interviewed on the points and considerations in judging dairy cattle.

"The other colored people came in to care for my mother, but when she died I was the only one with her. I remember a colored woman came in and looked at her and said 'Boy, your mother is dead. Then she ran. Some people are afraid of the dead. After that, I was handed about from one family to another. They called me a 'scout boy.' That was what they called a Negro kid that just had to scout around to live. I worked wherever I went, running errands, carrying water and wood."

After I was grown up, a white man rented a plantation in Mississippi and hired a lot of us colored men to go with him, to work in the cotton field. That was where I became a minister. I never had any training for it, but in Cairo, I went to school a little and learned to read. I had white teachers who treated me grand. But colored men were not educated for the ministry. They would come before a board who would question them. If they seemed to feel right about things, they knew the truth, they would make them ministers. I was never paid anything for preaching. I worked long days in the cotton fields, where we got from 50 cents to \$1 a day. Then I preached for nothing at night."

"In slavery days the colored people had lots of music. They never had money to buy banjos and fiddles, but the young masters liked to give them to them, and hear the music and singing. That was about all they did when they were not working, play and sing, and sometimes dance and frolic to the music."

"The old man leaned sideways on the pillow and I noticed that he was trembling."

"This talking makes you tired," I said.

"It does not take much to make me tired any more," he answered.

Tenny Van Every Retires From P. O. Employment July 31

Tenny Van Every, the man who invented postoffice stamps, cancelled his last stamp and wrote his last money order Saturday, July 31, and joined the various boards of review who look out store windows judging the passing scene.

He began work in Sept. 15, 1903, in the Buchanan postoffice as a clerk with the monthly salary of \$3 per week. In all he served in the local office 45 years, during 35 of which he was assistant postmaster.

The Buchanan postoffice was given a second class rating on July 1, 1913, and Mr. Van Every was appointed assistant postmaster. He has served under seven postmasters, George W. Noble, A. A. Worthington, J. C. Routh, C. D. Kent, Mrs. C. Kent, G. Herbert Bachelier and the present postmaster, A. Glenn Haslett. Mr. Van Every was acting postmaster for six months following the death of Mr. Kent on Nov. 19, 1925 until Mrs. Kent received her appointment.

Authorization of the appointment of an assistant postmaster to succeed Mr. Van Every has not yet been made by the postal department.

Major S. Stewart Dies in Sleep at Paul Moore Home

Was Official Many Years In N. Y., Mich. Highway Departments

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the Sween Funeral Home for Major Spencer J. Stewart, with Arthur Johnston, chaplain of Ralph Rumbaugh Post No. 51, American Legion, officiating.

Honorary pallbearers were B. C. Tinney and Newton Paquette of the Michigan Highway Department, M. V. Carmody, president of the Globe Construction company of Kalamazoo, and Atty. Frank H. Lee of Fort Huron. The remains were taken to Chicago for cremation, and were interred at Oakwood cemetery in that city.

Major Stewart was born March 28, 1870, at Rochester, N. Y., the son of James and Rebecca Turner Stewart. He received the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy from the University of Rochester. While still in college he had begun the study of civil engineering and was admitted to practice. He worked for the New York Central railway and later for the New York state highway department, meanwhile pursuing post-graduate studies at Columbia University and the University of Wisconsin during World War I.

He served in the quartermaster's department of the U. S. Army, in charge of construction and maintenance at Camp Upton, N. Y. There he superintended the building of fortifications, roads, sewers, water, installation and all matters pertaining to construction. He retired with the rank of major.

About 1920 he entered the employ of the Michigan Highway department, in charge of maintenance in the ten southwestern Michigan counties. He retired from that position in March, 1946. During the period in which he was in charge, his territory was known to be outstanding in maintenance of state highways. Major Stewart wrote many articles for publication in magazines specializing in his profession.

He had been a frequent visitor for many years at the home of his cousin, Mrs. Paul J. Moore, 114 West Front street, and after his retirement he made his home there.

His only survivors are two nephews and several cousins. He was a Mason and had advanced to the 32nd Royal Arch and the Mystic Shrine degrees. He was also a member of the American Legion, the Elks, the Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity and of the American Society of Engineers.

He had been failing gradually from infirmities of old age during the past several months and had been confined to the house since April. He died in his sleep some time Thursday night or Friday morning at the Moore home.

"During the week previous to his death he had threatened to take his life, but neither the Moores or his physician had taken the threat seriously. However an examination after his death revealed that he had taken a complete box of 15 sleeping tablets which had been obtained for him on a doctor's prescription Thursday. He had been taking sleeping tablets for some time.

Coroner William Phifer of Niles pronounced his death due to suicide by taking an excessive dose of sleeping tablets.



Historic Hotel Business Changes Hands

A. Smith Sells Hotel Buchanan To Floyd Burch

New Owner Comes From Cass Co.; Also Takes Over Taxis, Bus

The business and furnishings of the Hotel Buchanan were sold last

week by Arizona Smith to Floyd Burch of Cassopolis. Mr. Burch bought also the string of three taxis and the school bus operated by Smith, with the accompanying franchises. Mr. Burch lived a year in Buchanan, about 1921 during which he drove a taxi for George Bird, who died early in the thirties. Recently he has been a member of the staff of the sheriff of Cass county, his work being patrol of the summer resort lakes in that district.

Arizona Smith purchased the hotel from Mrs. Mary Walker, taking possession Jan. 28, 1946. Later she secured a taxi franchise and last winter she started a school bus for Buchanan children. A horseman and a lover of horses, Smith says that he expects to settle on a farm which he has yet to find, but somewhere in western or southern New York state or in northern Pennsylvania. Smith was in the dairy business in that section for many years before coming to Buchanan.
