Peace Possible Theme For World Community Day

Observed Here Nov. 4 Under Auspices Council Church Women

"Peace is Possible" has been selected as the theme for the six-day observance of World Community Day to be held Nov. 4 under auspices of the United Council of Church Women, a Protestant inter-denominational agency comprised of representatives of 83 denominations.

As a central project of the observance, the council is urging 10,000,000 women in this country to collect new pieces of materials for women overseas, known as the "pieces for peace" project. The movement is aimed to provide needy women with materials for dressmaking and other essential household articles.

In explaining the project, Miss Mabel Head, secretary of Christian World Relations and official observer at United Nations for the United States, pointed out that women abroad, while grateful for past gifts from American church women, are at present anxious to secure materials for use in mak-

ing clothing for their families. She said that this is especially true of European women, who for generations have been noted for their skillful needlework. The piece bundles are to be handled through the Church World Services, an agency through which 23 Protestant and Orthodox bodies administer their overseas relief.

Collection of the materials has been started by local women and anyone having donations may call members of the general commit-

tee Mrs. Clifford Peters is chairman, and others on the committee are Mrs. Harley Raymona, Mrs. Arthur Wissler, Mrs. Harry Heath, Mrs. Robert Bever, Mrs. L. A. Decker and Mrs. Phais E. Wallace. The items asked for are yarn, floss, crochet thread, trimmings, and yard goods. Certain materials are acceptable providing they are clean and in good condition. While used materials are not excluded from the bundles, the council aims to collect 60% of

new materials. The local observance will be held in the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints at 2:15 o'clock, Friday afternoon, Nov. 4.

Legislature Enacts Many Laws Affecting Cities And Villages

Editors Note This is one of a series of articles on laws which were passed at the 1949 session of the Michigan Legislature. They affect you and every resident of Michigan. The entire series is prepared as a public service of the State Bar of Michigan under the direction of Russell A. Searl, Lansing, Chairman of the State Bar Committee on Legislation and Law Reform. The articles are objective in nature and do not attempt to comment on the relative worth of the legislative enactments but rather, to present the most important facts and alert you to the changes these laws represent as they became effective on Sept 23, 1949.

Cities And Villages

The vast majority of bills introduced in the 1949 legislature having to do with cities and villages were the result of the thinking of the members as to the proper solution of the financial problems not only of the local governments, but, also, the state government.

General Property Taxes

The system under which the general tax on real and personal property is levied, was revised and modernized. The proceeds of this tax, ever since 1933 when the 15-mill limitation went into effect, have been divided between local municipalities. The state has refrained from levying any general property tax, relying on the proceeds of other taxes, such as sales tax, corporation tax, and liquor tax.

Under the new law, each step in the assessment of property and the levy of taxes is moved ahead to an earlier date in the year, the "tax day", being the date as of which property is to be assessed, being changed from April 1 to January 1.

Non-Exemption of Federal

Among the acts which failed of passage was an act requiring fire departments to grant a second holiday, a "Kelly Day", in every 8-day period to firemen. This would have reduced their work week to 63 hours.

Another bill was defeated also which would have prohibited local municipalities from adopting regulations denying members of the police from membership in the Fraternal Order of Police, a secret national organization.

Failures

By another act, municipalities were authorized to carry out programs for the modernization of residential neighborhoods. Cities and villages were also authorized to accept grants from the federal government as well as contributions of aid from industries to assist in projects to prevent water pollution.

Liquor Laws

Three bills of interest to local governments pertaining to the operation of the liquor laws were also enacted.

The first governs the holding of local elections upon the issue of "on premises" sale of spirits in cities and villages. From now on a vote upon that issue may only be held at elections at which candidates for state offices are to be elected. Previously, it has been possible to call a special election to vote upon such an issue and the experience has shown that at such elections only a fraction of the eligible voters determine the issue.

The second bill clarified the manner of determining the distance between liquor bars and churches or schools to determine whether the bars are outside the 500 feet area as prescribed by the 1945 act. This applies only to new licensees.

The third bill prohibited the operation of "bottle clubs" which sell set-ups to members and in which the members were served their own liquor. Before the effective date of this measure these clubs could operate without any regulation.

Election Laws

The "election laws" were details amended in some minor details. The first of these clarified the requirements in regard to absentee voters. The main purpose of this was to provide that a citizen who had actually changed his place of residence would not be permitted to vote at his former place of residence unless his intention to retain his former residence was demonstrated by something other than the ownership or renting or leasing of property, or the storing of furniture. Of course, this does not have any effect upon employees of state and federal government or members of the armed services who retain their former residences by virtue of constitutional provisions.

By legislation, the election officials are authorized to break the seal on voting machines following the seven days after the final adjournment of the board of canvassers unless prohibited by court order, and, in any event, the clerk is permitted to break the seals in less than twenty days preceding the next election so that the voting machine may be readied for use thereafter. This legislation was apparently occasioned by the tying up of several machines under court order preliminary to the receipt in the Ferguson-Hooker senatorial election and the Backney-Siever contest following the 1945 election. A number of cities were deprived of the use of their election machines and ballot boxes at the 1949 spring election inasmuch as they had been required by court order to preserve the machines and boxes without change and the recount had not been made by the federal officials by that time.

Property

Other amendments to the general property tax act included a limitation upon the exemption of federal property. With the increase of amount of property in the state owned by the United States government, Congress has passed legislation permitting certain types of federally owned property to be taxed for local purposes. Accordingly, our state act was amended to provide that such property, although owned by the federal government, would not be exempt in case of such permissive federal legislation.

Personal Property

Mr Average Citizen was given a break when the Legislature increased the amount of his exemption from taxes on personal property consisting of furniture, fuel, and tools in his professional trade.

On the other hand, school districts which own property which for more than two years is held for income purposes rather than public school purposes are required to pay taxes or special assessments thereon to the city, village, or township in which the property is situated.

By another act, municipalities were authorized to carry out programs for the modernization of residential neighborhoods. Cities and villages were also authorized to accept grants from the federal government as well as contributions of aid from industries to assist in projects to prevent water pollution.

Checked for leaks, but the radiator and the entire cooling system should be flushed out, removing the sludge and dirty water, which prevents free circulation.

"Starting assurance" for your car despite freezing weather can be gained if the motorists also observe these few additional precautions.

1. Keep the battery fully charged and charging. A fully-charged battery will not freeze in temperatures ordinarily encountered, but a very low battery may freeze and burst. The case open at temperatures not much below 32°F. See that the generator regulator is working properly.

2. At the approach of cold weather, the crankcase should be drained, flushed and refilled with the correct grade of oil for the coldest weather you expect during the winter. Ford recommends use of SAE 10 or 10W oil in below freezing weather and 10W with one pint of kerosene added in extreme cold (colder than 10 below zero).

3. See if the engine needs a tuneup to insure quick starting.

4. If the manufacturer recommends it, change to winter grease in transmission and differential. (No change is necessary for 1949 Fords).

5. Have brakes checked for winter driving and be sure that tires are not worn so dangerously smooth they will make driving on icy roads doubly hazardous.

"Careful motorists will drive slowly until the engine reaches normal operating temperatures," Pierce said. "And by keeping the fuel tank full as much of the time as possible, they will prevent condensation of moisture and resultant freezing-up of the gas line. A good plan is to fill the gas tank at the end of the day's driving, rather than at the start."

Soil conservation programs over WHFB, our local radio station, are certainly going to continue in popularity as our Soil Conservation district directors present practical programs from actual farm experiences. Last week Paul Smith, chairman of the Galien River district, discussed pasture programs with Art Martell and George Lozmack of Three Oaks. Art is a successful dairyman from South of Three Oaks and George is a teacher for the South Berrien D.H.A. Art believes in a good pasture program and strives to get 200 days pasture each year, which means adequate pasture from the middle of April to the first of November. Art says it can be done with rye for early spring and late fall, alfalfa-brome for early and late summer and sudan grass for mid-summer.
George reports that members of the South Berrien D.H.A. average 120 days per year on alfalfa-brome which provides a high quality pasture at a reasonable cost. The original fertilizer and seed cost may seem high but is reduced by the number of years good pasture is provided. George also reports that alfalfa looks very good this fall but a late hay crop may prove harmful and very costly and we'll certainly add our vote to that. An October hay harvest can cause serious damage before a severe winter. Reasonable pasturing in October, however, will seldom cause damage.
The Soil Conservation program is heard over WHFB at 12:45 every Thursday as a part of the regular noon Farm Hour program.
Local 4-H club leaders of Buchanan county will receive the "National 4-H News" through the courtesy and very fine cooperation of the Benton Harbor and Buchanan Indiana & Michigan Electric Company offices. They bought the house partially furnished and shipped rugs and other articles to complete the furnishings.

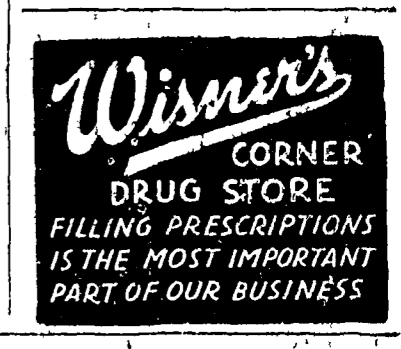

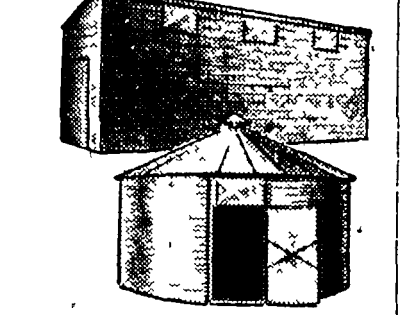

Buchanan Steel Corp. Plans Plant Enlargement Program

Addition Is 2nd Since World War

Payroll Increases From 25 In 1939 To 120 At Present

Prospects for future improvement in business at the Buchanan Steel Products plant here are indicated by the fact that a \$50,000 improvement program, including an addition to the forging room and installation of new equipment, is now in progress there. In fact the outlook for expansion of production is so promising that the management is now negotiating with the city of Buchanan for additional site space on the west side of McCoy's creek, amounting to a strip approximately 175 feet wide west of the road entering the plant and extending to a line parallel with the west side of the old tennis court. From the tennis court the proposed addition would extend south to the Michigan Central.

The present addition is the second since the end of World War II in 1945. Elmer W. Cress, president, states that he came to the plant in 1939 when the company was in severe financial straits and the outlook problematical. The place then employed about 25 men. The management had built up the business to a sound condition by 1941, when the war provided an unusual opportunity for increase of production. During the peak of war production the force averaged 165 men over a considerable period. At the close of the war management was confronted by the problem of whether they should plan to go ahead or to drop back in the direction of pre-war operations. The decision was to go ahead. Consequently they determined on a \$100,000 plant expansion program which was then carried out, including a substantial addition to plant space and considerable new equipment. Even with this enlargement, the company is handicapped in taking on more business by reason of productive limitations, states President Cress. The plant now manufactures a variety of vital parts in the fields of automotive equipment, aircraft, farm equipment, home appliances, industrial equipment and auto accessories. Promising offers of new business from present customers have been rejected by reason of limitations of plant capacity or of required equipment. The company plans soon to build another 30x50 foot structure in the rear of their present plant for inside storage. If they build more productive capacity to the south of the present plant on their present site, they have to use the area now utilized for outside storage.

The improvement now in progress includes an addition to the forging room and installation of new equipment. In the die room a new die-sinking machine has been installed and the equipment in general has been rearranged for more economical and efficient operation. In the forge shop two presses have been added, two forging machines known as "upsetters" and a new shearer for cutting steel. The addition houses new equipment and expands facilities for broadening the field in respect to the types of forgings that can be produced. The company suffered as did other industries from the let-down of production last April, the second shift being temporarily dropped. However it was called back in June and the average force employed is now 120. An element in the success of the company has been its ability to maintain satisfactory relations with their working force. The enterprise of the company in maintaining its production at a near wartime level into the peace years, its achievement of sound finances and stable outlets, and its unusual employee relationships have made it a very valuable factor in the welfare of Buchanan.

He has had 20 years of welding experience, during nine of which he has operated a very successful shop of his own. Construction Of New County Jail Starts By Jan. 1

Building To Be Among The Most Modern Of Kind In United States

Plans for the new Berrien county jail received a final vote of approval from the members of the Berrien county board of supervisors last week, assuring a start on construction after the first of the year. The new jail structure will replace the half-century-old jail presently in use. The physical condition of the present jail is so poor that in the last week two 16-year-olds successfully broke out. It has also been condemned by state and federal prison authorities.

The present jail quarters are also badly over-crowded. Designed for a maximum of 55 prisoners, as many as 155 were housed in it this summer with a total of some 120 confined in it at present. The jail is also inadequate to house modern crime detection equipment and it is impossible to adapt it to modern penal methods.

According to its designer, Ivan N. Cuthbert of the architectural firm of Smith, Hinchman & Grylls, Inc., of Detroit, the new jail will be the most modern and the only one of its kind in the nation when completed. It is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$800,000.

Marion Rutherford, chairman of the special building committee, told members of the board that completed plans would be ready to let out to contractors for bids by Nov. 1. Bids will probably be opened and approved by the board at the January session, at a specially-convened session earlier. Construction will commence soon afterward.

The motion to approve the plans was made by Supervisor Rutherford, supported by Supervisor Alvin Knaak of St. Joseph.

It was passed without a dissenting vote.

Okay Condemnation Proceedings
In another action in connection with the construction of the new jail, the board adopted a resolution presented by Rutherford ordering Prosecutor Joseph E. Killian to proceed with condemnation proceedings against the Berrien County Abstract & Title Co. located on the southwest corner of the block, the new jail will occupy.

The action was taken after it was pointed out by Supervisor Rutherford that due to the size of the new jail it was imperative that the corner property be obtained. The west wall of the jail will be erected on the present property line of the abstract company with arqways extending eight feet over the line.

Title to other property in the block has already been obtained by the county.

No Counterpart In The U. S.
Designer Cuthbert, commenting on the jail after the adoption of the final plans, stated that it would not have a counterpart anywhere in the United States.

The new Berrien county jail will combine the very latest ideas in penal construction. It will include the dormitory system currently advocated by many leading penologists, as well as the cell system favored by sheriffs and other law enforcement officers.

"It will provide the utmost in segregation, allowing jail officials to separate prisoners by ages, types, and other classifications. We have endeavored to combine all of the recommendations of the state corrections commission

and federal jail officials into the plans and we believe it will be unexcelled in the nation. Outlining some of the features of the jail's design, Cuthbert stated that the top floor would utilize the dormitory system except for a handful of individual cells for women. In the dormitory system prisoners convicted of lesser crimes or confined for any lengthy periods of time are held in one communal room, sleeping on cots.

The first floor jail quarters will include some 40 cells, half being cells for single occupancy and the others, holding four prisoners. Day rooms will be connected to the four-room cells.

Will Be Escape Proof
Solid masonry walls will separate each five cells with no way for intercommunication, Cuthbert stated. He also indicated that the jail will be virtually escape proof with special doors and corridors designed to closely regulate the passage of prisoners.

The designer also stated that the jail will include a basement bullpen for housing "overnighters" arrested on minor charges and released shortly after court appearances. Three cells for housing insane patients will also be located in the basement.

"This jail will also include all of the latest devices to maintain sanitation and cleanliness among the prisoners," Cuthbert stated. "There will be special disinfecting rooms and clothes sterilizing equipment to insure that no vermin is brought into the cell blocks. We are interested in the health of the inmates as well as preventing outbreaks of disease

among the inmates" that the designer added that the design of the building would tend to keep maintenance at a minimum. "It should be 30 years before any major repair or alteration should be made," the designer proudly stated.

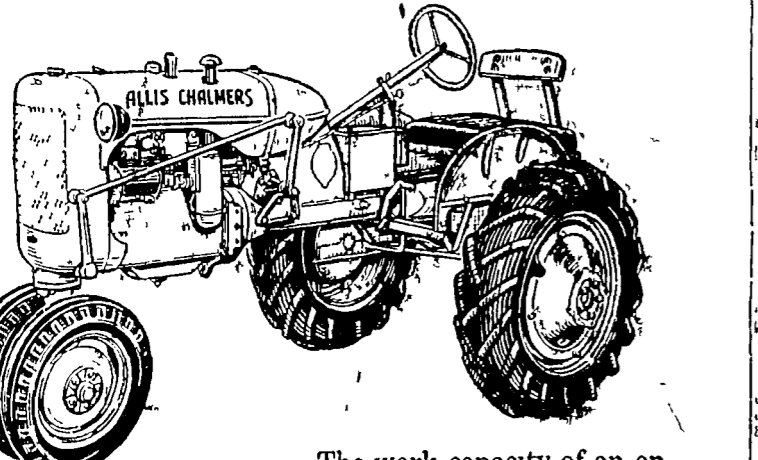

D. Hartman Writes From Yakota, Japan
 Yakota AFB Yakota, Japan Sept. 15, 1949

Dearest Mom, Dad, and Family, Well, here I am in Japan, so you can see why you haven't heard from me in such a long time.

My school finally came through, so I hopped on a C-54 4-engine cargo plane, and pulled in here. I haven't been in town yet, but this is sure a swell base. The typhoon did a lot of damage around here, but not to the barracks, which are really quite strong. The only damage they received was that part of the outer roofing was torn off, but as far as I know, no one was hurt.

Up here I have three kinds of money to worry about. On the base we use script or paper money, in denominations of 1c up through the dollars. Also we use American money. And in town we use Japanese yen. Any yen note smaller than ten yen is hardly worth carrying, as most everything costs over 1,000 yen, the legal exchange of the yen being 360 to an American dollar. One carton of cigarettes, bought American for 90c, will bring over 1,200 yen on the black market, and as far as I can tell, everyone from the big wheel down sells them. I haven't sold any.

We stopped for a two-hour layover at Okinawa on the way up. From what I saw there I was glad I was dropped off at the Philippine Islands. Okinawa is just one plain hell of a wreck. I am going to hydraulics school, which will run for weeks, so maybe I will see a little of Japan before I leave here.

The weather here is just like state-side. And boy! I nearly froze my tail off after the Philippine Islands. And talk about the chow—whoopee!

In a later letter he stated that his course in hydraulics would go on for 9 weeks, after which he will return to Clark Field, Manila. The colder weather in Japan is very uncomfortable after the tropic climate of the Philippine Islands. Don expected to make a trip within the next week to Tokyo. Trains he said, were both steam and power-driven.

Now Time To Check Home Fire Hazards, Urges State Police
 Protect your home against fire! This is the urgent advice of State Police Commissioner Donald S. Leonard, who points out that last year an average of more than 40 dwelling fires occurred in Michigan each day.

Leonard, who is also state fire marshal, made his comment in connection with the observance of fire prevention week this week.

"Last year 164 persons lost their lives in fires in Michigan, and most of the victims were children," Leonard said.

"The total fire loss of \$29,000,000 in the state in 1948 represented money sufficient to build a 100-room hospital each month for an entire year. The loss in dwelling fires alone amounted to \$7,000,000."

"An average of three persons are burned to death each week in Michigan. Most of these fatal fires occur in homes and are the result of carelessness and oversight."

"Now is the time to check all heating equipment and make necessary repairs, clean up rubbish, put combustible materials in a safe place, and check all possible fire hazards."

"Most fires can be avoided by precautionary measures. Protect your home by proper care."

Wool Value Cut By Weeds, Burrs
 Burrs and weeds are common in late summer and can mean a loss in wool quality unless care is taken, says Graydon Blank, extension sheep specialist at Michigan State College.

Payment for burrs and similar weeds, if the sheep come in contact with burrs and other foreign material, their wool will be burry and seedy. This type of wool is discounted on the market. Blank says a few minutes spent in checking a field and getting rid of such weeds will pay off in increased income when shearing time rolls around.

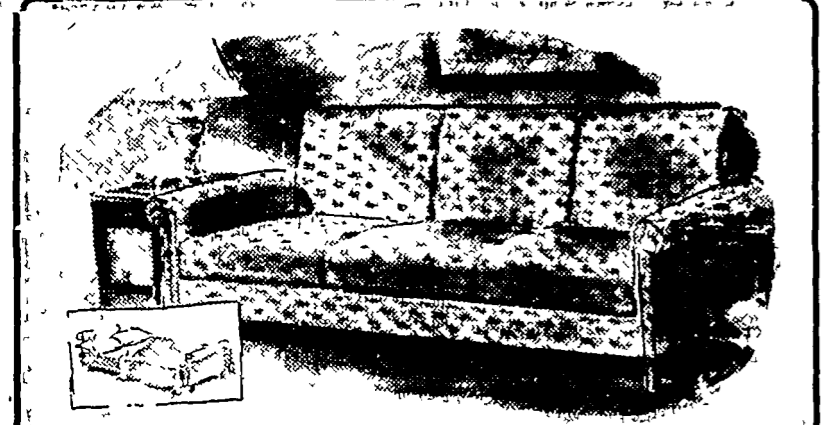
