

Commission To Restudy Two Traffic Control Ordinances

At the City Commission meeting Monday, there were two traffic control ordinances to consider. Number 88 would restrict parking on Phelps Street between school hours, and Number 89 was designed to restrict parking on East Alexander, Maple and Jordan Streets, between South Oak and Days Avenue and Smith Street from the millrace to Days.

There were a group of residents who appeared to protest the no parking restrictions on West Alexander. The attempt to keep factory workers from parking there had caused inconvenience to the people who live along there. One prospective bridegroom had been ticketed while he was getting ready for his wedding.

It was decided to table Ordinance 88. Ordinance 89 was rejected in favor of trying a suggested plan of limiting parking from 7 to 9 a.m. and from 3 to 5 p.m.

A property owner was presenting to question the charge of hooking onto the water line on Chippewa Street. He was asked to come back to the next meeting. The City Manager was out of town, and it was felt he might better be able to explain the charge.

The bid from West Motor Sales was accepted for the vehicle to replace Chief Neal Burks' car. It's a 1972 International Scout II with 4 cylinders for \$2,395 with trade-in.

The Commission had drawn up a contract with Scott Bagby and Associates as city planners. The proposed contract had been returned with a part deleted. There is question on the details of insurance coverage. Because the Commission knew that the Plan Commission was anxious to get started with the planner, they approved the contract if the paragraph on insurance coverage is reinstated.

An agreement authorizing Clyde E. Williams and Associates to prepare an operations manual, provide operator training and handle administrative matters with the federal government in conjunction with the construction of the waste water treatment plant was approved because such a step is mandatory to get government funds. A bill from Clyde E. Williams for inspection service for August 30, 1971 through September 27 was approved in the amount of \$850.83.

The Chief Neal Burks submitted his report for the quarter which included three alarms for July, three for August and one for September. One was at a residence, there were three car fires, one false alarm, and an assist to the Galien fire department.

A request for payment was approved by the Commission from Sollitt Construction for \$68,508.96 for payment number 7 for the waste water treatment plant.

Community Fund Drive Near 80% Mark

Contributions to the Buchanan Community Fund totaled more than 75 per cent of the fund goal of \$15,034 at present time, according to drive chairman David R. McCormack. Pledges and contributions totaled \$35,407.25.

In announcing the total, McCormack said "With solicitation continuing in several key areas of the drive I am still hopeful that we will make our goal. It is vitally important that we reach the goal so the many agencies supported by the Community Fund will be able to offer a full range of services to our community. I hope that every citizen of the Buchanan area who has not yet contributed will remember to give his share."

As he commented on the progress of the fund drive to date, McCormack praised several key in-plant and division chairmen who have completed their solicitations. He said, "Mrs. Robert Habicht and Mrs. Frederick Stout should be commended for their fine job in the advanced gifts division. Their goal was increased over last year and they met it."

"Mrs. Don Martin also deserves

praise for her leadership of the home solicitation division. This is a very difficult division to organize and Mrs. Martin faced special difficulties as a newcomer to the fund drive. She met them very well and exceeded last year's collections in the division by some \$30."

McCormack reserved special praise for the Electro-Voice employees solicitation. He said, "Quite frankly, I expected the E-V solicitation to be one of our less successful collections. Employment has been down there, the rumors that the plant may be closing down have lowered employee morale, and the Sportman's Alliance boycott of the drive caused some problems. However, Helen Mayberry, in-plant chairman, and her solicitors did a job that can only be described as magnificent. They increased the amount collected by nearly 50 per cent over last year while working against tremendous odds. The Electro-Voice performance certainly shows what can be done and I hope every solicitor still working on the drive will show similar spirit and take us over the top."

He has a BS degree in economics from Villanova university and a master's degree in city and regional planning from Harvard University. Crane also is a graduate of Institutes for Organization Management.

Charge Fraud In Welfare Case

A Niles couple were arrested Friday on charges of welfare fraud amounting to \$3,376, reports Berrien County Prosecutor Ronald J. Taylor. The amount alleged is the largest to date in any of the welfare fraud cases investigated.

Arrested at their home, Birchwood trailer park, by Deputy Stanley Wolkins of Galien substation were William L. Pickles, 29, and his wife, Lynn Susanne, 24.

The warrant charges both with welfare fraud over \$500. The fraud is alleged to have occurred between March 3 and Oct. 14. Taylor stated that the couple received unemployment compensation and also aid to dependent children for the unemployed.

His department welfare fraud investigation unit has authorized 56 warrants since the program began last April. About 40 convictions have resulted.

Seek Funds For Radios

Permission to conduct a fund raising campaign to purchase a communications system for Galien Emergency Vehicle Association and volunteer fire department was granted by the Township Board last week.

The two emergency groups are working together to raise approximately \$2,400 to purchase a base station and two mobile units. One mobile unit would be mounted in the fire department pumper and the other in the emergency vehicle. Radio equipment would put Galien in communication with Bertrand, Three Oaks and other area departments.

Thirty Christmas club savers will be receiving more than \$412,000 this month to assist them in their holiday shopping.

Checks totaling \$53,379.92 were mailed out Friday by LaSalle Federal Savings and Loan Association, and 1972 clubs are now open.

At Intec City Bank, checks in the amount of \$302,874 will be mailed Monday. This does not represent total Christmas savings, since the 1971 clubs do not close until Friday. 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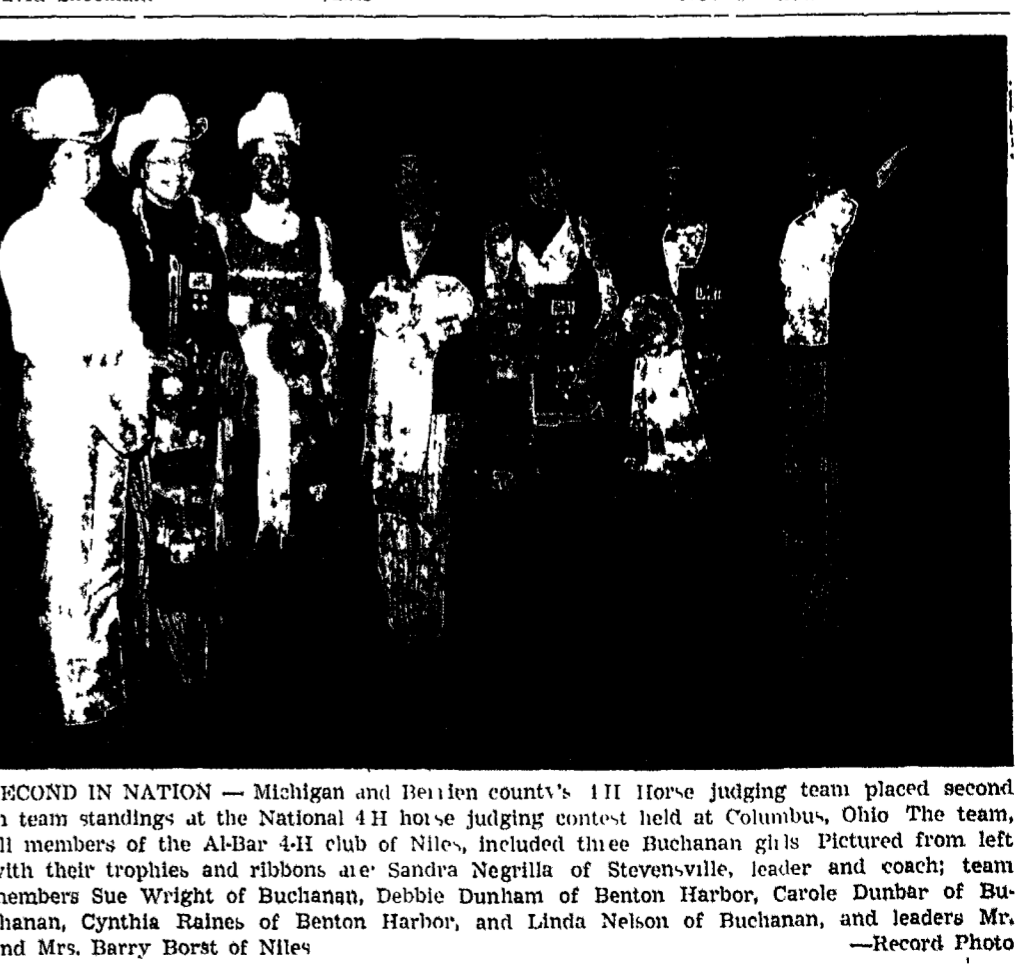

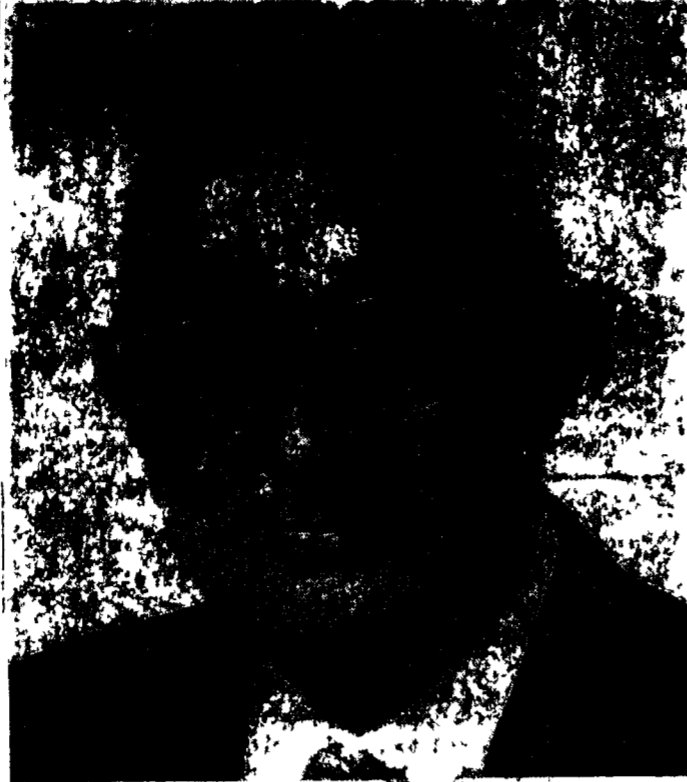

Public Forum to Explore Sex, Younger Generation

Dr. Charles E. Wittschiebe will conduct a two-part public forum on sex education and the younger generation beginning Monday night at 8 o'clock in the high school auditorium. The second meeting will be held Nov. 22.

Monday night's program will focus on "Youth and the Sex Revolution." The second session will cover "Sex Education — Pro and Con."

Each meeting will be followed by a question and answer period.

Dr. Wittschiebe is professor of pastoral care at Andrews University and a recognized authority. He has spoken before numerous groups in the community, as well as conducting classes in Christian sex education for schools and churches.

His speaking engagements across the United States include weekend programs on

marriage and family relations. A native of New York City, Dr. Wittschiebe received a bachelor of religious education degree from Atlantic Union College, South Lancaster, Mass., a master of arts degree from the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary in 1946, and a bachelor of divinity degree there in 1953. In 1964 he received his doctor of divinity degree from Andrews University. 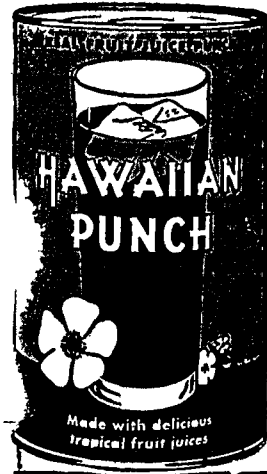

Excerpts From Ellen

Does the onset of deer season bring the dread of becoming deer hunting widows? Well, while the men are up in the wilds hunting and enjoying all the goodies you sent up with them, you can be making plans. Especially if you're one of the lucky wives whose husband brings home the prize game. Here are some basics to help you make the best use out of your venison cuts.

Venison, as we know, is one of the highly prized game meats and makes a tremendous holiday feast! Most of the objectionable or gamey flavors comes from careless handling of the deer once it's been shot. After the deer has been skinned, the easiest way to cut it up into usable pieces is to take it to a butcher or a locker plant where they cut, wrap, and freeze the meat. Freezing is the best way to preserve venison.

Venison should taste like venison and not doctored up to taste like beef. If you want meat to taste like beef, then beef is what you should buy. Most of the gamey flavor is in the fat, so trim away all the fat possible. Then too, venison fat, as it cools, tends to be sticky or tallowy, and it clings to the teeth and roof of the mouth.

Because venison is a dry meat, it is greatly improved by adding suet, butter, pork, or bacon to it while cooking.

When mixing venison with other meat for storage, using suet instead of pork will prolong the storage life of the venison. The suet doesn't become rancid as soon as the pork fat.

Loin and rib chops make the best frying steaks. The hump and neck can be used for pot roasts. Although neckbone irregularity makes boning difficult, with a little care, it can be done. The flanks and breasts do contain a lot of meat, but they're best used for soup, stews, or ground meat.

In general, when roasting the round, loin, or shoulder — (1) Season with salt and pepper, (2) Place on rack in uncovered pan, fat side up, (3) Don't add

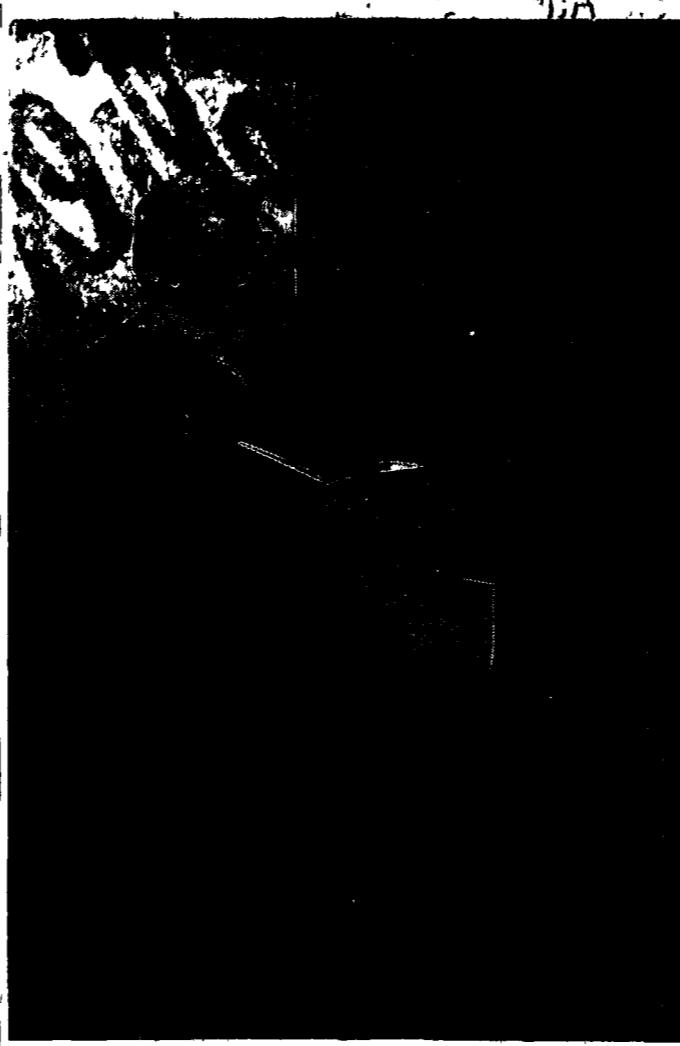

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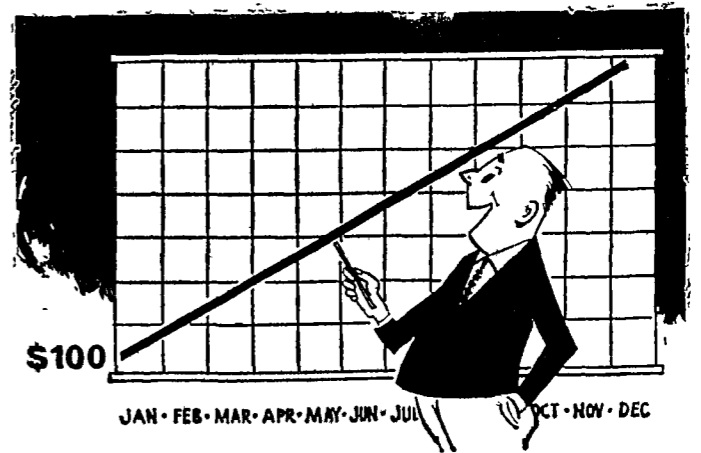

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Bucks Hammer Coloma 34-0 In Their Last Home Game

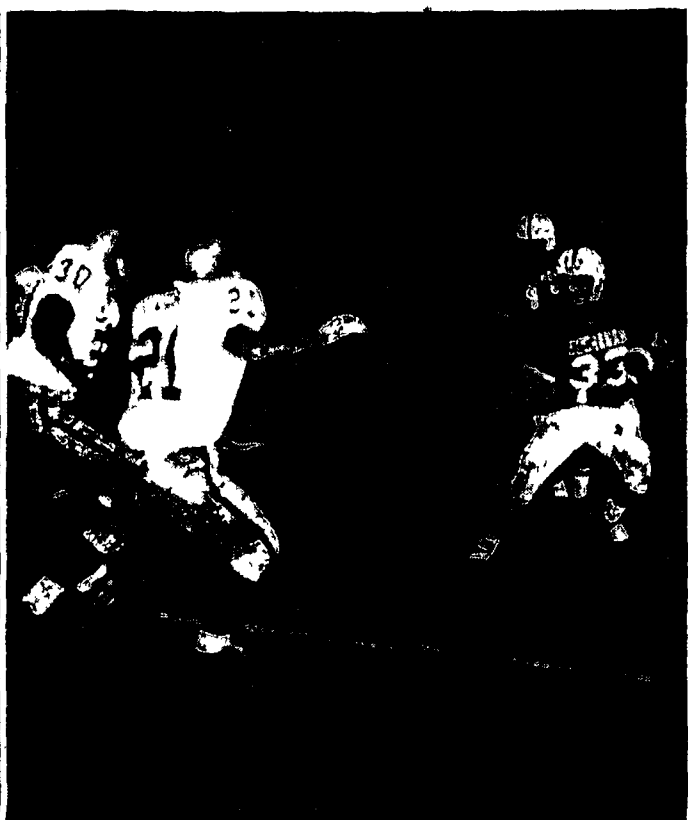

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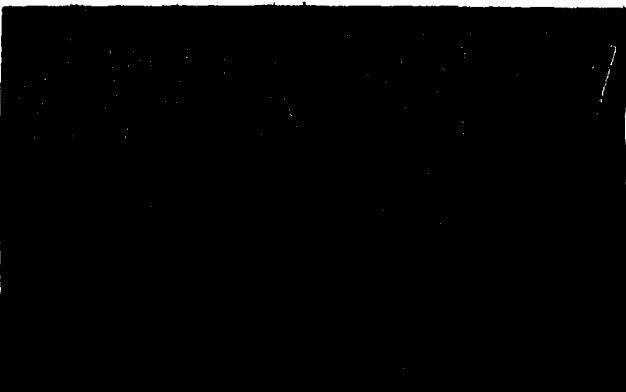
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Freshmen End Season On 28-14 Win Over Valley

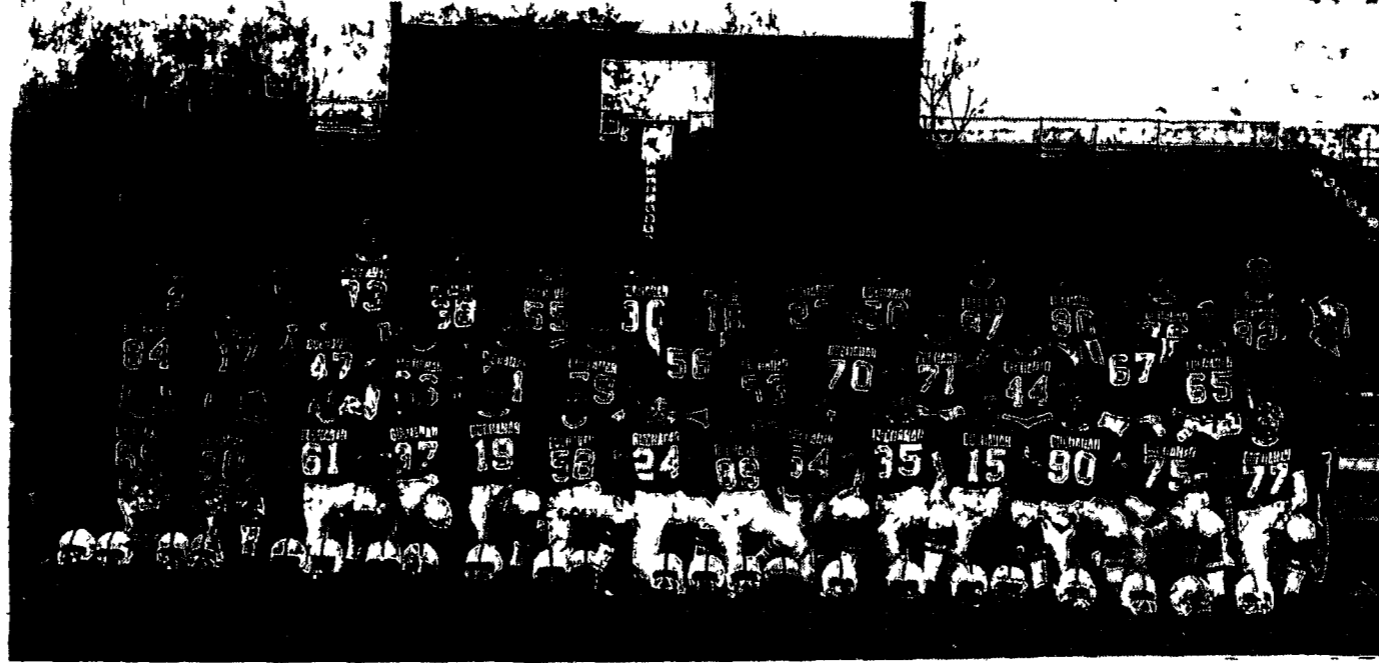
Much Improved

Sacrifice Today Will Pay Off Big... in Landscaping

Planning a home landscape may mean sacrificing the immediate for the ultimate. But the sacrifice can be a delight, according to Joe Cox, cooperative extension service landscape architect specialist.

"Your landscape should grow on you," said Cox. "And it will if beauty is balanced with function."

In planning home landscapes, the landscape architect urged homeowners to keep in mind many of the factors that affect the particular site. Then the actual design becomes just a matter of putting thoughts on paper.

"What you need in a landscape design will be geared to what resources you have available. You'll want a certain uniqueness in your home grounds that makes them a little different from every other person's home. You'll want to create compositions of materials that add to the pleasure of the property without adding greatly to the time and effort needed to maintain it," Cox stated.

"Start with an inventory of your resources. This will include land space and physical qualities of your property—climate conditions, winds, other forces of nature. You'll want to think of existing plants, shrub and trees, utilities and drainage," he continued.

Cox added that in actual working out a design, a homeowner should consider the pattern of movement paths, side walks and driveways, the layout of areas of use, and definitely several alternative plans.

He continued, "The design process itself should include some experimental planning. You may plan several times and not come out with what you want, so you'll have to try again."

"A helpful thing is a 'cool off' time," Cox suggested. "Even though the design skillfully put together, if you can set it aside for a short time, and then go back to some of the problems may seem so difficult. It gives you a chance to put together the ideas and old ideas in different ways."

Winterize Your Son for Safety

Winterize your 14-year old son and avoid a \$10,000 fine.

"Winterize? I mean send him to a tractor and farm machinery operators' training program," explains Howard Doss, Michigan State University farm mechanization specialist.

"He will learn basic safe operating practices that are good whether he's operating a tractor at home or on unfamiliar ground."

Besides the best training available, he will receive an exemption certificate after completing an approved program. It certifies that he's qualified to operate certain pieces of farm machinery.

"It's this exemption certificate that helps you avoid a \$10,000 fine," Doss says. "A 14 or 15 year old must have one in his possession, when working for someone else for pay or friendship. Otherwise, the U.S. Dept. of Labor could ask a federal district court to fine Dad up to \$10,000. Your son doesn't need a certificate if he's working for you on your farm."

Doss says approved training programs are available through high school vocational agricultural teachers or in the 4-H tractor operators program. You can find out about them by contacting your high school or your county Cooperative Extension service office.

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

Garden Notes

Recent inquiries have prompted this article concerning storage of crops for winter use. Keep in mind that the variety of vegetable determines the storage temperature required to keep firmness. Pumpkins, winter squash and sweet potatoes want a temperature of 50 degrees or over. Cabbage, beets, carrots, turnips, almost all so called "root crops" keep best at 32 degrees or less

Those of you who still prefer the outdoor storage bin should build it according to the amount and type of vegetables you plan to store. Making a small cave in the side of a hill is easy and very successful

When there is no hill, build a wood frame or use a barrel if one is available. Set the floor level of whatever you use six inches to one foot below ground level. Earth, sand or potting mix are best for the floor as these materials allow moisture evaporation. If you must use concrete, put a layer of damp (not wet) peat moss over the concrete before placing the vegetables on it

With the exception of the space you plan to leave for an opening, cover the entire exterior with two feet of soil, sod placed over this will provide more protection and prevent the soil from washing away. Make the door as solid as possible and cover it with several thicknesses of old carpet or burlap. Thick straw over the flap is often advisable

"Knitting machines are becoming real popular with women as they are becoming more cost-conscious," noted Mrs. Decker. "You can make almost anything in the clothing line, as well as curtains, rugs and purses. Knitting machines are becoming as popular as sewing machines in many homes."

Mrs. Decker was widely known during her years in 4-H as Kay Frame, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Frame of US-12 West.

She operates her knit shop from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Home on 20 Day Leave

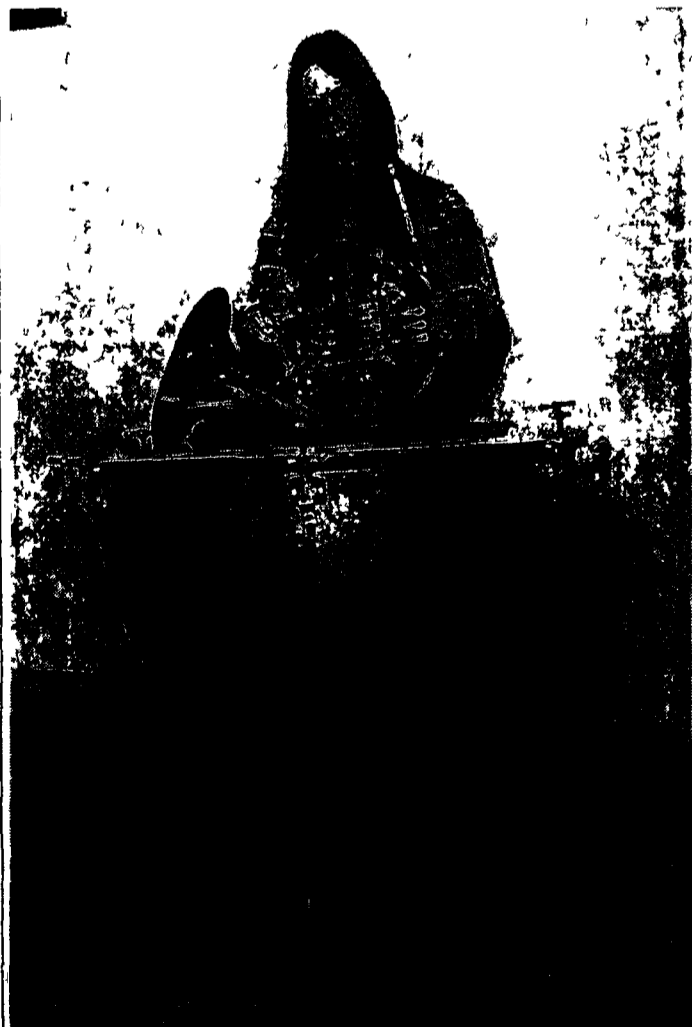

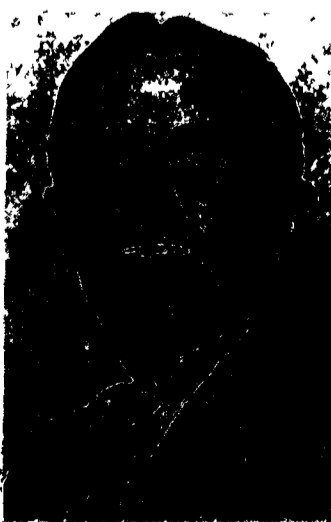
