All Out For The Cancer Quota

A short time since one of those many young men that we know and still don't know (the kids get away from us) came in the office and leaned across the counter.

"You know," he said, "if we'd only go all out to stop cancer as we go all out in war, the doctors and scientists could very likely let it."

"Why isn't it just as reasonable to go all out to save lives as to destroy them? Only \$12,000,000 as a national quota for the cancer drive! Compare that with a \$2,000,000,000 for the atom bomb. What couldn't science do with a two-billion kitty for cancer elimination? Or compare it with a mere \$150,000,000 for a battleship."

"Of course in war times we think of killing other people to save our own necks. Yet cancer kills more in the United States every year than we lost in World War II. It's a crueler, more dangerous enemy than war, in our experience at least. Cancer, we imagine, is the other guy's bad luck. But one out of eight die with it, which is a high casualty rate."

KAYE FRAMES TEN-SPOT

On the wall of the office of C. E. Kaye, cashier of the Union State Bank, hangs a framed \$10 bill.

No, it's not the first \$10 Kaye ever made—but it is one he helped make nevertheless. The significance of this framed bill is that it came at lower left is Kaye's signature, affixed there in 1929 when the bill was issued by the City National Bank and Trust of Battle Creek.

That was back in the days when national banks had the power of issuing currency. A national bank would sell, for instance, a \$50,000 issue of stock and would then take that money and buy \$50,000 in government bonds. They were then empowered by the treasury to issue \$50,000 in paper currency. The issue would be printed by treasury presses and sent to the bank. The cashier signed the notes at lower left and the president of the bank signed at lower right.

The bank of issuance drew 3% interest on the government bonds and 6% of the currency issue, the double interest, on the same \$50,000 totaling an annual yield of 9%.

At the top of the framed note is the large imprint indicating that the note was issued by the City National Bank and Trust of Battle Creek. The bill turned up a few weeks ago in the Galien Bank, where it caught the attention of an employee and was relayed to Mr. Kaye.

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Judge Westin Acts To Enforce Law On Picketing

No Ruling On Allegation Of Litigants In Decision

The telephone strike, now nearly a month old, settled down to a grim endurance contest again this week, following a flurry of excitement and speculation over the appeal of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company to the circuit court and the consequent ruling of Judge E. A. Westin.

Faced with a tangle of complaints and cross-complaints, Judge Westin cut through with temporary injunctions imposing a blanket restraint on both parties to the suit.

"He said: 'The legal rights of pickets and employers and the rest of the public are so well known that plaintiffs and defendants, both sides being responsible parties, should have been able to conduct themselves in this situation in such a manner to be above reproach. Failing that, the law-enforcement authorities of the municipalities involved should have been alert to prevent or cope with any violations of the law. It was unfortunate, as it should have been unnecessary, that the injunctive power of a court of equity must be invoked.'"

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company, appellant for injunction, had cited especially the Benton Harbor and Buchanan exchanges, alleging that in those places pickets had illegally interfered with the rights of representatives of management in entrance and exit to the property. The telephone union had filed a cross-bill alleging that representatives of the company had incited pickets. It was alleged that in both Benton Harbor and in Buchanan company representatives furnishing emergency service had been denied the right to come and go at will for several days last week.

Judge Westin in his ruling issued Monday expressed no opinion on the validity of any of the above claims but merely accepted the allegations of both sides as grounds for an injunction to enforce legal conduct by all concerned in the future.

The Bell Telephone Company's petition for an injunction was filed in the Berrien County Circuit Court Wednesday, April 23, following the adoption of mass picketing in several towns of this district.

The union's cross bill asking for an injunction against the company was filed at the beginning of the Saturday hearing in which Judge Westin ordered the union to show cause why the injunction requested by the Bell Telephone company should not be granted.

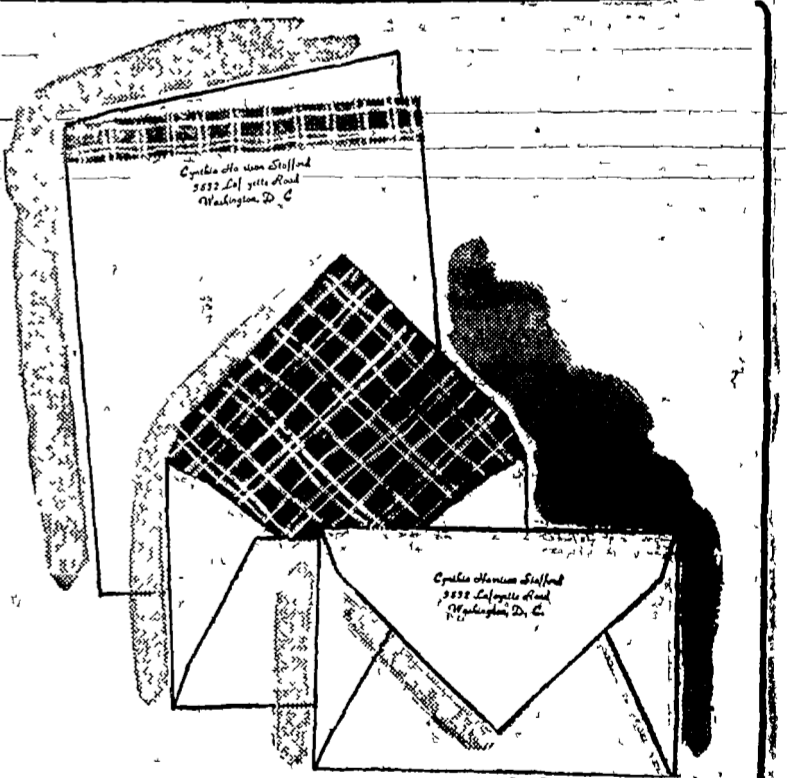

Hundreds Of Public Health Nurses Are Needed In Michigan "Need exists for hundreds more public health nurses in Michigan", Miss Helene Buker, director of the Bureau of Public Health Nursing, Michigan Department of Health, said today. "While public health programs in the state have been expanding, the number of public health nurses available has been decreasing," Miss Buker said. She explained that one public health nurse for each 2,000 persons in the state, with one supervising nurse for each ten nurses is considered by some to be the desirable ratio. Public health nursing services, she said, are needed for families in all economic brackets. In Michigan, the already small number of public health nurses, has decreased from 994 in January, 1940 to 815 in January 1947. There were approximately 300 vacancies in city, county and district health departments and other agencies at the outset of 1947. Four counties in Michigan have no public health nursing service, and five others have no county-wide public health nursing service. All public health nurses and primary lay committees are making an effort to acquaint people in their communities with the need for additional recruits for the public health nursing field, and to furnish high school and college girls and nursing personnel with the advantages of the field—maximum service to people, increased pay rates, increased possibility of advancement, and new travel and education opportunities. Public health nursing normally requires at least one year of specialized study beyond graduation from an approved school of nursing. In Michigan, public health nurses are employed, principally, by health departments and visiting nurse associations. Public health nurses, working with the family physician, play an important part in promotion of good health in children and adults, in the prevention of disease, the control of epidemics and in correction of remediable defects. The help to prepare expectant parents for their responsibilities and to teach them how to take care of their children. They give bedside care to the sick and in the home while teaching some member of the family how to care for the patient.

Mich. Employment Increased Slightly During Month March
Total employment in Michigan nonagricultural industries, except government, was estimated to be 1,777,700 in mid-March 1947 according to a report released today by the Cleveland Regional Office of the Bureau of Labor Statistics in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Labor and Industry, Lansing. The March estimate was only slightly above the February level but was 22% above the March 1946 estimate.

Employment in all the manufacturing industries remained fairly constant in the month-to-month period and also remained considerably above year ago levels. In the nonmanufacturing industries, small increases in employments were quite general in the February-March period and the total maintained a level 9% above March 1946.

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Drive On Drunken Driving Urged By Safety Spokesmen

Two prominent automotive and safety spokesmen have appealed for drastic curbs against drunken and reckless driving during the spring and summer motoring seasons.

John S. Cuthbert, eastern representative of the National Safety Council, and Otto F. Messner, President of the American Association Motor Vehicle Administrators, made the safety appeals. Mr. Cuthbert cited a study made in a midwestern city to ascertain the effects of alcohol on motorists. "More than 1,750 nonaccident drivers were tested in carefully selected locations over a week to obtain an accurate picture of the drinking habits of the motoring population," Mr. Cuthbert said, according to an article by Bert Pierce, automobile editor, in the New York Times.

Previously, examination had been made on 270 drivers who had been involved in accidents and brought to hospitals. "Only 12% of the drivers in the normal driving population showed

alcohol in the blood, whereas 47% of those involved in accidents had been drinking. There were 33 times as many drivers whose blood content contained one-fifteenth of 1% of alcohol or more in a group of accident drivers as in a similar sized group of drivers from the normal driving population."

Mr. Messner reported that a total of 318,000 motorists in the country lost their driving rights in 1946 because of drunken and reckless driving and other failures to comply with safety regulations. "Many violations, particularly drunken driving, are on the increase," Mr. Messner reported. "Motor vehicle administrators expect to see an upswing this year in license suspensions and revocations."

Mr. Cuthbert stressed that hazard possibilities increased with the concentration of alcohol in the blood. The average drinking-driver is "55 times more likely to be involved in a personal injury accident than nondrinking drivers," he stressed.

"The reckless and irresponsible driver is a menace to all motorists and pedestrians and his abuse of the privilege of driving forfeits that privilege."

The compilation covers the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946. After Michigan, with 904,557 licenses, it lists California with 764,557, which is followed in turn by Ohio, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Illinois, New York, Indiana and Wisconsin. Higher fees in other states produce more total revenue from fewer licenses for California, Massachusetts and Minnesota. California

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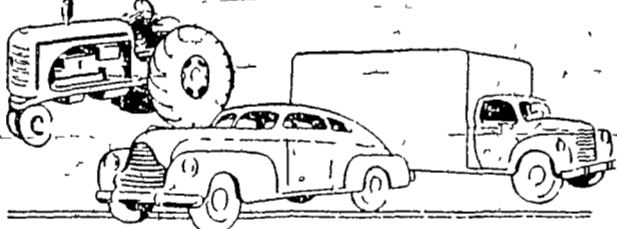

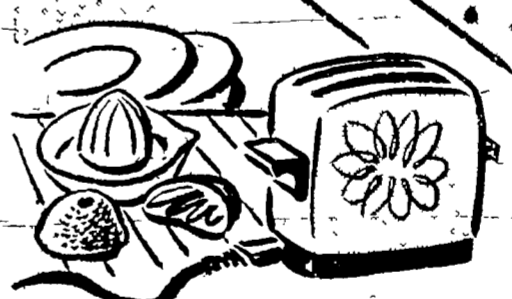
