Buchanan F. & A. M. Lodge No. 68 To Celebrate Centennial Next Week

A very important date in Buchanan fraternal history will be celebrated Thursday evening, April 22, when the members of Buchanan Lodge No. 68 F. & A. M. will honor the centennial anniversary of their organization at a dinner and program meeting held in the high school gymnasium.

Speaker of the occasion will be Dr. Preston Bradley, pastor of the great People's Church in Chicago for 42 years. Dr. Bradley is one of the most popular speakers for occasions in the middle west. The morning session of his church has been broadcast for over 30 years and has a tremendous audience. He is one of the great civic leaders of Chicago, where, he holds many important appointive offices, including membership in the board of directors of the public library, and in the State Normal board of Illinois. He is the chairman of the Chicago Council Against Racial Discrimination and a member of the Mayor's Commission on Race Discrimination. The preceding are only a few of his activities, but they indicate the wide range of his sympathies. He is loved and honored by people of every race and creed, not only in his home city of Chicago, but throughout the Middle West.

The dinner will begin at 6:30 p.m. During an intermission between the dinner and the address by Dr. Preston Bradley, the fine 40-piece Shrine band from South Bend, will play several selections.

HISTORY OF LODGE NO. 68

Buchanan lodge No. 68 F. & A. M., was the first fraternal order to be organized in Buchanan, having been chartered Jan. 13, 1854. The first meeting preliminary to organization had been held June 27, 1853, with the following members: Caleb Ingersoll, M. N. Griswold, Nathaniel Hamilton, E. P. Lewis, Frederick Howe, J. D. Rup, Garrett Morris, Joseph M. Knight, and William S. Merrill. The number of the lodge indicated that it was the 68th to be founded in Michigan.

A petition of recommendation for its formation was signed by the members of St. Joseph lodge No. 4 F. & A. M. of Niles. During the period before the charter was granted the Buchanan lodge worked toward official organization under the leadership of Caleb Ingersoll as Worshipful Master. A petition for organization had been signed by the Grand Lodge of Michigan on Aug. 16, 1853. The Grand Lodge committee on examination recommended that a charter should be granted on Jan. 12, 1854, and a session on Jan. 13, 1854 granted the charter. The first officers were men well known in the pioneer development of the town, as follows: Worshipful Master, Caleb Ingersoll; Senior Warden, M. N. Griswold; Junior Warden, Nathaniel Hamilton; Treasurer, Frederick Howe; Secretary, J. D. Ross; Senior Deacon, William S. Merrill; Junior Deacon, Joseph M. Knight; Tyler, Garrett Morris.

There are no records for its sessions during the first eight years, as a fire which devastated a large portion of the business section of Buchanan in November of 1863 destroyed its hall and all records. Following the fire, Bu-

chanan Lodge No. 75, I.O.O.F., chartered Sept. 5, 1855, generously granted the Masonic order the use of its room until other arrangements could be made.

A second Masonic lodge was chartered Jan. 10, 1867, as Summit Lodge No. 192 F. & A. M. on May 9, 1884, Summit Lodge No. 192 was merged with Buchanan Lodge No. 68 on request of the Grand Lodge of Michigan that the two units should be consolidated. The two were formally joined under the name of the first organized unit.

The lodge had been meeting previously in the A. C. Day building. In 1887 the lodge moved into the Redden building at the corner of Days avenue and Front street. There the 50th anniversary of the unit, Jan. 13, 1904, was celebrated adjoining for a dinner at the Dawn Hotel, later the Cottage Hotel, on the present site of the Edmonds Chevrolet parking lot on the west side of Main street.

In 1907 the Buchanan Masons moved into the present quarters on the second floor of the building at 122 1/2 East Front street, the first meeting there being held Dec. 9, 1907. On April 11, 1910, Nathaniel Hamilton, a charter member, died at an advanced age after 57 years of membership.

The club is planning a public dance at the UAW-CIO building on Fifth street on the evening of May 1. The donation will be 35c to raise funds for their program. They have begun a sports program in baseball, softball, badminton and table tennis. The lower age limit is 14. Any boy who wishes to join is cordially invited to attend.

White Beaver Scout Leaders Meet At Madron

Camp Madron, the area Scouting headquarters on Madron Lake, was the scene of an interesting meeting Tuesday evening by members and leaders of the White Beaver district. Nineteen interested men attended from Niles and Buchanan.

Myron Herrick, Niles, president of the Southwestern Michigan Council, outlined the urgent need of new leaders to take care of the rapidly-increasing numbers of boys engaged in Scouting. He said "We will need at least 1,800 more adults who will be available for a small portion of their time during the next five years of the Scouting program."

Herrick stated that Camp Madron is ranked in the top 5 percent of Scout camps in the entire nation. It has been selected for the past three years for the National Camping School. The camp is valued at \$150,000.

Ken Cramer, Scout executive for the district, explained the table of organization for the group. Ken Blake, Scout Ranger, supplemented his remarks. During the business session which followed the following officers were then elected for the ensuing year: William White, Niles, Niles district chairman; R. E. Lockwood, Gahen, first vice-chairman; Charles Bolton, Niles, second vice-chairman; Al Farr, Niles, district committeeman; Messrs. Lockwood and Bolton were named in the district executive board.

Wins 2nd Place In Nation-Wide Mould Contest

Bill Koenigshof, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Koenigshof, received notice last week that he had won second place in a national contest for foundry apprentices, under the auspices of the American Foundry Society.

The society had sponsored prizes in national competition for art students of the freshman through senior classes of Buchanan high school, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary. Bill took second in steel molding. He received a check for \$50 from the American Foundry Society as his award.

Bill started his apprenticeship in the local Clark Equipment company foundry on June 11, 1951, at the end of his junior year in high school under the co-operative arrangement between Clark's and the Buchanan schools for alternating study and practice in manufacturing skills. He continued after graduation from high school and has about one year more to complete the apprentice period when he will receive the rating of class A molder.

Bill was induced to enter by his boss, Raymond Gregory, who advised him to write to the American Foundry Magazine for an entry blank. Bill received a core box, pattern, and a steel casting, weight about 70 pounds, which he was to reproduce. The casting was fairly intricate for an apprentice. The rules required that Bill's entry in the contest be received by him in the foundry. Time to make the mold began immediately after the above and craftsmanship in the finished casting formed the basis of the scoring. Bill completed his mold in two-and-one-half hours.

Economic Development, United Fund Keynoted At Business Ass'n Meet

The Buchanan Business Association was host to a number of guests at the annual public program held last Thursday evening at the American Legion Hall, with two speakers from neighboring Niles on the east providing the bulk of the program.

Following a brief business session, Bela Woodworth, president, introduced the first Niles speakers, David S. Miller, vice-president of Kawneer company. Mr. Miller talked on the development and prospective purpose of the Economic Development Committee, which went into gear a little over a month ago, following a year and a half of study by a pilot committee, which was briefed by the Continuing Education Department of Michigan State College.

The purpose of the committee, said Miller, is the development of the Niles community area along proper channels, which will be formulated on the foundation of an intense study of the factual background. A community cannot stand still, said Miller. It must grow, not necessarily in size alone but in the vitality and proper direction of its institutions. And since a community must grow, it is in the interest of its citizens that it grows in a right direction.

There are two kinds of community promotion, said Miller. One is the careful, studied growth

proposed above. The other is that sort of spasmodic promotion which as often as not gets a community into trouble — by indiscriminate search for new industry, whether the community has the labor supply, the housing for more labor, the skills and the other considerations that should govern promotion. This is on the theory that getting bigger means getting better, and vice versa.

The Niles Economic Development Committee is not merely a "gimmick to get new payrolls in Niles so we will have more customers," said Miller. It's first business is a careful factual survey which will 1. Provide the information which will implement intelligent guidance, 2. Make accessible in convenient and organized form all information that both present and prospective business and industry needs, or which any organization or individual may need for any purpose at any time; 3. Provide adequate and pertinent information on which a future town plan may be based.

The Niles organization is now in the stage of gathering that basis of information. The first job of the committee was to "break down" the field to be covered, and then to assign to the study of each field individuals who know something already and know where to go for more knowledge. The committee of 38

members expects to complete, during May, a collection of adequate information on the whole life of Niles — covering its education, cultural, recreation, religious institutions, its city utilities, health and its transportation and markets.

This basic information will be maintained on a standby basis to answer any questions and also as a factual foundation for the development of the city and its area on an orderly basis.

United Fund

The second speaker was William J. Botts, executive secretary of the Niles Chamber of Commerce and holding a similar office in the Niles United Fund organization, which was the theme of his talk.

The first thing to understand, said Secretary Botts, is that the Niles United Fund is an autonomous local organization with no outside affiliations, either vertically or horizontally. It is not a part of any larger organization, it has no connections with any neighboring organization.

Its central idea is one annual drive replacing the multiple individual drives that were the rule before. It's appeal is "Give once — give yearly, on the easy payment plan if you wish, with a capable and continuous organization behind you that insures

that your gifts will be well managed and will serve actual needs and purposes."

Its success lies in the broader base of giving. At the time the former Niles Community Chest collapsed it had a basis of only 700 givers. Its last drive total in 1952 was \$32,000. The first Niles United Fund drive held last year broadened the base of givers to 4,000 and raised over \$95,000.

The 4,000 donors who provided the \$95,000 total gave or pledged themselves on an average of \$24 per year apiece. On the old basis of only 700 givers an average of \$135 would have been required. In the final Community Chest drive in Niles, the cost to the 700 givers was an average of \$47 apiece or double the cost per giver of the triple \$95,000 fund raised for the current year.

The appeal of the new organization, said Botts, was evidenced by the fact that the organizers did not have one single turn-down in their appeal for canvassers. The record of the United Fund drive in the nation at large has been uniformly good. It has been in use in Elkhart and South Bend for several years, with an increasing financial net to date.

No house-to-house canvass is made. The drive covers industries and business places. The See BUSINESS, Page 2

The Story of Buchanan



Infant Industry In Old Buchanan

As the full tide of the record land rush of the early and middle 1830's swept past the still-forbidden Indian lands around the present site of Buchanan, not free for settlement until September of 1836 the area was a great temptation, especially since the Potawatomi wemanning were too far debauched by white man's rum to effectively protest.

The river boatmen could stop at the mouth of McCoy's creek and explore its lower reaches, where the swiftly-flowing stream meant that most valuable of all land assets, water power. The temptation to "jump the gun" and squat on land with potential dam sites was too strong. So Charles Cowles, a river boatman, squatted on a choice site a half mile up the creek in June of 1833, three months before the federal government had signed a treaty with the Indians in Chicago Sept. 26, 1833, cancelling the Indian title, with a three-year period allowed for the Indians to vacate. Others followed Cowles. He was a bachelor, so he hired Leonard Madron and his wife to care for his cabin. Another river boatman, Russell McCoy, selected a squatter's claim in the summer of 1833 and built a cabin on it in 1834. He too was a bachelor, so he took a partner, Hiram Wray, who moved in the cabin with his family in

1834. Cowles had already built a shingle mill at a point opposite the present (1954) Clark Equipment parking lot, just west of the point where the creek swings southeastward toward its confluence with the river. In 1835 he sold the claim to Dr. Charles Wallin, who converted the power to a grist mill, where he ground corn into corn meal and wheat into "Graham flour." In the meantime Russell McCoy had built a sawmill in 1834 on a claim at the mouth of the creek. McCoy sold his mill in 1837 but it continued under other ownership.

John Hatfield and a partner named Adkins, arrived in 1835, squatted on a claim and built another sawmill just above McCoy's. These two primitive sawmills were undoubtedly of the rudest type, known variously as a "frame" saw, a "gash" saw, or a "gate" saw. These were a sort of variation of the hand-operated whip-saw, set in a cumbersome frame and cutting only in the downward motion. The "muley" saw, a later improvement, was first used in the vicinity of Schoolcraft in 1838. The muleys followed the gate saws here, operating on the same principle but with a lighter frame and less waste of power.

It should be added that the three early historians of the

county did not agree on all details, and there is no way to determine their discrepancies, especially in dates. The first historian was Edward Cowles (no relative of Charles), who published his "Berrien County Directory and History" in 1871. He sets the arrival dates of both McCoy and Cowles in 1834. Ensign's "History of Berrien and VanBuren Counties," published in 1880, and Judge Orville W. Coolidge's "A 20th Century History of Berrien County," published in 1907.

The writer simply went according to majority vote. All three histories are invaluable and for the most part agree in matters of importance, except occasionally in the spelling of names. The land claims of two of the above-mentioned settlers are not of record, since they were disallowed when the Michigan Legislature gave their lands to the University of Michigan when it was revived at Ann Arbor in 1837. The act which so endowed the University stated specifically that no recognition should be given to "squatter's claims." Cowles and Hatfield had sold their claims, and the buyer, Dr. Charles Wallin "held the bag." After an expensive battle in co-operation with many other disallowed claimants over the state came to a futile end and the lands were sold to others who continued and added to the industrial operations mentioned above.

Water power generated by the 66-foot fall in the lower mile of McCoy's creek and the transportation afforded by the nearby St. Joseph river were main reasons for the growth of the sawmill settlement which officially became Buchanan in 1842. Equally important were the sources of timber, first in the scattered woodland interspersed with "barrens" and swamps in the immediate vicinity, and later in the great "Ga-

lien Woods," which in the widest application of the name, began from one to two miles west of the present town, and extended nearly unbroken to Lake Michigan, with a northern border angling from Buchanan area northwest through Buchanan, Weesaw, Baroda, and Lake townships, and a southwesterly boundary continuing across the Michigan-Indiana line to the region of LaPorte. A pioneer report by E. K. Warren, one of the founders of Three Oaks, states that logs scaling 50,000 board feet of hardwood lumber were cut from a half-acre of the Galien Woods. This was something of a record, but at that rate the more than 150,000 acres of the original forest would have yielded lumber worth over \$5,000,000,000 at today's prices of over \$800 per thousand feet. Of course in the beginning choice hardwood lumber sold for as little as \$6 to \$10 per thousand feet. And a large part of the forest was "niggered off" by fire to clear the ground for farming. Many more thousands of acres were shorn to provide ties for the construction of the Michigan Central Railway through the forest in 1849, and also for fuel to be shipped to Chicago, first by sailing vessels loading at New Buffalo and later by the railway.

During the first 30 years the Buchanan sawmill lumber operations only nibbled at the western edge of the Galien Woods, until operations began to expand rap-

idly following the release of men from service in the Civil War. Its earliest market was the production of lumber for farm buildings during the rapid expansion of farming on the nearby Portage and Terre Coupe prairies and in the Bend of the River region immediately across the river. Remembering that farming on Portage and Terre Coupe prairies did not start until the middle 1830's, the following articles taken from the Niles Intelligence of July 19, 1838, gives a clue to the rapidity of development. The article is as follows:

"Last Saturday morning as we sat smoking our pipe and musing on the affairs of the nation, the Detroit greenback shavers, the wildcat banks, our fault-finding patrons, and our delinquent subscribers, our reverie was interrupted by the voice of a friend with the stirring question 'Will you ride with me into the country?'"

"Gladly we accepted the invitation and in five minutes we were in a carriage. Crossing the St. Joseph river, we whirled rapidly along the elevated plain that commands a most charming prospect of our romantic village. After a ride of about three miles we came into a highly cultivated country with broad fields of waving grain, neat cottages and extensive barns.

"It was really cheering to see much evidence of prosperity among these hardy settlers who,

in the space of three short years, have made the wilderness to blossom like a rose. At Portage Prairie the most magnificent scene was presented to our eyes that fancy could have pictured. A continuous field of wheat and corn stretched away to the south and west, bounded by the horizon. "For miles, as we rode along, we saw the same uninterrupted view of continuous fields, scarce broken by even a tree or a house and seemingly as wide as the ocean. We dare not attempt a description of the beautiful country we saw. After a ride of eight or nine miles we returned to town delighted and astonished by the beauty of our neighborhood."

This rapid blanketing of the untimbered prairies by farms provided a booming lumber market even during the national financial bankruptcy, the main industry being no doubt the questionable value of the forms of currency which the millers took in payment.

Trout Season To Open Saturday

Most Other Panfish In Season April 24 - Sept. 12 These are the days when all true fishermen may be told by that curl in their nostrils indicating that they have smelt the smelt and scented the suckers and are now all teed up for the trout season which opens Saturday, April 24.

The runs of both suckers and smelt have been phenomenal for this area. There is no season on suckers, except that time when they make themselves available by running up the St. Joseph river to the bottom of the Berrien Springs dam. The catch is ordinarily best during the fore part of April. A week ago Sunday one Benton Harbor trucker bought three tons of suckers from fishermen who were reeling them out with huge dipnets operated by windlass. Many dipnetters were reported to be taking in as much as a half-ton a day. Sales stands had been set up on the highway adjacent and some fishermen were peddling their catch at entrances to industrial plants when shifts changed.

An unusually good smelt run was also reported during the first two weeks of April in the lower half mile of all streams in the New Buffalo area entering Lake Michigan. The smelt may be fished with dipnets 5 feet in circumference in the first half mile above the stream's mouth.

The 1954 season for small fish in general will start April 24, immediately after midnight. The main species made available for the anglers during the period of April 24 to Sept. 12 are as follows: brook, brown and rainbow trout, Mackinaw or lake trout, muskellunge, northern pike, pickerel (walleyed pike), bluegills, sunfish, crappies, rock bass, yellow perch, warmouth bass, sturgeon, whitefish, white bass and other fry.

The season for fishing largemouth bass and smallmouth black bass will not begin until June 19, ending Sept. 12.

The cost of fishing licenses are as follows: annual resident (except trout) \$1.50, non-resident (except trout) \$3, non-resident 15-day (except trout) \$2; resident and non-resident trout stamp \$1.

A resident license is required of all residents who have not passed their 17th birthday, except on their home grounds or acreage. Licenses are required for all non-residents who have not passed their 17th birthday.

A non-resident is defined as a person who has not actually resided in Michigan for six months prior to making application for license.

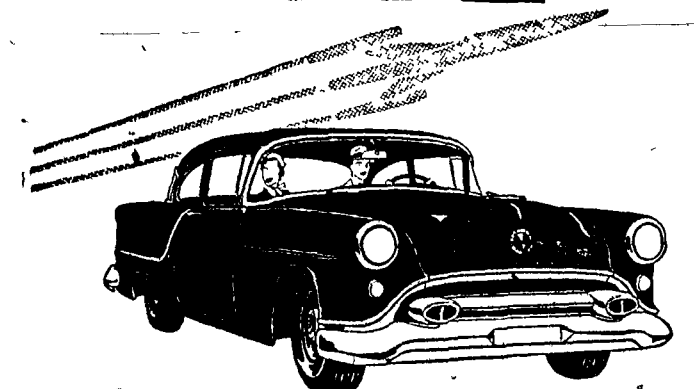

Watch Your Farm And Yard Fires

Now that the fires of spring will soon be burning in backyards, fields and fence rows as well as "in a young man's fancy," it is time that farmers and city households consider the legal background of such operations. The law allows you to burn trash on your domestic premises, which in the city includes the

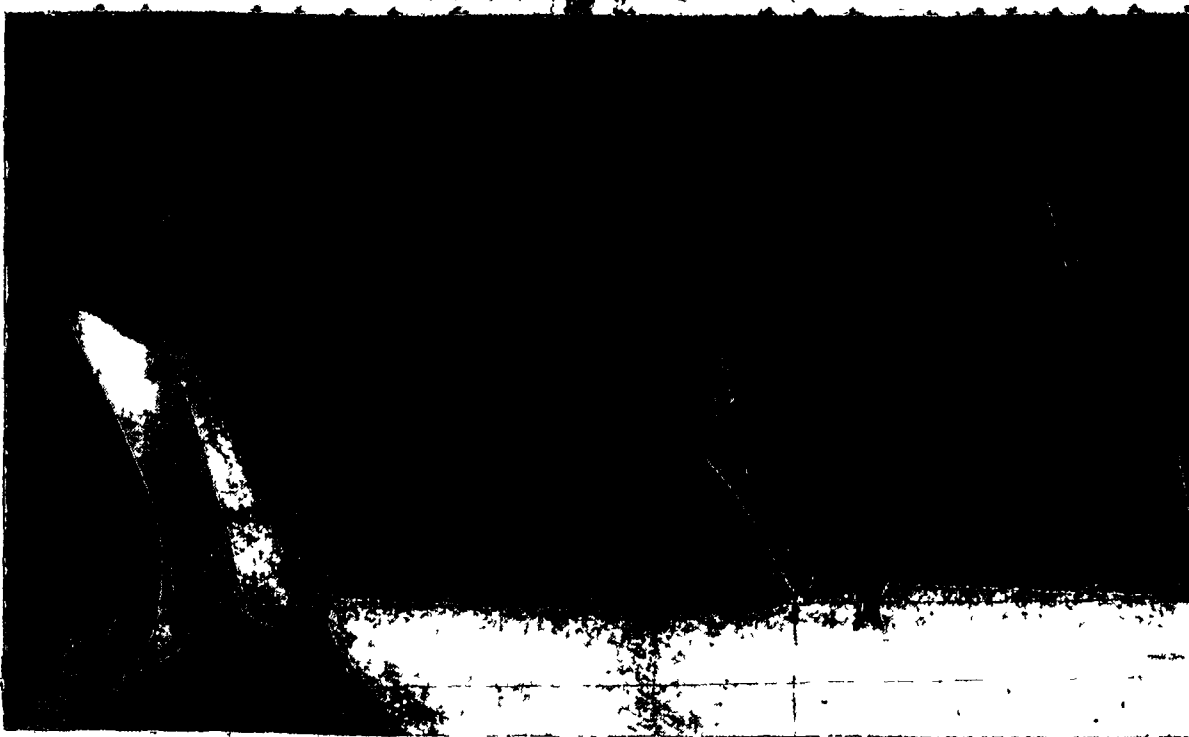
lot on which your home stands, and in the country the immediate vicinity of your farm and home buildings. For wider operations, on a town acreage or on a farm you must have a permit. In Buchanan city and Buchanan township you can get a permit from the police station in the city hall. In Bertrand township you get your permit from Clarence Canfield, Jr., at Baker-town. In Niles township you get your permit at either of the two township fire stations, one a mile north of the city of Niles on the Dowagiac road, the other

immediately south of the city near the mushroom farm. Or anyone may get a permit from the Michigan Conservation officer, Arnold Suomi, of Niles. Any of these agencies may immediately revoke a permit if dangerous conditions arise, such as high winds during dry weather. The penalties consequent to setting fires without permit, or to careless operations with a permit are defined by Michigan State law.

The sole exceptions for fires without permit are if the ground is covered with snow, if the fire is on your domestic premises, or if it is a counter fire to protect persons or properties by checking the spread of another fire.

Any person who negligently permits a fire to injure or endanger the property of another may, on conviction, be assessed not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or imprisonment for 90 days or both. Any person who maliciously sets a fire which endangers human life or destroys the property of another, may, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or imprisonment for not over ten years, or both fines and imprisonment. In any event, the person who permits a fire to escape is liable for all expenses incurred by the state of Michigan in the suppression of such fire except for Department of Conservation personnel and equipment.

All should keep in mind that fires in the immediate future are

Suggest Rhubarb And Asparagus For One Side of Garden

Why not use one side of your garden for a perennial vegetable bed?

C. J. McCarthy, Berrien county's vegetable agent, says rhubarb and asparagus will thrive in this area. Only a few plants of rhubarb are needed for the average family and many gardens have enough waste space to include asparagus, McCarthy insists.

Michigan State College vegetable specialists advise setting these plants in the garden as early in the spring as possible. Both asparagus and rhubarb like rich soil well supplied with organic matter. Ten to twelve bushels of well-rotted manure or compost should be worked into the soil for each 50 feet of row. And, the specialists suggest, apply 10 pounds of complete commercial fertilizer over this area and mix thoroughly with the soil. The specialists also suggest.

Buy disease-free rhubarb plants of McDonald or Ruby Set them in the row four feet apart and with crowns even with the soil surface.

When you buy asparagus plants insist on good one-year-old roots of the Mary Washington variety. Space them 18 inches apart in the row. Roots should be set in a trench 8 to 10 inches deep in sandy soils and 6 to 7 inches deep in heavy soils.

Rhubarb shouldn't be harvested during the first season. Asparagus should not be cut during the first and second years and only lightly during the third. But, thereafter, harvest full crops.

Way To Better Dental Health

(Dental disease affects at some time in life nearly every person. In the United States alone, it is estimated that dental decay and diseases of the gums and supporting structures of the teeth afflict all but two of three percent of the population. In order to show our readers what they can do to improve their dental health, the Berrien County Record in co-operation with the Tri-County Dental Society, presents the first of a series of articles on "Your Dental Health.")

It begins to look as though tooth decay may lose its title of civilization's most widespread malady. There doesn't seem much likelihood of ever completely eliminating tooth decay as a menace but top-flight authorities do see a dramatic reversal of the present trend and a better chance for everyone to have good teeth. The chances of reducing the toll taken by other dental ailments are also growing brighter.

"Never before has the dental profession been possessed of so many effective weapons for the prevention of disease," says the American Dental Association. "There is little exciting today for the appalling statistics that reflect the enormity of the effects of dental disease. The problem now is basically one of putting knowledge into action." The chief weapon of the dentist is education, because unless

the public learns the value of regular dental examinations and of proper oral hygiene and diet, the dentist cannot fully utilize the advances which dental science has made. But with these advances, he hopes to effect a sharp reduction not only in dental decay, but in other dental ailments as well.

Periodontal diseases, for example. There are the diseases of the gums and supporting structures of the teeth and the chief reason for loss of teeth after the age of 35. These diseases actually cause more loss of teeth than does dental decay.

Early and regular dental treatment is also important in the aligning of teeth which have come into the mouth irregularly and in the correction of improper jaw relationship.

Another effective weapon in the fight against dental disease is the fluoridation of community water supplies. Fluoridation has reduced dental decay by as much as 65 per cent. (Next week Dental Health for Children)

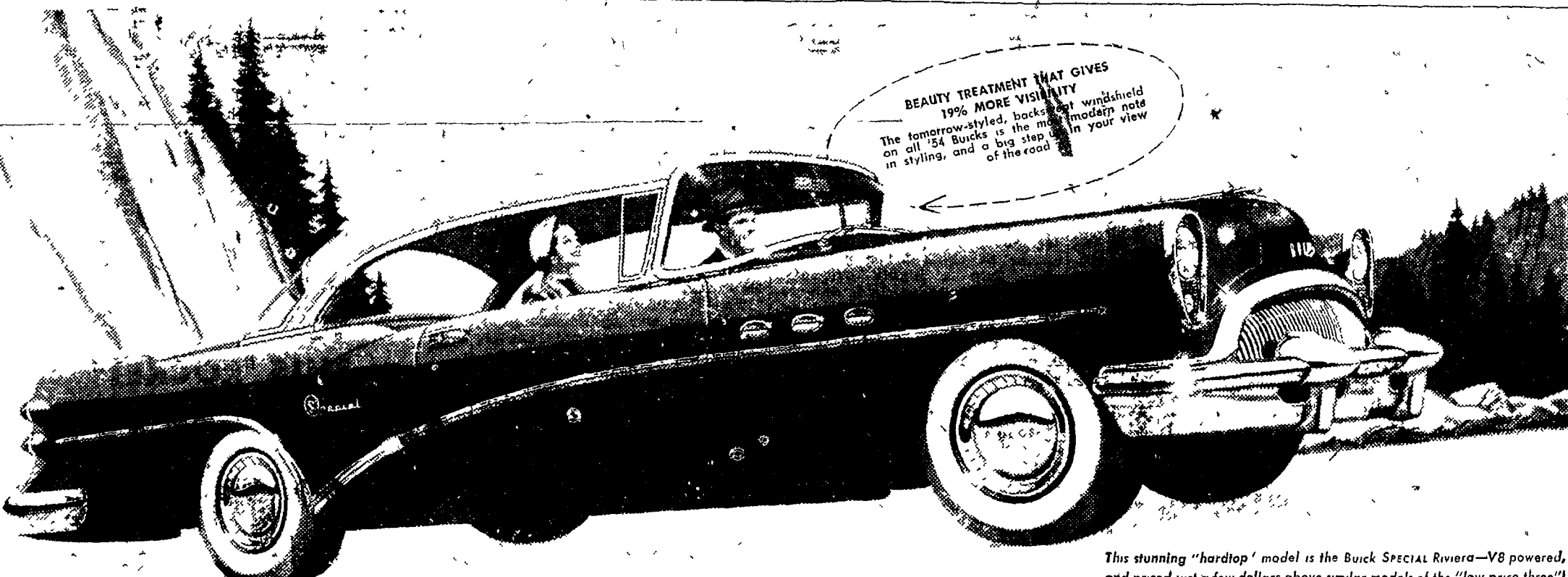

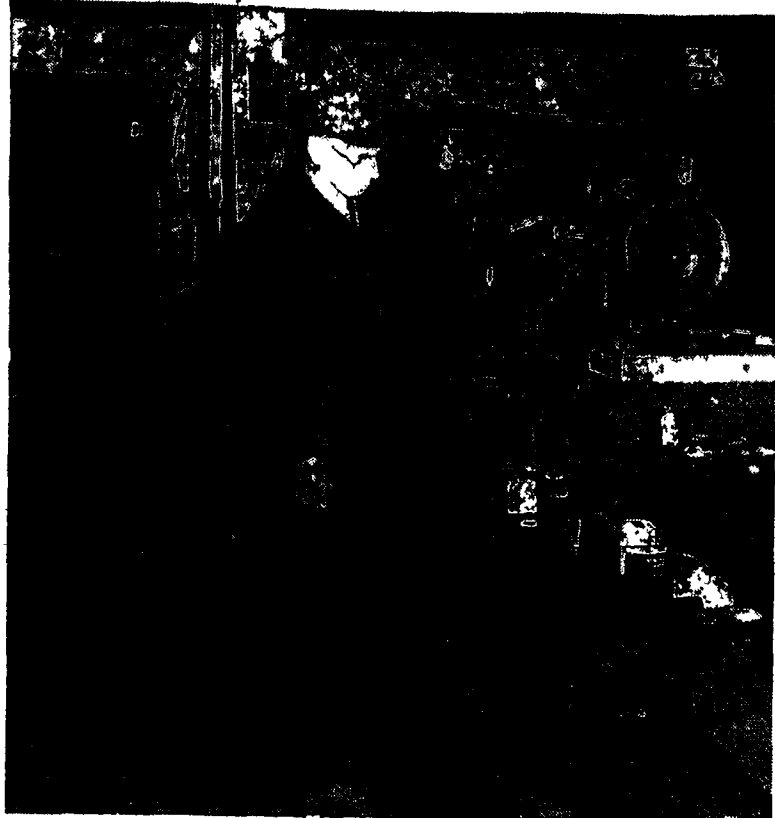

Board Evaluates Phases School Life and Work

Place of Extra-Curricular Activities Discussed In Panel

"How do you feel about extra-curricular activities?" was the theme of a recent session of the Parent-Teacher Board, an entirely unofficial organization which meets monthly to evaluate some phase of school work and life.

This board, which is actually a changing discussion panel, is regularly composed of eight teachers, eight parents, the five school board members and the school executive officers, including Supt. H. C. Stark, Principal Pierre Bailey and Grade Supervisor Lena Ekstrom. The changing factor in the panel is the parent personnel, new faces being introduced from time to time in order to include eventually a wide number of parents.

The decision of the March panel on extra-curricular activities was that they have great value, and that the question of whether students may be over-taxing themselves is the problem of the individual parent and child. The first sign of over-participation is a slump in grades. On the other hand, the extra-curricular activity is a valuable safety valve for the brighter students who are cramped by the medium standards which teachers must set for the average abilities of classes. The mental energies of the more book-minded student who gets bored by too little to do can be absorbed by the extra-curricular activity, such as dramatics, vocal or instrumental music, athletics, membership of one or more of the several school clubs, or athletics.

The extra-curricular activities worked about 12½ years in the tool department of the Clark Equipment, 12½ years in the same department of the National Standard of Niles, and lastly 3½ years in the South Bend Tool & Die plant, from which he retired to enter business for himself.

His saw filing work comes in throughout the year, but is heaviest during the winter. He is also skilled in the repair of gasoline motors and in washing machine repair, the latter being mainly "call jobs," which make him acquainted with many home basements. Part of his equipment is a small electric welder, useful in repairing damaged gears in washing machines and other equipment.

He began his repair service work 6 years ago in his garage, then 20x18 feet in dimension. His growing business soon required more space, and he added 18 feet to the rear, doubling his floor space.

In addition to the repair work he is also in the sales business, being the agent for the M-E Rotary Tiller operated by gasoline motors. He also sells bulb flowers, raised in two patches on his large lot. His floral wares are tulips, hyacinths, lilacs, and other Easter flowers, both in the bulb stage and in bloom.

M. S. C. Extension Folder Advises On Kinds of Vegetables

Want to know what vegetable varieties will do the best in your garden?

Then get a copy of Michigan State College's Extension Folder S-179, "Recommended Vegetable Varieties for Michigan." It is available at the county extension office, at 901 Port street in St. Joseph.

The folder tells you what varieties have been doing well in Michigan for several years. They have been tested by M. S. C. horticulturists and the recommendations are based also on grower and market acceptance. Knowing the name of the recommended variety and the source and strain of that variety is important. If a particular strain has been satisfactory in the past, they say, the grower should attempt to reorder the same strain of that variety. This can be done by specifying the stock or lot number that is found on the seed packet or on the tag on the bag.

Improved Practice Cuts Bushel Costs

*Want to cut your crop production and boost profits? Michigan State College scientists revealed the results of a study this week which showed costs of production can be cut sharply by improved farming practices.

The studies, conducted by Dr. R. L. Cook, head of the M. S. C. soil science department and C. R. Hoglund of the agricultural economics department, showed these figures on cost cuts:

Improved practices—as compared with older practices—pared the cost of producing a bushel of wheat from \$1.54 to \$1.28, of a bushel of oats from 80 cents to 69 cents, and of corn from \$1.21 to \$1.02 a bushel. And following recommended practices lowered the cost of producing a ton of alfalfa-brome hay from \$16.80 to \$13.30 and a ton of sugar beets from \$11.21 to \$8.19.

The M. S. C. men found that the biggest saving in production costs was through using the recommended rates of fertilizer. But other practices, such as timely planting, use of adapted crop varieties, seed treatment, crop rotation, the right soil management, tillage and weed control, each were cost cutters, too.

Although a farmer using the

recommended practices spends more money per acre, the resulting yields more than offset the extra expenses. Dr. Cook and Hoglund found, for example, that the average Michigan farmer spends \$46 an acre to produce 38 bushels of corn. But, by spending \$62.25 an acre, the cost of recommended practices, he would produce 61 bushels of corn per acre.

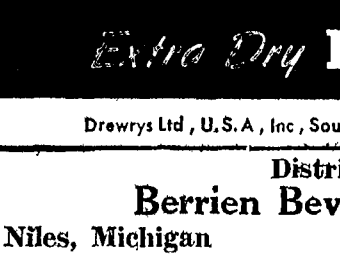
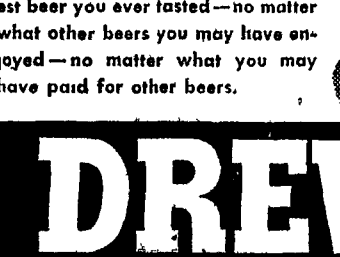
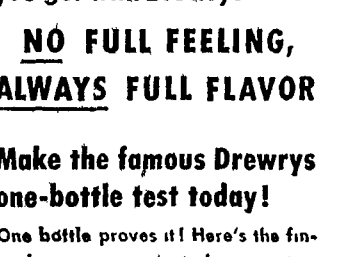
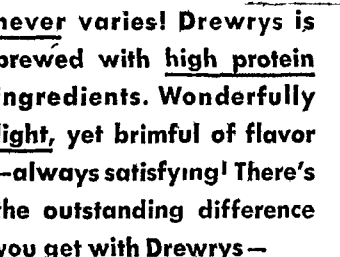
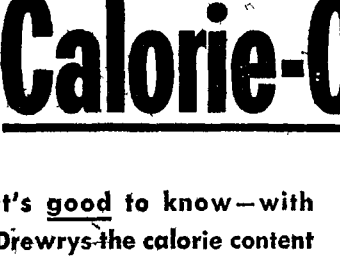
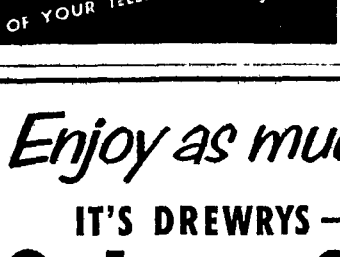
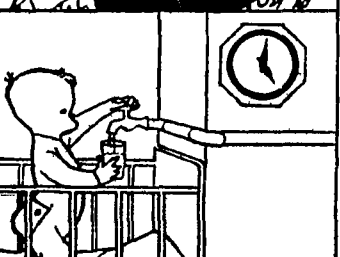
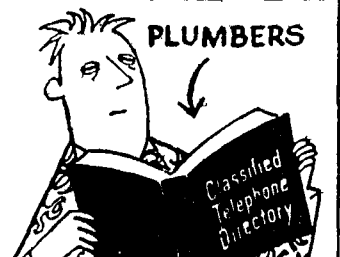
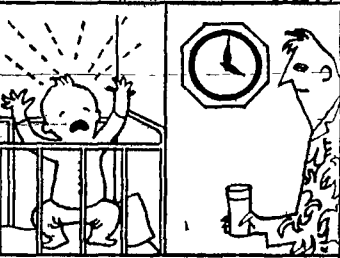
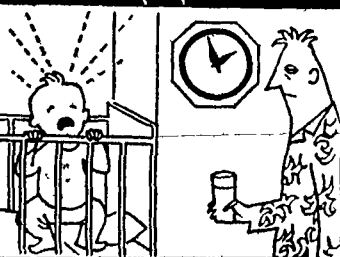
