Kenneth Peters, Richard Schwartz Add To Jack Knight Memorabilia

Mrs. A. P. Sprague Votes For "Tree Shack" As Origin Of Name "Sky"

To the rescue during the past week of this halting recital of the life of Jack Knight came Richard "Red" Schwartz, Kenneth Peters of Bertrand and Mrs. A. P. Sprague, all old-time friends of the late aviator.

Mrs. Sprague added her vote to the "tree-shack" up across the Michigan Central tracks as the most probable origin of the nickname, "Sky". She remembered the shack and Knight's airy domicile.

Kenneth Peters dropped in the office in reply to a request from your truly. Peters went through the Buchanan schools with Knight from the first grade to their graduation in 1911. Then afterwards he roomed at the same place while he and Knight were employed in Gary, Ind., in the days immediately preceding the first World War.

Peters said that he did not personally remember that Jack ever expressed any special interest in airplanes back in those days. But when World War I started Knight was an army air corps flight instructor at Ellington Field, near Houston, Texas.

Richard Schwartz came in with a copy of the "Jack Knight Air Log," a publication produced in the interests of the Jack Knight Air Mail Society, a branch of the American Air Mail society, and devoted to the collection of air mail labels and stamps, or technical speaking "to the interests of Aero Philately."

The issue loaned by Schwartz was the spring quarterly issue for the months of April, May and June, 1945, is given to articles on the death of Knight and to the air mail stamp exhibition for collectors of the Midwest, to be held in the Olympic Building, at the corner of Cermak Road and 61st Street, Cicero, Ill., on Saturday and Sunday, April 21-22.

A dinner was given Saturday evening, April 21, in memory of Knight at the Klax Restaurant, Cermak Road, Cicero, John J. Hart, former secretary of the National Association of Postmasters, and present postal director of United Air Lines, spoke on Knight's record as a flyer.

And now, in the course of this hop, skip and jump narrative, I'll pick up a fragment from Jack Knight's notebooks. Back in the Ellington Field days when Jack was teaching the air cadets of World War I how to fly, he nursed a lad named Joe Weil to a war career as a bomber pilot. After the war Weil conducted a department on Aviation in the New York Evening Telegram.

The following is from his writings in the issue of Feb. 16 in one of Knight's notebooks, with the marginal note, "I taught him to fly."

"The habit of flight, once formed, is hard to break. I have in mind the case of Lieutenant Jack Knight. Before the war Knight was a technical expert in a steel company. Following Mr. Hohenzollern's 'boob play', Knight put on a khaki uniform and soon was wearing a white band on his campaign hat. In other words, he had become a flying cadet. After the usual amount of red tape Knight became a flyer. He took to flying like a duck to water. He soon became the crack stunt pilot of the bombers aerial gunnery school at San Leon.

"To him the joy of flight overcame the disappointment of not being sent overseas. Incidentally it was he who sat stolidly in the front cockpit while I made my

first attempt at an awkward landing.

"With the signing of the armistice he said he was through. He had to get back to the business of life. Chicago swallowed him up in an engineering office. He thought he was through, but he was wrong.

"Today Knight is plotting a mail plane between Cleveland and Chicago. Only a few days ago he broke all speed records in this country for a flight of more than 300 miles by covering his route of 335 miles in two hours and eleven minutes.

"Ask Jack what made him come back. He will tell you he couldn't resist the call of the clouds. He couldn't think of the early morning sky and not ache again for the days when he used to crawl sleepily toward the hangars, after having hungrily munched his breakfast.

"Throttle shoved forward, plane bouncing along over the green-sward nose down and gathering speed, rush of wind, sharp morning air making you cheeks tingle, hangars flashing by, then the pangars on the stick, back, back, a lessening of the joining underneath, one more slight ounce and there you are off into the air. Up, up into the rose of the coming day, into cloudland.

"Jack Knight and many others of his stamp thought they could forget this, thought they could forget the life, the thrills and buckle down to 'other business.' But Jack Knight is back at it! If you ask him why he will not say much. Perhaps he really doesn't know what took him back to the thing of linen and spruce and steel. But when the spring days come around again and the former aviator sees the blue sky and the fleecy clouds and the sunshine, he knows and I know and you would know too, if you had ever lived the life."

Sgt. Robert Willard Sends Nazi Battle Banner To Parents

Mr. and Mrs. Warren Willard recently received a Nazi battle flag slashed with holes and rips that intimate they might be the marks of American bullets.

The flag is 5x7 feet in dimension, with a white and black center. The red is a solid piece, the full size of the flag, with a white circle 29 inches in diameter sewed in the middle. The circle has a black swastika in the center. It was sent by their son, MSGT Robert Willard, serving with a liaison plane squadron in Germany.

More recently he sent home a very beautiful beer stein, bearing the name of a German soldier and his Berlin regiment of World War I. The stein is of fine china, ornamented by beautiful miniature paintings around the side, and with a pewter top. It is apparently a memorial of a Berlin regiment. It bears a German inscription stating that "he rests with who by duvovacs with the --- Regiment, but he rests better who is at peace in his home."

Edwin I. Donley Is Promoted To Rank Of Lieut. Colonel

Edwin I. Donley, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Donley, 211 North Canyuga, was recently promoted from the rank of major to that of lieutenant colonel, while serving in the ordnance department of the 76th Division, Patton's Third Army, Germany. Donley is now 26 years old. He was graduated in 1935 from the Buchanan high school. His many friends here are pleased over his rapid advance.

City Moves To Keep Children From Taverns

Ordinance Passed To Prevent All Children Under 18 From Being In Taverns

An ordinance designed to keep minor age children from local taverns or other places within the city limits where beer or other intoxicating beverages are sold to be consumed on the premises.

The ordinance was enacted because of a number of reports of minors entering alone to buy liquor and of children of all ages being taken into taverns by their parents and being kept there with them for considerable periods.

The ordinance is published elsewhere in this issue. All liquor licenses in the city were renewed, with a definite understanding from each owner that they would observe Sunday and curfew closing regulations.

City To Open Pump Plant Bids Monday, May 7

Will Call For Bids For Sale \$25,000 In Bonds, Main Installation Later

According to a legal advertisement published by the City of Buchanan elsewhere in this issue, sealed bids are to be received until 7 p. m. Monday, May 7, for construction of a new water supply well pump, pump house and for revision of an A. D. Cook pump and installation of pressure regulating valves, at which time all bids will be opened and read aloud.

The bidder who is awarded the contract will be required to furnish a satisfactory performance bond. At a later date resolutions will be passed and published for bids for installation of additional mains required, and also for the sale of the \$25,000 issue authorized to cover the cost of water improvements.

City Clerk Harry Post states that to date no water meters have been received in addition to the approximately 20 which the city had in stock. These have already been installed at a cost averaging less than \$20 each. The cost of the meter is \$11.55. To this is added the cost of installation plus 10%, which varies according to the difficulties of installation.

Dies In South Bend Hospital Following Operation

Mrs. Mary Ethel Smith, 58, died at Epworth hospital, South Bend, at 12:35 a. m. Saturday, April 21, following a major operation. She was born in Buchanan Dec. 2, 1886, the daughter of Wellington Wells and Hattie Richards Wells. She grew up in Buchanan and was graduated from the Buchanan high school in 1903. She married Harry D. Smith in Buchanan Dec. 25, 1905. They lived for a time after marriage at Dowagiac, but had spent most of their married life in South Bend and Mishawaka, Ind. They moved to Buchanan about seven years ago.

She is survived by the husband, and by a daughter, Kathryn L. Smith, now serving with the WACS at Camp Edward, Mass., by two sisters, Mrs. F. R. Montague and Mrs. Blanche McIntosh, both of Buchanan, by a brother, George Wells of Springfield, Ohio. She was affiliated with the Presbyterian church.

The funeral was held at 3:30 p. m. Monday at the Swem Funeral home with Rev. Malcolm McNeal in charge and burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

In utter disregard of the counterbattery fire, the piece was serviced promptly and accurately until the completion of the mission. Corporal Leazenby's courage and distinctive service against the enemy reflect great credit on himself and the United States Army. Entered military service from Michigan.

Clark Workers Find Body In Car South Of Clear Lake

The lifeless body of Phay Redding, 39, was found in his parked car on the south Clear Lake Road early Saturday morning, with suicide by monoxide gas as the cause designated by Coronet William Pifer, who was called from Niles. Sometime late Friday night Redding had driven his car to the north side of the road headed west opposite the Monford Taylor farm. He took a piece of rubber hose about 10 feet long, inserted one end in the car exhaust and packed it with a piece of cloth. He then lowered a rear car window and introduced the other end of the hose, stopping up the remainder of the window opening with a blanket.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Herman saw the car parked by the road about 11 p. m. Friday while enroute from the last show in Buchanan to their home at Clear Lake Woods. They suspected nothing, as parked cars are common along the road about 7 1/2 a. m. Friday Mr. Herman was enroute back to work at the Clark Equipment plant accompanied by Stanley Reyback, and they again noticed the car and saw Redding sitting behind the wheel leaning against the window with his head down. At first they were going by, but they noticed the hose from the exhaust to the car window. They then stopped and found that Redding was apparently lifeless. They notified the Buchanan police, who called L. O. Swen Swen went to the scene and then notified Coronet William Pifer, Niles, who examined the premises and decided that suicide was the only explanation.

Redding was born July 11, 1905 in Dayton, Mich., the son of Billy and Stella Wilson Redding. He had lived in this community practically all his life. He had lived with his mother on the farm near Dayton until her death about a year ago, when he came to Buchanan and roomed at the home of Mrs. Maude Hansen at 408 West Front street. He worked for the Michigan Central maintenance crew at Dayton for a number of years, and also worked at the local Clark Equipment plant. He had worked for about two and one-half years in the garage at the Indiana & Michigan Electric company.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Frank Heckathorne of Dayton, and Mrs. Lee Seymour of LaPorte, Ind. He was associated with the Elks lodge at Niles. The funeral was held at 2 p. m. Tuesday from the Swem Funeral Home with Rev. Grant Jordan in charge and burial was made in the Mt. Zion cemetery south of Dayton.

An Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Protect the Welfare and Health of Minor Children and in Furtherance of the Public Welfare in General"

The City of Buchanan ordains that no minor child under 18 years of age shall be permitted to remain or loiter in any saloon, barroom or tavern or any other place where malt, vinous, spirituous, or other intoxicating liquors, or wine or beer, or malt liquor is sold, given away or furnished for beverage for consumption on the premises and

Any proprietor, keeper, manager or any person having the right to dispense such liquors, who shall permit any such minor child to remain in, or loiter in any such place and any person, including parents or guardians, who shall encourage or induce in any way such minors to remain therein shall be guilty of a misdemeanor

2. Any such minor, who remains or loiters in such place, if over the age of 17 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and any minor under the age of 17 years shall be deemed a delinquent child and reported to the Probate Court

3. Any minor under the age of 21 years, who shall falsely represent to any one operating such place that he or she is 21 years of age shall be guilty of a misdemeanor

Any person, firm or corporation, club or association violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction, before the proper court be sentenced to pay a fine of not to exceed the sum of one hundred dollars, or be confined in the county jail for a period not to exceed ninety days, or both such fine and imprisonment as the court shall determine

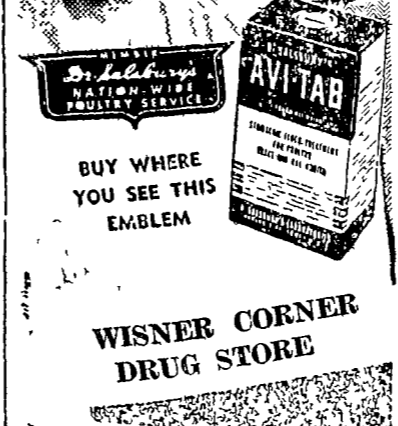

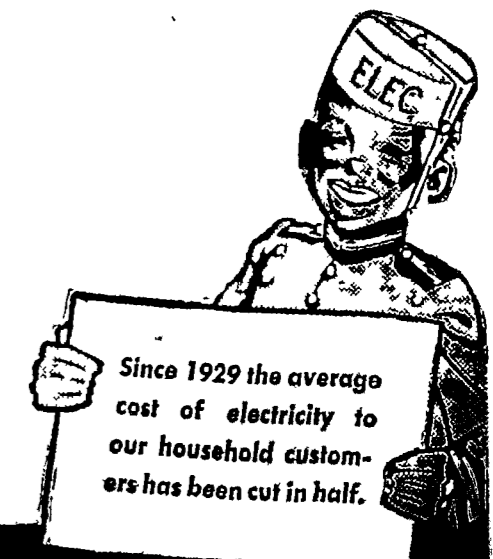
