Capacity Crowd Enjoys F. & A. M. Centennial Banquet Last Thursday

An outstanding event in Buchanan's fraternal history was held in the Buchanan high school gymnasium last Thursday evening, by Buchanan Lodge No. 68, F. & A. M., commemorating its official beginning on Jan. 13, 1854, and 100 years of subsequent history. A total of 450 members and guests attended the banquet and following program.

The invocation was given by Rev. H. Carlyle Carson, Worshipful Master, Bert N. Metzger, gave the address of welcome. Carl Garmire, master of ceremonies, introduced the following distinguished guests:

Gray, Sr., was general chairman in charge of arrangements for the event and the banquet was served by the women of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Blossom Fete Nears Climax Floral Parade

Key To Cities Tour To Arrive Here 1 P.M. Today

The coronation of the Blossom Queen, Miss Barbara Schoch of New Buffalo, was held Saturday, the Blessing of The Blossoms on Sunday, and the Blossom Festival is now at the midway mark, with the three-day Key to The Cities parade now on.

Buchananites are especially interested in the schedule of today (Thursday), which brings the queen's entourage with the 24 other "city queens" to Buchanan. Yesterday the "Key to The Cities Tour" covered the northwestern section of Blossomland, towns visited being Glenn, Bangor, Kalamazoo, Marcellus, Cassopolis, Dowagiac and return to Benton Harbor.

The schedule for today is Stevensville at 9:15 a.m., Baroda at 9:45, Bridgman at 10:10, Lakeside at 10:45, Union Pier at 11:05, New Buffalo at 11:25, Three Oaks at noon, Galien at 12:30, Buchanan at 1:00, Berrien Springs at 1:35, Eau Claire at 3:00, South Bend at 4:00 for WSBT radio recording on Miss Eleanor Moore's show and a WSBT interview at 6:15, Niles at 7 for dinner, and return to Benton Harbor at 9:15.

Friday the schedule is Sister Lakes at 9:30 a.m.; Decatur at 10:30; Lawrence at 11:15, Hartford at noon, Watervliet at 2:00, Coloma at 2:45, return to Benton Harbor for ceremonies at the Vincent hotel at 4:00; thence to St. Joseph for ceremonies and dinner at the Whitcomb Hotel at 6:00. The tour is being made in police-escorted convertibles.

The Blossomland and local queens will then attend the Kiddies Coronation Ball at 9:00.

Next and last is the crowning event of all, the Grand Floral Parade, beginning at 2 p.m. Saturday. The march will include a personnel of 2,500 paraders, and will cover three hours from beginning to end.

The parade will start at the south end of State street in St. Joseph, the various elements entering from intersections. The line of march will proceed south on State street, turn right on Ship to Wayne, then left on Wayne across the St. Joseph river bridge to Main street in Benton Harbor. The paraders and floats will then pass slowly in front of the judges' reviewing stand at 12th street and proceed on Main to Hull street, near the armory, where they will disband.

Parking on parade streets will be prohibited and highways U.S. 12 and U.S. 31 will be barricaded at four intersections, outside the city at 1:30 p.m.

Free parking will be permitted at the Fruit Market and the two municipal parking lots in Benton Harbor.

Holdup At Frame's On M-60, West

Ray Frame's gas station located on M-60 between Bakertown and Dayton, was held up by two bandits at 10:30 p.m. Saturday and \$45 in bills and coin change was taken.

The two bandits walked into the station, there being no car parked in sight nearby. Carl Cleveland, 16, was in charge. The men did not display guns but each kept a hand in his coat pocket as though holding one. Both looked to be about 22 years old, according to young Cleveland's description. One was described as about 5 feet ten inches in height, weight 140 pounds, thin face, wore dark suit coat. The other was described as about 5 feet 8 inches, weight about 150 pounds, dark cap, suit coat. They wore no masks.

One of the bandits handed the boy a paper sack and told him to put all available money in it. The boy did as ordered. Then he was told to lie down on the floor and stay there five minutes. The boy laid down about four minutes and then jumped up and called the Buchanan police. Deputy Robert Runkler of the Berrien county sheriff's department, Russell Dillavou of the Buchanan police and state police from the Niles station were soon on the scene. All that the station attendant could tell of their leaving was that the two men turned west when they left the door of the station.

If You Aren't Scotch, Don't Read This

If ye can say 'tis a bright light moonlight night" (the late Harry Linder's test for a sober Scotchman) ye doubtless ken what a haggis is.

It's a famous Scotch pudding which has become a ceremonial dish wherever and whenever assemblies of Scots meet. When the native sons of Scotland from all over the United States who have affiliated with the Society of St. Andrews meet for their annual dinner and program in Chicago, the haggis is the main dish of the feast.

A number of Buchanan people recently had their first taste of haggis through the generosity of Mrs. A. G. Bowers of Terre Coupe, Mo., and all pronounced it quite toothsome. Her recipe is, mix six pounds of stone-ground Scotch oatmeal with 2 1/2 pounds of suet, suet taken from the region of a beef kidney. This is seasoned with salt and pepper. The resulting mixture is then crammed into beef casings which have been cleaned and hung on a line to dry.

The casings are previously blown up by an auto pump, then filled with haggis. They are first dipped briefly into cold water and then placed in hot water and boiled for an hour and twenty minutes at a low heat, say 375 degrees. When the suet starts to bubble the dish is done.

It can then be stored in a cold place and eaten at leisure, first cutting it into thin slices and heating it slowly.

The ceremonial haggis eaten at the Society of St. Andrews banquet is brought from Scotland, where it was stuffed in the stomach of a sheep before boiling. The only stone-ground Scotch oatmeal available in this part of the United States is made by the Elam Mills, Inc., on Damon street, Chicago.

Contracts Let On Buchanan Twp. Building

The Buchanan township board met Tuesday night and let the contracts for the erection of the new township hall. Construction will start as soon as contracts have been signed and at a very early date. The estimated time needed for completing the work is 12 months.

Low bidders, who received contracts were, Harry Verker, South Bend, general contractor, \$22,109.00; Orput & Sons, Buchanan, plumbing and heating, \$6,457.31; Boyd Electric Co., Niles, electric work, \$1,910.00; Carl Ferris, Buchanan, well, \$1,027.36. The total is \$31,503.67, which is very close to the estimated cost of \$30,000. Roy Worden and Associates, South Bend, are the architects.

Ivan Price, supervisor, and the board members, stress the point that there will be no need for a tax or assessment, as the money has been accumulated from other taxes over a period of 7 years. Then, too, room has been allowed for expansion. The fire department room will be large enough to house a second fire truck if and when the need arises.

The balloon was about 6 feet in diameter and carried a radio transmitter. It bore a U. S. Army stamp. The police have sent it to Selfridge Field, Mt. Clemens, Mich.

Bill Baker, member of the American Legion committee for arrangements of the formal observance of Memorial Day, Monday, May 31, 1954, requests that every service man and woman in the Buchanan community who is able to march in the parade be present to honor the dead by participation in the march to the cemetery.

The lack of a uniform is no reason for non-participation, states Baker. "We can honor the dead just as well in our civilian casuals as in uniform," said Baker. He would like to have as many as possible report to him on participation as soon as possible.

Baker got off to a flying start this year and had all of the parade details worked out over a month before Memorial Day. He should be rewarded by complete cooperation. The program will be printed nearer the date of the event.

Student Control Day Observed Here Next Mon.

Preparations for the annual Student Control Day on Monday, May 10, when high school youth will pair with their counterparts in year-around city government, began Tuesday afternoon when the high school elected their City Commission.

Those elected were, James Letcher, Steve Pendley, Robert Pattengale, Dale Dellinger and Sara Marrs. Other city officers chosen were Baph Hurley as constable and Gordon Smith as justice of the peace.

The commission met Wednesday morning and elected Jura Letcher as mayor and Charles Soules as city manager. The commission has asked for more applicants for the office of city attorney and city treasurer before appointing those officials. Meanwhile City Manager Soules will name his appointees for the offices of city clerk, fire chief, chief of police, city assessor, parks and cemetery superintendent, public works superintendent, librarian, sewage treatment plant superintendent. The student city commission will meet Friday to confirm his appointment at their discretion.

The elected and appointed student officials will then report Monday to the actual city officials with corresponding offices on Monday, May 10, between the hours of 11 and 12 in the morning and between 1 and 2 in the afternoon. The commissioners will also meet with their adult counterparts in a commission meeting in the commission chamber from 7 to 7:30 p.m. The young person elected as mayor by the student commission will meet Mayor Arthur Anderson in the city commission chambers at 11:30 a.m.

The students will not, of course, "run the town", but the event will involve very serious instruction on how the town is administered by their adult counterparts. The adult officers of the city will illustrate and instruct their comparable junior executives by presenting their problems, and in as far as possible enabling them to furnish answers. They will find out firsthand in a very practical civics lesson just what the administration of a small city entails. The event should give the young people more insight in public affairs, against the time when they may be city rulers in fact.

Clark Equipment Expects Upturn In 2nd Quarter

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Clark Equipment company was held at the Buchanan plant Friday, April 30, during which all of the present 15 members of the board of directors were re-elected.

President George Spatta reported to the stockholders present on the operations for the first quarter of the present year, summarized as follows:

Sales for the quarter before discounts were \$24,500,000, as compared to \$28,700,000 of sales in the last quarter of 1953. Net income was \$1,244,000, which is at the rate of 5 1/2 cents per dollar of net sales. In the last quarter of 1953 net income was \$1,131,000. Net earnings per common share outstanding were equal to \$1.09, compared to 99 cents per share in the last quarter of 1953. At the close of that quarter, total current assets were \$40,704,000 and total current liabilities \$7,385,000, leaving working capital in the amount of—\$33,319,000. Projected volume for the second quarter contemplates an increase over the first quarter, and satisfactory earnings are anticipated for the first half of the year.

At the meeting of the board of directors held afterward, all principal officers were re-elected, including the six members of the executive committee. The firm of Price Waterhouse was named as accountants for the coming year.

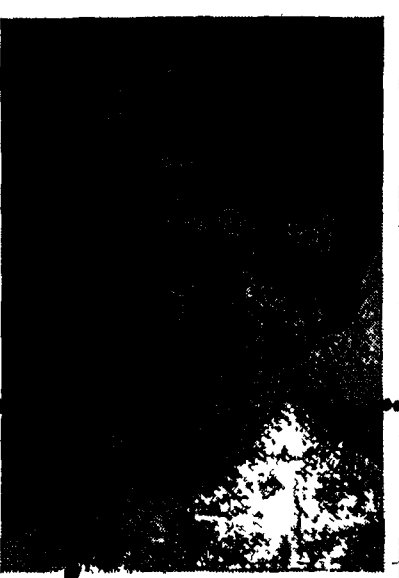
B. H. S. Seniors Receive Scholarships

Says Public Relations Key To City Success

Mayor Jackson, Coldwater, Explains Publicity Methods

"Too often the trouble with cities is that they lack good public relations," stated John T. Jackson, mayor of Coldwater 364 days of 1954 and Mayor of Buchanan for a day on Wednesday, May 5, at the dinner given in his honor by the Optimists on Mayor's Exchange day at the M. & M. restaurant.

"If you tell people clearly what you want to do, they will go along with it unless it is patently a bad project," said Jackson.

The best way to put a project over is by word of mouth, according to Jackson. He stated that he liked to present projects before service clubs. Often they picked out flaws that needed to be eliminated. They help iron out the wrinkles.

You cannot run a city today as it used to be run in the horse days, said Jackson. You can't run your home or your business that way. You need equipment, and so does a city. Sometimes citizens criticize the cost of city equipment. At the suggestion of a local editor his city is going to stage a special day explaining the use and savings made by good equipment. Each piece of equipment will bear a placard telling what it cost, what it has done, and what the cost would have been if done by antiquated methods and equipment.

Coldwater has a dirt moving machine which has moved 50,000 yards in the past year. It moved 35,000 yards on contract for a public highway authority. The rental the city received more than covered the cost of the machine.

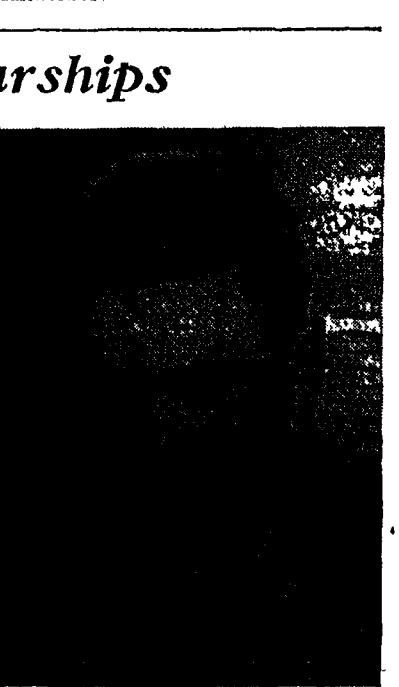
The city has a program over a local radio station at 5 p.m. explaining its program. They know it is listened to by the letters they receive afterward. Whenever a city project is carried out, pictures are taken before and after its completion. These pictures are reproduced in the newspapers, which also carry articles and occasionally editorials.

"If you explain well enough the needs of the city, the public will go along with you," said Jackson.

The dinner was opened by a prayer by the Rev. H. Carlyle Carson. Vice-mayor Goldwyn Smith introduced Mayor Jackson of Coldwater, presenting him with the guest key made by Mayor George Black about 1916 and afterward hung on the wall in the commission chamber. B. R. Woodworth introduced all of the guests present.

Dental Health

In civilized man, the toothbrush does for the teeth what raw, coarse and detergent foods did for the teeth of primitive man.

It washes away the soil in which the little acid-producing bacteria of the mouth thrive.

It stimulates the gums into a more rapid blood flow, thus removing waste products and enhancing the resistance to infection.

The toothbrush helps promote clean, healthy teeth, dentists emphasize.

They point out there are three conditions that must come together in the mouth before decay is produced. These include bacteria, easily fermentable foods like sugars and starches, and a hide-out that is undetected long enough for the bacteria to work on the food and build up acid of sufficient strength to attack the tooth enamel.

The duty of the toothbrush is to interrupt these conditions by interrupting acid formation so that there is never a sufficient buildup for an attack.

Another function of the toothbrush is to prevent deposits of debris, known as tartar or calculus. For some 24 hours, the deposits remain soft enough to be removable by the brush. But afterward, they become hardened to the extent that a dentist's steel instrument is necessary to scrape them off.

If tartar is left to accumulate, the gum tissue becomes irritated. This can lead to disturbances in the gums and supporting tooth structure.

The toothbrush also helps to keep the teeth clean and the gums in a healthy condition.

Sometimes gums will bleed because of the brushing. Dentists say there is no harm if it continues only a few days. The tissue cells covering the gums become toughened, like a hand doing hard labor. If, however, the bleeding persists, the condition should be checked by a dentist.

Heavy Soil Loss In S.W. Michigan

"Soils mapping in southwestern Michigan during the past years shows heavy losses," says Lee N. Rosencrans of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Kalamazoo.

In southwestern Michigan 800-473 acres have been mapped. According to the surveys made thus far, 14 of the land has lost 25% of the topsoil, 1/2 of the land has lost 25 to 75% of the topsoil, 1/5 of the land has lost 75% or the topsoil and 25% of the subsoil, and 1/20 of the land has lost all of the topsoil and over 25% of the subsoil.

Soil survey work in southwestern Michigan has been done in cooperation with the local soil conservation districts which are St. Joe River, Allegan, Cass county, VanBuren, Barry, East Allegan, Galien River, Kalamazoo, and St. Joseph county.

Rosencrans pointed out it was not only the seriousness involved when topsoil or the bread-and-butter soil of the farm is lost, but when it is lost there are large amounts of nitrates, phosphorus, potash, and organic matter lost along with the soil.

Soils maps of farms consist of determining the kinds of soil, the

kinds and amounts of erosion, and the predominant percent of slope. These factors are combined and grouped, placing the soil into one of eight land use classes. In southwestern Michigan there are about 55 different soil types, 6 slope groups and 5 erosion classes.

Main erosion causes in southwestern Michigan are by three different ways: sheet, gully, and wind. Much wind erosion occurs on exposed, sandy land, during the winter and spring months when the soil is left bare for a long period of time, muck lands also are subject to blowing under the same winter conditions.

Traffic Deaths, Injuries Show Drop in March

Traffic deaths and injuries showed a reduction during March as compared with the same period last year, but accidents increased slightly, according to the State Police monthly statistical report.

There were 117 persons killed, a decrease of 19, or 14 per cent, below 136 in March of 1953. Injuries numbered 3,596, a drop of

10 per cent, or 385. Accidents totaled 14,874, a gain of eight per cent, or 1,048.

There was a substantial decrease in urban and rural trunk line deaths, but rural county road deaths were higher.

Michigan's traffic toll for the first three months of 1954 includes 362 killed and 11,989 injured in 47,198 accidents. Deaths dropped two per cent below 369 in the first

three months last year, injuries jumped six per cent, or 729 over 11,260, and accidents increased 14 per cent, or 5,792 over 41,406. Estimated motor travel during January and February, the latest figures available, was 3.7 billion miles, an increase of two per cent over 3.6 billion for the same period last year. The death rate of 6.7 per 100 million miles of travel was down four per cent.

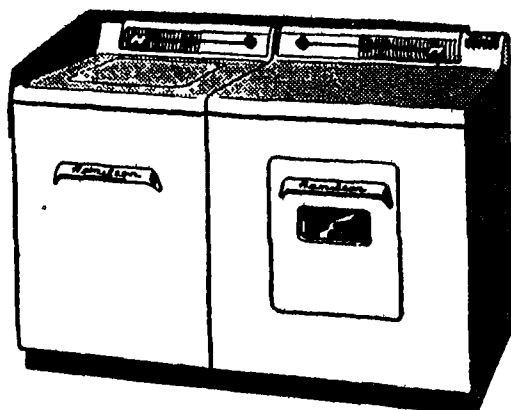
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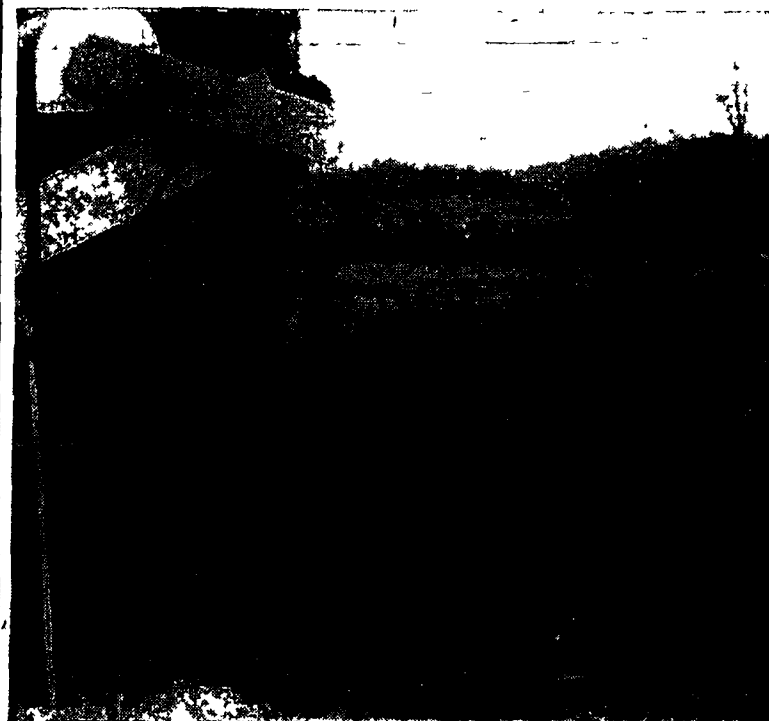

Equipment Cuts Dairy Druggery At Smith Farm

One of the most confining of all occupations is that of the dairyman at the original producing end on the farm.

He is the owner of, and at the same time the servant of, a herd of dairy cows which stand in rows such as you see above, to be fed and milked. The cows take no vacation, so the dairyman cannot take one. On the Kenneth Smith farm it is a 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. operation seven days a week. The fact that the cows are milked and the dairy barn cleaned by electric power is evidence that the farmer is a beneficiary of modern science — but it does not mean that his working hours are less. For as fast as science takes the load from his back, the stricter requirements of the state law in the handling and caring for milk pour it on.

Always hovering in the background, ready to pop any time is the state dairy barn inspector, the milk inspector who comes and goes you never know when. This keeps the dairy farmer on his toes.

AND HOW Adjacent to the new dairy barn completed early last winter is the milk room with all the equipment required, including an electric cooler in which the milk in 9 to 10 8-gallon cans must be kept at about 40 degrees so that it will reach the Anderson Dairy at a temperature of not over 60 degrees. In addition the barns must be kept clean for the inspector's visit, the cows must be stanchioned, fed, washed and milked twice daily. The milking alone takes an hour to an hour and a half. Cleaning the barn in the old hard way by fork, shovel and wheelbarrow, with a second manual process of pitching the manure into a spreader represented from an hour and a half to two hours of back-breaking labor.

The Jamesway snurtle-type cleaner solved that problem. Photographically speaking the work is difficult to illustrate. It consists of two "gutterbars" which operate the full length of each 44-foot gutter. Starting at the east end, the gutter bar cleans the first 8 feet twice, after which the paddles which pull the manure fold back against the sides and the bar cleans and recleans five more spaces until the whole extent is finished. Beyond the west wall the manure track makes a left angle and is hoisted through a chute through the south wall, dropping it into the spreader. A large motor powers the gutter bar and a smaller motor the hoist through the wall. The time consumed varies from 8 to 10 minutes, the only hand labor being to spread the load as it is dropped in the manure spreader.

For The Record -- No Killing Frost In Berrien

Berrien county fruit suffered very little or no damage as a result of low temperatures Monday night, when the mercury dropped to as low as 31° in small areas of the county. In general the temperature did not drop to freezing and a strong wind also reduced possibilities of frost hurt, states Clifton Conrad, Berrien county extension fruit specialist. The grape crop was at the most dangerous stage with the small buds just beginning to show.

The real danger to fruit now is that the pears are in full bloom and the apples just approaching full bloom, at the time when pollination is vital to the development of fruit. The weather has been too cold for the pollinating process, which cannot take place under 56 degrees. Bees, a main factor in pollination, will not work at low temperatures. Warm weather of 56° or over is a necessity if pollen is to germinate and grow into the pistil of the flower.

Peach, sweet cherry and most varieties of plums have shed most of their petals now, but pears and apples remain for a scenic show.

The soil in this area now has sufficient water to carry crops into the summer, says Conrad. Some continuing rain will be required then as there still remains dry sub-soils.

4-H Plowing Winners Named

Lester Schmalz, Galien Community 4-H Club, was named winner of the 4-H plowing contest held last Saturday, May 1, according to Leonard J. Hill, County 4-H Club agent. This is the second year that Lester has won the county contest. Last year he placed sixth out of a field of 21 contestants at the state contest held during the State 4-H Club Show at Michigan State College.

Runners up in the contest were Eldon Merrill, Eau Claire, and Neal Janke also of Eau Claire. Eldon is a member of the Pipe-tonne Lake 4-H Club and Neal belongs to the IX 4-H Club.

Awards consisted of a five gallon can of lubricating grease to the first place winner, given by the Farm Bureau Oil Company; a model toy tractor to second place winner, Merrill, given by Eau Claire Ford Garage, and two plow points to third place winner, Janke, given by Klug Implement dealer, Eau Claire.

Schmalz will enter the state

contest which will again be held at Michigan State College during the State 4-H Club Show held Aug. 31 - Sept. 3.

How To Grow Top Quality Tomatoes

Want to grow tomatoes that look like a color ad in a slick magazine?

The job can be done, but it takes a lot more than just setting out plants if you want to grow tomatoes the correct way, a new publication from Michigan State College horticulturists will show you how.

The publication, Extension Folder F-142, "Tomato Growing in Michigan," tells you about recommended varieties, how you should treat your soil, how to prepare the soil, how to start seedlings and how to set out plants so they'll produce top quality fruit. The folder also discusses cultivation, irrigation and mulching, how to improve early set by spraying, staking and pruning, how to get the best insect and disease control, and how to harvest and market the crop for the best profit. Your county agricultural agent will give you a copy.

State Accepts Last Four National 4-H Programs

Four more national 4-H award programs have been accepted by the State Extension Service, which completes the list offered for 1954. The programs and the donors are Bread Demonstration, Standard Brands, Inc.; Dress Revue, Simplicity Pattern Co., Inc.; Recreation and Rural Arts, United States Rubber Co., and Soil-Water Conservation, Firestone Tire & Rubber Co.

Awards are the same as last year excepting in the Bread Demonstration and Recreation-Rural Arts programs. In the first named program, gold-filled instead of sterling silver medals of honor will be awarded to county individual and team members. In Recreation and Rural Arts program, County Cash awards have been changed to \$20 to a specified number of clubs in each state, the state winner receives an all-expense trip to the 1954 National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago instead of a \$37.50 scholarship, and the national award are six \$300 college scholarships instead of 12 trips to the National 4-H Club Congress. All four programs are conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

One Big Fire Upsets Records

Michigan's fire loss in 1953 would have shown a reduction had it not been for the conflagration which destroyed the General Motors transmission plant in Livonia at an estimated cost of \$45,000,000.

As it was, the total loss for the year soared to a new high of \$78,126,591 as compared to \$35,600,412 in 1952. Subtracting the Livonia loss, the reduction would have been \$2,473,412.

The figures are disclosed in the annual fire loss report, compiled by the fire marshal division of the Michigan State Police.

The death toll in fires reached 216 for the year, or 23 more than in 1952. The victims included 81 children and two firemen.

Dwelling fires totaled 16,323, an increase of 535. Damage to structures was \$7,098,387 and to contents \$2,781,734. Damage to buildings other than dwellings was \$57,628,736 and to contents \$9,600,241.

Total damage in other types of fires amounted to \$997,716 as compared to \$1,160,297 in 1952. Firemen answered 76,113 alarms, an increase of 2,769. Of these 10,447 were false alarms, a gain of 1,332.

Carelessness and neglect were the leading causes of fires, with careless burning of brush accounting for 9,300 and careless smoking for another 4,450. Spontaneous combustion caused 4,107.

Formulate Program To Induce Students For Teaching Profession

"WANTED—7,000 young people. Attractive pay (starts from \$3,200-\$3,600), good working conditions, summers off; steady employment, social acceptance in community, assured opportunity for advancement."

This sort of a help wanted ad could easily describe the serious need in Michigan for qualified school teachers.

Faced with the alarming situation of 7,000 too few trained school teachers today and the obvious need for an additional 2,000 each year for at least the next five years, Dr. Clair L. Taylor, state Superintendent of Public Instruction, is leading a frontal attack.

A committee of 35 members has been appointed to solve this and other educational problems. A special sub-committee of industrial public relations experts, newspaper publishers, educators and representatives from radio and television was assigned to work out a program "to interest bright young people to enter the

teaching profession. Adopting techniques already proved successful by industry, business and the armed services, this sub-committee announced its plan which will be carried out through Michigan newspapers, radio and TV, and "sales presentations" to students.

These will be aimed at three groups; the 65,000 students who will graduate from high school this spring, students already enrolled in the state's colleges; former teachers who might qualify themselves by securing a few more hours of college work.

"Lack of promotion for the teaching profession has permitted other vocations to skim off much of the cream of graduates," explained Dr. Taylor. He also feels that low salaries paid teachers several years ago were an important factor in student minds when they considered teaching as a life work. "Present pay schedules are about comparable to those in industry, stated the state superintendent.

"Figures indicate that next year teachers' salaries will average about \$4,300 for the 10-month school year," stated Dr. Taylor. "While the present pay schedule might not be considered ideal, it represents a trend toward more money for good teachers that is desirable. And it eliminates to a great extent the low salary as a factor against teaching."

Serious need does exist. Of the 45,000 teachers busy in Michigan at present, 10% leave the profession each year. Some marry, retire, die or change vocations. Census figures show that 60,000 new pupils will be enrolling each year for at least the next five years. They will require 2,000 more classrooms.

Many present teachers do not meet minimum requirements for teaching standards. Some are teaching with "special" certificates because better qualified instructors are simply not available.

Members of this committee as well as the department of public instruction realize the urgency of providing fine educations for the youth of Michigan. Keen thinking is needed to meet national and international problems that today's children must face. They feel a strong sense of obligation to provide the best possible training.

Break Ground For Mackinaw Bridge Friday, May 7

The ceremony of turning the first earth for the construction of the long-discussed bridge across the Straits of Mackinaw will be held Friday, May 7.

The official ceremonies inaugurating the building of a bridge which will connect the two peninsulas of Michigan will be the occasion for parades with floats and bands, street dances and other manifestations, with St. Ignace, the Upper Peninsula terminal and Mackinaw City, the lower terminal, each trying to outdo the other in a gay carnival atmosphere of celebration.

Mrs. Charles Fisher, wife of the vice-chairman of the Mackinac Bridge Authority, will turn the first earth at Mackinaw City, and Mrs. Prentice Brown, wife of the chairman of the authority, will perform the ceremony at St. Ignace.

Serious consideration of the project began as long as 20 years ago. The plans were officially approved, bonds floated covering the estimated cost of just under \$100,000,000 during the past four years. The bridge is to ultimately pay for itself by toll charges for its use, which has mounted to a tremendous volume in recent years. The sale of the bonds was greatly encouraged by an act of the Michigan legislature authorizing a maintenance fund for the upkeep of the bridge. The Michigan Supreme Court made this finally effective by ruling that the procedure for financing the bridge is constitutional.

The date for the beginning of construction was determined after Chairman Brown received a check for \$96,500,000 realized from the sale of bonds.

The Mackinac Bridge will be the longest in the world over water, although the main span of 3,500 feet will be 400 feet shorter than the span of the Golden Gate bridge in California. Two side spans will be 7,400 feet in length, approximately 1,000 feet longer than the west coast structure.

From a point in West Michigan at Mackinaw City to a point a half mile west of St. Ignace in the upper peninsula, the bridge will be 26,185 feet long. Clearances from the water will range from 135 to 350 feet under the main span and from 20 to 84 feet under the approaches.

Work on the bridge will not interfere with the fleet of ferries operated by the Michigan highway department for transportation of travelers between the two peninsulas. By ferry, the trip across the straits is about 9 miles requiring a 50-minute trip under normal conditions, but the trip between the two peninsulas will be made in approximately 10 minutes via the new bridge.

Bill In Congress Would Microfilm Weekly Papers

Permanent preservation of priceless files of pioneer newspapers through transcription on microfilm has been under discussion by librarians and library board members of this area for several months.

The head of a library in a neighboring city states that he received an estimate which indicated that the cost of microfilming the issues of a small, daily paper for an entire year would not greatly exceed the cost of binding. However, the apparatus required to enlarge the microfilm copies for reading would cost over \$200. The binding of 60 years of preceding files of dailies and 60 years of weeklies might amount to \$3,000, including the cost of the enlarging device for readers.

Now comes the report of a bill introduced recently in Congress to "promote the preservation of the true history of this nation, as actually recorded in pioneer weekly newspapers and currently published in weekly newspapers of the United States, to locate, microfilm and make available this valuable material to schools, libraries, clubs, lawmakers, and every citizen, to provide a safe depository for weekly newspapers duplicate microfilm, now in any other library, and for other purposes."

The bill has been referred to the House Committee on Administration. If passed it would institute a "National Library of Weekly Newspapers and Depository Act of 1954."

Historians place a high value on pioneer weeklies and dailies as one of the most reliable sources of early history, equalled only by private diaries and memoirs written by highly literate individuals. Both the Buchanan and Niles libraries have invaluable files of pioneer newspapers, the Buchanan files extending back to 1869 and the Niles files to 1835. The Buchanan files for nearly 20 years after 1875, and the Niles files following 1842 and into the 1870's were edited by John Holmes and Darius Cook respectively, both editors who depicted the passing scene of their times in a vivid and colorful style.

The microfilm copies would serve two practical purposes. 1. Preservation of ancient files that are now deteriorating from age and handling; 2. A great conservation of space.

Several congressmen expressed their appreciation of the need of such recordings, and the great value of the material to be preserved. Letters are now being written to the author of the bill, Brady Gentry, representative from Texas, endorsing the value of the idea.

Friends of the library might lend their support by additional letters or wires to Congressman Brady Gentry.

7th Day Adventists Publishing New Bible Commentary

The Seventh Day Adventist publishing house in Washington, D. C., is in process of publishing a new Bible Commentary, according to an announcement by Pastor L. C. Caviness, pastor of the local church.

The first two editions of Volume I have appeared and have been completely sold out. The cost of the entire set will be \$70. The minister added that, with few exceptions, the contributors are teachers in the theological departments of 12 7th Day Adventist senior colleges in North America, or of the Seventh Day Adventist Seminary in Washington, D. C.

1,000 Adventists Serve In Army

Although Seventh-Day Adventists are known as non-combatants, approximately 1,000 of them are in military service today, most of them as medical men, states L. C. Caviness, pastor of the Buchanan Adventist church, in announcing a special offering for literature for servicemen. This offering will help finance a small monthly newsletter containing young men in service, and sent letters from and about Adventists to them without charge, and will also aid in supplying each new service man of the church with a kit of suitable Sabbath reading matter.

Friendship Gardens Tulips On Parade Sunday, May 9

Sunday, May 9 has been set as the opening day for "Tulips On Parade" at the International Friendship Gardens, when nearly a half million tulips will grace the Gardens of Nations.

The large cargoes that come from the Netherlands each fall are planted in all the National Gardens to fulfill the wish by the Hollanders that every nation bloom in the splendor that tulips are so able to give.

"With tulips making a rapid growth in this sun-warmed valley, the winter-weary will see a most outstanding tulip exhibition," said J. Virgil Stauffer, director of this famous flower and gardens exhibition.

In addition to the flowering of the choice tulip bulbs there are many ornamental flowering peach, lilacs, dogwoods, azaleas, flowering crabs, red-bud and hundreds of other flowering shrubs that complement the richness of the color display on these 100 acres.

The Gardens, dedicated to the ideals of spreading peace through friendship and the international love of beauty, are a unique Hoosier gift to the world which Stauffer and his brother Joseph created from a one-time virgin wilderness as of 1935. 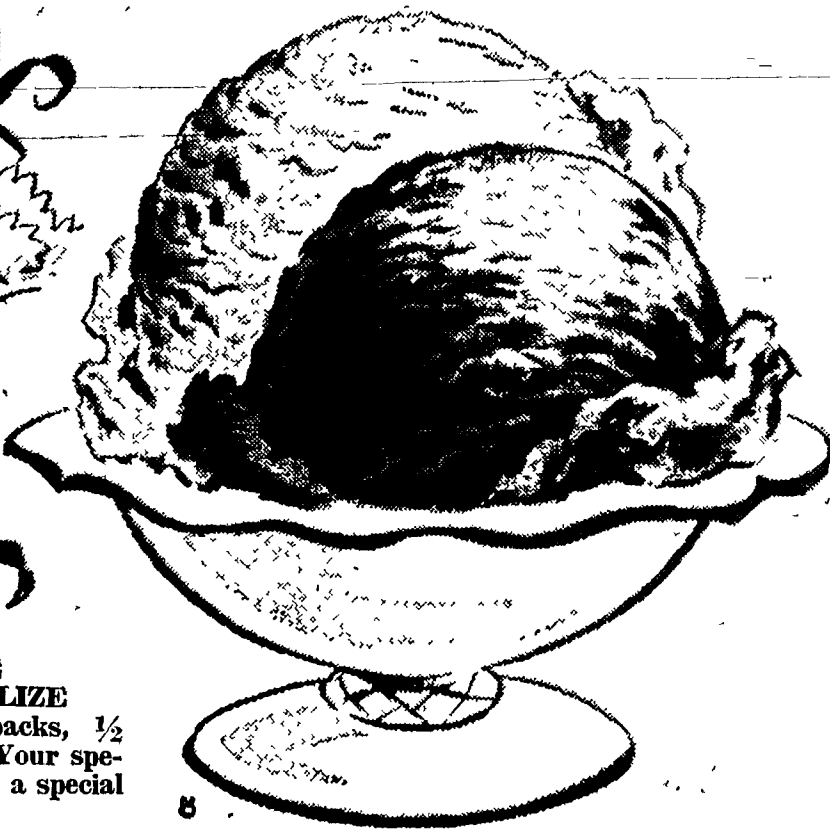

Driver Training Delayed By Cost

The nation's public school superintendents are nearly unanimous in their belief that teaching youths how to drive in high school offers the best long-range hope of reducing highway accidents.

Teacher's salary costs are the biggest single reason behind the wheel instruction is not given, according to the superintendents who do not have this training.

Ninety-five percent of the superintendents believe that driver education should be taught in the nation's high schools, yet in only a fifth of the school systems covered by the survey was driver training a compulsory course.

Three out of every four students have a sincere desire to learn to drive skillfully and safely, the educators reported.

Next to costs, lack of curriculum time and a shortage of qualified teachers were the most commonly stated reasons for not including behind-the-wheel training in driver education courses.

But 96% of the superintendents who had no behind-the-wheel instruction said they would include it if the cost problem was eliminated. This was the result of a survey to uncover problems holding back the expansion of the training, and the interest in a new multi-place classroom training device, the Aetna Drivotrainer, that enables one teacher to supervise instruction for as many as 30 pupils at a time.

This new experimental model of the Drivotrainer, the development of which was financed by an insurance company as a public service, cuts instruction costs to a half of that of conventional cars.

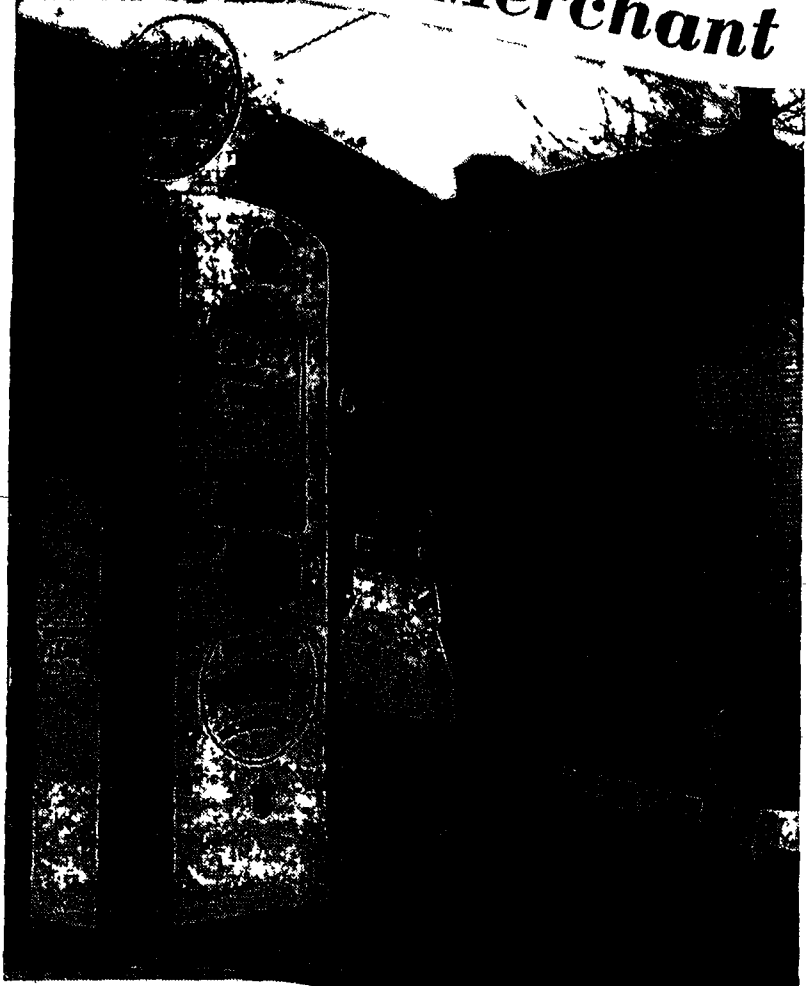

Federal Aid For Michigan Road Building Up 50%

Federal-aid funds for highway construction in Michigan will be increased by more than 50% for the two years beginning July 1, 1955, under legislation recently approved by Congress, Senator Homer Ferguson indicated today. The new Federal road bill in-

creases allocations to Michigan from \$19,250,850 to \$29,936,000 per year for the two years covered by the bill.

Included in the increase is \$5,965,000 for the secondary system of farm to market roads. The allocation of funds to Michigan under the bill would provide \$9,776,000 for the primary system, \$5,965,000 for the secondary system, \$8,031,000 for the urban areas, and \$6,164,000 for the interstate system.

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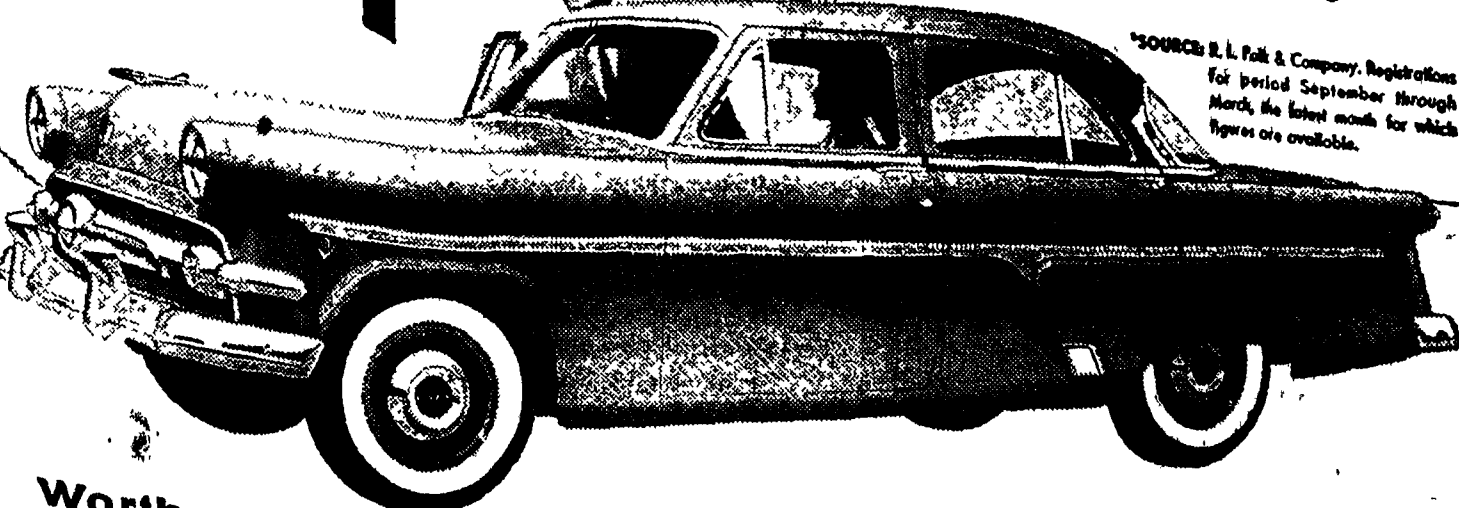

Conservationist Advises Need Proper Land Use

Five hundred and seventy-six miles of diversions and terraces are needed in southwestern Michigan, according to Lee N. Rosencrans, area conservationist of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Kalamazoo. Diversions and terraces are mechanical practices used to check the flow of surface water on sloping fields by carrying water slowly across the slope and emptying the water where it will not do any damage to the land.

Rosencrans pointed out that 136.2 miles of diversions and terraces have been built by farmers cooperating with local soil conservation districts in southwestern Michigan. These districts are located in Berrien, Allegan, Cass, VanBuren, Barry, Kalamazoo, and St. Joseph counties.

Rosencrans pointed out that diversions and terraces are the names given to artificial channels or small earth ditches built across the slope of the field to intercept the runoff water and lead it around the slope to a waterway which, in turn, lowers the water safely to a suitable outlet.

that farming operations are continued in the same field. The terrace is farmed as a part of the field. Diversions, on the other hand, Rosencrans pointed out, are much larger channels than terraces. The channel and the ridge is generally left in permanent sod and not farmed as part of the crop-land program. Diversions may also be used on steeper lands than terraces. Such fields might be fields that are quite steep, or permanent pasture fields where normally great volumes of water collect. Diversions, as the name implies, are applicable to many locations where it is desirable to prevent runoff water from flowing in low-lying fields, farmyards, constructed to divert water from roadways, or gullies. They are these locations.

For further information on constructing and maintaining diversions or terraces consult your local soil conservation district or your nearest U. S. Soil Conservation Service office.

How To Create Your Cultivated Woodland Garden

Make your cultivated woodland garden close enough to the house so you can enjoy the wild flowers as they come along in quick succession of bloom, advises Felix G. Gustafson, professor of botany at the University of Michigan.

With spring flowering coming to a climax in May, you can enjoy that early arrival, Dutchman's breeches, next the delicate hepatica, which is happy in any shady wild garden, and then bloodroot (Sanguinaria canadensis), with a thick underground stem containing the bright red juice from which the plant takes its name.

The soil must, of course, be suited to plant needs, Professor Gustafson reminds. "It can be acid or neutral, compact or soft with humus, depending upon the origin of the plants. For shade-loving plants like woodland phlox and Jack-in-the-pulpit, use woods soil and add an equal amount of organic matter in all stages of decay, or use soil, leafmold or garden moss, and sand. Ordinary shootingstar (Dodecatheon erythrostium), one of the loveliest plants for a cool, shady rock garden."

Among May-flowering ground covers in shade, the botanist says that favorites are partridge berry, wintergreen and bear berry, all of which require a sandy acid soil. He recommends obtaining from the county agent a soil test kit, which will enable you to determine the degree of acidity of your soil.

"Taller plants you can use," he says, "are nutcracker (Mitella diphylla), Jack-in-the-pulpit and trilliums — the great trillium (Trillium grandiflorum) being the most satisfactory for cultivation, thriving even in ordinary garden loam."

For dappled shade or full sun, Professor Gustafson suggests that a good selection would be crested iris (Iris cristata), Eastern columbine (Aquilegia canadensis) and

many species of violets. In late summer butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa) will do beautifully in a sunny mid-border, he says.

According to the botany professor, the small yellow ladyslipper (Cypripedium parviflorum), found on wooded slopes and hummocks in swamps, is the easiest native orchid to grow in the garden, often persisting for many years. "It may be planted in dappled shade and not too rich soil. Wood geranium (Geranium maculatum), with lavender-purple flowers and deeply cut leaves, will do well in the wild garden or border."

Here are Professor Gustafson's hints on transplanting wild flowers. "Some soil should be taken with them to keep the roots moist. Do not take the flowers when they are in first leaf, but rather wait until they are dormant. If it is desirable to transplant when they are in full leaf, it is wise to cut them back so as to reduce the leaf surface while they are producing new roots and establishing themselves in the soil."

"If you are transplanting from moist woods soil to drier garden soil, take a good deal of soil with the plants. Dig a hole and plant the flower with its native soil around it. Plants should be watered as soon as they have been placed in their new location, and covered with newspaper or cloth so the sun will not burn them."

Here Professor Gustafson inserts a warning. "Remember that trees, shrubs and flowers along the state highways or on state property are protected by law. Also, to collect ladyslippers and trilliums one must get a written permission from the owner of the land where they grow."
