### Letter To The Editor

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

Shortly before noon on May 27, the High School principal called the Buchanan police to remove John Moulder from the high school business office. He was in the business office solely to obtain the necessary signatures to enable him to receive state aid to augment his dwindling savings.

This letter concerns the aforementioned incident as well as some related circumstances. Anyone desiring substantiation of the statements contained herein should consult the Buchanan police report log of May 27 (11:50 a.m.) or the secretaries employed in the high school business office.

For those who have forgotten, John Moulder was suspended in early 1974 for improper teaching methods, or some other ambiguous terms that conjure up all kinds of bad connotations in the minds of those "outside the fishbowl."

At any rate, Mr. Moulder was dismissed after a lengthy as well as controversial hearing with the school board. He is still appealing this decision which, incidentally is why he has been selling valued personal property and also explains his going to the Buchanan High School business office to get his relief papers certified. (Apparently those responsible for his dismissal don't realize the difficulties they have created for Mr. Moulder in regard to obtaining meaningful employment.)

The incident itself occurred somewhat like this. Shortly after Mr. Moulder entered the building on May 27th, he was confronted by Asst. Principal Rennhack who told Mr. Moulder that he had no business in the school and demanded that Mr. Moulder leave at once.

After exchanging words with

Mr. Rennhack, Mr. Moulder proceeded to the business office where, shortly thereafter, Mr. Vanderbush appeared with a police officer. Mr. Vanderbush also ordered Mr. Moulder to leave immediately, without even asking why he was there. Apparently the police officer didn't feel Mr. Moulder was violating any laws, for he left by himself, having made no arrest, no forced escort, nothing!

I think Messrs. Rennhack and Vanderbush should jointly undertake a reading course in "How to Win Friends and Influence People" by Dale Carnegie. This should be done immediately, for those in daily contact with many people, should be masters in the art of interpersonal relations. Unfortunately, these men have failed to even make a noticeable attempt in that regard.

I can almost understand Mr. Rennhack's overzealous reaction to Mr. Moulder's presence. After all, he was promoted from Junior High arithmetic teacher to Asst. Principal shortly after testifying for the school in the Moulder hearing.

However, I can't fathom why Mr. Vanderbush would be a party to such a flagrant abuse of a basic privilege to which Mr. Moulder is certainly entitled. Then too, with Mr. Vanderbush's obvious academic exposure, he should at least be able to communicate with all sorts of people and in all sorts of situations with a modicum of tact and success.

My main purpose in this letter has been to present facts, not hearsay. While I recognize my obvious bias, I maintain nonetheless that I have been completely accurate in my transmission of the events as they occurred.

I trust that Messrs. Vanderbush and Rennhack won't begrudge me for relating this incident to the public. However, I'm willing to let the chips fall where they may.

Another lady, in response to an article in this column, said she was intensely interested in getting a theater group started. Anybody else?

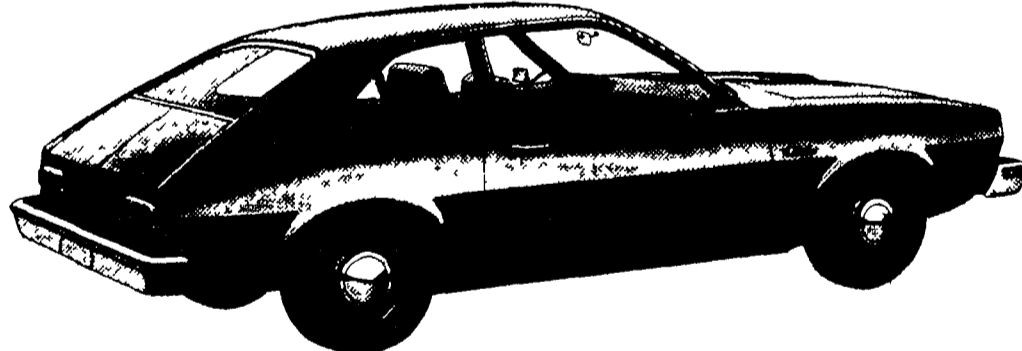

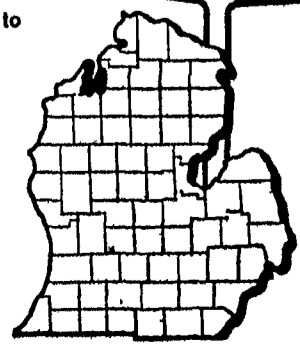

### Urges Study Of Motorcycle Laws

Buchanan police chief Dan Moore reported that there have been several violations of laws governing motor driven cycles and that many drivers of them apparently don't understand the laws. Buchanan police have been giving warnings in some cases, but will have to begin issuing citations.

For the convenience of all, chief Moore has listed some of the laws.

**Basic Laws for Motor Driven Cycles**  
Bicycle means every device propelled by human power with 2 tandem wheels over 20 inches in diameter. It includes pedal bicycles with helper motors rated less than 1 brake horsepower transmitted by friction, not by gear or chain.  
Motor driven cycle means

every bicycle with motor attached, except those described above. It also means every motor scooter, as well as every motorcycle with a motor that produces less than 5 gross brake horsepower.  
No person shall operate any motor driven cycle on streets or highways during night hours unless the cycle is equipped with required lights, and received

written approval from the chief police officer of the city, township or county in which he resides. Speed not to exceed 35 miles per hour, or as fixed by local ordinance, whichever is lesser.  
A person propelling a bicycle or operating a motorcycle or motor driven cycle shall not ride other than upon and astride a permanent and regular seat attached thereto. No motor driven cycle shall be used to

carry more than 1 person at any one time.  
A person operating a motor driven cycle on a public thoroughfare shall wear a crash helmet on his head that shall meet the approval of the Department of State Police.  
Persons riding bicycles, motor driven cycles or motorcycles upon a roadway shall not ride more than 2 abreast, nor shall they pass between lines of traffic

A pedal bicycle with helper motor rated less than 1 brake horsepower transmitted by friction and not by gear or chain, which produces only ordinary pedaling speeds shall not be operated by a person under 15 years of age.  
No person operating a bicycle, motorcycle or motor driven cycle shall carry any package, bundle or article which prevents the driver from keeping both hands upon the handlebars of

said vehicle. No handlebars of a motorcycle or motor driven cycle shall be higher than 15 inches from the seat to the highest point of the handgrip of the operator.  
These are some of the laws pertaining to the operation of motor driven cycles. There are many additional laws covering the operation and use of bicycles, motor driven cycles and motorcycles. Any person owning or intending to purchase such a

vehicle should thoroughly read and understand the laws he is required to operate under. It must be the responsibility of the parents to insure their children know the vehicle laws before allowing them to operate their vehicle off of private property.  
It is a misdemeanor for any person to do any act forbidden or fail to perform any act required in Section 656 to 662 inclusive.

## A Minute With Mary

**Helping Others Overcome Stress**  
"Any major change from the norm can cause stress. How people react to stress can mean the difference between good and poor health," says Dr. David Imig, Michigan State University Extension Family Life Specialist.

When people you know are undergoing stress, there are ways to help them. If someone in your family comes home, slams the door and kicks the dog, something must be bothering him. Try to be understanding instead of expressing disapproval.

Encourage the person to express feelings - talk, yell or cry. By asking neutral, open-ended questions, you can find out what is distressing.

Once you know what the

problem is, you can help relieve the pressure by being supportive. Let the person know you understand and will stick by. Help explore the situation and find ways to adapt to it. Suggest possible alternatives.

"Communication techniques are extremely important in relieving stress," says Dr. Imig. "Be a facilitator, not a blamer."

For example, if your spouse can't keep up with his or her work load, you might say "We all have our trouble with our work at times. It could happen to anybody. Don't feel badly about it."

Don't say "Organize your work better and you won't get so far behind."

If your spouse is overloaded, help him (her) learn to say no and question some demands placed upon him (her).

Helping someone overcome stressful situations now, may prevent serious physical and mental problems from developing later.

Area weavers are looking forward to an exciting new class this coming week at Fernwood. Due to Mary Snyder's illness and the subsequent cancellation of her weaving class, a group of five Niles Weavers journeyed to Grand Haven, Michigan, for a visit with Libby Crawford. As a result, Libby Crawford will be at Fernwood Tuesday, September 2 thru Friday, September 5 for four 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. classes in Bound Weaving.

Many will remember Libby's visit to Fernwood during 1971 and the popular Christmas Weaving Workshop she taught at that time. This year's class also lends itself to Christmas designs as well as a multitude of unique floral and geometric patterns. Class members will also learn to design and weave people-like figures as a border or all-over pattern.

Bound Weave is unique in that the warp is completely covered by the weft and never shows unless used as fringe or purposely left visible. The resulting effect is a repetitive design with a jewel-like appearance caused by colors grouped into small patterns. This fabric is thick and heavy. The entire process requires care and serious attention to the color used, which can be delightful.

Libby Crawford, who has explored Bound Weave more fully than most, will have many examples on hand as an inspiration to class members. She will also be using her experiences and weaving techniques studied at Greenfield Village and Cranbrook under such weaving experts as Peter Collingwood and Eva Antilla.

Libby Crawford is presently a member of the Gampers, a group of well known professional weavers and is also a yearly participant in the Annual Conference of the Michigan League of Handweavers. Her home is a weaver's paradise with her own handwork of chair coverings to curtains and wall hangings to bed spreads.

Class members will be working on their own looms during the entire session, using 4-ply worsted knitting yarn. Earth tone colors will be supplied at a small charge as will black, white and flesh colors for the human figures and faces. Anyone preferring bright colors such as red or orange may bring their own supplies. This class is filled.

It won't be long now. School is just around the corner. And Fernwood is proud to be offering high school credit courses in Natural Science again this year.

Because of a \$24,000 state grant awarded to the local school consortium and Fernwood on the merits of last year's program, Fernwood has expanded its course to include two groups of twenty students each. Kay Harker will teach the course to meet for two hours each day with one session in the morning and one in the afternoon. Her students will explore and discover outdoor natural science using Fernwood's facilities as a base for study. Emphasis will be placed on individual growth and students will choose many projects from their own particular areas of interest.

Detroit (November 29, 1760) Fort Pontchartrain was surrendered to the British here today. French Captain Francois De Bellestre gave command to the post over to a British force led by Major Robert Rogers.

The Fort, located on the banks of the Detroit River, will now be known as Fort Detroit.

The takeover ends 150 years of French rule in a large part of North America. Two months ago the Governor of New France surrendered all French posts but New Orleans to the British. Today's takeover was a sequel to that surrender.

British Captain Donald Campbell will be the new commandant of Fort Detroit.

Asked about changes in the operations of the Fort, Campbell replied, "We anticipate no major changes. On our march here from Fort Pitt, we met with a number of Indians, with whom we smoked the peace pipe. We hope to maintain those peaceful relations."

However, the British captain indicated that he is under orders to exercise a firmer hand with the Indians. "No sales of rum, not so much gift giving. I rather think these measures will contribute to the good order of things," he said.

Campbell said that the British plan to make Fort Detroit (Pontchartrain) the center of the northwest fur trade.

"The French ran the fur trade as a government monopoly. We British permit the fur trade to be run on a free enterprise system," he said.

Campbell added that the British had discovered a fortune in furs inside the Fort when they took over this morning.

I have always been deathly afraid of flying but I have recently scraped up enough courage to make short flights. Now it appears that I will have to make an overseas flight and I'm a bit apprehensive about it. You usually have information on where to get helpful material. How about something for my phobia?

The thing for you is a booklet entitled "How to Fly" published by the Air Transport Association. It is chock full of information including tips on how to fly with baggage, pets and infants; how best to use a travel agent; rules on air travel for pregnant women; AND how to travel overseas.

The booklet is available by writing the Air Transport Association, 1709 New York Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006.
