

## Berrien County Youth Fair Breaking Records

A record breaking 5,818 young people between the ages of 5 and 21 entered some 16,787 exhibits to kick off the 27th annual Berrien County Youth Fair. The number of exhibitors is an increase of 548 over the 1971 total, and 302 more exhibits were entered.

Climaxing Monday's entry day activities was the crowning of Steve Patzer, Stevensville, and Vanessa Votrath, Berrien Springs as Fair King and Queen. Buchanan was represented in the contest by Donna Matzen, Pam Huebner, Dick Matzen and Don Batchelor.

Also crowned was Diane Radebold of Niles as Berrien County Apple Queen.

Tuesday, opening day, was designated "School Day" and all school children were admitted free. Judging began in most classes and will continue until Thursday. Fair activities, including Auto and Tractor Operators contests and the annual Beef, Sheep and Swine Auction, will run through Saturday. Featured at the free grandstand tonight (Thursday) will be Sandi and Sally of the Lawrence Weik Snow Finishing. The week will be The Sound Generation on Friday and James Duren on Saturday.

## School Faced With More Heating Expense

The Buchanan Board of Education was faced with another problem concerning the high school's heating system, and they had to have a special meeting Monday to determine what to do.

There had been leaks in the steam lines located underground between the band room, and a tunnel and the west wing of the building. Closer investigation revealed that the pipes had deteriorated badly and were scaling badly inside and out. It had first been thought that they could be repaired but the school administration was told that repair would only lead to further trouble, and the buried pipes should be replaced.

The Board discussed the problem for some time. They had

already agreed to a major renovation of the rest of the heating system and hadn't counted on the latest development. It was finally decided that there was no other alternative.

Two bids had been received for the replacement of the pipes. That of Frank Casselman of Sturgis was the lowest at \$5,485 for an eight-inch line and \$1,040 for a three-inch line for a total of \$6,525. Casselman was the low bidder on the rest of the heating renovation and is already at work in the building.

The new pipes will be steel and have insulation all the way around and will be coated with tar, which it is hoped will eliminate the problem.

## Price to Fight City's Annexation Plans

The Buchanan Township Board met for almost three hours Tuesday. They had a 45 minute discussion before they approved the minutes of the last meeting.

Supervisor Ivan Price warned that he intends to fight hard against Buchanan's attempt to annex land for a by-pass be-

tween River Street and Front Street, and the Board generally agreed with him. Price said that he would call a meeting of all involved people to see what could be done to stop the action. Property owners will receive a notice, and the meeting will be in about two weeks.

It was decided to meet with the zoning board of appeals at their meeting of August 28 to discuss amending the zoning ordinance. Other zoning matters include a dispute between men at Weaver Lake over boat rentals.

Property owners at Indian Springs wanted their road repaved and chloride added. This was done by the county at the owners' expense, and the Township Board authorized it after the fact.

George Beach from his own insurance agency and a representative from Bunham & Flower in Kalamazoo presented bids for the Township's workmen's compensation. Beach's bid was \$480.39 and the other was \$483, so Beach was awarded the business, but not before there was a long discussion between the representatives over the relative merits of their companies. It was indicated that the Board expects to re-bid all its insurance in October.

The next meeting will be Tuesday after Labor Day, September 5.

An elementary principal for Ottawa will be announced later. Ellis May is continuing as as-

stant principal with his work primarily in the senior high area.

## New-Mail Times Are Announced

Effective Saturday, incoming mail from the Kalamazoo Sectional Center will arrive once a day at 6:45 a.m. at Buchanan. Outgoing mail announced Postmaster Charles Wesner, must be in the post office by 5 p.m. each week day.

On Sundays, mail will be received and dispatched at 12:30 p.m. but must be in the boxes by 11 a.m.

This is part of complete re-scheduling for the new Area Mail Processing program. Wesner said that the times for all rural and city routes will be approximately 20 minutes later each day except in the business district.

Wesner cautioned people on the sending of local mail. Unless it is separated into a box marked for Buchanan, it will go along the way to Kalamazoo with the rest of the mail. Wesner said that the use of the words "local" or "city" on mail for Buchanan is no longer acceptable and will only delay delivery.

## Commission Okays Some Change Orders for Wastewater Plant

The Buchanan City Commission studied some change orders presented by Clyde E. Williams and Associates for the wastewater disposal plant. The orders the consultants had in mind would have come to an additional \$33,000, but the commission eliminated or tabled some. They approved a new primary sludge pump for \$2,940 and the installation of additional circuit breakers, required by the state inspector. There was a roof drain which had been forgotten in the original drawings. They threw out paving of the road, figuring that they could do it cheaper. They questioned the need for site grading and wanted to study the need for an automatic timer for the grit channel and screen. Altogether the change orders approved came to about \$17,555.

The commission approved the transfer of a liquor license from Marguerite Snyder to William Maveo and Wallace Wagner for the tavern at 116 Main. The applicants were present and were told by the Mayor that it was hoped that the back end of the property could be upgraded. It was officially announced that the Southeast Berrien County Landfill Authority had rejected the appointment of Carl Heiman to represent Buchanan on that body. They claimed that the people on that board must be elected officials from the cities or township-represented. The Buchanan City Commission passed a resolution suggesting an amend-

ment to the Authority's by-laws, enabling non-elected citizens to serve. It was pointed out that this body shouldn't be political and some of the members on that board who are elected officials never show up at the Authority's meetings. Paul Montgomery was appointed to take Herman's place, and Carl Heiman's appointment to the Zoning Board of Appeals was approved.

The Commission received a letter from George and Marjorie Treat notifying the city of intent to cancel a lease on property now being used in the city parking lot. No action was taken, but further investigation was indicated.

Approval was given to invest \$20,000 in tax money at the First City Bank at the going rate of 5 per cent.

The tax exemption status of the Junior Achievement building was questioned since it is now renting part of its space to a county agency. A similar ruling in Grand Rapids called for the part of a building drawing income to be taxed.

### Hilltop Break-In

Last Thursday the Buchanan Police discovered that a window by the rear door of the Hilltop Zephyr Station had been broken out. Owner Robert Kell was summoned at 1:30 a.m. It was determined that \$98 was missing. Investigation revealed that the window had been broken from the inside and it was speculated that this might have been a cover-up for entry made through the door with a key. At 9:30 a.m. Kell reported that another \$50 was missing, and he felt this may have been taken after the first break-in. Dan Moore assisted investigating officer McNeely in dusting for fingerprints and reported that they had several suspects.

### Carpeting Taken

Larry Dorman of Grand Rapids Tile Co. reported that some-thing between August 4 and 7 over \$200 worth of carpeting had been taken from one of the apartments in Metea Court. The carpeting was still in a roll.

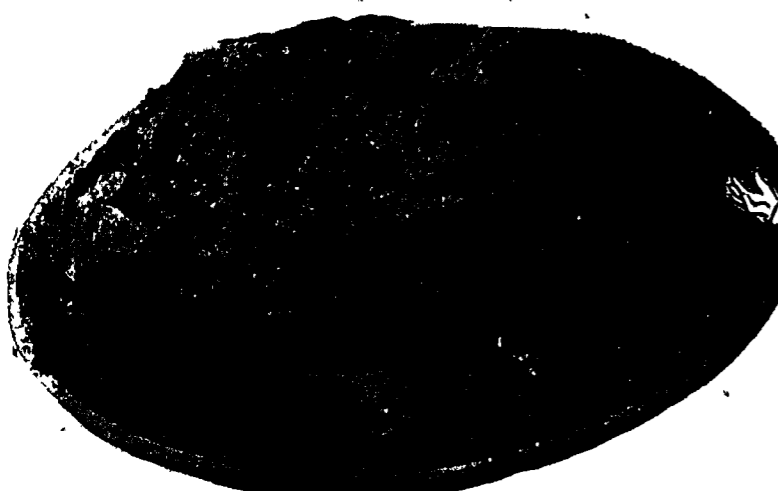

Meals on Wheels in the Niles-Buchanan area has been supplying meals for eleven people since the program started operation on August first. This service has proved invaluable to many all across the country in areas where the program is offered and is not limited to a particular age or economic group. People in all walks of life are enthusiastic users of this service in numerous places where it has been used successfully. As we go to press the number has now grown to 14 being served in the Niles-Buchanan area.

The primary reason for use of the program is an urgent need for nutritional meals. People are expected to pay for this

service as they can pay the full amount. Where there is need for financial help, it can be provided.

For more information about the service or to subscribe to it, call Mrs. Ted Lyon in Buchanan. For those in clubs or churches who are interested in becoming informed on this worthwhile project, call Mrs. Lyon who will gladly arrange for a speaker.

Meals are delivered by volunteers at midday and each order consists of a hot dinner with meat or a meat substitute, vegetable, salad, dessert and beverage. A sack lunch for a balanced evening meal completes the order.

Examples of situations where Meals on Wheels would be helpful are:

- 1 A hospital patient might be discharged earlier if arrangements for meals were possible.
- 2 Special diets may be provided for those unable to do so themselves—such as low fat, salt free, bland or diabetic.
- 3 A person physically handicapped or alone might be unable to market and cook for himself.
- 4 Someone, often a man, may feel unable to plan and prepare balanced meals.
- 5 An ill or elderly person living with relatives might need to have meals provided when the family is vacationing or called away. Other special circumstances such as one where a mother is hospitalized and a handicapped youth needs help—one who can stay alone but not satisfactorily feed himself.

Meals on Wheels is a service that can be used on a temporary basis or for a longer period. Usually it is on a weekly arrangement, but it is flexible in that it can start at any time, or by calling, an individual may arrange not to have a meal delivered on a particular day if he has been invited out for instance.

For anyone having trouble providing balanced meals it is a possible solution well worth investigating.

Jennie now has to hug and pat her when she comes into the office. Phil and Karen Honeycutt are no strangers to the family and are more than distant relatives. Phil has been with the management in another state since he got out of high school. He knows the good and the bad of running a small paper. He's watched another one develop from a loser to a strong factor in its community. He's with the Record, banking entirely on the future and knowing that present income doesn't justify all the work.

Then there's Gene Hill. He's about to have to learn new methods of work when the paper switches to offset. He's at the same time excited and nervous. A trained linotyper, he also has been doubling on sports coverage, and he's a great fan of several sports.

Pat Feeny is new and has already become the "little brother." He comes from a large family of boys. He's used to the kidding he gets.

Webb Kohn has been in the printing business all of his life. He helps out regularly. He's the only one who knows where to find things. He's the one called when there's a particularly tricky printing job.

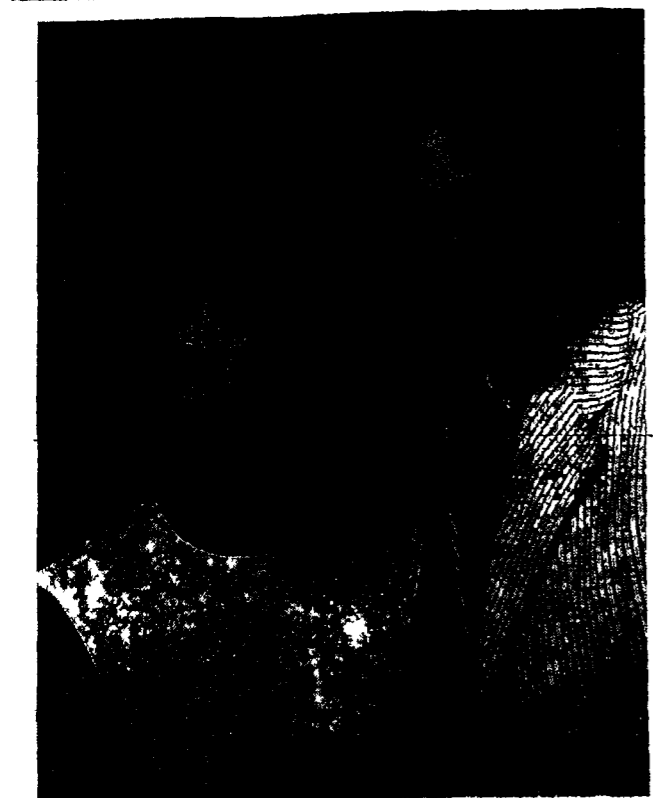

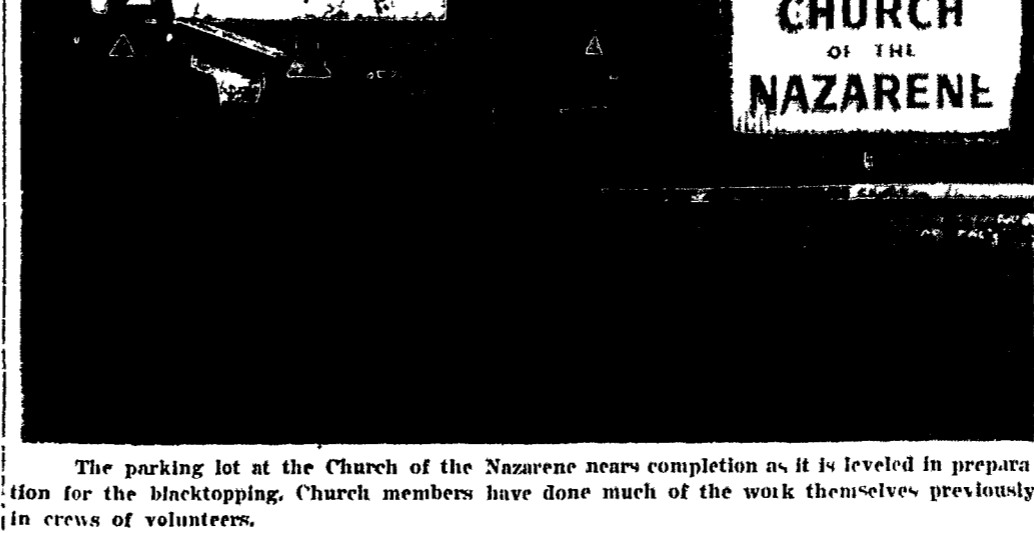
### Entertain At Family Picnic

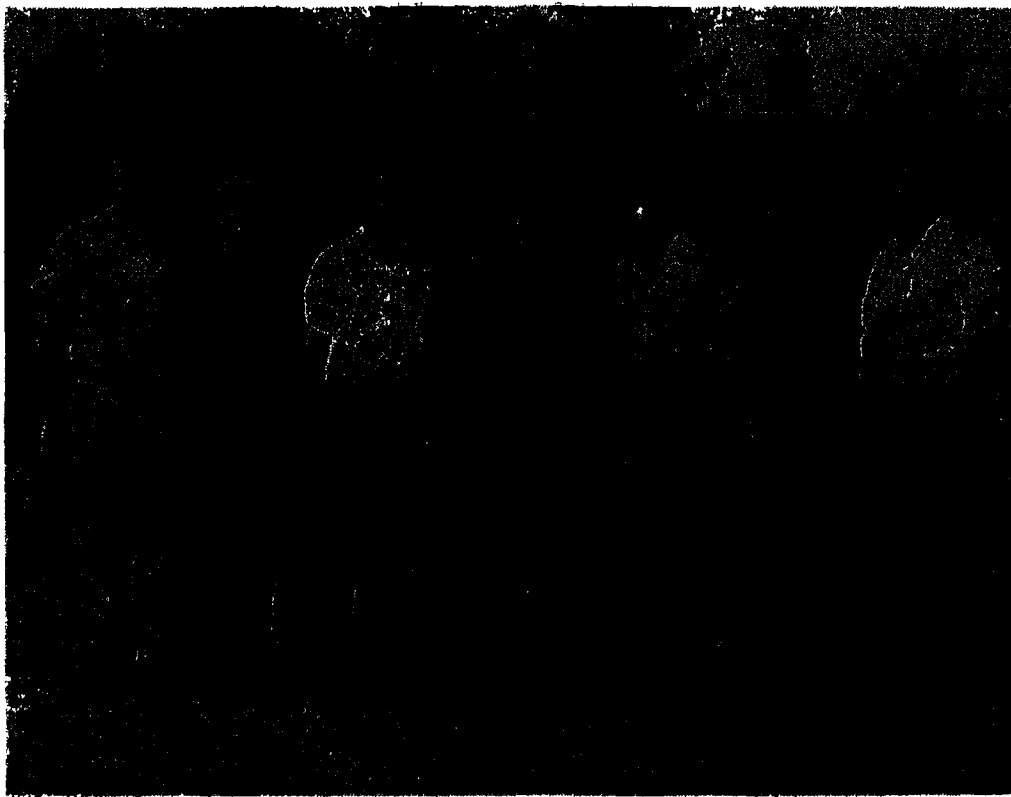

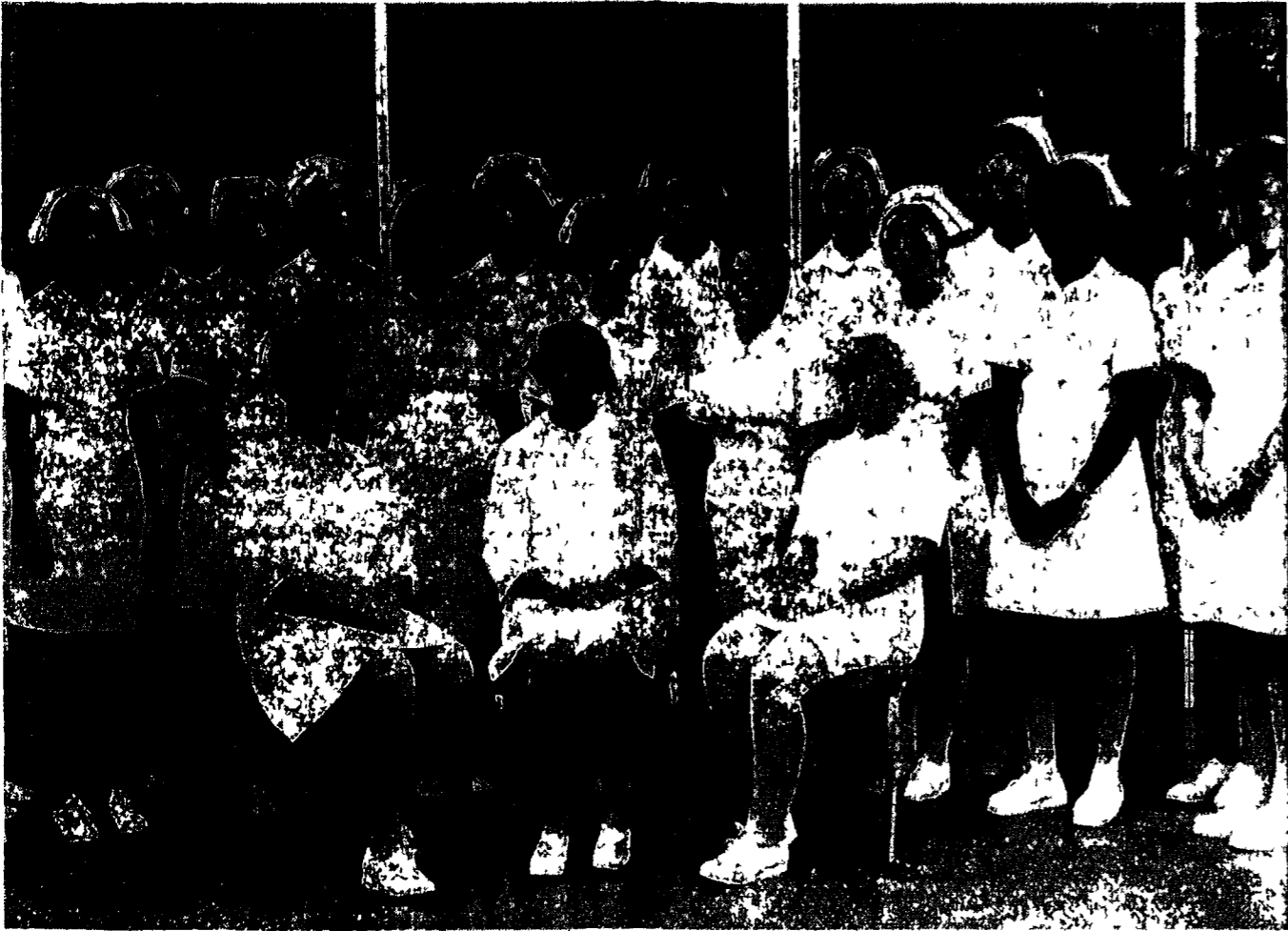

It takes a know-how of when to cut them. It takes sanitary practices in handling them. And it may take nutrients in their water supply.

As for cutting, either morning or evening is best. Then they're full of water and you'll have less problems with the flowers wilting. Always cut the stem on a slant, since the larger the cut end, the more water can be absorbed.

Sanitary handling comes in with the equipment you use. Keep the cutting knife clean and your hands clean, too. Then lay the flowers on a clean piece of paper as you cut and work with them. And scour the flowers

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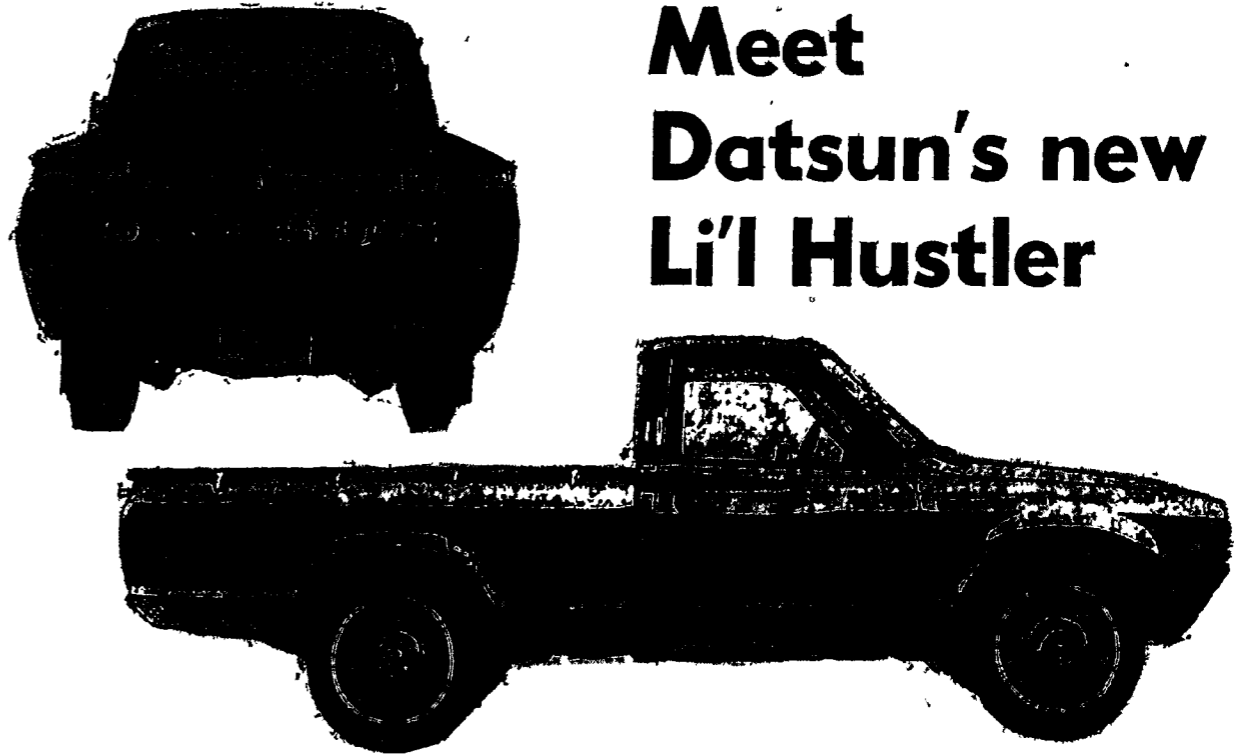

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# ORDINANCE NO. 1

**AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR ACQUIRING A LANDFILL SITE, IMPROVEMENTS, EQUIPMENT AND RELATED FACILITIES BY THE SOUTHEAST BERRIEN COUNTY LANDFILL AUTHORITY IN THE COUNTY OF BERRIEN, STATE OF MICHIGAN; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF REVENUE BONDS TO DEFRAY THE COST THEREOF; TO PROVIDE FOR THE RETIREMENT AND SECURITY OF SAID BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE TO SAID BONDS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE OPERATION OF SAID LANDFILL REFUSE DISPOSAL FACILITIES OF THE AUTHORITY.**

WHEREAS, the Southeast Berrien County Landfill Authority, was created in the year 1969 pursuant to the provisions of Act 179 of the Public Acts of Michigan, of 1947, as amended, for the purpose of disposing of rubbish or garbage or both, by the City of Niles, Berrien County, Michigan; the City of Buchanan, Berrien County, Michigan; the Township of Niles, Berrien County, Michigan; the Township of Buchanan, Berrien County, Michigan; and the Township of Bertrand, Berrien County, Michigan, all of which are constituent members of said Authority, and

WHEREAS, all of the above-described municipalities have entered into a contract with said Authority pursuant to which said municipalities are to deliver or cause to be delivered to the Authority at the Authority's landfill site or sites, all of the garbage and rubbish collected within the limits of their municipalities and the Authority has agreed to accept and dispose of the same, and

WHEREAS, said contract provides in paragraph (6) thereof as follows:

and

WHEREAS, the Authority has adopted by resolution on February 29, 1972 a program for the acquisition and operation of a landfill site, improvements and equipment for the disposal of garbage and rubbish including an estimate of \$225,000 as the cost of acquisition thereof and an estimate of 25 years and upwards as the period of usefulness thereof, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the Authority issue revenue bonds in the principal amount of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000) to finance the cost of such landfill site, improvements and equipment for the disposal of garbage and rubbish

THEREFORE, the Southeast Berrien County Landfill Authority in the County of Berrien, State of Michigan, ordains

Section 1. Whenever used in this ordinance or in the bonds to be issued hereunder, except when otherwise indicated by the context

(a) The term "Authority" shall be construed to mean the said "Southeast Berrien County Landfill Authority"

(b) The term "Board" shall be construed to mean the Board of Trustees of said Authority, the legislative and governing body thereof.

(c) The term "constituent municipalities" shall be construed to mean the Cities of Niles and Buchanan and the Townships of Niles, Buchanan and Bertrand, all in the County of Berrien and other municipalities which hereafter become members of the Authority in accordance with the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation of the Authority

(d) The term "Chairman", "Secretary" and "Treasurer" shall be construed to mean the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively, of the Board of Trustees of the Authority

(e) The term "Agreement" shall be construed to mean the Agreement now in existence between the constituent municipalities and the Authority for disposal of rubbish and garbage and dated as follows

City of Buchanan	March 22, 1971
City of Niles	June 28, 1971
Township of Buchanan	June 7, 1971
Township of Niles	June 15, 1971
Township of Bertrand	May 13, 1971

(f) The term "landfill site or sites" shall include the sites for disposal of burnable (including incinerator ash) and non-burnable refuse now or hereafter operated by the Authority

(g) The term "project" shall be construed to mean the landfill site, improvements and equipment and related facilities to be acquired by the Authority

(h) The term "acquired" shall be construed to mean acquisition by purchase, construction or by any other method

(i) The term "revenues" and "net revenues" shall be construed as defined in Section 3 of Act No. 94, Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as now amended, and shall include payments made to the Authority pursuant to the Agreement by the constituent municipalities from any available funds.

Section 2. The Authority hereby determines to issue revenue bonds pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 94, of the Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as amended, to finance the cost of acquiring a landfill site, improvements and equipment for the disposal of garbage and rubbish and related facilities in accordance with the Agreement between the constituent municipalities and the Authority as described in the report dated February 23, 1972, entitled Cost Estimates for Self Operation of Landfill and approved by the Board by resolution adopted February 29, 1971.

Section 3. The Authority does hereby adopt the estimate of twenty-five (25) years and upwards as the period of usefulness of said project and the estimate of cost in the amount of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000) for the project as contained in said report and resolution. Said estimate of cost does not include any capitalized interest for the bonds authorized and described in Section 4 hereof.

Section 4. There are hereby authorized to be issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 94 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as amended, revenue bonds in the aggregate principal sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000), for the purpose of paying the cost of the said project. Said bonds shall be known as "Landfill Bonds", shall be dated as of September 1, 1972; shall be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 to 45; both inclusive, shall be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 each; shall be registerable as to principal only, in the manner hereinafter set forth in the bond form; shall bear interest at a rate or rates to be hereafter determined not exceeding 8% per annum, payable on March 1, 1973, and thereafter semi-annually on the first days of March and September in each year; and shall mature on September 1st in each year as follows:

Bonds to be issued shall not be subject to redemption prior to the date of their maturity, but shall be subject to redemption, at the option of the Authority, in whole or in part, on any interest payment date on and

after September 1, 1976. Each bond called to be redeemed shall be redeemed at the par value thereof and accrued interest, plus a premium in accordance with the following schedule, to-wit:

- 4% per bond if called prior to September 1, 1981
- 3% per bond if called on or after September 1, 1981, but prior to September 1, 1985
- 2% per bond if called on or after September 1, 1985, but prior to September 1, 1989
- 1% per bond if called on or after September 1, 1989, but prior to September 1, 1991
- 1/2 of 1% per bond if called on or after September 1, 1991, but prior to maturity

Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of the bonds to be redeemed by publication of such notice not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular services, notices of the sale of municipal bonds; provided, that where any bond shall be registered, then notices of the redemption thereof shall be given by registered mail addressed to the registered holder thereof at the address shown on the paying agent's bond registration books, which notice shall be mailed within the State of Michigan, not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem the same. The principal of said bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at such bank or trust company in the State of Michigan as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds, which paying agent qualifies as such under the statutes of the State of Michigan or of the Federal Government, upon presentation and surrender of said bonds and attached coupons as they severally mature

Section 5. The Chairman and Secretary are hereby authorized and directed to execute said bonds for and on behalf of the Authority, to affix the seal of the Authority thereto, and to execute the interest coupons to be attached to said bonds by causing to be affixed thereto their facsimile signatures. Upon the execution of said bonds and attached coupons, the same shall be delivered to the Treasurer who is hereby authorized and directed to deliver said bonds and attached coupons to the purchaser thereof as hereafter determined by the Board upon receipt of the purchase price therefor

Section 6. The bonds herein authorized shall be sold in the manner provided in Section 12 of Act No. 94, Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as amended

Section 7. Said bonds and attached coupons shall not be a general obligation of the Authority and shall not be an indebtedness of the Authority within any state constitutional provision or statutory limitation. The principal of and interest on said bonds shall be payable solely from the net revenues of the Authority derived from operation of the project and the landfill site or sites including the payments to be made to it pursuant to the Agreement. To secure the payments of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued hereunder and on any additional bonds of equal standing issued as hereinafter provided, there is hereby created (to become effective at the time of the issuance of said bonds) in favor of the holders of said bonds and the interest coupons pertaining thereto, and each of such holders, a first lien (by said Act No. 94, Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as amended, made a statutory lien) upon said net revenues. The net revenues so pledged shall be and remain subject to said lien until the payment in full of the principal of and interest on said bonds

Section 8. The holder or holders of any of the bonds or interest coupons herein authorized to be issued, shall have all the rights and remedies given by law and particularly by said Act No. 94, Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as amended, for the collection and enforcement of said bonds and coupons and the security therefor, including the right to have a receiver appointed for the project and the landfill site or sites in event of default on the part of the Authority in performance of the terms of the bond contract.

Section 9. The project and the landfill site or sites shall be operated upon the basis of a fiscal year beginning on July 1st of each year and ending on June 30th of the following year

Section 10. The operation, maintenance and management of the project and the landfill site or sites shall be under the supervision of the Board and subject to its control. The right is reserved in the Authority to contract for the administration, operation and maintenance of the project and the landfill site or sites with a private contractor or contractors. Such contract or contracts may provide that the contractor will bill and collect from the constituent municipalities directly their share of the cost of administration, operation and maintenance incurred by the contractor pursuant to such contract.

Section 11. After the project is completed and is in operation, it is intended that the Authority shall contract to render rubbish and garbage disposal service to other municipalities and to residents of other municipalities and to private contractors. The rates to be charged to non-constituent municipalities or to any private person, firm or corporation shall be fixed by the Board. No free service shall be furnished by the Authority to any person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality.

Section 12. After the project is completed and is in operation, payments to be made by the constituent municipalities for debt service or for services rendered by the Authority shall be made as set forth in the Agreement. All charges to other municipalities and to private contractors shall be billed and payable as set forth in the written contracts between the Authority and such other municipalities and private contractors. The Authority shall not render service to municipalities, persons or corporations which are in default to it.

Section 13. Prior to the time the project is completed and is in operation the Authority may operate a landfill at any site available to it for the use of the constituent municipalities in accordance with the rates and provisions of the Agreement. After the project is completed and is in operation, the initial rates to constituent municipalities for services rendered by the Authority shall be on the basis and in the amounts described in the Agreement. The charges to be paid by the constituent municipalities to the Authority pursuant to the Agreement will be established so that they are at all times sufficient to provide for the payment of the expenses of administration, operation and maintenance of the project and the landfill site or sites; to provide for the payment of the interest upon and the principal of all bonds payable therefrom, as and when the same shall become due and payable, and for the creation of a reserve for the payment of principal and interest as required in this ordinance; and to provide for such other expenditures and funds of the Authority as are required by this ordinance. Such charges shall be fixed and revised from time to time by the Board so as to produce the foregoing amounts, and the Authority covenants and agrees to maintain at all times such charges to the said constituent municipalities for services furnished by the Authority as shall be sufficient to provide for the foregoing.

Section 14. From and after the issuance of said bonds, the revenues of the project and the landfill site or sites are hereby pledged for the purpose of the following funds, and as collected shall be set aside into a fund to be known as

the "Receiving Fund", and shall be transferred therefrom periodically into separate and special funds, as follows.

1. **Operation and Maintenance Fund.** Out of the revenues in the Receiving Fund, there shall be first set aside in each month into a fund to be designated "Operation and Maintenance Fund", a sum sufficient to provide for the payment for the next month of all current expenses of administration, operation and maintenance to be incurred and paid by the Authority. The Board, at the beginning of each fiscal year, shall adopt a budget covering the foregoing expenses for such year, and such expenses shall not exceed the amount specified in said budget except by a vote of 2/3rds of the members of the Board declaring the necessity thereof.

2. **Bond and Interest Redemption Fund.** Out of the remaining revenues in the Receiving Fund, there shall be next set aside each month into a fund to be designated "Bond and Interest Redemption Fund", a sum proportionately sufficient to provide for the payment as the same become due of the next maturing principal and interest on the herein authorized bonds. Provided, that the amount so set aside for interest on the bonds herein authorized, in each month shall not be less than one-sixth (1/6th) of the total amount of interest maturing on the next interest payment date, and the amount so set aside for principal on the bonds herein authorized, in each month during each fiscal year, shall not be less than one-twelfth (1/12th) of the amount of principal maturing on the next principal payment date and if there shall be any deficiency in the amount previously set aside, then the amount of such deficiency shall be added to the current requirement. In addition thereto, there shall also be set aside in monthly installments for the purpose of creating a reserve in said Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, for the bonds herein authorized, a sum not less than \$1,000 during the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1973 through June 30, 1978, a sum not less than \$2,000 during the fiscal years commencing July 1, 1978 through June 30, 1983, and a sum not less than \$3,000 during each of the fiscal years thereafter until said reserve shall equal at least \$20,000, and if at any time thereafter said reserve shall be less than \$20,000, then there shall be set aside in said reserve annually a sum sufficient to restore said reserve to \$20,000 at the earliest possible time. If any additional bonds of equal standing shall be issued, the authorizing ordinance shall provide for a comparable reserve therefor. Moneys in said Bond and Interest Redemption Fund may be used for the redemption of bonds. Provided, that except in case of refunding, no bonds of any issue less than all the outstanding bonds of said issue, shall be called for redemption unless the Authority shall have on hand in said fund sufficient moneys therefor not otherwise appropriated or pledged, in excess of the amount of interest and principal maturing on all issues of bonds then payable from the revenues of the system within the next eighteen (18) months from the redemption date, and for the purpose of determining the amount on hand, moneys in the reserve shall not be considered as appropriate or pledged. When the principal amount owing upon any bonds shall be reduced to the amount of the reserve therefor, then the principal of such bonds shall be paid from such reserve.

3. **Replacement Fund.** Out of the remaining revenues in the Receiving Fund there shall be next set aside in annual installments in a fund to be designated "Replacement Fund" a sum to be determined annually by the Board to build up a reserve for any improvements and replacements to the project which may become necessary from time to time and for the purchase of new landfill sites.

4. **Surplus Fund.** Revenues remaining in said Receiving Fund at the end of any fiscal year after all periodical transfers have been made therefrom as above required shall be deemed to be surplus moneys and shall be transferred to a "Surplus Fund". Moneys in the Surplus Fund may be transferred from time to time to one or more of the above mentioned funds or to other funds established by the Board or may be distributed to the constituent municipalities as directed by the Board.

Section 15. In the event that moneys in the Receiving Fund are insufficient to provide for the current requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, any moneys and/or securities in other funds of the Authority shall be transferred, first, to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, and, second, to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, to the extent of any deficits therein.

Section 16. All moneys in the several funds of the Authority, including reserve moneys, shall be deposited in a commercial account, interest bearing account or certificate of deposit with the paying agent for the bonds herein authorized. The moneys in the Receiving Fund, in the Operation and Maintenance Fund and in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, shall each be kept in a separate depository account. Moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, over and above those being accumulated for the payment of the next maturing principal and interest, and moneys in any other fund of the Authority may be invested in United States Government obligations. In the event of any such investment, the securities representing the same shall be kept on deposit with the bank or trust company having the deposit of the fund from which such purchase was made and the income therefrom shall become a part of such fund.

Section 17. The Authority hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders, from time to time, of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, that it will punctually perform all duties with reference to the project and the landfill site or sites and said bonds required by the constitution and laws of the State of Michigan and by this ordinance; that it will acquire the project at the earliest possible time, that it will acquire and maintain an adequate landfill site or sites, that it will not sell, lease, mortgage or in any manner dispose of the project or any substantial part thereof, until all bonds payable from the revenues thereof shall have been paid in full, except that the Authority may sell or otherwise dispose of landfill sites or equipment which are no longer of value to the Authority as determined by the Board; and that it will not permit any person, firm or corporation to compete with it in the furnishing of garbage and rubbish disposal services except for refuse collected by private contractors pursuant to contracts with individual commercial or industrial users. Said Authority further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds that it will maintain said project in good condition and operate the same in an efficient manner and at a reasonable cost, so long as any of said bonds are outstanding; that it will maintain insurance on the project for the benefit of the holders of said bonds in an amount which usually would be carried by private companies engaged in a similar type of business; that it will prepare, keep and file such records, statements and accounts as may be required by Act No. 94, Michigan Public Acts of 1933, as now or hereafter amended; that it will promptly file with the original purchasers of said bonds a copy of each annual statement which it is required to file with the Municipal Finance Commission and will also file with such purchasers a copy of the Annual Audit of the system certified to by a Certified Public Accountant, within ninety (90) days after the close of each fiscal year; and that it will furnish a copy of the foregoing statement and audit to any bondholder upon request.

Section 18. While any of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, shall be outstanding, no additional bonds payable from the revenues of the project and the landfill site or sites shall be issued which shall have a prior to equal standing therewith, except as hereinafter provided. The Authority shall have the right to issue additional bonds of

equal standing with the bonds herein authorized for the completion of the project herein described in the event the bonds herein authorized shall prove to be insufficient therefor. Also, the Authority shall have the right to issue additional bonds payable from the net revenues of the project and the landfill site or sites for the purpose of improving, enlarging and/or extending the project or acquiring an additional landfill site or sites, which bonds when issued shall have equal standing with the bonds herein authorized; Provided, that no such additional bonds of equal standing shall be issued unless the average net revenues for the then last two preceding years or the net revenues for the then last preceding fiscal year, whichever shall be the lower, plus the estimated additional net revenues to be derived from the improvements, enlargements and extensions or additional site or sites to be financed by such additional bonds, in any fiscal year beginning with the second full fiscal year following the estimated time of the completion of such project, shall be equal to at least 100% of the average annual principal and interest thereafter maturing on the bonds then outstanding payable from the revenues of the project and the landfill site or sites and on such additional bonds then being issued. Such additional net revenues shall be estimated by a Registered Professional Engineer who shall be selected by the Board but who shall not be a regular officer or employee of the Authority. The selection of such person shall be subject to disapproval by the Municipal Finance Commission. No such additional bonds shall be issued if the Authority shall then be in default in making any payments to the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund established herein. Permission by the Municipal Finance Commission of the State of Michigan (or such other state commission or agency as shall have jurisdiction over the issuance of municipal bonds) to issue such additional bonds shall constitute a conclusive presumption of the existence of conditions permitting the issuance thereof.

Section 19. The bonds and attached coupons herein authorized to be issued, shall be substantially in the following form, to-wit:

and funds for said site as are required by said ordinance. Rates shall be fixed and revised from time to time by the Board of Trustees of said Authority so as to produce the foregoing amounts.

Section 20. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be allocated and used as follows:

1. Any premium and accrued interest paid to the Authority by the purchaser of the bonds herein authorized shall be paid to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund created hereunder.

2. 




