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Clark Transmissions To Be Built In Romania

National Standard Ends 2nd Best Year

Thanksgiving 1975

Clark Equipment Company has announced that its overseas subsidiary, Clark Equipment A G, signed a ten year agreement with Universal Tractor of Bucharest, Romania for the manufacture of powershift transmissions and matching torque converters at Universal Tractor's plants in Brasov, Romania.

Universal Tractor is Romania's leading manufacturer of both agricultural and industrial tractors including earthmoving equipment. The transmissions will be used in Romanian-built heavy construction equipment, railway switching locomotives and like vehicles.

These transmissions will be sold primarily in Eastern Europe by Universal Tractor and outside that area by Clark International Marketing, S A, the overseas marketing arm of the Clark Equipment group of companies.

Included in the agreement are

provisions for the joint development by Universal Tractor and Clark Equipment A G of a line of metric transmissions primarily for use in Romanian-built crawler tractors.

According to Mr. B. E. Phillips, president and chief executive officer of Clark Equipment Company, "This new arrangement should help Universal Tractor in the manufacture of their own product lines, expand the Clark group's marketing area for transmissions and, at the same time, broaden the economic and technological cooperation between the countries."

In addition to powershift transmission and heavy duty axle manufacture, Clark Equipment is a major worldwide manufacturer and vendor of industrial lift trucks, material handling systems, construction machinery products and commercial refrigeration and display equipment.

For the fiscal year ended September 30, 1975, National Standard Company reported sales of \$226 million and earnings of \$9.4 million or \$2.19 per share. The year's results were second only to 1974, when sales were \$219 million and earnings were \$13.9 million or \$3.20 per share. The previous year's earnings included \$62 per share or nonrecurring gains from the closing of unprofitable operations and withdrawal from certain foreign activities.

"We feel 1975 was satisfactory considering the reduced level of economic activity during the last six months," Chairman T. H. Pearce said. A strong performance in products that are consumable and the very active Farm Equipment and Energy related markets had a favorable impact on earnings.

Fourth quarter sales were \$48,610,000, or 18 percent below last year. Net earnings were \$1,703,000, or 52 percent lower than 1974. "Lower sales volume, increased costs, and foreign exchange losses accounted for the quarterly drop in earnings," according to Pearce.

The symbol of Thanksgiving is an American tradition of freedom and justice for all. Our children are taught that the Pilgrims fought for personal liberties, but parents no longer seem to teach children the basic principles on which America is founded, and the schools often neglect them.

As we ponder the words of the beautiful hymn, America the Beautiful, let us consider the phrase "And crown Thy good with brotherhood", and make it our Thanksgiving prayer.

If all of us in Buchanan will practice what we proclaim to be the true American spirit of Thanksgiving, then Buchanan will indeed become a fine place in which to live.

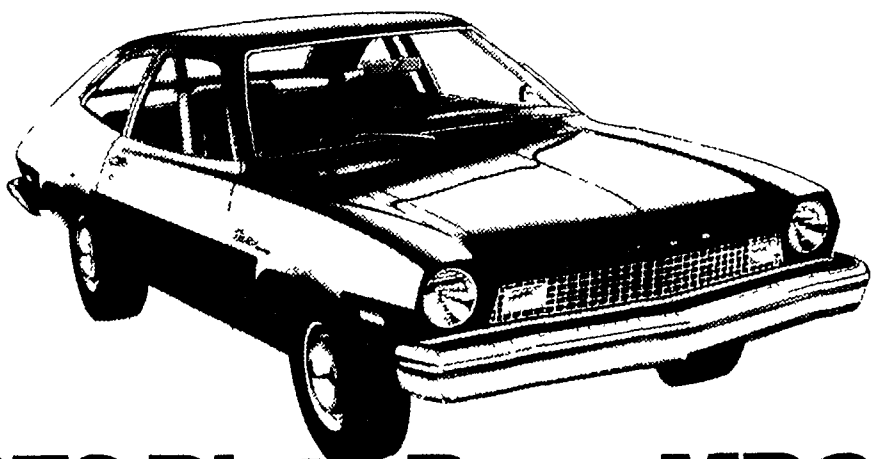

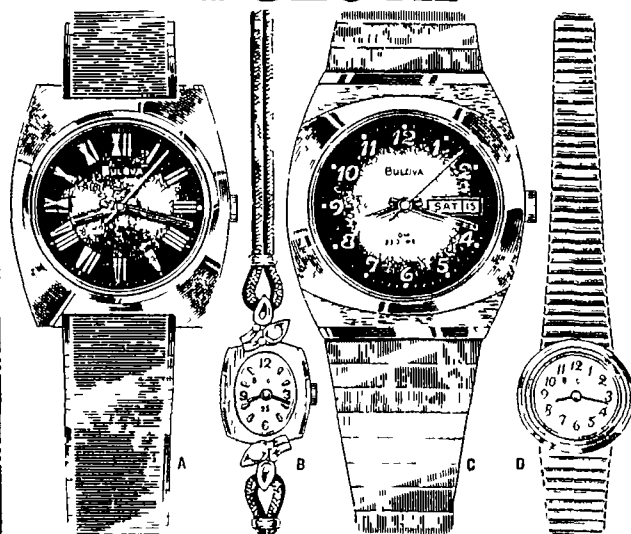
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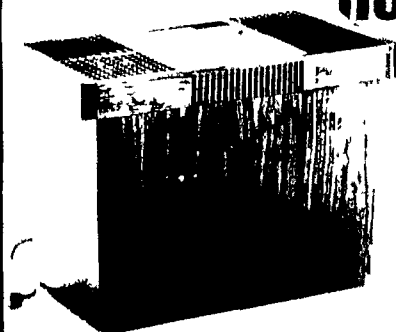

Food Truths and Untruths How to Separate Them

On any day of any week, you can walk up to a rack of women's magazines and find several articles about food.

A Harvard nutritionist, a New York doctor or the food expert from a Washington-based consumer interest group may have written his or her views about the dangers of vitamin overdose, a new pounds-and-inches-off diet or the benefits of gardening the organic way.

All of the articles appear in established supposedly responsible publications. All of them are logical and scientific-sounding. But each of them contradicts something recently proclaimed by some other "expert" in some other equally well known magazine.

You, as the consumer of this information, are left in the middle of a quandary. Which expert do you believe? How can you sort the food truths from the food fallacies?

"Start by considering the source of the information," advises Anita Dean, Extension Foods and Nutrition Specialist at Michigan State University.

"A professor of nutrition at a well known university, a spokesman for the federal Food and Drug Administration, a member of the American Dietetic Association, or the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences will be speaking from a sound base of scientific knowledge about nutrition and health," she says.

A string of letters following a person's name can indicate anything from a doctorate in biochemistry to a bachelor's degree in the history of art to a nonsense title like "Doctor of Body Ecology." Even a medical degree is no guarantee the writer is knowledgeable about nutrition.

Be wary about accepting information from someone who has something to sell. The author of a new diet book or the promoter of a line of "health foods" may be more concerned about the state of his pocketbook than about the state of your health.

Well-meaning friends can be a source of unreliable information, too -- especially if they tend to believe everything they read. Unless your friend happens to be a trained nutritionist, he or she is in no better position to give

nutrition advice than your paper boy.

A sure giveaway of food fakery is a claim that eating a food or certain combination of foods will give you perfect health, everlasting youth or easy weight loss without exercise or calorie-counting. Other warning signs are claims that the "expert" is being persecuted by "establishment" organizations -- the FDA, the American Dietetic Association, etc.

Steer away from the person who promises you can cure or prevent arthritis, cancer or other medical conditions with diet. Such claims are false and misleading and can even become a threat to health. A person may try to doctor himself with "health foods" instead of getting medical attention. By the time he realizes the diet isn't working, it may be too late.

The best way to avoid the traps of food misinformation is to arm yourself with as much reliable information as you can gather. Then take your questions about a new wonder food or easy-does-it diet to your County Extension Home Economist, the food specialists at a nearby university or your physician, Mrs. Dean advises. They're the real experts.

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Buchanan Families To Be Questioned

Half of the families in Buchanan will be surveyed in December. To fill requirements for the second year's application for community development funds, every other family in town will be questioned. The information needed is the size of the families, ages of the children, cost of houses and whether they are owned or rented, amount of taxes and insurance paid, cost of utilities and how much mortgage is on them. Questions about income groups will be asked but the interviewers won't urge any body to divulge anything they don't want to.

In addition to be a requirement for applying for funds the information is expected to be useful in updating the city's master plan and to assist the city in upgrading the whole community.

The survey team still needs more interviewers who will be paid by the interview. Anyone interested in part time work of this nature may contact the Buchanan city hall.

New Place To Take Cookies For Veterans

Mrs. Kenneth Gearhart is now acting as a go-between and gathering place for articles for the veterans in the Battle Creek Veterans Hospital. For many years Mrs. Harry Banke served in this capacity. When she indicated she felt the time had come for her to stop, Mrs. Gearhart accepted the responsibility.

Articles are picked up at her home the third Wednesday of each month and delivered directly to Battle Creek. Homemade cookies and candy are favorites with the veterans and any quantity will be gladly received. Mrs. Gearhart says that magazines are another welcome item as well as anything people would like to send for day to day use by men -- any small necessities do much to brighten their lives.

This makes a worthwhile activity for clubs. One of the home economics clubs in this area has made it a project and the members take turns seeing that some cookies are ready each month for the pickup.

Mrs. Gearhart lives at 201 North Oak and asks that people use the Dewey Street entrance since there is also an apartment. She will also be glad to answer questions if anyone wishes to call her for more information. She stresses that while the next pickup is December 17 and things are needed then for the veterans Christmas, they need to be remembered all year around -- many of them may well feel forgotten at other times.

She also adds that cookies, etc should reach her by Tuesday as the truck may come quite early and suggests that people do not leave them more than a week in advance.

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Class Has Bug Project

The third grade room of Mrs Phyllis Amiel at Moccasin School has a science project the whole class has developed interest in. It began in September when David Jessweim found a lady bug nest and brought it to school. Sometime later another nest was found by Kevin Freehling.

As the class often does, it called upon the school librarian, Mrs Entenman, for information. She responded beyond the call of duty by doing some research outside school and contacting Penny DeWitt at the USDA laboratory on U S 31. Penny supplied the class with a cage, beetles and gymsum plants. The beetles lay eggs on the underside of the leaves and these are then eaten by the lady bugs.

The class was then referred by Penny to Dr Bath and George Thottappilly at MSU's Department of Entomology. They sent aphid cultures (aphids are the primary food of lady bugs), broad leaf bean plants and seeds for future germination of more plants. Mr Thottappilly also said he'd be glad to help with any further questions and wished them luck.

It is the hope of the class at this time that if the lady bug colony thrives and is still living in the spring that the bugs can be transferred to the school farm where the third grade will be planting next year.

The class has a study lamp and maintains a temperature of 70 to 80 degrees so the lady bugs will not hibernate as is normal for them. The nests, which have now been removed after serving their purpose of transporting the colony to the classroom, are where the bugs would normally hibernate.

Completes Course

Army Private Clifford C Carson, son of Mr and Mrs Louie Bruno, 510 East Arctic, Buchanan, completed the seven-week basic field artillery (cannoneer) course at the U S Army Field Artillery Training Center, Ft Sill, Oklahoma.

By James Clavell

This is a whopper of a book, two volumes in fact. It's one of those rambling novels where everything could be said faster and in fewer words. It has moments where it's like a soap opera that doesn't seem to progress from day to day.

It deals with Japan at the time when Elizabeth I was queen of England. A few Spaniards and Portuguese have been in Japan, but the hero is one of the first Englishmen.

As is the case with this author, he dwells frequently on the bodily functions of his hero and gives a graphic and repetitious account of his sexual experiences, but this is done with a little more restraint than in earlier novels.

By Agatha Christie

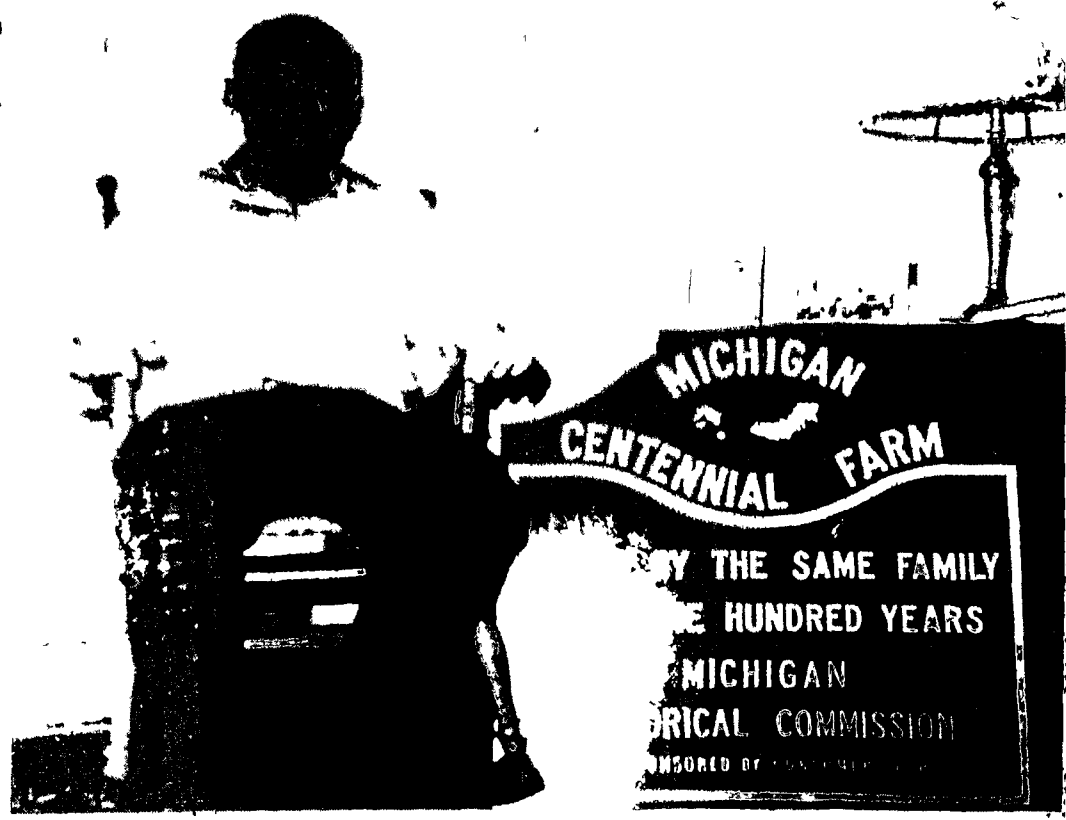
This book was written in 1940 but wasn't published until now. It's not really a typical Christie. This was the one in which she planned to kill off Hercule Poirot.

Named Centennial Farm

Edwin Marsh of Route 1, Buchanan, has lived on Tabor Road all his lifetime, having moved into his present farm home when he was one year old. His farm, recently named as a Centennial Farm by the Michigan History Division of the department of state, amply qualifies for that honor.

The first Marsh to hold title was his great grandfather Melancthon Marsh who arrived in 1845 from New York State and purchased a 20 acre tract for his family. He built a log cabin in which the family lived until the present farmhouse was constructed in 1853. He continued to farm the land until Edward Marsh took title in May, 1866 followed in April, 1875 by Edward's brother Dewey. Dewey Marsh retained the property until April, 1915 when Stanley Marsh became the owner. In October, 1940, Stanley changed the title to deed it jointly to himself, his wife Maybell and son Edwin, the present owner.

Over the years the number of acres has been increased considerably and the house has been remodeled extensively. Edwin Marsh farmed the ground for

many years and still farms some of it, renting out the remaining to others for farming.

For the past ten years Marsh has been a substitute rural mail carrier and one day a week he delivers on the 60 mile long Route 1 which starts out on the East side of the river near town and goes clear up to his own area winding through the beautiful countryside.

Another interest of Marsh's is photography. He has some interesting aerial photos of the area he has taken on airplane jaunts with a young friend of his who is a student at Andrews. The family homestead, the fields of fruit trees, Cook Nuclear Center and the Five Corners all make interesting appearance from the air and are something Melancthon Marsh never even dreamed of.

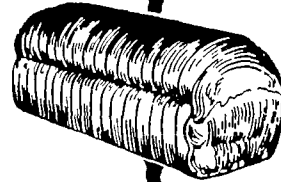

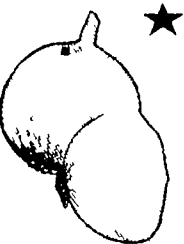

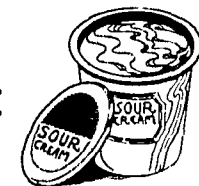

United Way Wraps Up 1975 Drive

The Buchanan United Way closed out their year short of their goal. Over 87 percent of the goal of \$53,963 was reached for a total of \$47,393.

The shortage made it necessary to cut back the appropriations in individual agencies, and an austerity grant of \$45,393 was developed.

The grant for Berrien County Cancer Service was cut from \$6800 to \$6000. Riverwood Mental Health Center will receive \$850 instead of \$1200. Gateway, Inc. was cut from \$2000 to \$1000. Handicapped Camping stayed the same at \$43.

The grant for Child and Family Services was cut from \$2300 to \$2000, and Big Brothers from \$2000 to \$1800. Salvation Army was cut from \$2400 to \$2100. Christmas basket money stayed the same at \$200. Girl Scouts were cut from \$5900 to \$4900, and Boy Scouts from \$5500 to \$5000. The Niles-Buchanan YMCA was cut from \$3000 to \$2500.

The Michigan United Way will receive \$5000 instead of \$6320, and Red Cross was cut from \$7800 to \$6500. A reserve for collection losses was cut \$1000 to \$3000.

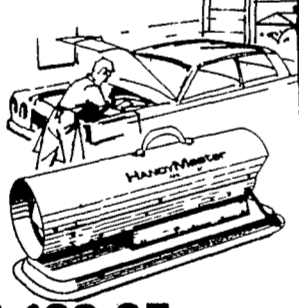

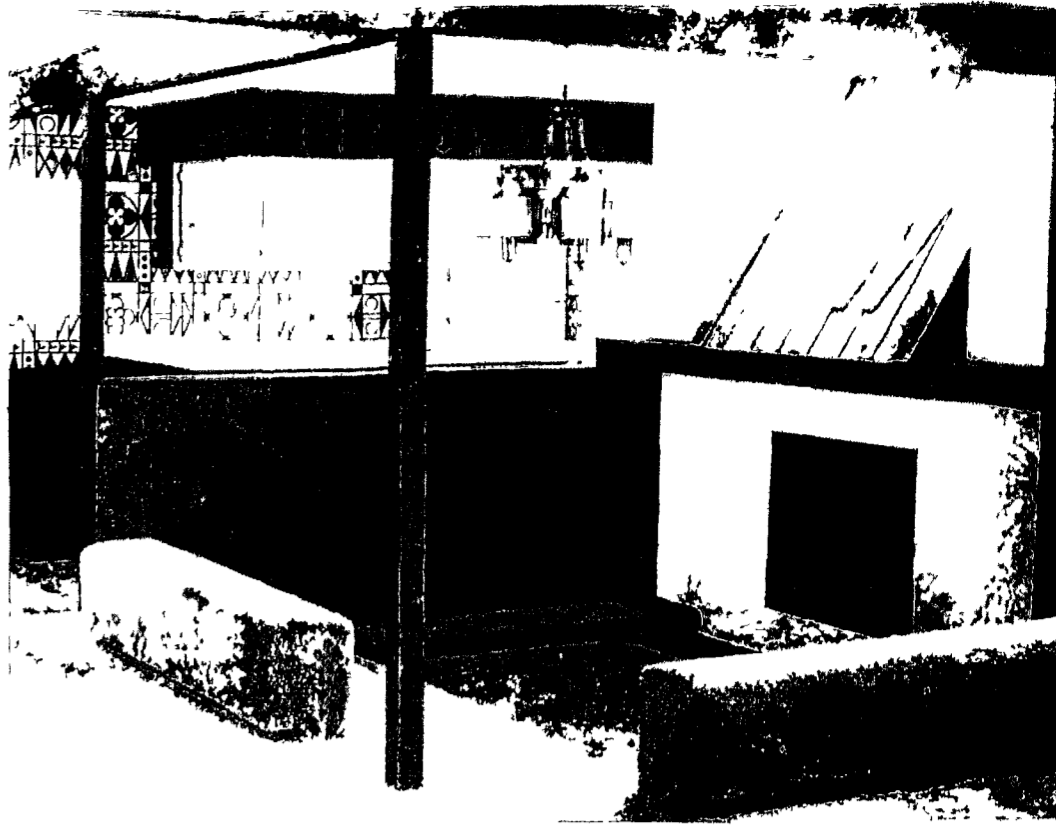
Seeks Volleyball Team

City Wants Schirmer Parkway Surface Fixed

The city commission heard explanations from their engineering consultant as to why the riding surface of Schirmer Parkway wasn't smoother. They finally voted Monday to instruct the engineer to have the contractor either repair the pavement by grinding it down or to replace it.

Change orders for the Charles Court Bridge were accepted and a final payment of \$20,153.13 was approved. In considering the replacing of other bridges the question came up if there might be state funds to help such projects, and it was decided to look into it.

A long, ponderous municipal tree ordinance was adopted, which will enable the city to control the trimming and care of the trees in the tree laws.

It was decided to continue having a crossing guard on North Redbud at the recommendation of the chief of police, although an earlier notice had been given that the guard would be discontinued.

The commission accepted the new agreement worked out by the landfill authority in case of deficit payments by the municipalities. This will be figured in proportion to population instead of use of the landfill.

Because of certain additions to this year's budget, it was necessary to revise the budget. The new contract for taking care of the trees added \$6,500, and the middle school improvements needed \$14,838 more to be budgeted. In addition the item of \$31,472 for the Charles Court bridge was included. All of this was done by transfers from one account to another and by additional revenues received.

The city had bids from four companies for police cars. After considerable discussion it was decided to table the purchase of cars until more study was made.

To prepare the way for possible sale of a lot at the end of Sylvan, the commission passed a resolution to establish a right of way for a cul de sac at the end of the street and authorized the city manager to advertise for bids for the lot (number 28) with the right to reject any or all bids.

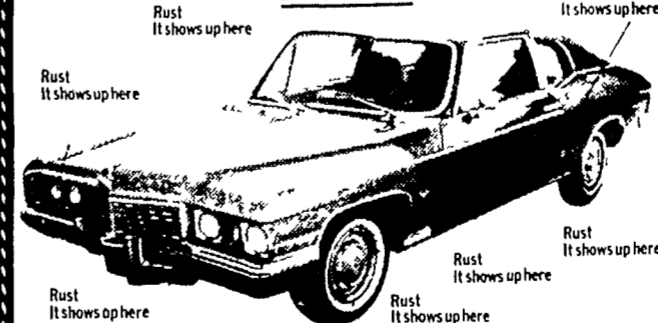

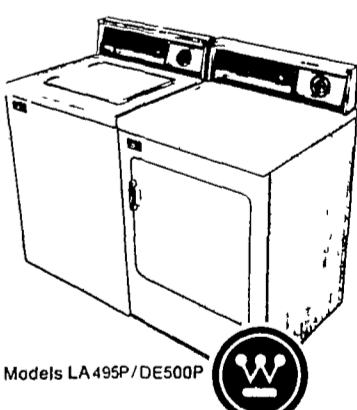

Announce Snowmobile Safety Training Class

A new law went into effect on January 1, 1975, governing the operation of snowmobiles by youngsters through the age of 16. The law states that a person between 12 and 16 years of age is not permitted to operate a snowmobile in Michigan unless:

- He has in his possession a snowmobile safety certificate,
- Or, he is under the direct supervision of a person who is 18 or older,
- Or, he is on land owned or under the control of his parents or legal guardian,
- A person under 12 may not operate a snowmobile without direct supervision of an adult except on lands owned or under the control of a parent or guardian.

I just received that annual bundle of cheer in the mail—my federal income tax forms! This year, I want to make very sure that I get all the refunds and deductions I'm entitled to, but the problem is that the instruction pamphlet which comes with the form is too sketchy for my needs. Where can I get more information?

Of course, you could consult an attorney or a certified public accountant in whom you have confidence. You may also get answers to specific questions by calling or writing your local IRS office. In addition, you may wish to obtain a 92-page booklet available from the IRS entitled "Your Federal Income Tax." In past years, a charge was made for this particular publication, now it's free.

For your copy, write to your local IRS office or stop by and pick one up.

It seems that a lot of Congressmen and Senators retired this last year. Was that some kind of record?

Farm Bureau Services sponsors the Cooperative Research Farms tour periodically," said Feed Department Manager Donald Shepard, "to bring field representatives up to date on current feeding practices, new research data, and modern technical developments.

They will in turn communicate the feeding knowledge to farmers whom we serve as a farm-owned cooperative, and who have charged their cooperative with maintaining a leadership position in livestock and poultry feeding.
