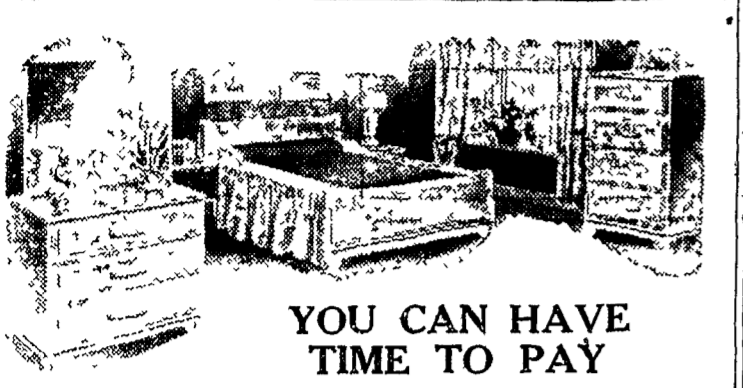

Letter To The People:

ATTENTION MR. CLARE HOFFMAN: "Number One Slippery Question Dodger"

At the debate at the Benton Harbor High School Sunday, October 22, 1944, they asked for questions. I, being a farmer of the Fourth District, asked Mr. Hoffman if he voted for the appropriation for Rural Electrification and if not why? His answer was he did not vote for Rural Electrification and said he did not want to vote for anything that would tax some of the people and not benefit the rest.

Do the voters of the Fourth District know that money voted by Congress for the purpose of bringing Rural Electrification service to the farmers of our nation is loaned to co-operatives on which they pay their interest and principal every thirty days? We have served 38,043 farm homes in the State of Michigan in the past six years and will serve the rest as soon as labor and material is available.

Up to this date there are 815 R. E. A. projects in the United States which have paid their interest to date and \$17,000,000 in advance in addition to regular required payments.

We would have had at least 50,000 farm families served by this time if it had not been for the war. That means 50,000 women released from the scrub boards to the electric washers in the State of Michigan, a benefit on which Mr. Hoffman voted NO. If Mr Hoffman had had his way 50,000 farmers—would have been pumping water by hand and 50,000 farmers would have been milking their cows by hand in the dark. Those who now get electricity have besides all the other electric appliances.

Does it seem possible that any man running for Congress in a rural district could or would be so narrow minded to vote against the people who elected him to office?

Mr. Hoffman also voted NO in 1934 on the appropriation for funds for Rural Electrification for the rest of our farm families that have not got electric service. He also voted NO on most all of the fine programs this administration brought to the farmers.

Let's give our friend, Mr Foley, a chance to serve the farmers of the Fourth District.

154 Children Aided by Court During October

The monthly report of Probate Judge Malcolm Hatfield reveals that a total of 154 children passed through the juvenile division of the court during October. Judge Hatfield attributes the sharp decline in the number of so-called delinquency cases to the intensive work being done by rural, city, public and parochial schools alike in meeting the individual needs of each problem child.

White Judge Hatfield also noted a substantial decline among petitions asking for investigations of neglected children, he stated that a total of 18 such cases throughout October was altogether too high for a county the size of Berrien. In various other categories such as crippled and afflicted children, traffic violators, run-aways, parole and probation violators and adoptions, there was little change over the preceding nine months of 1944.

In the probate division of the court, 39 deceased, 2 mentally incompetent guardianship and seven guardianship of minor's estates were closed. However, 41 new

deceased and five new guardianship estates were opened.

During October, Judge Hatfield approved inheritance tax payments of \$10,719.08 and computed new inheritance taxes in the amount of \$15,435.35. Intangible tax payments were ordered paid which totaled \$183.07. Throughout the month the court took under advisement 214 petitions and heard 26 contested cases. New administrators and guardians bonds amounting to \$187,000.00 were approved and are now in full force and effect along with other fiduciary bonds totalling \$4,265,000.00. Such bonds protect only personal property and not the real estate that is now passing through the Probate Court.

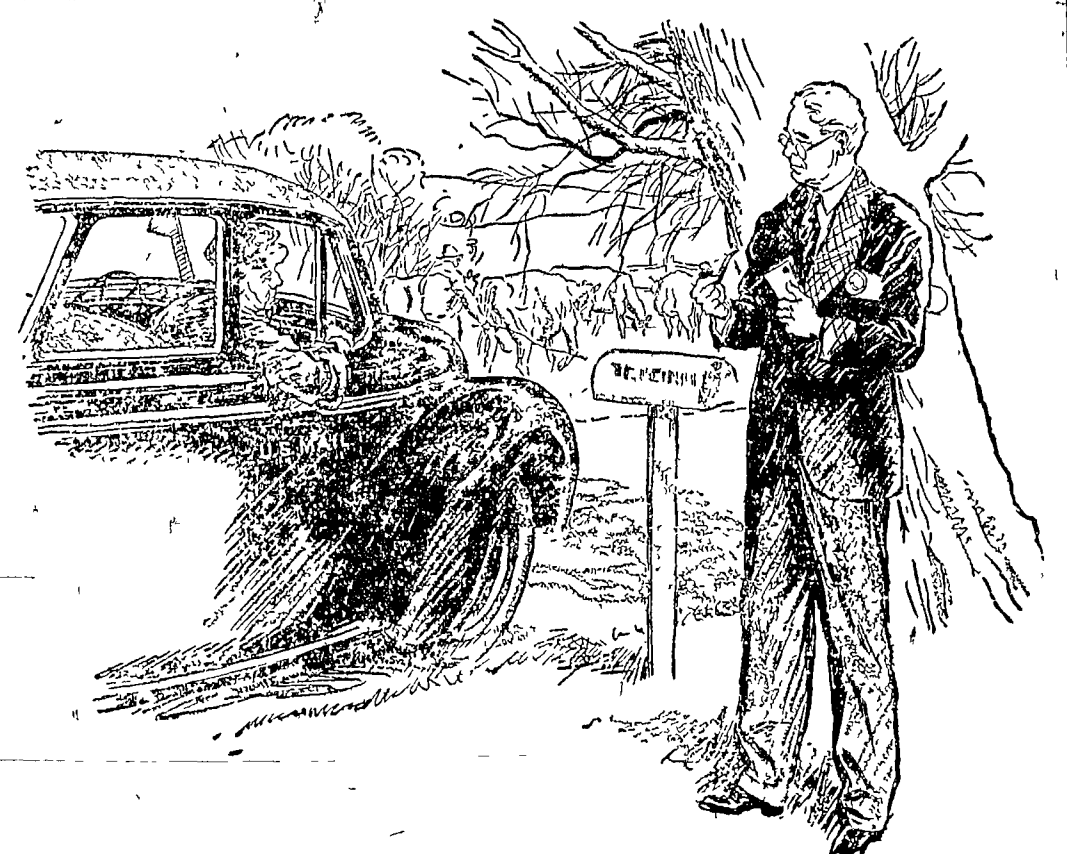

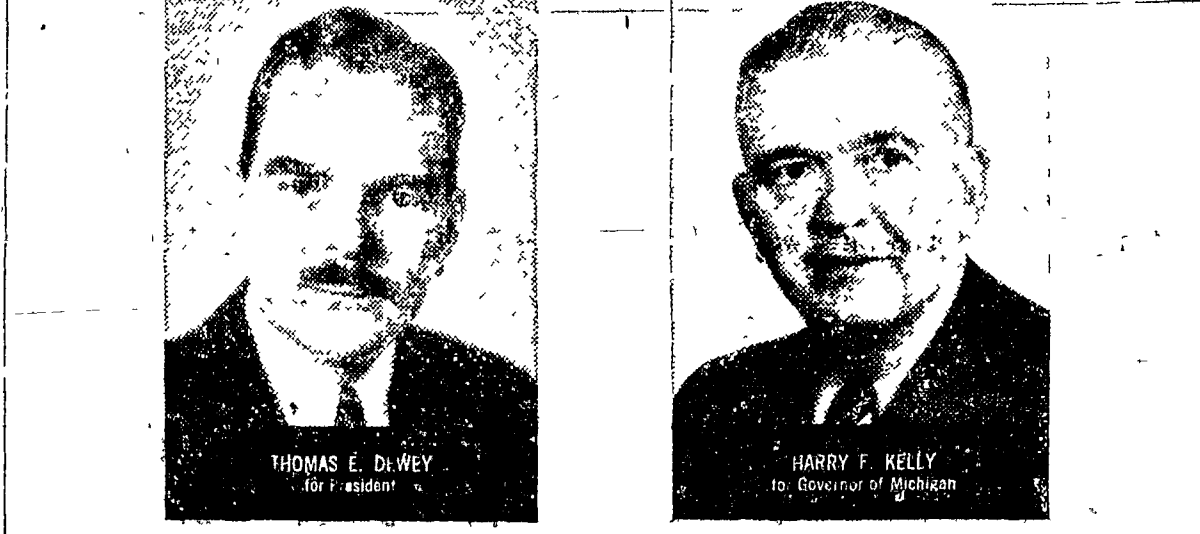

Open Letter To Judge Hatfield

Judge Malcolm Hatfield, St. Joseph, Michigan. October 30, 1944

Happenings of the past two months, and especially of the past three weeks, lead me to write this letter to correct certain statements you are spreading over the county about me in connection with your campaign for re-election as Probate Judge. At the same time I want to make clear why I cannot support you for re-election. The fact is, I am now fully convinced that the cause of good government in Berrien County will be greatly advanced by your defeat. And I am now working for the election of Al Hastings.

My reasons for this action are: The least we citizens should expect in an office holder is trustworthiness. Example 1. I have heard the following story from four sections of the county: "Artman much wanted appointment to the position of Juvenile Agent; and he is sore because I (Judge Hatfield) would not give him the job. Hence, he is opposing my re-election."

The facts: Two days after the primary you called me by phone and asked why I was opposing you in the campaign. I told you why and I stated I would continue to oppose you.

Two weeks later you phoned me and offered the job of Juvenile Agent. This came as a great surprise. I told you that I could not and would not consider the job. Of course, I assumed that you were trying to influence me.

Example 2. You started a story over at Three Oaks to the effect that I had taken three different boys—wards of the Juvenile Court—each to become a member of my family; and that I had worked these boys so hard that you had to take them away from me.

This story does not tell the facts. First, let it be understood that there were three boys—one at a time. The first was with us five days; a month later the second boy stayed for six days; four months later the third boy remained for a few days. Now if I worked the first boy too hard, why did your office phone me and ask me to try the second? And if the second boy was worked too hard, why did your office, four months later, ask me to take and try a third? It seems to me, Judge, that you should think twice before releasing this story.

Example 3. Do you recall, Judge, of speaking some two years ago to the Three Oaks Young Men's Forum? I was present and heard you speak on the Four Emotions which you stated you had found to be controlling factors in delinquency. As I listened I almost fell off my chair. Your defining of the four emotions was taken, word for word, from W. I. Thomas of the University of Chicago. The only change you made was from "wishes" to "emotions." Thomas called them the four wishes. You called them the four emotions. Yet everything used by you was word for word from Thomas. You did not mention his name once to give him credit. You did not even say you were taking the material from someone else. Instead, you left the impression that the four statements were your own superior wisdom.

Such use of other people's work, without giving credit, is unfair. We citizens have a right to expect efficiency in a probate judge. Have you been efficient?

Example 1. Let us consider the three boys again. You know, of course, that I have had years of experience in dealing with delinquency and courts. When I took each of these boys to my home, my first act was to get the case record from your files—before seeing the boy. I read these carefully typed pages about each boy to note: the boy's bringing-up, the circumstances leading to his difficulties, his treatment by the court. I was greatly surprised to find within two days that case record No. 1 did not fit the actual story of the boy's background and circumstances. I passed this off, thinking that any one will be fooled once. Then came the second boy and his case record proved to be just as misleading as the first. Two case records in a row which did not give the facts! Then, months later came the third boy. He was described in the case record as an orphan—no parents, no brothers, or sisters, not even a distant relative. Yet it came out in a few days that this boy had both father and mother and six brothers and sisters. A whole bevy of aunts, uncles and cousins were thrown in for good measure.

What should one conclude? Three case records in a row—all nicely typed—but none giving the actual circumstances of the boy in question. Under these circumstances how can anyone do for a boy, who is your ward, what will help him? So, Judge, instead of re-electing you, I think you should be defeated.

Example 2. You placed a boy in a Three Oaks home for adoption. (Name on request.) Fifty weeks later these same people were summoned into circuit court and compelled to defend themselves in that court for "restraining and imprisoning" said child. This was the result of your original court order.

Because the custody of this boy had become "too hot" for you to handle, you asked Judge White to act as Probate Judge in the disposition of this case. On December 6, 1935, Judge White found "that said child, _____ shall continue as a ward of this court and that the further consideration of the matter be and is hereby continued to the 2nd day of March, A. D., 1936, at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M., at which time the said mother and the said county agent are hereby directed to appear before this court for the further disposition of said child." Signed by Chas. E. White, Acting Probate Judge.

I am told that this case has never again been brought to court. Isn't it true that during all these years you, and you alone, were responsible for the welfare of this child? During all these years he has been kept under home conditions which the reports of the Juvenile Agent in your own office showed to be anything but the best.

Just two weeks ago the sheriff's office was asked to pick up this boy for delinquency. Doesn't this delinquency belong directly on your doorstep? Do you think any ward of the court should ever have been allowed to live under the conditions which were forced upon this child?

The probate-juvenile court in the county is a vital part of our county governmental system. The judge of this court should be a man of crystal-clear judgment. He should use the court to help the people, not to promote his own ambitions and notoriety.

He is not an attorney, yet he now has a profound knowledge of law as related to the descent and distribution of all types of property. I would not take him along if I were going out for a big night, but if I got into a jam, I would turn to him first of all.

I have pictured the two men, now for the real issue. If you get to feeling that we should go back to the old system and again place our courts under control of the politicians you should NOT vote for Hatfield. On the other hand, if you are proud of a judge who has brought real distinction to Berrien County as a result of the fine job he has been doing then vote for him. It is purely a matter of what is best for the people of the county, not personal liking or ill fellow will met.

I value the friendship of both men. I have nothing to say against either. I have presented the evidence, weight it carefully before you decide and then vote for the best interests of the community and yourself. (Donated by the Non-Partisan Judiciary Committee.)


