Four thousand feet of air an hour! and yet there are multitudes who sleep with closed doors and windows in rooms which do not contain a thousand cubic feet of space, and that thousand feet is to last all night. At

To the Editor of the Chicago Evening Journal: The object of the expedition of which I am a member is well known to the readers of your paper, and anything regarding it is unnecessary at this time. Our boats having arrived at Green River City, on the Union Pacific Railroad, were launched on the 24th of May, and loaded with the freight, consisting of the instruments nec-essary for the scientific work of the expedition,
