KEEP UP YOUR COWS.—Marshal Smith says the ordinance requiring cows to be kept up will be strictly enforced, and that all cows found running at large contrary to the Village ordinance will be impounded. This is right, and we trust the Marshal will rigidly enforce the law in the case.

THE ECLIPSE.—Our readers, of course, will not forget the great eclipse on Saturday next, Aug. 7th. The public display will commence in this vicinity at about 4:15 P. M. and close at 6:15 P. M. A good plan to observe the eclipse is to prepare a glass for the purpose by smoking with pine resin. Another plan is stated by the New York Post as follows: "Take a large card with a small round hole in the centre, and hold it against the sun's rays, so that the shadow will fall on the floor, pavement, wall, or other dark and smooth surface. In the middle of the shadow there will be a true image of the sun, and the eclipse can be studied in its progress without straining the eyes, and without smutting the face or hands with smoked glass. The simple process was suggested by the familiar circumstance, that the light spots in the shadows, during a solar eclipse, take the shape of the luminous portions of the sun's disc; and the perforated card has been used with perfect success."

From Wessaw. Editor Record.—The Railroad excitement having passed, the good people of Wessaw thought that peace would once more reign on this once happy community; but "was designed" to be otherwise. The Township Treasurer, Mr. Samuel Smith, having failed to live up to the full requirements of the law, as laid down in our Statutes, and there being a difference of opinion in regard to the Railroad question, between Smith and the Supervisor, Mr. Alonzo Sherwood, he (Sherwood) concluded he would have a little fun, or revenge; that then was the time for it, and he would strike while the iron was hot. And accordingly a meeting of the Board was called, and a new Treasurer appointed. From Three Oaks. July 3, 1869. Editor Record.—Business in our place is improving. The farmers are again beginning to show their smiling faces once more, after having a good harvest of wheat. RAILROAD MATTERS are quiet. Occasionally see some of the good people of New Buffalo in our place. I hope they may come often. I only wish that the two rival R. R. towns may grow to good sized cities. The funeral services of Mr. J. W. Smith were held at the new Baptist church on last Sabbath. A very able and interesting discourse was preached by Eld. Van Wyck, of New Buffalo. The church was filled to overflowing. I have often been at funerals, when I thought presented itself to my mind, are not the Americans showing a dereliction of duty, in not attending funerals more freely, especially in following the remains of departed friends and neighbors to their last resting place, the grave. Perhaps it may be said, or thought, that in a few years an American could not receive a decent burial, from the aid of his own countrymen. 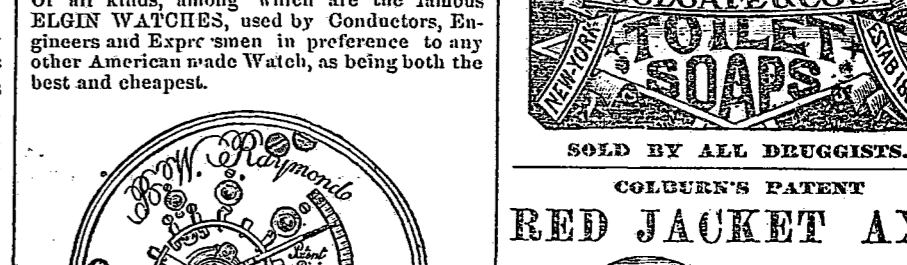

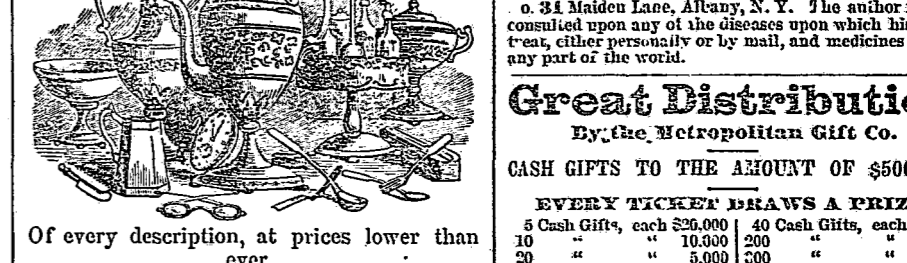

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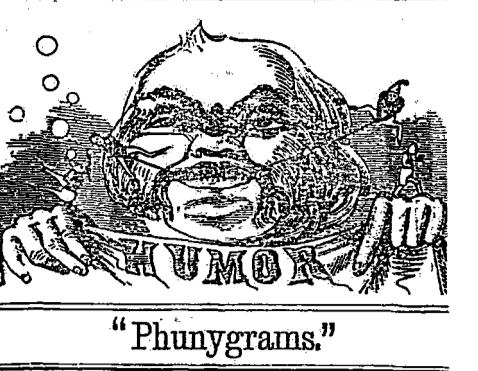
