Lay a Fainting Person Down.

It is surprising how eagerly everybody ushes at a fainting person, and strives to raise him up, and especially to keep the head erect. There must be an instinctive apprehension that if a person seized with a fainting or other fit fall into the recumbent position, death is more imminent. I must have driven a mile to-day, while a lady, fainting was held upright. I found her pulseless, white, and apparently dying, and I believe if I had delayed ten minutes longer that she would really have died. I laid her head down on a lower level than her body, and immediately color returned to her lips and cheeks, and she became conscious. To the excited group of friends I said: "Always remember this fact—namely: fainting is caused by a want of blood in the brain; the heart ceases to act with sufficient force to send the usual amount of blood to the brain, and hence

the person loses consciousness because the

function of the brain ceases. Restore the son recovers. Now, though the blood is propelled to all parts of the body by the action of the heart, yet it is still under the laws of gravitation. In the erect position, the blood ascends to the head against gravitation, and the supply of the brain is diminished, as compared with the recumbent position, the heart's pulsation being equal. If, then, you place a person in a sitting position whose heart has nearly ceased to beat, his brain will fail to receive blood, while if you lay him down, with the head lower than the heart, blood will run into the brain by the mere force of gravity; and in fainting, in sufficient quantity to restore consciousness. Indeed, nature teaches us how to manage fainting persons, for they always fall, and frequently are restored by the recumbent position into which they are thrown."-From Note Book of an Em-

Diamond was cast in a Baltimore foundry; and lastly, brilliant, in which it takes 4,000 of the letter to make a pound, and which is but a twentieth of an inch deep, is the production of a type cutter in Berlin. SENATOR HOWARD.

The Memphis & El Paso Railroad Another Card from Senator Howard. The controversy between Senator Jacob M. Howard and the New York Tribune. about the action taken by Mr. Howard on the Pacific Railroad bills brought before the Senate committee, closes with the following letter, which was published in the-Tribune of Thursday. - Detroit Post. "To the Editor of the Tribune: "SIR -In your issue of the 5th inst.

you judged me guilty of getting the Memphis & El Paso joint resolution referred to the Pacific Railroad Committee of the Senate, 'and there holding it, in defiance of justice and fairness, thus denying to the Senate an opportunity to pass on the bill. Your charge was positive and unequivocal. And yet, in reply to my note denying it, you found yourself obliged to retract it, as being unsustained by the facts. You, however, assert in your reply of the 17th inst., that I threatened to talk the session out if the Senate should consent to take it up.' To prove this threat, you quote my brief remarks in the Senate, made in the afternoon before the day of adjournment, in which I opposed Mr. Morton's motion to take it up-taking good care not to quote those of any other Senator who opposed it. My remarks contained, in fact, no such threat, and no intimation that I intended to "talk the session out," as any one will see who reads them. So this charge is eqally unsupported by the facts of the case.

"In the course of your reply you say, 'We have built one through line of Pacific roads, with sundry parts, and branches at least one of which (we mean the Atchison) should never have got through an honest committee.' This seems to be a reflection upon the Pacific Railroad Committee of the Senate. If that was your intention, you will again pardon me for correcting you. The Atchison branch was provided for in the 13th section of the original Pacific Railroad act of July 1st, 1862. It was in Mr. Campbell's original House bill of March 14 of that year. The clause underwent but two amendments in the Senate, one requiring this branch to pass via Atchison, the other allowing it to pass, with the assent of the Legislature of Kansas, directly west from St. Joseph, Mo. These amendments were the work of no. committee, but of the Senate in regular session. This action was had late in June. 1862, and the Senate Committee on the Pacific Railroad, of which I am chairman. was not created until December. 1863. They therefore are not chargeable with the committee, whether honest or dishonest.

"This leaves the matter between you and me to stand solely upon the ground that I-opposed Mr. Morton's motion to take up the bill the afternoon before the adjournment, for the reason that it would have led to a debate which we had not time to go into. No one need be told that such postponements even of bills of the highest importance, are of very frequent occurrence in legislative bodies; and to say of a member who simply alleges want of time on such an occasion, that he is using 'tactics if not quibbles,' (as your reply says of me), is quite gratuitous. Perhaps I should be more correct in saying that in your view my fault lay not in alleging want of time, but in not advocating and giving my vote for the bill outright. "Acting Secretary." "ALBANY, September 3, 1869. 'Sin: I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of the 30th of August, received here vesterday, requesting me to forward to your Department 'a certified copy in the usual form of the action of the Legislature of New York upon the fifteenth proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States.*

"The action of the Legislature was, by concurrent resolution, not submitted to the Executive for approval, nor was he directed or requested to promulgate the same. "In all previous instances of proposed amendments, save one, a formal bill was passed which, like all other bills, was submitted to the Executive, and in the exceptional instance I find no record in this De partment of any Executive action.

"In accordance with your request, however, I enclose a copy of the resolution, signed by the clerks of the two houses. "Very respectfully, your obedient serv't, "JOHN T. HOFFMAN."

Thus, like Captain Scott's coon, Governor Hoffman instantly came down when he found a National gun pointing in his direction. Thereat the New York World, which had exultingly proclaimed that Governor Hoffman would not forward the documents, and New York would not be counted as a ratifying State, boils over in a column and a half of indignant hifalutin. It examines the laws and the constitution, and finds no authority under which "the Assistant Secretary of State" is empowered to make such a request of a Governor. This amount together with other means on hand and will be sufficient to finish, iron and equip the 1st Division of the road, from New Buffalo to St. Joseph. Mr. Field's Body Found—Evidences that he was Murdered. The following from Chicago gives the latest information regarding the Manistee

murder ; "GHICAGO, Sept. 20.—The body of Herbert Field, the missing Manistee banker, was found on the 18th inst., on the lake shore, near Frankfort, 25 miles north of Manistee, where it had drifted by the rapid black and the shore of t id lake current, which was known to have set north with great force at the time of his disappearance, one week ago Sunday. Three ghastly wounds, evidently made with some blunt instrument, were found on the head of the body, and a rope was around the neck. Field was dressed

as when last seen. The body was brought to Manistee, coroners's inquest held, and a verdict rendered that Field came to his death at the hands of George Vanderpool, his partner. Vanderpool was at once re-arrested and put in jail. Fears are entertained that he will be lynched, as the people are much excited over the occurrence."

Sir John Franklin. Reported Finding of a Document Revealing the Fate of his Expedition. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.-A party, who is vouched for as reliable, writes from San Buenavontua, that a document was found on the beach at that, place, August 30th, the finder to forward it to the Secretary of Admiralty at London, or the British Consul in the nearest port. The request is printed in six commercial languages on the margin. Every vacant portion s filled with writing relating to Sir John Franklin and his party. The document was evidently cast into the water in latitude 69 degrees, 37 minutes, 42 seconds: longitude 98 degrees, 4 minutes, 5 seconds. It gives an account of the desertion of the ships Erebus and Terror. The party numbered 105, and at the time of desertion was under command of F. R. W. Crossier. They succeeded in reaching the above latitude, where they found relies of the late Sir John Ross. It states that the party wintered at Beecher Island in 1846 and 1847, and Sir John Franklin died on the 11th of June, 1847. It contains many interesting incidents connected with the expedition.
