"I was summoned back by the friends of the President to secure his acquittal. It seemed a foregone conclusion that he should be convicted, and I had given it up as sure, and I thought it would be better for our party if they would convict him; therefore I had stayed away and let events take their course. I still believe that if they had convicted and removed Johnson we would have elected our President last year. Johnson's friends thought I could manage certain Senators who were committed for impachment, and sent for me accordingly. I don's remember who I first saw, but had conversations with McCulloch, Randall, Seward, and others. They seemed to think the matter could be got over easily. I told them it was desperate. They wanted to know how much it would cost to secure an acquittal. I told them it would cost a good deal of money; couldn't is would cost a good deat of money; could to say exactly, but probably \$150,000. I distinct-ly said I would have nothing whatever to do with the money, nor did I have. I told them that there would be an investigation if Johnson was acquitted, and that it would not do for him to handle the money. I don't know who received the money. I understand Randall raised some and McCulloch some. A good deal was raised by outsiders. Henry B. Smythe

raised quite a sum. A good deal t ut was raised never was used for the purpose for which it was given. People raised money, and reported that it had been expended by the counsel, but I doubt if the counsel were ever the pockets of those who raised it. I told them it would cost \$150,000. 

of the appointment of Ex-Secretary Stanton as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, until the telegraph flashed over the country the news of his death. His death was very suddea and unexpected, his family and physician not realizing his danger until a few hours before he died. He died at an early hour on Friday morning.

The memory of Secretary Stanton will go down to the latest ages of the American Republic, as a man of undoubted integrity, and the War Secretary whose herenlean labors aided. to almost boundless extent, the subdaing of the Great Rebellion.

Mr. Stanton was fifty-four years of age; and would doubtless have lived a number of years yet, if his constitation had not been impaired by the duties of his Secretaryship, during the years of the rebellion. His death will, therefore, bring sorrow and sadness to many thousand hearts. Just as he was on the eve of serving his country in one of the most importnever so used. ant trusts, committed to persons in our government, he was cut down. Truly man at best can make but uncertain calculations of events yet future.

Mr. Stanton was of Quaker descent. and in 1833 he entered Kenvon College. In 1836 he was admitted to practice at Columbus, Ohio, and was elected Prosecuting Attorney. In 1839 he was elected reporter of the decisions of the Supreme Court of Ohio, which office he filled till 1842. In 1848 he removed to Pittsburg, where he gained a high reputation as a lawyer, and stood acknowledged at :

the head of the bar of that city. James Buchanan, in 1858, appointed Mr. Stanton Attorney General, to attend to important cases in behalf of the Government in California. During the administration of Buchanan. after Gen. Cass resigned and Attorney General Black became Secretary of State, Mr. Stanton, as Attorney General, no doubt, did much to prevent the vacillating Buchanan going over to secession. Mr. Stanton was ever a firm lover of his country, and stood by it throughout his eventful life.

President Lincoln, in 1862, after the resignation of Secretary Cameron, appointed Mr. Stanton Secretary of War. This act rallied the War Democracy to the support of Mr. Lin-coln. It showed his determination to divest the administration of a partisan political character, having only in view the saving of the Government. How well Mr. Stanton performed his duties as Secretary of War, is known to almost every school boy. His energy in the War office soon dif-fused activity throughout our armies, and movement after movement was made, though not always victorious, it showed that work was the watchword of the new Secretary. Everything moved on, so far as the Secretary of War was concerned. Men, arms, and supplies were furnished with such ra-

Debate on the Georgia reconstruction bill

Debate on the Georgia reconstruction bill commenced in the House immediately after the opening of the session. Several Democratic members spoke against the bill, and Messrs. Bingham (Rep., O.,) and Farnsworth (Rep., Ill.,) also opposed it. Mr. Bingham's motion to post-pone further consideration of the bill until the third Wednesday in January was defeated, only two Republicans voting for it. The bill was then passed, yeas 121, mays 51. A resolution extending the recess from the 5th to the 16th of January was agreed to. A joint resolution authorizing the President to make proper preparations for the reception of the remains. of Mr. Peabody was adopted after some debate. 


