ENIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN.

The recent action of the Board of Regents of the State University, is meeting, as it deserves, with general approbation. The following resolution was adopted with but one dissenting voice:

Resolved, That the Board of Regents. recognize the right of every resident of Michigan to the erjoyment of the privileges afforded by the University, and that no rule exists in any of the University statutes for the exclusion of any person from the University, who possesses the requisite literary and moral qualifications.

Messrs. Burt, Estabrook, Gilbert, McGown, Stockwell, Sweezy and Willard voted for the resolution, and Mr. Walker voted against it.

It is to be regretted that every member of the Board of Regents did not yote for the Resolution. It shows that the spirit of progress is not unanimous. But, for all practical purposes. the passage of the Resolution with but one dissenting voice, shows that progress is the watchword of Michigan in her first, and justly celebrated Institution of learning.

The passage of the resolution-the throwing wide open the doors of this | thing but love." institution to all classes of citizens, without regard to race, color or sex, is but a simple act of justice. That woman should have all the advantages of education equal with man, there is, or at least ought to be, no one to oppose. The days of the oppression of woman is almost gone, and all her just claims will soon be acknowledged. It is, then, with no small degree of approbation, that the friends of progress, not only in Michigan, but all over the country, note the action of the Board of Regents of the Michigan University.

THE PARDONING POWER.

The action of Governor Palmer, of Illinois, in commuting the sentence of Walch, the notorious wife-murderer, is creating general comment upon the pardoning power. Walch was a notorious criminal, and had been tried and convicted. His sentence to be executed gave great satisfaction to the law-abiding citizens of that State. Now that the Governor has commuted his sentence to imprisonment for life, there is a general cry against the action of the Executive.

It certainly appears to us that the time has come when the pardoning power should be somewhat restricted. The public security would undoubtedly be enhanced, if this power was lodged with the Legislature, instead of with the Governor. It would be a security against the hasty exercise of this power, which, in our judgment, should only be used for the very best of reasons.

In the exercise of this power the Governor almost always acts upon testimony and reasons alone offered by one side. If the power is to be left with the Executive, it would be desirable, that in all cases where petitions, praying for pardon or commutation of sentence, are to be examined, that due notice be given thereof. This being done, parties, who might feel that the interest of the public demanded the carrying out of the full extent of the sentence, could also be heard, and in many cases, prevent the exercise of Executive clemency to the great injury and danger of an out-raged public.

BEET SUGAR.

The experiments are being made in some ocalities, and the results seem to be of the most satisfactory kind. It seems to us that no other enterprise offers greater inducements in this lopeople; authorizing the election of State officality than the manufacture of beet cers provided by said constitution, and memsugar. We give the following exbers of Congress, approved April 10, 1869; tracts, one from a Wisconsin paper, therefore, be it e the other from a California paper:

"Col. Farrington, of this city, has just returned from Fond du Lac, where he has has been visiting the beet sugar factory.

He brings specimens of sugar. One is a beautiful light brown, a very lively grain, worth fourteen cents per pound, and the other is letter A coffee.' It is delicious, and cannot be distinguished from the best cane sugar, The brown fastes new. just as any sugar does fresh from the mill. The beets are first shoveled into a washer, where they are cleaned, and hoisted to the second story and ground up. The juice is sent from here down to the centrifugal boiler, in the first story, where it is boiled a certain number of hours and run off into

the defecation pans. It is cooled, settled, and run through a box of animal charcoal (burnt bones), into evaporation pans, and then put into a receiver called a 'vacuum." which, like a large churn,, separates the pure sugar from other matter.

"The Colonel describes the factory as a building 20x60 feet, two stories high, with sheds attached. It is located near the railway, in the city, and the water is furnished by an artesian well. There are twenty workmen in the factory, and none of them know anything of the manufacture of sugar, save what they have learned from the proprietors. The manufactory turns

out about 1,200 pounds every twenty-four hours. The demand for the sugar is unlimited, and is sold to Fond du Lac merchants before it was fairly cold. The Colonel believes, from his observation. that capital invested in a sugar manufactory, will double itself every year."-Journal (Madison, Wis., Dec. 23d.)

Pennsylvania stands next to the Empire State, and prints 495 papers. Illinois has 415; Ohio, 377; Indiana, 269; Missouri, 240; Iowa, 228; Wisconsin, 216, and Massachusetts only 219. ETHEMON.

Of the two hundred publications issued in the State of Michigan there are twelve daily papers, over 150 weeklies, one semimonthly, 15 monthly publications, 2 quarterlies, and on annual. Of this number. 18 are published in Wayne county, 12 in Washtenaw, 9 in Berrien, (4 being in the village of Buchanan,) 9 in Calhoun, 7 in Kent, 6 in Genessee, 5 in each of the counties of Saginaw, Kalamazoo, St. Joseph and Ingham, and 4 in Oakland. In the whole of Great Britian, only S9 daily newspapers are published, of which 22 are published in London; while in New York State there are 77 daily papers, and in Pennsylvania, 49.




