THE ONEIDA AND BOMBAY.

The slaking of the United States War Steame: Oucida by the British Steamer Bombay, and the conduct of Capt. Eyre, of the Bombay, on the occasion, is a sed commentary on his humanity, and is, to our mind, a clear case of criminal Ladifforence.

In the early part of the night of the 24th of January, within sixteen miles of Yokohama, the Oneida was struck by the Rombay and cut to the water's edge. She such in fifteen minutes, only fully-five out of the one hundred and sixty-one persons on board being save l.

The Bombay, after striking the Oneida, stopped her engines for only tea minutes, according to Captain Eyre's own statement, then steamed away to Yokohavan, without so much as making an effort to ascertaia the damage done to the Oneida. Capt. Eyre says he saw no signals

of distress, yet the fifty-five survivors testify that the steam whistle was blown fiercely, three guns were fired, and when the Buabay hauled off just after the collision, Licut. Com. Stewart shoutel, "Ship aboy! Ship aboy! Lay to, you have cut us down to the water." This he did three times, yet Capt. Eyre says he heard nothing. This is stamped on its very face with falsehood; for the guns were heard distinctly in Yokohama, sixteen miles distant.

It is the uniform testimony of our countrymen, the survivors of the disaster, that if Capt. Eyre had laid to, and rendered the proper assistance, that not a life need to have been lest.

The Oneida had been stationed in Japanese waters for some three years, and had just started out on her homeward trip, when struck by the Bombay. The latter vessel arrived at eight o'elock p. M. in Yokohama. After carefully considering the matter we come to the conclusion that Capt. Eyre, of the Bombay, was alarmed for his own safety, and hence was eriminally negligent of the safety of the Oncila and her crew.

VANDERPOOL.

STATEMENT OF MR. CROWNINSHIELD.

The undersigned, a duly appointed committee f the citizens of Muskegon, submit this appeal to the intelligent, generous, justice-loving Peonle of the State of Michigan, to aid, unite and o operate with them in securing to George Vanderpool, lately convicted for the murder of Herbert Field, at Manistee, a new trial, to be conducted with fairness and impartiality, in a community uninfluenced by prejudice, passion or undue sympathy.

In initiating a popular movement to set aside verdict duly rendered, after trial by a jury, n accordance with the forms of law, we insist that we are not incited by any desire to screen sideration of abundant capital and good charguilt from legal responsibility, to protect an acter. The latter is a commodity much needoffender from punishment, or to awaken a popular sympathy in favor of the accused that would be likely to blind the judgement of intelligent men-only to secure a hearing that shall be so exhaustive in bringing before a jury all the facts having relation to the case, and a verdict so impartial, that the judgement of all candid, thoughtful minds shall be fully satisfied therewith.

A further issue of last named bonds is authorized at the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury, provided the ag-gregate debt of the United States is not thereby increased, all these bonds to be entirely ex-empt from taxation. The Secretary of the

Freasury is authorized to appoint agents in the United States for the negotiation of bonds, and a sum not exceeding half of.1 per cent is appropriated to pay the expense of preparing, issu-ling, and disposing of the same; \$150,000,000 annually of duties on imported goods are appli-ed to the payment of the interest and the re-duction of the principal of the public debt, and United States bonds now held as a sinking fund in the treasury, as well as those bereafter purchased, shall be cancelled and destroyed on nd after the 1st of October next. Registered bonds of any denomination not less than \$1,000, issued under the provisions of this act, are to be deposited with the Treasurer as security for the circulation of the National Banks. The circulation of those banks which do not comply with this provision within a year from the pas with this provision within a year from the pas-sage of this act to be forfeited; provided banks shall be allowed, upon giving thirty days notice to the Comptroller of the Currency, to deposit legal-tender notes with the Treasurer to the amount of their outstanding circulation, and take up the bonds pledged for its redemption;





not from those alone who have doubts of Vanderpool's guilt, but from persons occupying different stand points relative to his guilt or innocence. It clearly appears to us that there cannot, in any community, be a fair and impartial hearing of a case where the feeling is so strong ugainst the accused as to almost break out into a mob. Where this spirit prevails, it is difficult for a witness on the unpopular side to fearlessly testify, or the counsel to defend with that feeling of freedom that should exist in every fair and impartial trial. The jurers too, may and will feel this same pressure in spite of all efforts to the contrary. For instance, if there had been two or three on the jury in Vanderpool's case, who really thought the evidence insufficient to convict him, with the intense feeling in the community against the accused and the fear of being looked upon as favoring a generally thought-to-be murderer, it would not be strange that under such a pres-sure their judgment should yield to the force of the situation.

Whether guilty or innocent, the sause of justice and law will be strengthened by granting a new trial outside of Manistee. In another place we bublish an appeal to the people, from bitizens of Muskegon, in behalf of securing a new trial for Vanderpool, and the means to carry on the same. It is claimed by the committee that new evidence has been brought to light materially bearing upon the innocence of Vanderpool.

TAXATION.

There is a pretty general clamor for a reduction of taxation, all over the country. The people desire Congress to so direct their legislation. that the burdens of taxation may be reduced to the lowest possible point consonant with the integrity of the nation. The people do not desire any step to be taken that will lessen the credit of our country at home or abroad, but they do feel that many of the existing expenses of running the government might, with profit, be lopped off. This fact they feel that our Senators and Representatives well un-lerstand, and to them they look to carry out their known wishes to the fullest extent possible.

It is encouraging to see a disposition of retrenchment manifested in Congress, yet this feeling is not so general and earnest as the people would like to see. There is no one act now, that will render our public servants so popular with the people as that of a persistent determination to lessen the burdens of taxation. This heavy load has now been borne a long time by the masses, with scarcely a nurmur, the people feeling it to be necessary to the preservation of the honor of the nation. That period is now passed, and the feeling that the time has fully arrived that taxation may safely be reduced. is wide spread. and cannot be ignored by our Senalors and Representatives without disster to themselves.


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
