It must be borne in mind that on the frontier the act of Gen. Sheridan is universally approved-approved by those who are most nearly interested -those whose lives were jeopardized by these maranding Indian bands.

THE THING TO FEAR.

One of the greatest dangers now threatening the welfare of our Government, is the influence of the immense railroad corporations of the country. This influence is growing stronger and stronger every year, and even now has no small impression on the legislation of the country. It is not the small rail-roads that are to be fcared, but those immense corporations, that control the rail-road interests of the nation. These are gradually, but surely, absorbing the smaller interests, and as gradually, and as

surely strengthening- their influence. To our mind, there appears no such formidable danger in the near future, as these immensely wealthy rail-road companies. What influence can they not bring to bear on the legislation of the Government, as well as upon the Legislatures of the several States? Where, in any State, has not legislation, inimical to the railroad interests, been defeated? We look forward to the time, and that, at no distant day, when the rail-road interest will so control the legislation of our nation, that the people will be rendered powerless to thwart the designs of these im-

IN RELATION TO PUBLIC HEALTH, &c. SEC. 1. A Board of Health, to consist of the President, Trustees, Marshal, and village. physician, shall have authority to enforce the law of the State as provided in chapter 37, title 11 of the Compiled Laws of 1857, and the amendments thereto; and they shall cause the removal and abatement of all nuisances which in their opinion may be detrimental to the health of the citizens of said village.

SEC. 2. No person or persons shall be permitted to keep within the incorporated limits of said village, any slaughter house, or yard for the purpose of slaughtering any animals, or any yard for the purpose of feeding any hogs, sheep, cattle or other animals, to be slaughtered or shipped for other markets; and any person violating any of the provisions of this by-law shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not less than ten nor more than twenty-five dollars, or be imprisoned in the county jail not less than ten nor more than twenty days. BY-LAW XVII.

IN RELATION TO PUBLIC EXHIBITIONS AND . SHOWS.

It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to exhibit publicly any show, or to perform publicly any plays, games, theatrical or other performance, or concerts, whatever, or to exhibit any natural or other curiosities within the corporate limits of said village. for which pay or compensation shall be required or demanded, of any kind, unless such person or persons shall have been previously licensed so to do by the Clerk or President, under a penalty of not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence.

BY-LAW XVIII. IN RELATION TO GUN POWDER.

It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to have or keep, or suffer to be kent or deposited in any building or place within the corporate limits of said village, except in a magazine kept for that purpose, a greater quantity of gun powder than twenty-five pounds; and the same shall be kept in tin canisters with a secure tin cover, and not to contain more than ten pounds of powder in each canister, and no such canister shall be. opened after candle light. Any person vio-lating any of the provisions of this by-law shall be punished by a fine of five dollars for each and every offence, one-half of which shall be paid to the villago Treasurer and the other half to the party making the complaint.

BY-LAW XIX. IN RELATION TO FIRE ARMS. It shall not be lawful for any person or

persons to carry any concealed fire-arms, slung-shot, or any deadly weapon, or any

struction that may have been erected, or placed and continued, or which may hereaf-ter be erected, or placed upon, or over any side-walk or any street opposite any lot, be-yond the line of such lot, within the corporate limits of said village, and which shall in any manner impede, obstruct or prevent the full, clear and free passage of the entire width of said side-walk up to the line of such lot, shall be removed by the owner, or agent of such lot, within five days after being notified so to do by the Marshal, whose duty it. shall be to notify the same, and in case the Marshal shall, not be able to notify such owner or agent personally, then he shall serve, such notice in writing, by posting, the same. in some conspicuous place upon such, premiscs, and in case such encumbrance, encroachment or obstruction shall not be removed by such owner or agent as aforesaid, of such lot, such owner shall be liable to a penalty of one. dollar for each and every day that such encumbrance, encroachment or obstruction shall. as aforesaid, and in case such encumbrance,

COLLECTION OF TAXES.

The village Tax Roll shall, on the first day of September of each year, be placed in the hands of the Marshal for collection of taxes; and the Marshal shall add as fees for collection of all taxes paid on or before the 20th day of October following, one per cent., and to all taxes thereafter paid, four per cent, shall be added as fees for collection thereof. Notice by publication in some newspaper printed in said village, if there is one published therein, if not, in some newspaper within the County of Berrien, shall be published, stating the time and manner of collecting said taxes. And the Marshal shall be in his office each Saturday, from September 1st to October 20th, to receive taxes.

BY-LAW XXXI

ENFORCEMENT OF THESE BY-LAWS SEC. 1. 
