WOMAN SUFFRAGE. Now, that the ratification of the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States has placed the suffrage question on the broad basis of matter, the next great problem to be solved is that of Woman Suffrage. No question ever agitated among the American people since the formation of our Government, has gained adherents and advocates so fast as that of woman suffrage. But a few years ago, it and only had advocates among those who were esteemed well and visionary. Now, it numbers its friends from all ranks of society, and among its most ardent advocates are numbered many of the first men and women of the nation.

The cause of woman suffrage is becoming popular, and its friends are attracting an ever increasing number. Even now, in Utah, and Wyoming, the woman are allowed to vote, and it needs no prophetic eye to see clearly, that at no distant day the women, in all the States and Territories of the Union, will be permitted to use the elective franchise. This state of affairs surely bodes no good for evil doers; for women, as a class, are more susceptible of moral influences than men, and consequently her influence will be brought to bear more forcibly upon the legislation of the country than it now is. This influence, too, will be more uniformly in the direction of temperance and morality than will be that of men.

As to the propriety of women voting, we cannot, under our system of government, see anything in the least improper therein. We cannot see, according to the basis of a Republican form of Government, how this right can be denied to woman, as she desires it. If governments do, as we maintain all true governments ought, derive their powers from the consent of the governed, then, to woman, should, unhesitatingly, be extended the right to vote, make laws, and to enjoy and perform such other privileges and duties as the nature of her constitution will allow.

Are not women required to obey the laws? Are they not taxed? Do they not help make these laws, or levy the taxes? These things being true, and women being subject to the same laws, and it is presumptuous in her to ask the right to help make the laws by which she must be governed?

The day is not far distant, when our wives, sisters and daughters will quietly and peacefully go to the polls and deposit their ballot in favor of such persons and measures as will, according to their judgment, best subserve the public good. It may seem strange, to make such a prediction thus early, but we confidently expect to see this state of affairs in, at least, five years. When this is accomplished, then will our government, in the true sense, be a Republican in practice as well as in fact.

All that women would vote, if the elective franchise was conferred upon them, we do not, for a moment, believe. Neither do all men vote who have the right to vote. However, on all great questions, a general vote would be given by the women, as is the case with men. Let the car roll, and let it be known throughout the entire world, that the United States is truly a Republican Government, and that all her citizens, of mature age, help make her rulers and her laws.

LAWLESSNESS. There seems to be a growing disposition in our country to disregard law. This presents to the careful observer a deplorable state of affairs; and unless public sentiment, in this respect, corrected, many crimes will yet have to be lamented on account of this lawless state of affairs.
