PRESBYTERY.—The annual session of the Presbytery of Kalamazoo was held in Niles on the 13th and 14th inst., consisting of fifteen churches and seventeen ministers. Rev. Milton Bradley, of Richland, preached the opening sermon. Rev. J. V. Hilton, of Kalamazoo, was chosen Moderator. The reports showed the churches to have enjoyed a good degree of prosperity, together with considerable revival influence. The Sabbath Schools were reported to be in a flourishing condition.

HORSE THIEVES COMMITTED.—Frank Williams, an Italian, and Ross Brown, a colored man, were arrested near the City, on Saturday last, by Marshal Chambers and Constable Farrell, for horse stealing, and after examination were bound over to Court by Esquire Chipman. In default of bail they were taken to Berrien jail, where they were held until they had secured a team of horses and harness from a colored man named Alexander Matthews, at Colon, Cass county, and a wagon from some other man in the same neighborhood. When on the road to jail, they acknowledged these thefts, and also owned up to stealing some pork from a house in West Niles. In this transaction they claimed a Mrs. Lewis as a confederate. Part of the meat was found at Mrs. Lewis' and part was found east of the City where the wagon and team were secreted. It was subsequently ascertained that the pork belonged to Moses Davis. Mrs. Lewis was arrested, but no one appearing against her, she was released.—Niles Republican.
