Under all the circumstances in the premises, we see no great need of haste, and we trust that there will be no extra session of the Legislature called by Gov. Baldwin...

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demands of such an outrage; that it is a crime of which the law utterly fails to take cognizance, and therefore that men in dealing with each other concerning this matter must be lawless, their own individual sense of justice being a law unto themselves...

There will be some very loud complaints against this decision as to its effects upon the bonds already issued, as well as upon those not issued; but the rule of law is voided by the Supreme Court, it is that he who purchases the bonds of public corporations...

The people of Michigan, who have been rescued by this judicial decision from this debt of \$7,500,000, which for half a century would hang as a mortgage upon their property, will, before long, admire the wisdom and the fairness of the court...

The effect of the decision will be the killing of a dozen, more or less, of projects which had no foundation in necessity, and which would have imposed a serious burden upon the taxpayers of that State...

It is very evident that the people in their constitutional conventions, should settle the practical questions of this sort that public enterprises essential to the progress and prosperity of the people may go forward without danger of being wrecked on some legal snag which they may encounter in their course...


