THE APPOINTMENT.

On Thursday last the House of Representatives kicked over the Apportionment bill, as it passed the Senate. Or perhaps more correctly, killed it for this session, by a reference to the Judiciary Committee.

It surprises us that any Western member should have voted for the reference of the bill, and not for its passage. That the East should labor to keep the West out of its proper proportion of representatives, is not at all strange.

Perhaps we do not see this bill in its proper light, or else we could explain why Messrs. Blair and Bennett voted so as to defeat it. At least, until we understand the matter differently, from what we now do, and can comprehend why the Western States should be delayed in their just representation.

THE CURRENCY QUESTION.

The great question of the currency is about to reach a solution, so Washington dispatches indicate. It seems the House could not get a bill that was acceptable to the Senate and vice versa.

All three per cent. certificates will be withdrawn; \$45,000,000 of new National Bank circulation issued; a re-issuance of \$25,000,000 of National Currency, and the authorizing of five hundred million gold bonds.
