

Grammar-No. 1.

We have considered Reading, Orthoepy, Orthography, and Writing. But one study relating to language re-mains to be treated, as the common school course is now arranged. Grammar is usually defined as the science of language. The definition is too broad. A vast multitude of the facts of language are classified under other heads; to be studied as distinct branches, some of which are named above. The science of language, in its


comprehensive sense, is Philology. Strictly, Grammar is the analysis of the sentence. It classifies words as parts of the sentence, according to their relations in it, and gives the rules for their combination into sentences in certain forms, which the usage of the best writers and speakers has established as correct. Its branches, properly, are only Etymology, (this without reference to the derivation of words) Syntax, excluding Orthography and Prosody. In fact, we advise teachers in the district schools not to take their grammar classes thro' the

two branches last named, but to drop them altogether from this connection. The matter of Orthography can be taught better to spelling classes, and that of Prosody to the reading classes, when engaged upon poetry. All the time that can possibly be devoted to ough instruction in Etymology and

should be studied with the aid of a keen and constant observation of the current speech and composition, in oth their, correct and incorrect forms-the former for illustration, the latter for warning to the student.

Any well-grown schoolboy, for example, should be able to correct one of the most popular grammars (unfortu-nately) in use in this country, which authorizes the antiquated form "you



er, for its practical uses in the correction of speech or composition, and the preservation, of the language in its purity. As we have before, stated, it is desirable that every cultivated language maintain fixed standards of orthography, and rules for the arrangement of words (which constitute syntax); until, at least, they can be im-proved upon i. To these standards and rules every person who uses the language should conform. But they are fixed by the general usage of the best scholars; and, if we are not brought up under the influence of such, and cannot take time in youth for the perusal of their works, with careful observation of their language, we must form our own habits of speech and writing by the aid of a book which gives the laws these scholars observe. Hence the necessity of grammatical study in the schools.

Serious loss is often caused in busi ness, and misunderstandings in social affairs, by errors of languager, which a practical knowledge of Grammar would have prevented. It was estimated by an Attorney General of the United States that many thousands of dollars were lost every year, and unpupils in grammar is needed for thor- told trouble and litigation caused by errors of this kind.

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
