But if we would have our best men to serve us in official capacity, it is necessary to select the same class of men at our Township Caucuses to represent us in the County Conventions. THE WAR.

The prospects of peace between Prussia and France seem farther away at present, than they did at the surrender of Napoleon. It was then thought by many that but a short time would elapse before a peace would be concluded. The change in the French government has complicated matters, and makes it difficult to ar. range satisfactory terms of peace. Prussia is unwilling to give up the great advantage gained, unless she can have assurances of a lasting peace. It appears, as yet, that the French Republic cannot give such assurance as King William requires. As soon, however, as the present French government is in a condition to guarantee the conditions of peace, we imagine that such a peace will be concluded.

Prussia will, undoubtedly demand the cession of Alsace and Lorraine, Railroads." either as independent states or to be attached to Germany. This will be opposed by France at present, but when it is seen that this must be one of the conditions of peace, France will undoubtedly yield.

The war was commenced by Napoleon, backed by the acknowledged government of France, for the purpose of national glory and the extending of French territory. It cannot, therefore, be seriously objected to if King William should pay them according as they had purposed in their hearts to treat him. If, however, Prussia's demand should be unreasonable and unnecessary to her future security against France, she will lose the sympathy of the civilized world, which she has had in her contest with Napoleon, and may perhaps provoke European intervention.

The Prussians are closely investigating Paris, and seem determined not to relax a momment until a peace is concluded. Bazaine is still cooped up in Metz, with no prospect of getting out until he surrenders. Strassburg is suffering greatly, but must at length capitulate. 
