Austin Blair and Mr. Ferry, to succeed by hook or crook, in drawing support to themselves.

One thing should be understood by the Republican members of the Legislature, and that is, justice, right and every consideration says, let us have a western man in the place of Mr. Howard, whose term expires. Any western member who shall presume to vote against this just claim will undoubtedly kill himself politically, and will fail to represent the demands of the people for an equal representation in the U.S. Senate from the western part of the State. Every member of the Legislature should study this matter thoroughly.

Another matter needs looking after. It is said by Mr. Blair's friends, "we want Blair elected because he is a western man." Yet these same men, some of them, would prefer the election of a Detroiter to that of Mr. Ferry. Where, then, is their consistency in advocating the election of a western man? Therefore, to hold the chances open four years hence. some of the friends of these two western men, Mr. Ferry and Mr. Blair, will oppose the election of a western man, except it is the man of their choice. This is not right. The people demand, justice and right demand a western man. If it cannot be Mr. Ferry, our first choice, let it be Mr. Blair, our second choice. In no event, if representations are true, let it be Hon. Wm. A. Howard. All that is said may not be so; yet, it has been thought, and is still thought, by a vast multitude of the people of Michigan, that he removed to Grand Rapids in order to further his Senatorial schemes. Moreover, we fear his efforts to secure the position through the disagreement of the friends of Mr. Ferry and Mr. Blair, thereby hoping to control the Detroit vote, of Hon. J. M. Howard, is not altogether laudable. We may be mistaken, and could we be assured of such fact, we would most willingly take back all we have said on the subject. We have, however, kept our eyes open, and are confident that we are on the right track. If Wm. A. Howard should be chosen he would, undoubtedly, be as much a Detroit man as the present incumbent. This is the way in which a large portion of the people of the State look at it. and all arguments of interested advocates cannot make them see it in a different light.

PEACE PROSPECTS.

Again the out-look augurs a coming peace between the combatants of the old world. The recent defeat of the army of the Loire, has, undoubtedly, produced great depression of the French leaders. They depended much on this army to assist in raising the siege of Paris. Now that it has failed to meet the Prussians successfully France appears more willing to look towardsmaking peace. The Germans, too, we are inclined to think, are fully ready for peace, and greatly desire the cessation of the struggle. They have commenced the drafting of their married men, which meets with great opposition, so great as to result in open resistance. This shows that the miliitary power of Russia is almost exhausted, and that she is ready for peace. This view of the German situation, and the certainty that the French begin to realize the utter hopelessness of their cause, gives great significance to the current rumors that Gambetta has asked for a cessation of hostilities to allow of the election of a constituent assembly. Peace will undoubtedly follow the assembling of a representative assembly of the French people. In this way the French leaders, who now undoubtedly perceive the certainty of the fall of Paris and the utter wildness of further re-

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
