The majorities of Seymour and Blair were considerably reduced in Delaware, Maryland and Kentucky, owing to the colored vote principally, but that loss is permanent.

They claim a gain in several of the Congressional districts in Pensylvania in the election of 1870, but in many cases the contest was between rival Republicans, and cannot be taken as an authentic exposition of the sentiment of that State.

The Republican party must know that to gain a victory in the coming Presidential election, there must be work performed. It will not do to be inactive or indifferent at such a time es-this. The purposes and objects for which the Republican party was organized have not yet been accomplished. The vital principles which it has so long advocated of freedom and civil rights, have not yet been established beyond controversy in every part of our government, and the Republican party must remain in power until it has performed its mission. There is no doubt but it will do this so long as it adheres to the grand principles that underlie our Republican form of government, and use care and discretion in nominating, as its candidates for office, men who are worthy the confidence of the people. The Republican party has a history of which it may well be proud, and many men within its ranks who are the most able in point of intelligence, and among the most worthy citizens in our nation. It possesses within itself ample power to free this government of all corruption, and to work all necessary reforms, and to establish permanently and substantially, as a reality, the sublime principles taught in the Declaration of American Independénce, that all men are created free and equal, and endowed by their Creator with the rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Why, then, change the Administration? And why, we ask, should we think, at this time, of giving the government over into the hands of that party that is now, as before the war, in alliance and affiliation with the sworn enemies of our government, from whose murderous assaults and acts of hostility and devastation our country has not been fully rescued. Peace, if she be indeed unbound and among us, comes wearing the red ribbon of danger in her yet disheveled locks. The paths in which our government is treading to-day are slippery, and tangled and thorny is the thicket of public questions ahead.

The enemy are marshaling their forces, and understand that their prospects for success are favorable, unless the Ropublican. party will use every vigilance and en-ergy in opposing; them: We say to Republicans everywhere, be awake and again to the rescue, or we shall yet lose at the ballot box all we have gained on the battle field at such a sacrifice of life and treasure.
