From the Leavenworth (Kanses) Times, March 22. Man Buried Four Days in a Well-No is Takén Out Alivo but Dies in S few Nours. . . .

On Thursday of last week, as a young man named John Self, was engaged in cleaning out a well on the farm of Mr. Ewing, on the Perryville road, the loose stones and gravel gave way, and, without a moment's warning, the well wall, earth and sand, fell in, completely imprisoning the young man and burying him to the depth of fifty-six feet, below the surface of the earth. The well filled in, and an opening had to be made in the usual slow and tedious mode of well-digging. "However, the work of excavation commenced Willing hands made rapid work, until hope gave way, and a conviction seemed to root itself in the minds of all that there was no possibility of reaching the young man before life had fled. Friday and Saturday the work went on. On Sunday it still progressed, and so continued till Monday alternoon about 3 c'clock, when the unfortunate young man was reached, and strange to say he was found alive. He

was brought out to the air and sunshine as soon as possible, but he only murmured a few words about angels and heaven, and fell into an unconscious state, from which he never rallied. He died on Monday night about 11 o'clock. It will be noticed that this young man was imprisoned four days and four nights at the bottom of the well, without food, of course, and with only space enough to keep from drowning. He was found on his knees, as if in prayer.

About the Blood.

If you take a glass of water it begins to enter the blood within one minute after it is swallowed, and soon it is all there. If we take a cup of tea all the soluble parts of it are in the blood in a very short time; usually. If we take a glass of whisky or beer, it is on the same route of travel with the ten, and very impure blood it makes at times. 
throw it ont in our breath, in the shaps of vapor, and the kidneys work away as lively as they can. Then our food, when it is properly pre

Further, when the smallest part of a muscle, or a nerve, or of any part of the body is worn out, it must be removed, and it is taken in very small pieces and floated off in this stream of the blood; to be still further changed, and if of use, it is used; otherwise it finds its way out

of the body. So we can see how the blood is continually changing, growing pure and impure. Not impure because some villainous stream of dark poison maintains its stay there, floating around to do what mischief it may, but impure because we have introduced the impurities to it through our stomaches

or lungs; impure. perhaps, because we have filled it with the contents of some villainous bottle of somebody's dyestuff,

which he claims will purify the blood. If we could have pure blood, then, let us breathe pure air, eat pure food, and drink nure water.

The provisions may be good, but if they are not enforced they are fruitless. In some places, however, this new law will doubtless be enforced, while in others it will not. Where its enforcement is most to be desired, in cities and villages where the traffic is carried on regardless of law, it will fail of that moral support requisite to the enforcement of any law. Let the readers of the RECORD read. carefully the provisions of the law; and especially those who rent buildings for the sale of intoxicating liquors therein, and also every wife who suffers from the neglect of a drunkon husband, and all parents who have sons who spend their time and money for whisky. It would be well if all, in any way interested, would preserve the law for future reference.

FRANCE.

Notwithstanding the Franco-German war terminated some time ago, the outlook for France is anything but fattering. Paris to-day is in about as bad, if not worse, condition, than when surrounded by German troops. Our dispatches indicate that the Versailles government is getting the better of the Paris Commune. The success of the Thiers government is not yet assured ; and was it not that the German interests require the continuation in power of the Versailles (Thiers) government, we should have but little hopes of its continuation for any length of time. As it is the German interest is allied with the authorities of Versailles, the government with which peace was concluded.

There has been some bloody work between the contending parties, or the government and the Paris rebels. And to us it appears that the Germans ought to interfere and put a stop to the further and useless effusion of blood. This, thus far, they have stead-ily refused to do. It, however, begins to look different, and we shall not be much surprised if within a few weeks the German forces assist in the maintenance of the Versailles government. One was found hanging on a tree, near Salt River, and the other one was shot and instantly killed; I saw him myself. Another was shot dead while in his buggy, a short time before I came here, by a youth of Southern chivalry. Those that were Union men during the war, are good, and law-abiding citizens. I will probably say more about these Ku-Klux, after I get better acquainted. It is a little rougher than I expected. I don't wan't to go any further South, at any rate. If any of my Democratic coat on. I have one, but I would not for fear I might be found hanging on my neck. The wheat crop is looking splendid. There are fields of growing wheat as high as a man's boot tops. There is much of the corn planted, oats looking well, and a prospect of an abundant fruit crop of all kinds. The trees were white ten days ago, and still continue to bloom. The woods are green, and vegetation is as green as it is in the middle of Mav in Michigan. I cannot see anything to hinder this from being one of the

first States in the Union, for grain or stock growing, or fruit raising of all kinds. There is plenty of timber and coal. Farmers have the best fences here that I have seen for many years in any State. The weather is very warm and pleasant—splendid for farming. We have had fine weather since the twelfth of March; no snow, but three light frosts. Since the middle of March, we have had two very warm days-the 6th and 7th insts. On Monday, the 10th inst., the wind

blew very hard all day, the damage was a few fences blown down on the prairie; no rain nor snow, as you had in Michigan. Corn is in good demand at 40 cents per bushel; wheat, \$1.25; flour, \$3.80 per hundred; potatoes, 40 cents per bushel; milch cows, from \$30 to \$50 each. etc. Cattle live well here, running on the commons: They have got their living, since the first of March. That every wife, child, parent, guardian, husband or other person who hall be injured in person, property, means of support or otherwise, by any intoxica-ed person, or by reason of the intoxication of any person, shall have a right of action in his or her own name against any per-son or persons who shall, by selling or giving any intoxicating liquor or otherwise who have caused or contributed to the intoxication of such person or persons; and n any such action the plaihtiff shall have a right to recover actual and exemplary damages. And the owner or lessee. or person or persons, renting or leasing any huilding or premises, having knowledge that intoxicating liquors are to be sold therein at retail as a beverage, shall be liable severally or jointly, with the person so selling or giving intoxicating liquore, as aforesaid. And in every action by any wife, husband, parent or child, general reputation of the relation of husband and vile, parent and child, shall be Prima facic evidence of such relation, and the amount recovered by every wife or child shall be his or her sole and separate prop erty. Any sale or gilt of intoxicating liquors by the lesses of any premises, re sulting in damage, shall, at the option of the lessor, work a forfeiture of his lease; and the circuit court in chancery may enjoin the sale or giving away of intoxica-

ting liquors by any lessee of premises which may result in loss, damage or liability to the lessor or any person claiming under such lessor. (I663) SEC. 3. If any person by himself, his clerk, agent, or servant, shall, directly or indirectly, sell or keep for sale, contrary to law, and such liquor, he shall forfeit and pay, on the first conviction, \$25 and the costs of suit or prosecution, and shall be at once committed to the common jail of the county until the same be paid. Frank Blair on the Constitutional Amendments. Mr. Frank Blair has recently attempted

to reconcile his revolutionary interances with the prudence and moderation by which some sagacious Democrats are try. ing to cool down the "red hot" men in their party. It is due to Blair's sincerity to say that he cannot long restrain or conceal his real opinions. Whether it be the vinous candor which men of his habits are credited with, or a genuine and inherent outspokenness that was happily recognized in his name 'st christening, we shall not undertake to say. It may be 's combination of the natural and the artificial incenuoueness. At all events, it is not "equivocation" which "will undo" him and his party, but rather his intelligible and candid statements. In his speech last week on the Ku-Klux bill, he said that the laws for the enforcement of the constitutional amendmenta were worse than the slien and sedition laws at the close of the last century. But worse than the enforcement laws -- that is the bill to prevent fraud at elections and the Ku-Klux bills-were "the daring and audacious usurpations attending the reconstruction measures, and their olispring, the fraudulent amendments to the constitution, on which the men in power chiefly base their further encroach. ments upon public liberty." "At the last Presidential election," he continued, "the usurpers were sustained by an apparent popular majority throughout the country but the disfranchised voters excluded then from the polls by these usurpations were more than enough to have turned the scale and 'counterbalanced that small majority. As it was, no majority would then have: been found against the cause of the Constitution if the timidity or infidelity of friends had not placed the contest in an at-

titude which left us nothing worth fighting Thus we have the distinct assurance from Mr. Blair that in his opinion the amendments to the Constitution are fraudulent, and, of course, are "revolutionary; null, and void," and that the timidity and infidelity of the moderate Democrats in the last campaign, in acquiescing in these amendments, took away from that party ments.

In brief, Mr. Blair and the mass of the Democratic party regard the late amendments to the Constitution as the Bourbons have been accustomed to regard the acts of the first Napoleon-as so many usur. pations which were to be blotted out from official record, and to form no part of the governmental history and legal precedents of France. The Democrats conceive of them as something thrust violently into the body politic, and sustained and beld there by artificial means which must be removed as speedily as possible.-Detroit Post.

The Senate amendments to the House Ku-Klux bill were taken from the Speaker's table. and the three most important among them were rejected. The amendment extending the right of the President to suspend the writ of habsas corpus till the end of the next regular session of Congress, instead of till June 1, 1872, wes rejected by 86 yeas to 98 nays. The amendment in relation to the oath of jurors, and the amendment known as the Sherman amendment assessing the damages on localities, were also rejected. A Committee of Conference was then appointed on the disagreeing vote of the two Houses.

BENATE-APRIL 17TH.

A Conference Committee was ordered to which the Ku-Klux bill was committed. The Deficiency Appropriation bill was also sent to a Conference Committee. On motion, the House bill authorizing the name of the vessel William H. Stover to Hamilton Fish, and to grant a new registration was passed. On motion, a joint resolution authorizing Prof. James Henry, of the Smithsonian Institute, to accept s title and decoration from the King of Swed en, was passed. BOUSE-APRIL 17TH.

The following bills were introduced: Grantng bounty lands to those who served in the army or navy during the rebellion; To promote commerce among States and to cheapen transportation; to incorporate the Louisiana, Arkansas, and New Mexico Railroad Company ; For a bridge across the Portage Lake, Mich.; For payment to the State of Arkansas money expended for the United States for enrolling, provisioning and equipping militia to aid in suppressieg the rebollion; Granting public

ands for purposes of education. A resolution 2077 was offered requesting President Grant to intercede with the authorities of the Dominion of Canada for the release of American citizens now confined in Canadian prisons .- Adopted. 


