**FIRE.**—On Sunday night, about ten  
o'clock, the alarm of fire was again  
heard in our village. On repairing  
to the scene of the alarm, the fire shop  
and hardware establishment of Mr.  
Geo. Churchill was discovered to be  
on fire. The fire engine was prompt-  
ly on the ground and did good service.  
Without this engine, the fire would  
undoubtedly have consumed several  
of the wooden buildings in the same  
block, as the hose to the pump engine  
was all uncoiled, and the time con-  
sumed in getting it ready would have  
given ample opportunity for the spread  
of the fire.

While speaking of the fire, a few  
words about the necessities of the  
hour will not be out of place. The  
pump engine is a good thing; but to be  
of any use, it should be in some  
different arrangements. It can, if  
properly arranged, be brought into  
action within three minutes, as well as  
to have to spend a half an hour.  
There should at once be a hose car,  
and the hose should be all coiled  
and ready at all times for use. Then,  
in case of fire, within the reach of the  
pump engine, it would only be neces-  
sary to run the cart to the scene of  
operations, uncoil pipe and commence  
work at once, which, ordinarily, need  
not consume over three minutes of  
time. We trust this matter will be at  
once attended to by the proper author-  
ities, and not delayed till a needless  
loss of ten or twenty thousand dollars  
occurs to some of the business estab-  
lishments and buildings of our village.

The evening was very fortunate for  
the fire, as there was no wind, and  
the fire did not spread. The citizens  
and all interested, took hold  
will to assist in the stopping  
of the fire, and to save the goods and  
property of the establishments ex-  
posed to danger.

The loss to Mr. Churchill will be  
some \$800, which will fall pretty  
heavily, as there was no insurance.  
The origin of the fire was, "doubtless,"  
another illustration of "self-combus-  
tion" of a lot of rags stored in the  
garret of the building where the fire  
was first discovered.

**Solution of E's Problem.**—Query.  
The least number that can be divid-  
ed by 28 and leave 19 for remainder is  
the sum of 28 and 19. When we  
come to divide this by 19, we have 9  
for a remainder, which is the excess  
of 28 over 19, and we must add 28  
often enough, that the sum of the  
nines in excess will be divisible by 19  
with 15 for a remainder. We find  
this gives us 47, 136, 243 as  
the least number that will fill the con-  
ditions of the problem. But we  
will do this no farther. Then, we  
shall have to add still more. In our  
first addition, we had to add some  
multiple of 28, because we must not  
forget the remainder we had in divid-  
ing by 28. Now, as we have our re-  
mainders right for the divisors 28 and  
19, we must add some common multi-  
ple of 28 and 19. The least common  
multiple is 532. If we divide 243 by  
19, our remainder will be 8; 532  
divided by 19, gives 28 remainder 16.  
We shall have to add this 16 to 8, to  
243, before the sum of 243 plus 16  
plus 8 will be divisible by 19 with  
11 for remainder. Then 243 plus 16  
plus 8 gives 267, the number re-  
quired.

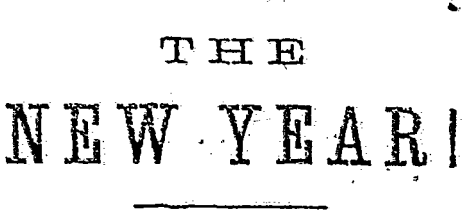

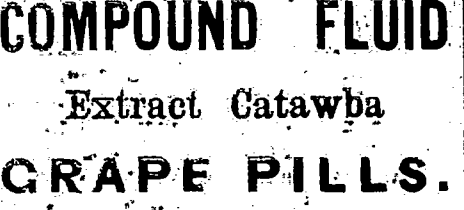
