

## THE TREATY OF WASHINGTON.

Contrary to the expectation of the President, Cabinet and Senate. the fall text of the "Treaty of Washingon." the result of the labors of the Foint High Commission, has been pubished. It was sent to the Senate on the 10th, and was published in the New York Tridune of the 11th and in the Western dailies of the 12th. There was considerable indignation expressed by some Senators at the ununthorized publication of the Treaty. However, since the Treaty has been prematurely" brought before the onblic, we imagine the public discussion thereon will re-act much in its

favor. The treaty, as a whole, meets the general approval of the press of the country. This being the case, will undoubtedly have a tendency to-facilirate its adoption. In fact we have not much faith in the secret considerations of great and important measures by the Senate. The Senate of the United States is but the servant of the people: and, in all great measures, it will be found that the people will stand by the right. We are, therefore, glad that the Treaty has been published, so that our Senators may have some opportunity, before acting thereon, to know somewhat of the feelings of the people relative to its adoption.

Taken as a whole the provisions of the treaty are just and equitable, based upon honorable principles, and if finally ratified, calculated to establish a friendly feeling between the two great governments' of the world. speaking the same language. A great triumph too is gained for the cause of peace, without the humiliation of either government. There is no more degredation in referring disputed questions to arbitration by governments than by individuals. It is an honorable way to settle difficulties-it is Christian like, and will, we doubt not, be the means, in the future, of warding off many a bloody contest. The example of England and America, two of the greatest maritime nations of the world, will not be without its effects on other governments. THE ALABAMA CLAIMS

"That British subjects resident in France yould have no just ground of complaint against the French suthorities in the event of their property having been destroyed by the invading armies. After this concession of wrong-for it cannot be viewed in any other light -a peaceable solution of the Alabama difficulties becomes quite easy. Governments may be wrong as well as individuals, and it is noble, honorable and elevating to honestly acknowledge this fact. We have no doubt, bat the difficulties existing between the two governments would long since have been settled, if England had made the concession and acknowledgement she has now done. She, however, has heretofore held herself justifiable in allowing the escape of the Alabama and kindred vessels.

The Alabama Claims, by the provisions of the treaty, are to be re-ferred to tribunals of arbitration to be named, one by the President of the United States, one by the Queen of England, one by the King of Italy, one by the President of the Swiss Confederation, and one by the Emperer of Brazil. No objection can be urged against the persons selected to appoint the Board of Arbitration, as they are all, excepting the President of the U.S. and Queen Victoria, interested equally in the parties at va-

riance. The arbitrators, in the settlement of these claims, are to be governed by the American doctrine of the duty of neutrals in time of war. This is all that our Government could ask or desire. England has heretofore refused to acknowledge the American doctrine, but now accepts it as the rule of the settlement of the Alabama Claims, and for the future action of the two governments. Also, Eng-land and the United States agree to use their endeavors to induce other governments to accept this doctrine of international law. The doctrine, as maintained by our Government, and expressed in the treaty, provides that a neutral power "is bound, first, to use due diligence to prevent the fitting cat, arming or equpping within its jurisdiction of any vessel which it has reasonable ground to believe is intended to cruise or carry on war against any power, and with diligence to prevent the departure from its jurisdiction of any vessel intended to cruise or carry on war as above, such vessel having been specially adapted in whole or part within such jurisdiction, to warlike uses. Secondly, not to permit or suffer either belligerent to make use of its ports or waters as a base of naval operations against other nations, or for the purpose of the re-newal or arranging of military sup-plies or arms, or for recruiting men. Thirdly, to exercise diligence is its own ports, and watch all persons within its jurisdiction. to prevent any violation of the foregoing obligations and duties."




