Ten Years a Captive among the Indians. There arrived in the city yesterday morning by the Southern road from the West a woman named Mary J. Phillips.

who has been for the last ten years not only au unwilling captive among the Indians of Colorado Territory, but the slave of a revengeful tribe, whose hatred of the white race was exhibited in maltreating her to a degree which would have ended in the death of almost any man. The woman has two ears which are not ears, both having been cut and slashed until they resemble pieces of flesh attached to her head without purpose. Her fingers are broken and crippled, she is lame from a dislocation of the hip, which she received five years ago, and she stated to our reporter that her body bore numerous scars to show the dog's life which she led among the savages. Her story is this: Nearly eleven years ago, she being then 22 years of age, her father started from La Salle county, Illinois, to go to California by the over-land route. He fitted out in the usual way, having covered wagons, and taking considerable furniture. The family consisted of father, mother, this woman, a boy of 19, and a girl of 11. The party crossed into Kansas, at Weston, Mo., and were detained at Leavenworth about three weeks by the sickness and death of the mother, who was buried there. For some days the father debated whether to go on or to return to Illinois; but finally concluded to make the journey, and fell in line with a government train which was

loaded with provisions and ammunition for

the interior posts.

the living captives.

Everything went well, until after reaching and leaving Fort Kearney, when, owing to one of the teamsters having attempted an outrage upon Mary, the father broke off from the train and could not be prevailed upon to go in company any further, although traveling except in large parties was known to be dangerous. He thought more of the honor of his daughter than the danger to the party, and went into camp until the Government train had left, following on one day behind. The joined by another family, whose name she believes was Fuller, but cannot distinctly remember. Together they traveled for three days, getting a long distance west of Kearney, and seeing Indians almost every hour. The other family consisted of four persons, and the children were quite small, a boy named William being about seven years old. Mrs. Fuller could not be kept still, lamenting and moaning the shocking fate of her husband, and soon after daylight she was horribly maltreated, taken a little way out of camp, and there shot to death with arrows, her screams being plainly heard by

contents such articles as pleased them, the savages burned the whole together. The captives were then mounted on the horses, and the party struck for the West. On the second day they divided, and one gang took Mary's sister, whose name was Henrietta. The sisters were weeping and lamenting their hard fate, when both were cruelly beaten, and Henrietta was hurried off at a rapid rate, while Mary and the Fuller boy were urged in another direction by blows and shouts of derision. After several days' traveling, the party reached the Black Hills, and there they found the balance of the tribe. Here it. may be stated that the girl Henrietta was never afterwards seen by Mary, but she heard two-or three years after, of her death by maltreatment. The captives were received with kicks and cuffs, and Mary was especially ill-treated. The lad

COMPULSORY EDUCATION AGAIN

One of the best arguments in favor of compulsory education is furnished hy the census tables. In 1840 there were in the United States 549,850 persons who could neither read nor write: of this number in 1850 there were 962,898; in 1860, 1,126,575, and in 1870, the number had increased to 5,867,111. These figures show an alarming increase of ignorance, and the number of murders, thefts and crimes that were committed has increased correspondingly, in proportion to the number of inhabitants.

Such are the natural consequences of the reign of ignorance over the human mind. And when we take a retrospective view of the ages that are rest, when the events that history records are such as present to our view the most revolting scenes of war, rapine and devastation, as if the earth had been created to serve as a theater for mischief, and its inhabitants for the purpose of dealing misery and destruction to all around them, and justly attribute all to the intellectual darkness that then prevailed, it seems that nothing farther would be necessary to induce parents everywhere to have their children obtain the benefits of an education. If this be not done, so that they may become useful, intelligent citizens, the world will retrogade and he reduced again to the condition presented in ages that are past. No distinction will be placed between what is sacred and what is profane, what is barbarous, and what is refined. Amid the din of war, the burning of cities, the desolation of provinces and the slaughter of millions, the voice of religion and of reason will not be heard. Science will be abandoned, useful knowledge set at nought, every benevolent feel ing and every moral principle will be trampled under foot, and the inhabitants, instead of cultivating the useful sciences, will assume the character of demons and give vent to the most brutal and ferocious passions. This picture is not over drawn, and creates. a most melancholy train of reflection in the mind of every intelligent per-

Looking at it in this light, every one is, in a measure, responsible for the condition of his fellows. No one has a right to shrink from performing his duty to secure his own happiness and the general welfare of mankind. The present and future happiness and prosperity of our nation depend upon the general diffusion and discimilation of useful knowledge, and for this reason each is interested in the success of all others and has a right to dictate in regard to matters a common interest

OUR JUROR SYSTEM. The Foster case, which was tried in New York, strikingly exemplifies the weakness and absurdity of the present system that requires that every juryman should be a fool. Every one will remember the circumstances of this case. It is but another of those open. bold street car murders of New York City. An elderly gentleman, escorting two young ladies to their homes, was brutally murdered for attempting to remonstrate with a villain who repeatedly insulted them on the cars. From all the statements that are made there can be no question but that this was a case of wanton, unprovoked, undiluted murder. There was great difficulty experienced, in obtaining a jury to try this case. The number summoned was over four hundred. This was all on account of the law which permits the recusation of a juror because he may have read a newspaper account of the crime of the man whose case he is about to try. It is necessary that a juror should come to decide a case with his mind free from all bias, prejudice and undue influence, but no one would object to having his case submitted to a man because he may have read some careful, accurate and non-prejudiced statement of the offence with which he was charged. It would seem that education and intelligence are especially to be desired as qualifications for a juryman, and certainly this part of our legal code is far behind the age. It is almost impossible in these days, when newspapers are so popular and so generally circulated, to find a body of men to act as jurors who have not read some account of the matter upon which they are called to pronounce, and when found they will be utterly unfit to decide upon so important an issue as life and death. It has been wisely suggested that a House of Detention be established, where a thousand or more intelligent citizens could be constantly on hand to be drawn as jurors. They must be allowed no

This morning the excitement at the shaft was greater than ever. CLEARING THE MINE. Un'to So'clock twenty-four men had been brought to the top, of which number six were dead. All were insensible when brought out. One or two bave so far recovered as to be able to give an account of themselves.

- THE FIRST ALARM. At the time of the ignition of the upper part of the shafe yesterday, the shifts of miners were being changed and many were standing, and a few others were relieved by their companions coming out. The alarm being given to Engineer Me-Dermott, he at once communicated a warning of danger to the bottom of the mine, and began to hoist the carriage, bringing with the first four trips several men. In the three succeeding trips no arrivals were reported, and while the eighth trip was being made, the rope slipped off the pully, and all further, means of escape was beyond a possibility

THE CONFLAGRATION. In an hour and a quarter, the breaker had burned to the ground, hundreds of women and children had congregated near the scene of the disaster, and their heartrending cries pierced the air. At 6:40 the mouth of the mine had been sufficiently cleared to let down a dog. He was kept down the first time for three minutes, and let down again, staying five minutes. The dog came up alive. ' A few minutes before 8 o'clock P. M., Wm Law was let down by a rope 75 feet into the shaft, but immediately gave the signal for hoisting. A strong current of air comes from the opening, carrying with it thick smoke and obnoxious gases. The preparations for the rescue of the miners continued to be pushed with the greatest vigor until 12:30, when, as above stated the first man was reached.

NARBATIVE OF A SURVIVOE. Martin Cox, one of the minera taken out of the mine alive, makes the follow-

ing statement: We went in at 7 o'clock A. Answer to Queries.

I do not suppose that my questions yet unanswered in the Query corner of the RECORD are so difficult that no one else can answer them, nor that they are of too little consequence to be deserving of notice, but that the right person in the right mood has not taken hold of them. I will answer them briefly myself. To illustrate the traction of loads properly would require more space than would be allowable here, and, to make a long matter short, for a wheel raising over an obstruction the line of traction should be at right, angles with a line, drawn from the point of contact with the obstruction to the center of the wheel, and generally the least force that will move a load must be exerted? in the direction that the load is to move for each instant, that the force is applied. So we see it is not true, as is generally stated without limit, that the nearer we hitch to a load the easier it can be drawn. I can't furnish the Editors with a demonstration of what I have asserted if required, and can show that it is not correct philosophy which is often given, that the load moves more easily in hitching up close to it, because the team carries part of it and draws the rest.




