A Novel Musical Instrument.

A new musical instrument of great interest is said to have been invented in Cincinnati. 



a piece of martial music we were ad-

dressed for a few minutes by Mr. Geo. to the preparation of the ground, and also notifying us that the services of Eld. D. A. Wagner, of Buchanan, as chief Orator, had been promised, but owing to sickness in his family he was unable to be present. After vocal music by the entire assembly, Rev. J. W. H. Carlisle, of Berrien Springs, was introduced, who delivered a very able and appropriate prayer. Again the sound of vocal music rent the air of the forest, after which Rev. L. W. Wilkinson, of Niles, kindly entertained us with a very instructive and pleas-ing speech. This was followed by an able and well taken speech on the institution and results of Sabbath Schools, by Rev. D. H. Reiter, of Berrien Springs. After a piece of martial music dinner was announced, whither we all wended our way, escorted by Marshal Parketon. We will not attempt to describe the sumptuousness of the feast, but suffice it to say that no such feast was ever eaten in the Garden of Eden, in all the primitive loveliness of Nature's early morning. Many thanks are certainly due to the gentle hands that prepared it. The repast being ended, we returned to our posts for further duties. The first thing in order was the hearing of reports from the several Schools. Seven Superintendents presented statistical reports of the condition and progress of their Schools. The Superintendent of the Charlotteville School, Mr. Geo. McCallom, has forwarded to us a very full and explicit report, which we subjoin to this article, as a sample for other Superintendents in making their reports hereafter. We are sorry that we have not all the reports, for thereby we could see at a glance that Lake township is not in the rear with the work of teachng the rising generation the lessons of truth and piety. After a few pieces of music Rev. Mr. Hetzler was introduced, who submitted a very instructive speech to the Sunday School

scholars, Vocal music from individnal Schools being in order, the following responded: California, two pieces; Laketon, three; Lake, two.
R. V. Clark being called for, responded with a few remarks relative to the Sunday School work throughout the State, and the arrangements that were made at the last State Convention for the purpose of collecting Sunday School statistics, and concluded by presenting a resolution, which was adopted, organizing the Sunday School Association of Lake township, to meet annually. We were then interested by a colloquy from the California School. A piece of instrumental mu-sic closed the pleasures of the meeting, a meeting which we hope will long be remembered, not only for the present pleasure, but for the good which may grow out of it. Ps. 121: 7-3; "He Sall Paysence The Soul" God works by means; and means and ends are connected in His plan and in His providence. In the use of means and in a humble and constant reliance upon the grace of Christ, the child of God may cherish the hope that he shall not be left to fall into sin and dishonor his Master. This is implied in that safety which the promises of God encourage us to expect—"The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil: He shall preserve thy soul." But this preservation may be expected only in the use of appropriate means, and the cherishing of right feelings. The Christian is ever to feel his dependence upon divine grace, and he must watch and pray. He must live near to God, if he would not be left to wander away from Him. God has ordained means for the security of His people; and it is His purpose to ren-der these effectual. Their safety, therefore, does not depend altogether upon themselves. They are kept by the power of God, through faith unto salvation. He will never leave nor forsake them. He will keep them near to Himself. If He permits some into sin, it is for wise reasons—for our humiliation—to show that the work of sanctification is not complete in this life, that His cause is not dependent upon human instruments; and He may permit some to fall into sin for the salvation of others, as these falls excite others to diligence, watch-fulness and prayer, and so tend to their safety and salvation. Thus He overrules their fall for good, and displays His glorious grace in their recovery. These laus, then, are out exceptions, permitted for wise reasons, and overruled for the safety of many. They are one of the means by which the people of God are kept in the path of holiness. And if God regards their safety so highly as to promote it by means so costly—bring good out of ovil—He will not suffer them to be lost. They may trust in Him and te safe. 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
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

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
