A Subterraneau Forest. The Flint Globe says that one of the singular incidents of the fire below Flushing, is the bringing to light the remains of a subterranean forest. On the farm of D. B. Lyon, of this city, is a marsh of about twenty-five acres in extent, which he has cleared, and has mown as a meadow for some time. The fire has burned off the alluvial soil which bore the grass, and which was about two feet deep. As it appeared, the remains of an ancient forest came to light—a perfect tangle of old trees and stumps, which appears to have been familiar with those famous dam builders, the beavers. Many of the stumps show plainly the marks of the beaver's teeth, while others, Mr. Lyon says, have every appearance of having been cut off with an axe. If this is true, there must have been men who used such an implement roaming through the forest thousand years ago.

How Needles are Made.

There is a needlo factory in New Haven where the whole process is done by a single machine without the manual labor of any person. A coil of steel wire is put in. It cuts it off at the required lengths. 'It cuts the steel pieces consecutively; punches the eyeholes, counter-sinks the eyes and grinds the points, and, in fact, does everything until the needles drop out completely formed. Another machine picks, them up and arranges them heads and points together, and a third piece of mechanism puts them into paper. One of these machines occupies no more space than an ordinary table, and each of them turns out from thirty to forty thousand a day. Most of the needles hitherto in ' use have been imported from England until a few years past.

Millions of money have been accounted for by false charges for carpets, furniture, plumbing, printing, ink stands, stationery, &c. These articles, of course, were never received, and the work never performed. The people were thus robbed of millions of their treasury. One of the latest frauds has been detected in the services of Hon. Thos. C. Fields, one of the Assemblymen from New York City, who is proven to have been an active agent for the ring. While a member of the Legislature Fields put through a bill to compensate certain suburban Fire Companies for services in the sum of \$521,952.87. This large sum was raised, as provided by the bill, by the issuing of Fire Department stock. Field was to have fifty per cent. for his services in passing the bill, but the report of the cit-

izens' committee shows that he received, as assignee, \$507,279 and the Firemen got \$14,673.85. The Attorney General has brought suit for \$459,977.79, allowing Field about \$50,000 on his account. SMALL-POX AND CHOLERA. From many localities throughout the country, our exchanges note the prevalence of small-pox. Philadelphia seems to be suffering the worst at the present time. The disease is said to have been introduced there by Indian buffalo robes from infected tribes. These robes were quarantined by government, but were smuggled through. The deaths in Philadelphia from the disease, for the week ending Nov. 4th were 567. The disease has also broken out in Chicago, but as yet it has not spread to a very great extent. New York gives a full account of the arrival of the Cholera at that port: "The steamship Franklin, of the New Baltic Lloyd Line, arrived Saturday night with a number of cases of Cholera. She sailed from St. Etlin October 10th, touching at Copenhagen on the 12th. At the latter port she had 22 cabin and 611 steerage passengers, and a crew of 67 men. Ten days out the first case of cholera made its appearance among the steerage passengers, and when the steamer put into Halifax to obtain coal there had been nearly 100 cases of cholera and choleraic diarrhea, of which 40 were fatal. Since leaving Halifax one death occurred, and 12 patients suffering from cholera were sent to a hospital. The well passengers were also transferred to the United states steamer Delaware, lately fitted up as a receiving ship by the quarantine authorities. The Franklin. after the transfer of her passengers, was ordered to the lower quar-

Berrien County Schools. Superintendent's Report. In making my first report of school work, and the condition of the schools in Berrien county, I include the period from May 4th, 1871, to November 4th, 1871. Districts No. 10 and 30 of Niles Township are not included, as they have failed as yet to report. The report, unavoidably,

The school houses, so far as reported, number I52; 17 are brick, 2 log, and 133 frame buildings. The school property of the county, is valued at \$233,603, with a total indebtedness of \$6.836.68. During the past six months two brick school houses were constructed in the township of Pipestone, one each in Benmost commanding in its importance ton, Lincoln and Weesaw townships, and all seared with improved furniture. Those

The Buchanan Union school buildingwhich will be completed in time for the winter school—is a fine brick structure,

three stories above the basement, contain ing nine rooms, and will seat 700 scholars. Its estimated cost, when fully completed and equipped, will be about \$30,000.

St. Joseph, too, is leading in the forward march in educational matters. The Union school building has already reached its second story, and will be finished the coming winter. It will have cost, when completed, \$40,000. The citizens of

these districts can justly feel proud of the

school-houses they are so liberally provid-

ing for their children.

In the general confingration this fall, two school houses were burnt in this county; one in Chikaming, the other in Lake I have visited the schools in eight of the twenty townships of the county, and all the graded schools, except that in the city of Niles, and spent, with one exception, a half day in each school visited. In most of the schools I found the teachers zealously at work, and conducting the exercises of the school-room in a satisfactory manner. A few were eminently successful, and only one a total failure. I have

endeavored to make my visits pleasant and beneficial to teachers and scholars, making suggestions in methods of teaching and in some cases conducting the exercises of a class. The high standard for successful examination has left but a few poor and incompetent teachers in our schools. The word-

method, object-lessons, and phonetic spel-ling are taught in all the graded schools and in many of the district schools. The wages paid male teachers during the last school year, are reported at \$9, 798.82; to female teachers, \$29,737.32 making a total of \$39,537.32. The attendance upon the schools is highly gratifying; 79.7 per cent, or 7,487 of
