THE LABOR BILL.

The subject of appointing a Labor opmmission was discussed for sevral days in the House of "Representatives. The bill, with amendments, faally passed on the 20th by a vote of 134 to 36. As finally passed the bill^sreads as follows: A BILL to provide for the appointment of a commission on the subject of wages and hours of labor, and of division of profits between labor and capital in the

United States. Be it enacted, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, that there shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a commission of three persons, of whom one shall be practically identified with the laboring interests of the country, and who shall be elected from civil life solely with reference to their character and capacity for an honest and impartial investigation, who shall hold office for the period of one year from the date of their appointment, unless their duties shall have been sooner ac-

complished; who shall investigate the subject of wages and hours of labor ind of the division of the joint profits of labor and capital between laborer and capitalist, and the social, educational, and sanitary condition of the aboring classes of the United States, and how the same are effected by the existing laws regulating commerce, finance, and currency; provided, that said Commissioners be appointed ircespective of political or partisan con-

siderations, and from civil life. SEC. 2. That said Commissioners shall receive an annual salary of \$5,-000 each; shall be authorized to employ a clerk, and shall report the result of their investigation to the Pres-ident, to be by him transmitted to Congress.

The Finance Committee, reported a substitute for the bill fixing' the salaries of the Register and Second Comptrol-ler of the Treasury. The substitute es-tablishes a uniform salary of \$4,500 eachfor Assistant Secretaries, Comptrollers, Auditors, Registers, Commissioners of Customs, and Supervising Architect of the Treasury Department, Assistant Post-master General, and Commissioner of the Land Office, Commissioner of Pensions, and Commissioners of Indian Affairs. The Committee on Retrenchment and Investigation was directed to, make a most searching investigation in regard to the New York Custom House affair. HOUSE, DEC. 19th .- The day was spent in discussion on the Labor Bill without any action being taken. \$27,830 was appropriated to supply the deficiencies in the expenses of the Ku Klux Committee. SENATE, DEC. 20th.-An appropriation of \$250,000 for the expenses of the Geneva Commission, and one of \$60,000 for the Mixed Commission expenses at Washington were passed. Bills were introduced and referred as follows : Approonly ten are democratic.-Plaindealpriation \$350,000 to provide a building for the use of the Rost Office, Custom House, United States Courts, and Internal Revenue officers at Albany; to grant Missouri all the remaining public lands in said State for the school fund ; also to authorize the Court of Claims to try the suit of Carondelet vs. the United States; a resolution authorizing the Committee on Re trenchment to sit in the city of New York, and authorizing its sub-committee to administer oaths and take testimony was adopted. Mr. Sumner called up his resolution asking information about the United States naval vessels sent to San Do mingo, and it was passed without opposi tion. A bill was reported from the Einance Committee to reorganize the Custom service. The House General Amnesty bill was discussed at some length, but without action being taken thereon. HOUSE, DEC. 20th .- The select Committee on Civil Service were instructed to inquire into the expediency of providing for the election of Postmaster by the people. The Labor bill was again discussed and after amendments passed, as given in another column.

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
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ONE TERMI

The one-term Presidential question must now be fairly and squarely met in Congress. Senator Sumner has set the ball in motion by the introduction of a resolution proposing an amendment, to the constitution -rendering the person once holding the Presidential office ineligible to a second election. In order to not in any way interfere with the re-election of General Grant it is proposed that the amendment, if ratified, shall not take effect till after the 4th of March, 1873.

Now that the subject is introduced In the Senate we trust its agitation will be continued till Congress shall adopt this or a similar amendment, to be properly submitted to the Legislatures of the several States. The oneterm idea is gaining ground among the people; and we have not the least, doubt, if the voice of the entire American people could be heard on the question, that that voice would pronounce) unmistakably in favor of only one term for the President. It is the generally received impress-

ion that every President, almost as soon as elected, begins a series of operations looking to a second term. Let this temptation be entirely removed, and let every man, honored with the Presidency of the United States, understand that he has secured the highest honor in the gift of the American people, and that it is expected, for the term of his office, that he will devote his energies to the service of his country's good; and not to the manipulating political workings; so as to secure another term of office.

We trust Congress will be disposed to look at this question in its true light, and as respects of the interests of the country; and not as a political move to influence the re-election of Grant. It is a question with which the people sympathize, and in which they feel a deep interest, whether introduced by Senator Sumner or Senator Morton. We say then let Congress consider the question impartially and not in a partisan light.

POSTMASTERS. A move was made in the right di rection in the House when the Select Committee on Civil Service was instructed to "inquire into the expediency of providing for the election of Postmasters by the people." There is not a valid reason, to our mind, why this officer should not be elected as well as any other officer where the duties to be discharged are of so local a character. If it is considered wisest that the party in power shall have the Postoffices, then we say let that offieer be nominated or clected by the majority of that party in the several. localities, where the officer is to offiwiate. Better however, that the office be made elective, as any other office, by the whole people within a given dis-trict. This would be true Republisanism, and would meet the hearty approval of the people; with the ex-e-ption of political wire pullers. We trust Congress will agitate this
