## LOUISIANA LEGISLATIVE MUDDLE.

For some time the Legislative muddle in Louisiana has created no little excitement throughout the country, and the prospects of a bloody encounter in New Orleans between the different factions, have been extremely fair. There are two assemblages claiming to be the legally constituted Legislature, but neither of these have a quorum, and hence are unable to transact business. Both Legislatures are guarded by armed force. The Reformers are under the lead of Carter, and the other party under that of Governor Warmoth. It appears that corruption and fraud have aroused the people to that extent that the most bitter feeling prevails against the Governor. It is difficult yet to predict which party will come out ahead, though last reports seem to indicate that the Governor has played a little sharp on the reform party, by securing the repeal of the laws obnoxious to the reformers.

RAILROAD-AID-BOND DECISION.

In the United States Circuit Court Judges Emmons, Longyear and Withry, on Tuesday rendered a decision adverse to the Supreme Court decis-ion, relative to the constitutionality and validity of Railroad-Aid-Bonds. This decision holds that Railroad-Aid-Bonds voted and issued prior to the decision of our State Supreme Court are constitutional and valid. If this decision is sustained by the Supreme Court of the United States, as the cases will probably be carried there, all the Bonds issued prior to the de-cision of our State Court will have to be paid. This is as we predicted, at the time our Supreme Court rendered its decision. The amount of Bonds affected will be about \$1,500,-000.

## THE MURDERER STOKES.

Stokes, the murflerer of James Fisk, Jr., was to have been arraigned in the court of Over and Terminer on Tuesday, the Grand Jury having found six indictments against him for the murder of Fisk. It is to be hoped that justice will be meted out in this case by the New York courts. Let the courts vindicate the law. Let murderers, who take vengeance into their own hands, learn that the majesty of the law will be maintained.
