APPORTIONMENT.

It is a matter of great importance that each section of our Government should have that representation in our Nacional Legislature equal to the ratio which its inhabitants bear to the entire population of the Nation. This is one of the first principles of our Republican form of Government. That this is not the case at present is admitted by all, and that justice demands that a change shall be made is also admitted, but in what way the evil is to be remedied is a question upon which our wisest, men entertain different opinions.

We cannot adopt a Democratic form of Government in the strict sense of that term. From the immensity of car population there would be endless confusion and undue deliberation should the people meet together as a whole for the purpose of enacting our laws. They have the right to do so, but have chosen to exercise this right through their Representatives in Conress. The interests and welfare of the Nation can be more safely entrusted in the hands of a few who have the control and management of Governmental concerns.

The question is whether or not our present Congress as a Legislative body is composed of a sufficient number of men to enact the laws and to look after the interests of the Nation. Some contend that it is not. That the numher of inhabitants entitled to a Representative should not be enlarged, and that the new apportionment should be made accordingly. Others maintain that the number of the members of Congress should not be increased. There are now 243 members in the House, besides two members from each State in the Senate. The number of population entitled to a Representative would be increased, and each State furnish its due portion according to the actual enumeration of its inhabitants. As our nation increases in wealth and population its affairs of necessity become more complicated, and the machinery of the Government is run at a greater expense, but whatever looks to a decrease in the burdens and taxations of the people without material detriment to the country is what the present time demands.

Whether it would be wisdom or not to increase the number of the members of the House of Representatives or retain the present number, needs no further discussion, as the Senate, after considerable delay, introducing a new apportionment bill, and discussing the subject pretty thoroughly, adopted the House bill on Monday. EXTRA SESSION.

Some of the papers of the State make considerable to do in opposition to other than apportionment legislation during the coming extra session. This, to all thoughtful persons, appears very unwise. If an extra session must be called, as is evident, to act upon the new apportionment question, there is not one good reason why other needed legislation should not be attended to. There is no valid reason why the interest of numerous locali-

tics should be made to suffer because the coming session of the Legislature is not a regular one. The present members will be able to accomplish more in thirty or forty days than an almost entirely new body could accomplish in twice the time. Let the necessities of the hour be met by such legislation as the interests of the people demand. As to what matters need legislation thereon, Governor Baldwin is, no doubt, pretty thoroughly posted. And that these matters arc numerous, and both general and local in

their character, there can be no question. We trust, therefore, that the extra session will be one of legislation on other subjects as well as on that of Congressional apportionment and a re-districting of the State.

NILES CITY AND POVERTY.

We did not call attention, last week, to the fearful prevalence of poverty in Niles, as shown by the Report of the Superintendents of the County Poor, from the fact that it was a near neighbor. We preferred to let others in the north part of the County speak first. They have done so, as will be seen by the articles published from the St. Jo. Traveler, and from the Herald. We claim all these matters should be looked into. There appears to be no just reason why Niles, with only a population of 4,630, according to the census of 1870, should use of the County funds, for the poor, to the amount of five times the sum of Buchanan, while the population is not double. Providence is a place of about seventy thousand inhabitants. Its principal source of wealth is from its manufactories, which are of cotton and woolen goods, jewelry and farm-ing implements. Many very wealthy people reside in this place, whose interests are largely in factories beyond

the city limits. I heard the name of Sprague spoken of as one, and his

factories were pointed out to us, a few miles out of Providence. as we were passing. The large factories were substantial looking buildings, but the most noticeable of all were the dwellings of the operatives. There were seven streets running parallel. I counted eleven houses on one street, near the center of the village. The buildings were uniform in size, and as near alike as though run in one mould, there being a garden privilege in the rear, leaving a space of twenty-five feet between each dwelling, as near as I could judge, as we moved rapidly through. The houses stood in rows, as accurate as a well set orchard. All were neatly painted, presenting a cheerful and pleasant appearance. None but an actual observer can comprehend the magnitude of the

CHICAGO RELIEF BILL.

After a thorough look at the prin-ciple involved in the Chicago Relief bill our firm conviction is, that the bill on its re-consideration in the Senate should be defeated. While our sympathy goes out for fire-destroyed Chicago, it is also equally strong for the suffering towns of our own State and those of Wisconsin. And still farther, the principle of justice would allow to every individual losing his buildings by fire to rebuild the same, on the same liberal terms accorded to the Chicago sufferers. This, at once, will appear out of the question for the Government to pursue any such course. Our Government was not organized for the purpose of thus making good the losses of the unfortunate.

While at first thought it was almost a unanimous voice throughout the country, and by the press, that Chi-cago ought to be granted the relief sought by the provisions of the bill, but a sober second thought, the result of mature deliberation, has wonderfully changed the conclusion. The provisions of this bill, while it grants relief to Chicago, does so at the material interest of other localities equally entitled to the sympathy and pro-tection of Government. For illustration, Manistee, Michigan, Peshtigo, Wisconsin, are Lumbering towns. Destroy this interest and you destroy the prospects of these places, and render doubly severe the blow already suffered. If aid must be rendered to will share equally their burden. As it must be a source of deep mortification to the Niles people to be compelled to support so large a number of their population out of the county charity fund, we would suggest that they send a deputation of their prominent citizens to our place to observe our manner of getting over these difficulties. A few days of contact with our business men could not fail to be of advantage to them and the sight of our laboring people going cheerfully to and from their work might illustrate to them the benefit to be derived from providing that class


