No certificate will be endorsed or renewed. In no case will a certificate be granted unless the applicant sustains a good moral character; for attention losses more than that of value if it does not include moral teachings. All teachers are requested to attend the Spring Institutes, which will be announced as soon as arrangements are completed for holding them.

CONSTITUTIONAL.

A case has been decided in the lower Courts declaring the law passed at the last session which fixes the salaries of the Auditors of Wayne County unconstitutional. This position has previously been taken by some of our most able lawyers, who claim that the Board of Supervisors or Auditors have the right to fix the compensation of their own services, as well as all other services rendered for the county, and that all laws intended to limit or effect the discretion of the Board of Supervisors in adjusting and settling all claims of whatever nature against the County are null and void. The opposite of this doctrine has many intelligent lawyers and jurists, and we are glad that arrangements are being made to carry up the case referred to above as a test case, so as to have the matter settled by the Supreme Court.
