#### GOAT ISLAND AGAIN.

The Goat Island Swindle is again before Congress. It needs the most careful watching on the part of Congressmen to prevent the numerous land frauds that are constantly being urged before that body. This Island, in the Bay of San Francisco, should no more be given to the Central Pacific Railroad Company than should so much ground adjoining Chicago.

Our readers will remember that the RECORD had occasion to discuss this same swindle some two years ago. It is hoped that Congress will, at once, put a veto to this fraud. The United States should in no way part with Goat Island. It is of immense value to the Government for military purposes, as every one knows, who is at all acquainted with its location.

We are glad to see that the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce-is properly opposing the swindle. A San Francisco dispatch of the Sth.

says:
"The Chamber of Commerce of San Francisco, this afternoon, unanimously adopted a resolution denouncing the projected granting of the use of Goat Island to the Central Pacific Railryad Company, and a memorial to Congress protesting in behalf of the commercial interests of the State against the grant. The memorial states that the company has already secured from that grant sixty acres in the harbor of San Francisco."

The bill for the payment of \$100 bounty to soldiers, or their widows and orphans, who were mustered into service prior to the 22d of July, 1861, up to which time no bounties were allowed, was taken up. has so ordained it that we do the greatest Christian work for others, greater is the reflex good resulting to ourselves. He that waters shall himself be watered.

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
