Thus merchants of Detroit have already obtained quite a large increase of trade from dealers who have quit purchasing in Chicago, and who feel resentful over the abusive tirades of Chicago journals. If the Tribune will only eep that sort of thing going for a year or two longer the trade of large sections of the Northwest will avoid Chicago as instinctively as a peaceful gentleman avoids the neighborhood of a common scold.—Detroit Post.







THE STATE LAND OFFICE.

The recent investigation by the Legislature into the management and regulations of the State Land Office shows very conclusively what evila men will resort to for their own aggrandizement, and the vigilance and care which the people should use to prevent and detect fraud and corruption in those who are entrusted with official positions.

Let us briefly refer to some of the charges against the practice of the State Land Office and note the opportunities afforded for deception and chicanery and the advantages which are taken of them. We montion first what is known as "dealing in scrip." Everybody has heard, of certificates being issued by the State for the opening of Public Roads, which are received in payment for swamp lands. These certificates, or scrip, are bought by speculators, often at a great discount, and present on their face a fair and legitimate transaction. But when the scrip is allowed to be purchased by those connected with the Land Office for speculation, with money that should be returned to the Treasurer as soon as received, we then see where the practice works a hardship and injustice in many cases. For instance, a. person wishes to buy a certain 80 acres of land. He sends \$100 to the Land Office, being the government

price for such land as he desires \$1.25 per acre. The Land Commissioner examines into the matter, discovers that the land is swamp land, puts the \$100 in his pocket and pays to the State for the land \$100 in scrip, which he has on hand, and for which he has paid perhaps seventy cents on the dollar. He has cleared \$30 by the transaction, and cheated the State out of the same amount.

Again is the "selling of information" by the Land Office. This is done in the following manner : The numerous land agents in our large cities have an agreement with the Land Commissioner that if he will report to them so soon as a certain desirable piece of land is called for by one who desires to purchase, he will sell it at an advance of the government price, and divide the excess. A person, for instance, applies to the Land Office for information concerning a piece of land. The Land Commissioner at once telegraphs to some land agent in the vicinity of the land, and at the same time writes a letter to the person who makes the idquiry, and tells him the land is sold to Mr. ----, in his neighborhood, and if he desires that certain piece of land he had better call upon him as it is for sale. If the agent can sell the land at an advanced price it is at once deeded to him, who transfers the title, if not no deed is made and it reverts This practo the State. tice, of course, has less color of right and justice about it than the one previously mentioned, but it is, nevertheless, indulged in to an equal extent.

There are many more "ways that are dark and tricks that are vain". which have been exposed by the investigation referred to, in connection with this one office, but we will only mention one more, and is the most pernicious and disgraceful of any that is yet discovered, and it is known as "selling out homesteaders." We have not the space in this article to explain this nefarious method of speculation in detail. The technicalities of the law require homesteaders who have settled upon the so called swamp lands after they have occupied it three months, under a license granted by the State, to make an affidavit that they have actually settled upon the lands, and obtain the affidavit of the Supervisor of the town to the same purport. After five years of continuous occupation and improvement a deed is given.

Thousands of homesteaders have settled upon lands after such a license has been given them, have worked early and late for five years to redeem. and improve the land and to build them homes, enduring innumerable hardships and privations, but who have failed to make the affidavit as is plainly required by law. This has sometimes resulted from ignorance and sometimes from negligence. After five years of wearisome toil, anxious waiting and undisturbed possess ion, the settler, when he comes to make inquiry concerning his deed, finds that his home belongs to some stranger. The affidavit of occupancy having never been filed the lands are considered swamp lands, and sold to

for in no other way than the reduction of the tariff and the discussion in Congress of a further reduction, which deterred parties from engaging in building smelting furnaces as they intended, as it is attended with an enormous expense, and unless protected by a tariff would be a hazardous undertaking. The result is as expected, the supply is not sufficient for the in-

creased demands, and pig iron has advanced some \$7 per ton. This should be a lesson to those who are clamoring for a reduction of the tariff on woolen goods. There is little question but that the

woolen crop of this country could be thribbled in three years if proper effort was made. Our farmers have sold one wool clip at a good price and have promise of still better for that soon to be ready. They should increase their flocks at least fifty per cent. This country should shear its own wool and wear it. Nature has not imposed any barrier to prevent this result, as is the case in the raising of coffee. We should not fall on a dependence upon Europe to provide us protection against the inclemency of a capricious climate. The money paid for the same can all be spent at home, greatly to the advantage of the people and the nation, if a tariff is established that will furnish proper-

Bills were reported authorizing the payment of bounty to accepted volunteers who enlisted under proclamation of May 3, 1861, prior. to the 22d of July of the same year; authorizing the Southern Claims Commission to appoint special commissioners, etc.; the bill giving the assent of Congress to sub-scription of the District of Columbia for stock of the Piedmont & Potomac Railroad Company was taken up and discussed until adjournment.
