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



THE CINCINNATI CONVENTION. The intention originally in the call of the Convention to be held at Cincianati, no doubt, was not to nominate candidates for President and Vice President, but the purpose was to have a meeting of those who are opposed to the President, of such numbers and of such men, that measures could be inaugurated to influence the Philadelphia Convention to nominate some other candidate.

Since the recent elections, however speculations in regard to the Cincin nati Convention have changed. It is considered that Grant's re-nomination is a foregone conclusion, and the disposition to turn the Cincinnati Convention from a Republican assembly to a nursery for a new party organization is very evident. The aim now is to put in nomination some candidate who is not objectionable to a portion of the Democratic party; and a large faction of the party has agreed to support the nomination, and others on condition that the same ticket be put in nomination at the Democratic Convention, if there be one held. We would inquire what reasons are

there for this new party? When the Republican party was called into existence they advocated new measures, new theories, new issues sprung up which brought the party into being. There were issues directly opposed to the doctrines of Democracy, and must ever remain such. Is was an attempt to preserve freedom and equal rights in these United States which brought on the war and exposed the disloyalty and enmity of a certain portion of the Democratic party to our Republican form of Government, and this spirit of hatred and rebellion still exists—it has not been destroyed but only subdued. It is folly to suppose because victory has been secured upon the bat-tle field that the Republican party has fulfilled its whole mission and may

is covered with cedars, hence its name. The range of which Cedar Hill is a part is said to be a continuation of the White Mountains, and terminates in East Rock, near New Haven. On the ridge of this Hill, about a quarter of a mile from the cemetery, can be seen, it is said, East Rock, at New Haven, and Mt. Tom, in the southern part of Massachusetts, and also hills thirty miles to the west, as well as hills twenty miles to the east. West Rock is situated two or three miles west of East Rock, and is said to be a termination of the Green Mountains. West rock is noted for the Judges' Cave, where the judges, Goffe and Whalley, the regicides, were hid in the early history of our country. The portion of the cemetery which is improved is laid out in hard walks and drives, and is now frequented by those who wish to spend an hour or two away from the crowded city. No slabs or ordinary stones are allowed on the grounds, but only these which are fan-ciful and grand. Occupying the most commanding position is the monument of the late Samuel F. Colt, the noted pistol and revolver manufacturer. It was erected at a cost of thirty thous-

and dollars, is of Scotch granite, with a base of New England granite. It is very high and massive, and is sur-mounted by a bronze figure, repre-senting the angel Gabriel, facing the east, ready to blow his trumpet. Near this monument, and about as costly. is another which deserves notice. It is four square, and on each side are inserted slabs of Italian marble, on each of which are beautifully carved one of four scenes of the death and resurrection of our Savior. Resting on the corners of this are four pillars of Scotch granite which support a dome of Sienate marble exquisitely inlaid with marble of different colors. The niche under the dome is waiting for a statue. There are many others which deserve attention, but I leave the rest for your imagination to pic-

FROM NEW TROY.

April 15, 1872. EDITORS RECORD: - Jo. Baker, awhile ago, boasted that Three Oaks was a temperance town, but a few days after, the Marshal was seen helping a drunken man to the calaboose. 'Saloon" here has been closed by authority, and we hope the law will be so well observed as hereafter to be able to dispense with the services of a Marshal. Order also reigns in Weesaw. The greatest event of the season here, was the Drawing of Herman & Maudlin's grand gift enterprise on the 2d of this month. About 50 of the 400 ticket holders were present. About 2 o'clock P. M., the crowd assembled in front of the doctor's house with boxes, bags, and baskets, in which to pack their prizes. Shortly a grind-stone crank with two cheese boxes were placed in the front yard, each having a slide about the size of a man's hand. By the side of these Alladin Boxes was a table and chair for the venerable scribes, and a large dry-goods box for the speaker's stand. After vainly calling the crowd to order, the speaker announced that out of the 5,000 tickets issued, about four hundred only had been sold, and he would leave it to the representatives present which they would do, whether postpone indefinitely, or draw now for such prizes as he rould read over? The princi prizes offered were, a vacant lot in New Troy valued at \$150; a mare at \$100; a buggy at \$100; a bureau at \$25; a bedstead at \$10; and a variety of small prizes. The crowd, impatient to make themselves rich, voted unanimously to draw now. Then the master of ceremonies came forward with boxes containing the names of the stockholders, and the names of the prizes. It was advertised and also then voted that a list of the prizes only (and no blanks) should be placed in one box; the individual names in the other; then the company chose who should turn the crank and draw. After turning till the cheese, which had long left their wooden tabernacle, had almost been resurrected, the motion was stopped; and then with all the solemnity of the occasion, the man at either cheese box put in his hand, and with the manners of a school boy, presented to the master of ceremonies what they had drawn. All was joy and exultation when the crank was in motion, (and this was done before every drawing) each expecting a big slice of cheese, or something else; but when it stopped, and the drawing took place, not a sound was heard, nor a breath stirred, nor a man stirred, nor a hen stirred, nor a cow stirred, till each learned whether he had been made rich or poor. At the close of every such scene a shout would rend the air which would remind one of the Red men, of the forest. One "poor unfortunate" who had invested \$50, drew two 5 cent fractionals and an iron wedge; single ticket men drew the most valuable

prizes, thus proving the adage, "that it is better to be born lucky than rich." As soon as the drawing was over pan-dimonium reigned till the cheese boxes had been smashed, and the crowd satisfied that there were no prizes left; then a better spirit prevailed, and the disappointed ones resolved to Patrieve their fortunes by investing in Luther & Son's Enterprise —A few evenings since our quiet village was greatly disturbed by the alarm of fire.
