It seems that England did not comorehend the situation from some cause, and that Earl Granville's reply or proposition to our Government was, "That the United States withdraw the claims for consequential damages from the Geneva tribunal, Great Britain still maintaining that they are outside of the provisions of the treaty; that in future wars whenever either nation is a beligerent and the other a neutral, the neutral shall not be held responsible for indirect or consequential damages in claims arising in a similar manner and under similar circumstances with the claims to which the treaty of Washington refers."

To such a proposition of course our Government could not accede. The result therefore is that the Administration has decided Earl Granville's proposition unacceptable, and that our Government will adhere to the case as presented before the Geneva Arbitrators. It seems to us that the case is in a worse condition than before there were any intimations that the consequential damage claims would on any grounds be withdrawn. 
Children's Understanding.

CINCINNATI CONVENTION.

The Cincinnati Liberal Convention after a three days' session nominated Horace Greeley for President on the sixth ballot, and B. Gratz Brown for Vice President, on the second ballot. Greeley's principal competitors were Charles Francis Adams and Lyman Trumbull. Judge Davis' strength in the Convention was not nearly so much as was anticipated. On the first ballot Adams had 203 votes, Greeley 147, Trumbull 110, Brown 95, Davis 921, Curtin 62 and Chase 21. The philosopher of the Tribune kept gaining on his competitors till the 6th ballot when he received 482 votes, and Adams 187.

The nominations are variously received, among Republicans and Dem-ocrats. While the great body of the Republicans will repudiate the Cincinnati nominations, a few are found in every locality that approve, and who will vote the ticket, provided it is endorsed by the Democracy. Perhaps a few will vote it any way, but the majority of those who are favorable to the Cincinnati ticket will repudiate it, in case the Democratic Convention shall make independent nominations. There is no disposition among Liberal Republicans, as a class, to pursue such a course as shall, in any event, place a purely Democratic candidate in the Presidential chair for the next four years.

Liberal Republican Platform.

We, the "Liberal Republicans" of the United States, in National Convention assembled, at Cincinnati, Ohio, proclaim the following principles as essential to just government:

1. 4. Local self-government, with impar-tial suffrage, will guard the rights of all citizens more securely than any centralized. power. The public welfare requires the supremacy of the civil over the military authority, and freedom of person under the protection of the habeas corpus. We demand for the individual the largest lib-erty consistent with public order, for the State self-government and for the nation to return to the methods of peace and the constitutional limitations of power.

5. The civil service of the Government has become a mere instrument of partisan tyranny and personal ambition and an object of selfish greed. It is a scandal and a reproach upon free institutions, and breeds a demoralization dangerous to the

perpetuity of a Republican Government. 6. We therefore regard a thorough reform of the civil service as one of the most pressing necessities of the hour ; that honesty, capacity and fidelity constitute the only valid claims to public employment; that the offices of Government cease to be a matter of arbitrary favoritism and patronage, and that public station shall become again the post of honor. 

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

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
