ROTATION IN OFFICE.

It being the settled conviction of the wisest and best men among us, that the only way any party can be kept together in unity and harmony, is by a change or rotation in office, it becomes the bounden duty of all persons upon whom the party have bestowed a reasonable share of public trust, by electing and re-electing them to office, to step aside like men, that others equally deserving, and who have worked as faithfully for the interest of the party may have also an opportunity to serve the people in a public capacity. In Berrien County it has been set-

tled almost to a definite rule, in the Republican party, that no officer, except in very rare cases, shall be elected more than two terms in succession, or four years. According to this rule there will be almost an entire set of new candidates to nominate at the County Convention. The Judge of Probate is elected for a term of four years, and it has not in the history of the County and of the Republican party, been customary to reelect to this office, with perhaps one exception. The County Clerk, Treasurer, and Sheriff each have been re-

elected to office, making their terms four years each. The Register of Deeds. Frank N. Dix. has had but one term of office, and as the work of that office has been satisfactorily performed, he, according to the usages of the party is entitled to a renor nation, and will undoubtedly receive it. As to the other incumbents, of course none of them can claim by the usages of the party, a re-nomination. There is however, much talk of Treasurer Hess' re-nomination, as also that of Hon.
