





### CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS, AND HIS NOMINATION.

As the Congressional Convention was held last week on Wednesday, and was field last week on Wednesday, and we did not return till Thursday morning, we could only simply announce the result in our last issue. The full proceedings of the Convention will be found in this week's paper. Let no one fail to read the proceedings, and one fail to read the proceedings, and especially Capt. Burrows' Speech accepting the nomination.

There was the most harmonious feeling prevalent throughout the Convention, notwithstanding the unpreceden-ted number of ballots taken before a nomination was effected. We presume that the history of Conventions will not present a parallel to this one. One hundred and fifty-one successive ballots cast without a single change, is a thing unheard of in nominating conventions. The final result of the Convention,

in nominating Capt. Burrows, was a most singular affair. The ground was so thoroughly looked over and the position of the delegates so firmly fixed, that each candidate expected, that by sticktuitiveness he would bring the support of the others to himself, and thus secure the nomination. Seven of the delegates from Berrien County in no event would combine against Capt. Burrows or in favor of any other candidate. And without seven of the delegates from Berrien, after Capt. Burrows received 14 votes, no other candidate could have been nominated. Only one vote, or two at most, in the Berrien delegation could have been, in any event, carried to Stoughton or Clisbee. When, therefore, it was evident that St. Joseph and Cass would not come to Bonine, the Berrien delegation determined to end the contest by casting their entire vote for Mr. Burrows. This was done too, with the approbation of the Doctor. The St. Joseph delegation, save one, it seems, had resolved that as Clisbee or Stoughton could not secure enough of Berrien delegates to insure the nomination of either, they too, would go to Burrows, if the Cass delegates did not at once come to Stoughton and abandon Clisbee. This the Cass delegation would not do, deeming that it was Stoughtons place, after having had two terms, to yield and come over to Cass. The result was therefore, on the 152d ballot, 26 votes for Burrows, 8 from Kalamazoo, 6 from Van Büren, (these were the original 14 that he had received) 8 from Berrien and 4 from St. Joseph.
