Proceedings of the Farmers' Club. The Buchanan Union Farmers' Club met, as usual, in their room on Saturday, Sept. 28th, and discussed the subject, "How to improve our roads." The different understanding of the law relating to roads, by the members of the Club, and the diversity of ways advocated by them for the improvement of the same, was the occasion of a number of animated speeches being delivered by members of the Club and others present. That we have a good and efficient road law is no doubt, but we believe its requirements are not often carried out, principally because the people have so little interest in the roads. In some cases our poor roads are caused by a lack of the requisite knowledge of how to work them. Much labor is put upon them that is the same as when plowing, because they are made no better on account of the work laid out on them. It is believed that we may, as a usual thing, have good roads if they are well turpined, with good ditches made on each side to carry off the water, and gravel, or some such material put in the middle as will pack down and become hard and not easily softened up by the rain. The advantages of having good roads are so evident that a moment's reflection must cause us all to have an interest in improving them. How pleasant and delightful to both man and beast to pass over a smooth, well graded, turpined road, with beautiful shade trees on either side. Oh, what a fine country this is, the traveler is apt to say, but how very disagreeable it is to ride over a rough, stony, and unimproved road. It matters not what other desirable qualities the country may possess, but few persons would choose to live in such a place. We hope the people will see it to be much to their advantage to have good roads and take more interest in improving them.
