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Paper Collars. [From the New York Evening Post.] Walter Hunt, who is said to be the

originator of the first successful paper

collars, was one of that useful race of inventors who seldom receive their full reward. He had been experimenting for years in machinery for sewing purposes, and, it is claimed, perfected an invention which, but for his pecuniary embarrassments, would have proved the first successful sewing machine. He was compelled to abandon this field, however, and after obtaining some twenty patents for new and useful inventions, he turned his attention to the manufacture of collars and cuffs of paper. In 1854 he made his first collar. Having secured the aid of business men, who saw a new and profitable trade in this invention. he gradually got his collars into market; but the sale was slow. To wear a collar made of paper was regarded as a sign of poverty, and people ridiculed the idea of substituting paper for linen. Their business in 1856 was about \$1,000 a week, which increased, in the hands of Messrs. Valentine & Co's successor, to \$3,000 a week in the succeeding year. In 1858 Mr. W. E. Lockwood, of Philadelphia, purchased the Hunt patents and machinery, and continued the manufacture of cloth-lined collars.

After concluding to take a journey to the far West, the first thing in order is to select the best method of getting there, and to those who contemplate going by rail road we unhesitatingly advise them to take the great Burlington Route. You can go on this route from Chicago to Omaha without change of cars, making close connection with the Kansas Pacific and Union Pacific railroads to California, and all the Territories. It is also the only direct route from Chicago to Kansas City, without ferry or change With elegant day coaches, Pullman's Palace Sleeping cars, Pullman's Dining cars, accommodating conductors, heavy ironed and well ballasted track, and everything provided for the convenience of travelers, regardless of cost, the route is, as claimed, unsurpassed for comfort, safety, and speed. That portion of Iowa we shall speak of more particularly at this time, lies in Montgomery and Cass Counties, being in the second and third tiers of counties from the southern boundary of the State, and about sixty miles east of Council Bluffs. We left the cars at Red Oak, a flourishing town of some 2,500 inhabitants, and the county seat of Montgomery we say of Red Oak applies alike to nearly every village we visited in western Iowa, in regard to the place being in advance of the settlement and agriculturalimprovements of the country. People should therefore use more care in the selection of a town to do business in than in the selection, of there is no difficulty at present to find a farm of suitable size in any township in south-western Iowa, that would suit the idea of any farmer so far as the surface of the country is concerned. The surface is generally rolling, but farms can be selected in the bottoms or on the ridges by those who prefer level land. The soil is a rich black muck, from three to six feet in depth, underlaid with a clay loam substance. It is hard to find so large a section of country with such uniformity in the quality of the soil, so that in selecting a farm on the wild prairie one will consult nearness to market, timber, water privileges &c., more than the nature of the soil or the gen-

eral surface of the country. .... There are no longer any homesteads in this section. Wild land sells from four to nine dollars per acre, and railroad land on a credit of ten years from eight to fourteen dollars per acre. Land that can be bought for four and five dollars per acre, is worth from \$18 to \$20 as soon as broke and enclosed by fence. The soil affords a natural, drainage, and, strange as it may appear, even in the bottom called "Seven Mile" where the land is low and perfectly level, farmers are able to plow in a few hours after the hardest rain. This valley of the Seven, Mile is a beautiful section of country, noted for its rich soil, valuable farms, and the protection it affords from the cold prairie winds. The country is well watered. It is hard to find a farm where there is not good living water, in either of these counties. There is also an abundance of large blue stem grass on the wild prairies. It is almost equal to our timothy hay for stock, and on account of the grass and water no better section of country can be found anywhere for raising stock. winter, and farmers frequently com-






