



## PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

Some of the papers in this and other States are suggesting that the National Constitution be changed so as to require a bill or joint resolution. to be read three times in each House, and that on its final passage it shall receive a majority of the votes of allthe members elected to each House before it shall become a law, the vote to be taken by yeas and nays, and enmanifest object of such a provision is to prevent hasty legislation at the close of the session, and the Consti-tutions of several of the States contain a similar clause. All unnecessary restriction by constitution, either in Congress or State Legislatures should he avoided. It is evident that in the matter referred to, Congress should have greater latitude, and greater limits than are required in the gov-"ernment of a single State. The members of our National Legislature are becoming numerous, and must of course grow still larger in numbers, is the country becomes larger in population. The subjects brought under legislative control and supervision necessarily enlarge as the country developes. The matters of tegislation are more and more difficult and complicated as the material interests of the country improve, and become more extensive and diversified. We already see that by far the most important work of Congress is enrusted to committees.
