

FCFR SUFERVISORS FOR MILES **COTY-A PROPOSED SWINDLE ON** REDRIES COUNTY.

It may not yet be generally understool that it is the design of the memb.r frem the Niles district to introduce a hill in the Legislature to amend the charter of the city of Niles, one of the main features of which will be to grant that place four, instead of two Supervisors as shonow has. Scarcely could a greater piece of injustice and swindling upon the balance of the County be attempted. By no rule or principal of justice can the thing be looked apon with the least degree of milowance. And Berrien County will cternally politically remember any of her members that, for a single menent, dares advocate the measure. Niles city has found, that she can Lo longer control the Board of Sun rvisors to the interests of that place and to the disadvantage of the balance of the County. In this extremity, something must be done to rein her control of the County. She his had har say solong that she can-not brock the inter of yielding to the tak claims of the balance of the iter of wants twice her present undue influence on the Board of Supervisors. She has more now than she is justly entled to, as compared with some Townships in the

County. Take for instance the Village and Township of St. Joseph, which has only one Supervisor, with a population of 2.974. The Village and Township of Buchanan has but one Supervisor, and the population in 1870 was 2,857, Now, Niles City has only (in 1870) a p pulation of 4,630. Now, sho already has an undue proportion on the Board of Supervisors, and to give her two more, would be simply an outrage on the balance of the County.

It is true Niles may come and claim that her population has increased since 1870. This may be true, but then her increase has not been in any greatce ratio than that of the Townships and villages above referred to, or than that of other Townships in the County. So that the argument that may le based on the increase of population falls to the ground: We know that Niles has always pretended to have a larger population than she really had. Her claim in days gone by was 7,000 inhabitants, but the census of 1870 took the wind out of her sails, giving her only 4,630. Now, every person in Berrien County knows full well that the city of Niles has not, for the last three years, increased in population and other improvements any faster than the rest of the .County. That she to-day is not, relatively considered, of any more importance, as compared with the balance of the County, than she was in 1870. The First and Fourth Wards of Niles city have now one Supervisor, and have a united population of 2,582. The Second and Third Wards have a population of 2,048 and have one Supervisor. Now then, if the 2,582 inhabitants of the 1st and 4th Wards of Niles are entitled to two Supervisors, then the 2,857 inhabitants of Buchanan, the 2,994 inhabitants of St. Joseph. and the S.116 of Benton are entitled respectively to at least two Supervisors each. If the 2.048 inhabitants of the 2d and 3d Wards, of Niles city are entitled to two Supervisors, then the 2,857 of Buchanan are entitled to about three; the 2,994 of St. Joseph to three; the 3,116 of Benton to three; the 1,909 of Niles Township to two Supervisors. Several other Townships having nearly 2,000 inhabitants would also be entitled to an additional Supervisor each. Now, the fairness and justice of Niles city would not in any wise allow these additional Supervisors to the other Townships. The entire people of Berrien County know that this move of Niles city is but to succeed in getting, not her full share of repretentation on the Board of Supervisors, but to get more than her full share, to get double. She is not satisfied with equality. It may still be claimed that Niles city is entitled to two additional Supervisors on the ground of her wealth. But how stands the case ? The valuation of real and personal estate in Niles city, as equalized by the Board of Supervisors in October, was \$986 .-270. This amount is now represented by two Supervisors. The 1st and 4th Wards, represented by one Supervi sor, has a total valuation of \$394,890 Now, if this \$394,890 is entitled to two Supervison, then the \$534,096 of Bertrand is entitled to more than two; the \$377,200 of Berrien to two; the \$488,650 of Benton to more than two; the \$551,653 of Buchanan to more than two; the \$537,499 of Niles Township to more than two; the £397,995 of Oronoko to two; the \$392,746 of St. Joseph to two. Again, if the \$591,380 of the 2d and 8d Wards of Niles city entitles them to two Supervisors, then the \$584,096 of Bertrand ought to entitle that Township to two; the \$551,653 of Buchanan to two; the \$537,490 of Niles Township to two. The secret of this move, by the city of Niles against the balance of the County, is found in the fact, that for many years that city has been wont by hook or crook, or by means of the persistency of its Supervisors, to evade its just share of taxation. This has been known to many of the Supervisors, but the difficulty was to remedy it. The Supervisors, however, at their October session, determined to take the bull by the horns, and hence determined to bring the assessment in the city of Niles up to something near an equal basis. The Niles Supervian equal basis. The Niles Supervi-sors had assessed, for the year 1872, the real estate of the city at \$689,-\$355, and the Board raised their as-sessment 20 per cent. bringing it up

an assessed valuation (of \$584,096.; Buchanan of \$551,653; Niles Townhip of \$537,499; Benton also has nearly an coust amount, it being \$488.650.

Now, from these data we submit if Niles city-is not already liberally-reprented on the Board of Supervisors,

and that it would be simply unjust and outrageous to give to them one or two more Supervisors. This would accomplish their cherished desire to have an undue amount of control on the Board, thereby enabling that city to evade its just share of the burdens of the County in the future as in the past. No reasonable Representative or Senator in the Legislature can cast his yote for such an outrage.


POPELATION AND VALUATION OF BERRIEN COUNTY, BY TOWNSHIPS AND WARDS.

FEDERAL, AND STATE OFFICES. The President has issued a proclamtion declaring that on and after March 4th, 1873, persons holding any Foderal civil office by appointment un-der the Constitution and laws of the United States will be prohibited from, holding civil office under any State or

Territorial.government, or under the charter or ordinances of any municipal corporation except, the offices of Justice of the Pence, of Notary Pubic, and Commissioners to take acknowledgment of deeds, administer oaths, &c., and that the acceptance or continued holding of any such Territorial or municipal office, whether elective or by appointment, by any person holding a civil office as afore-

CONGRESSIONAL ...

SENATE, Jan. 21:-Bills were passed for the protection of owners of saw mills on the Mississippi River; for the erection of public buildings at Nashville; Tenn.; for the sale of a portion of the lighthouse reservation at Fort Gratiot, Mich.; to enable the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to purchase certain improvements within the Nez Perces reservation in Idaho .-Bills were introduced-Authorizing a reference to the Court of Claims of the claim of the book agents of the Methodist Church South ; authorizing the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company to make payable in lawful money bonds which it has been anthorized to issue ; Oragin's amend. ment to the bill for the construction of six sloops of war, limiting the aggregate tonnage to 10,000 tons, was agreed to. The credentials of P. B. S. Pinchback, Senator elect from Louisiana, were presented.

HOUSE, Jan. 21.-The bill was passed authorizing settlers upon untimbered land to enter forty acres of timbered land for every one hundred and sixty acres of untimbered land, at \$1.25 per acre. Mr. McCrary, from the Election Committee, reported that Mr. Niblack, a contestant, was entitled to the seat from Florida, as against Walls. The Committee on Approoriations were instructed to inquire into the value of existing telegraph lines, the cost of their construction, and of the construction of new lines. The session was mainly occupied in debate upon the bill for the revival of American commerce. No action was taken on the bill.

SENATE. 



REDUCTION OF POSTAGE.

A bill is now before Congress which provides for a very material reduction postage. The bill provides that postage on letters be reduced to two cents for each half ounce or fraction thereof. This rate also to apply to all drop letters. Also that newspaper postage shall be paid at the offices where the papers are mailed instead of the office of delivery. This provision does not apply to weekly local newspapers, so far as their circulation in the county where published is concerned. Their circulation through the mails in such counties to be free of

postage as heretofore. In many respects this bill is far preferable to the present plan of collecting newspaper postage at the office of delivery. It will undoubtedly save much postage on printed matter that is now lost, as no papers will be sent without the postage thereon being paid. Now, in many instances, numerous papers are sent on which pos-

tage is never collected, owing to the removal of the parties to whom they are sent or their refusal to take them from the office and pay the postage thereon, as well as for other reasons. This move we regard as a move in the right direction, and one that ought to give general satisfaction.

RED TAPEISM.


