The Old Board.—The old Village

Board finished their labors for the

year on Wednesday evening of last

week. The Board have labored un-

der peculiar embarrassment in many

respects, feeling often that the prop-

erty was not given, though the

defects in the old charter to enable

them to enforce their orders and pro-

ceedings. This has been especially so

in the collection of side-walk tax, li-

censes, and assessing damages in the

opening and laying out of streets. With

a direct tax assessed at only \$2,500,

the Board have been reluctant about

appropriating more in some cases

where it would have been a reasonable

fit to the town. Taking all these

things into consideration our Village

Council deserve great credit for their

management of the affairs of the vil-

lage during the past year. Among

the principal improvements may be

mentioned the building and repairing

of side-walks. We cannot name the

amount of new side-walk that has been

built, but our side-walks, where need-

ed most, are built, and with a few

exceptions are in a good condition

throughout the entire village. The

cemetery has also much improved in

appearance, although not all has been

done in this direction that would have

been desirable. The village finances

were in a new Engine House, built

at Calaboso has been built for the

village. No one will deny but that

this is a needed and very desirable im-

provement to our village, and that our

Village Fathers acted wisely in order-

ing its construction. A Fire Com-

pany has also been organized during

the year, and other improvements

added to our Fire Department. Alto-

gether the Board has performed their

duties to the best interests of the vil-

lage and to the general satisfaction of

all concerned. Their meetings have

also been pleasant, and the utmost

harmony and good feeling have always

prevailed during their sessions.

Loos were hauled to our mills just

as long as the snow lasted and to the

road as long as there was sleighing in

the woods. There is a nice lot on

hand, and the mills will be kept busy

this summer.
